## Politics hit the parade

Gay and lesbian float denied entry in Western Days parade

TWIN FALLS — It's the first float to be denied entry into the Western Days parade.

While some say the decision was made in defense of conservative values, others say it was simply discrimination against gays and lesbians.

The Western Days Committee rejected a gay and lesbian group's request to participate in the annual Western Days parade that takes place today. The committee said it denied the float entry by the Southern Idaho Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender (GLBT) Community Center because it was inappropriate for a family event.

"This is a very conservative region with strong religious values," said Lisa Cuelier, chairwoman of Western Days Committee. "It's nothing against the group itself, but we felt that it was in everybody's best interest not to allow their float in the parade."

## Gonzalez murder suspect had drug conviction earlier in week

TWIN FALLS — A Twin Falls man convicted of drug possession earlier in the week was charged Friday with murder over Thursday morning's fatal shooting of another Twin Falls man.

James Anthony Naranjo, 27, was charged by the Twin Falls County prosecutor in the murder of Vicente Molina Gonzalez, 29, and is being

held without bail.

Police say Gonzalez was shot multiple times at 434 Fourth Ave. W. at about 1:20 a.m. Thursday, the result of an altercation between Gonzalez and a friend of Naranjo's.

Three other men — brothers Bernardino Duran, 32, and Reyes Duran, 27, and Eric Gonzalez, 22 — were charged by the prosecutor's office with accessory to murder, a charge that can carry a maxi-

mum of five years in prison. Eric Gonzalez is not related to the victim.

Preliminary hearings are scheduled for the four men June 8 at 8:15 a.m.

The charges came one day after police surrounded a Main Avenue West home for seven hours until the Durans surrendered. Eleven children who had been in the house were unharmed.

## New Jayco plant will bring increased production, new jobs to Magic Valley

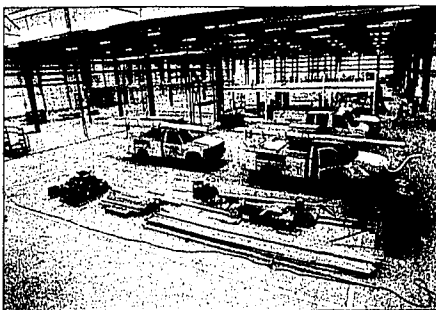

TWIN FALLS — Workers finished putting production lines together Friday in the new 86,000-square-foot Jayco Inc. plant where crews will begin building travel trailers Monday.

Unemployment "You can dips to 1.9 see we've percent in May got lives back there. In Twin Falls. We've got axles back here." See page C6

Dave Yoder, Jayco general manager, said during a tour of the new plant.

It is one of two buildings the Indiana-based company has built on Hanks Road in east Twin Falls at a cost of \$9 million. Half of the 57,000-square-foot second building will be used to laminate walls and floors that will be installed in



some of Jayco's most expensive trailers. The remainder of the building is for support services for other Jayco operations. The laminating department

is a key addition to Jayco's Twin Falls operations. "That will give us the ability to introduce new models on the West Coast," Yoder said.

In Twin Falls, Jayco opened in early 2005 with 10 employees at 621 Washington St. S.

### Caswell says he can balance land management, development

BOISE — The man President Bush wants to oversee the U.S. Bureau of Land Management says the federal government, in an era of rising prices and ever-growing demand for oil and gas, cannot ignore the untapped resources stored beneath millions of acres of public lands across the West.

At the same time, James L. Caswell, a veteran forester nominated by Bush this week to head the oft-maligned agency, believes balance is the key to managing public land and that technology can lessen the effect of drilling, logging and grazing can have on the landscape and wildlife.

"We just have to develop the resources that we have," Caswell told The Associated Press during an interview from his office Friday. "You

can't just write this stuff off. It's a terribly important activity for the good of the country."

## Working on the weekend: 1 in 5 take laptops on vacation, stay in touch with work

WASHINGTON — Sun block. Beach umbrella. Laptop.

One in five people toed laptop computers on their most recent vacations, an AP-Insos poll reported Friday said. Along with the 80 percent who said they brought along their cell phones, the survey shows going on vacation no longer means being out of the electronic loop.

Sizable numbers are interrupting their unwinding time to check in at the office and, even more so, to keep up with the social buzz.

About one in five said they did some work while vacationing, and about the same number checked office messages or called in to see how things were going, the poll showed. Twice as many checked their e-mail, while 50 percent kept up with other personal messages like voice mail.

The credit — or culprit, depending on one's view — is in part today's array of devices that can easily keep people digitally tethered to work-places, friends and family. The electronic gear was most commonly brought along by younger people — one in four below age 40 brought laptops, compared to 15 percent of those 50 to 64 and even less for older people.

Reasons vacationers performed work-related tasks include an expectation that they be available; a worry about missing important information; or in some cases the enjoyment of staying involved, according to analysts and some of those surveyed.

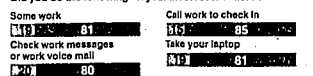
Nineteen percent said they worked on their vacation even though they were technically off. Twenty percent said they checked work messages like voice mail, and another 15 percent said they called to check in.

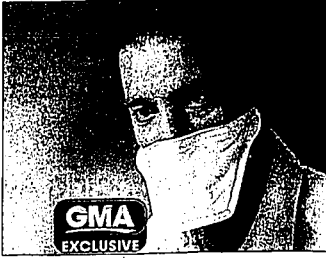

# TB patient apologizes to airline passengers

Speaker insists he was told he was no danger

DENVER (AP) — The Atlanta lawyer quarantined with a dangerous strain of tuberculosis apologized to fellow airline passengers in an interview aired Friday, and insisted he was told before he set out for his wedding in Europe that he was no danger to anyone.

"I've lived in this state of constant fear and anxiety and exhaustion for a week now, and to think that someone else is now feeling that, I would want anyone to feel that way."

It's awful," Andrew Speaker, speaking through a face mask, told ABC's "Good Morning America" from his hospital room in Denver.

Multiple questions arose as to whether the wedding even took place. The mayor of the island of Santorini in Greece, Angelos Roussio, told The Associated Press: "There was no wedding. They came for a marriage but they didn't have the required papers." He

said the couple stayed in a hotel for three days and then left.

In Denver, Speaker's doctors said that he could be in the hospital for up to two months, and that if antibiotics fail to knock out the extremely drug-resistant infection, he may have to undergo surgery to remove infected lung tissue, about the size of a tennis ball.

Surgery to remove pieces of the lung was more common

before the advent of sophisticated drugs in the 1960s. But it is coming back as a treatment because of the development of strains resistant to those drugs.

Speaker is the first infected person quarantined by the U.S. government since 1963. In the TV interview, Speaker, wearing street clothes, repeatedly apologized to the dozens of airline passengers and crew members now anxiously awaiting the results of

their TB tests.

"I don't expect for people to ever forgive me. I just hope that they understand that I truly never meant to put them in harm," he said, his voice cracking.

Health officials have contacted 74 of the 310 U.S. citizens who were on the May 12 Air France flight that Speaker and his fiancée took to Paris, the CDC said. That count includes all 26 who sat in the five-row area around Speaker — the ones considered at greatest risk.

Note is exhibiting symptoms, CDC officials said.

Speaker, 31, said he, his doctors and the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention all knew he had TB that was resistant to those drugs before he flew to Europe for his wedding and honeymoon last month. But he said he was advised at the time by Fulton County, Ga., health authorities that he was not contagious or a danger to anyone.

Officials told him they would prefer he didn't fly, but no one ordered him not to, he said. Speaker said his father, also a lawyer, taped that meeting.

"My father said, 'OK, now are you saying, prefer not to

go on the trip because he's a risk to anybody, or are you simply saying that to cover yourself?' And they said, 'We have to tell you that to cover ourself, but he's not a risk,'" Speaker said.

"I never would have put my family at risk, and my daughter at risk. I repeatedly asked my doctors, 'Is my family at risk? Is anybody at risk of this?'" he said.

Speaker was in Europe when he learned tests showed he had not just TB, but an especially dangerous, extensively drug-resistant strain.

"He was told in no uncertain terms not to take a flight back," said Dr. Martin Cetroni, director of the CDC's division of global migration and quarantine. But there were no legal orders preventing his travel, Cetroni said.

Speaker said he felt as if the CDC had suddenly "abandoned him." He said he believed if he didn't go to the specialized clinic in Denver, he would die.

"In hindsight, maybe it wasn't the best decision, but I did ask if it was voluntary. And in my mind, I thought that if I went there, if I waited until they showed up, that meant I was going to die," Speaker said.

# Bush pushes immigration bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush challenged lawmakers on Friday to pass an immigration bill that would legalize millions of unlawful immigrants despite the harsh criticism they're hearing from voters and interest groups on both sides of the issue.

It was Bush's second personal plea in a week for support on the initiative — one of his top domestic priorities — part of a multi-front effort by his administration to bolster lawmakers in both parties as the Senate resumes a searing debate on immigration.

"No matter how difficult it may seem for some politically, I strongly believe it's in this nation's interest for people here in Washington to show courage and resolve and pass a comprehensive immigration reform," Bush told a group of activists, lobbyists and analysts who have pushed for an overhaul.

Lawmakers, at home during a weeklong recess, are hearing from conservatives who decry the measure as overly lenient and from liberals who are clamoring for its passage even as they complain it is filled with problems.

Bush acknowledged those gripes, but he added, "The question people have to answer is, are we going to sacrifice the good for the sake of the perfect?"

# Kevorkian released from prison

Aide: Views on assisted suicide haven't changed

COLDWATER, Mich. (AP) — Jack Kevorkian had few words but a broad smile as he walked out of prison Friday, ending eight years behind bars for helping end the life of a man suffering from Lou Gehrig's disease.

The retired pathologist known as "Dr. Death" said his release felt

"wonderful — one of the high points in life" as he paused near a van that was waiting to drive him to the home of friends in suburban Detroit.

Outside a gift shop across from the 25-acre prison grounds, about a dozen people stood in a line, some holding signs bearing such phrases as "Jack, we're glad you're out of the box" and "Dr. K is on his way."

The attention focused on a man who claimed participation in at least 130 assisted suicides, brought a rebuke from the Catholic Archdiocese of Detroit.

"For 10 years, Jack Kevorkian's actions resembled those of a pathological serial killer. It will be truly regrettable if he's not treated as a celebrity parolee instead of the convicted murderer he is," archdiocese spokesman Ned McGrath said in a statement.

The 73-year-old Kevorkian, wearing his trademark blue cardigan and a striped shirt and the spoke only a few words to reporters after leaving the prison with his lawyers and legal assistants.

As he got ready for the ride home, "60 Minutes" correspondent Mike Wallace, 89, got out of the van and embraced him, asking, "What do you say, young man?" Kevorkian is to appear in a "60 Minutes" segment on Sunday.

Attorney Mayer Morganroth said his client planned a news conference on Tuesday.

"He thanks everybody for coming. He thanks the thousands who have supported him, have written to him," Morganroth said. "He just wants a little privacy for the next few days."

Throughout the 1990s, Kevorkian challenged authorities to make his actions legal — or try to stop him.

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# U.S. pilots indicted in Brazil's worst crash

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — A Brazilian judge indicted two U.S. pilots and four Brazilian air traffic controllers Friday on manslaughter-related charges in Brazil's worst air disaster, court officials said.

Judge Murilo Mendes accepted the charges filed by a prosecutor last week in a federal court in Sinop, a small city near the Amazon jungle site where a Boeing jetliner plunged into the rain forest after a collision with an executive jet last year, spokesman Fabio Paz said by telephone.

"Now the criminal process begins," the official said. "The American pilots have been called on to give preliminary depositions on Aug. 27 and the flight controllers have been called to testify a day later," said Paz.

Prosecutors last week asked the judge to indict pilots Joseph Lepore, 42, of Bay Shore, N.Y., and Jan Paladino, 34, of Westhampton Beach, N.Y., with exposing an aircraft to danger resulting in death. The charge is similar to involuntary manslaughter and is punishable by one to three years in prison, Paz said.

A lawyer for the pilots said the charges were unfounded.

"The pilots' conduct was completely competent throughout the flight and cannot be fairly characterized as criminal," said Joel R. Weiss. "The allegations against the pilots are inaccurate, and the pilots are innocent."

The men were allowed to return to the Long Island, N.Y., communities late last year after signing a document promising to return to Brazil for their trial or when required by local authorities.

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
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
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
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
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


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# Can we have the game without a word from our sponsor?

Misdemeanor DUI prosecutions jumped 48 percent in Twin Falls County and 56 percent in Jerome County. That's nearly double the state average.

Part of the rise can be traced to a change in state law that boosts the number of felony DUIs which can be filed — to three drunk-driving convictions within a five-year period

from three DUIs within a 10-year span.

But it's equally clear that the two counties are taking a zero-tolerance approach to DUI prosecutions, even if impaired drivers haven't gotten the message yet.

"When we went from a .10 to .08 (blood alcohol limit) several years ago, MADD (Mothers Against Drunk Driving) assured us our DUI arrests would go down," said Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Deer, chairman of the state Senate Judiciary and Rules Committee. "We could make the law tougher and people would realize it. But we haven't seen that. DUI arrests are up."

Getting convicted of driving drunk isn't just an inconvenience anymore. Whether felony or misdemeanor, you could lose your job and your car insurance.

But even that beats the alternative. Eighty-nine people died in alcohol-related accidents on Idaho highways in 2005.

**CHEERS:** To the Camas County Chamber of Commerce and the Fairfield community for embracing the traditions of the Shoshone and Bannock Indians during the town's recent Memorial Day celebration.

I also did a study on predation on sage grouse and wrote an article for *Sage Grouse*, magazine in Idaho and it published in 1981.

I also took pictures of antelope giving birth to fawns and put tracking collars on the fawns, and these pictures were published in *Wildlife Monographs* in 1975. I worked on a deer study in the Snake Hills, where we tracked the deer fawns. I was not home for weeks at a time where we lived in the Owyhee Desert and in the mountains. The Fish and Game at that time paid for all the film and developing, so needless to say, I took hundreds of pictures of many animals and birds. I also have hundreds of dollars of camera equipment such as a 600 mm telephoto mounted on a Minolta SRT 101.

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## Iraq contract workers: Deniable, disposable casualties

Something was missing from my local Memorial Day parade.

There were soldiers, sailors, World War II veterans, firefighters, Girl Scouts, soccer players, marching bands, flag-draped floats and a festive contingent from the Board of Education. But there was no float memorializing the hundreds of civilian contractors killed in Iraq.

It's fashionable to look down on the civilian contractors employed by companies such as Halliburton and Blackwater. When contractors make the news, it's usually in the context of stories about waste and fraud in reconstruction or service contracts, or human rights abuses committed by private security contractors.

Because civilian contractors die in Iraq, most of us don't waste many tears. These are guys who went to Iraq out of sheer greed, lured by salaries far higher than those received by military personnel.

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Because it's our patriotic duty to support the lucrative corporate empires that employ the thousands of contractors in Iraq, but because many of the men and women employed by these corporate giants are in Iraq at our government's behest.

They're part of our war — and just like those who serve in the military, they pay for our government's mistakes with their health and their lives.

In Iraq, civilian contractors form a vast parallel army. In the Persian Gulf War, fewer than 10,000 civilian contractors accompanied more than 500,000 military personnel. In Iraq today, an estimated 126,000

Defense Department civilian contractors support 145,000 troops. Thousands more civilians work under contract to other U.S. government agencies.

A combination of poor record-keeping, corporate meddling and the Bush administration's penchant for secrecy has prevented even the Government Accountability Office from getting solid numbers on civilian contractors in Iraq. Prime contractors subcontract out much of their work to other companies, which in turn subcontract out much of their work to other companies, which in turn — you get the idea.

Add in foreign corporations and the offshore subsidiaries of the U.S. giants and you get a game of corporate hide-and-seek in which no one knows, at the end of the day, whose potato it was to begin with.

Only a fraction of the civilian contractors in Iraq fit the stereotype of the gun-toting, muscle-bound mercenary. Most contractors from the U.S. are engineers, accountants and women truck drivers, mechanics, IT specialists, former soldiers and cops, drawn to Iraq by the prospect of tax-free earnings that dwarf what they could make at home.

You could call it greed, but you'd be overlooking the economic insecurity and hardship that lie behind many decisions to sign up with companies such as DynCorp or KBR: the overdue mortgage, the unpaid debt from a spouse's surgery, the dead-end local jobs. And plenty of contractors also want to "do their bit" — but for one reason or another

— age, health — joining the military isn't an option for them.

Just like the troops they support, these contractors are dying by the score in Iraq. After all, Bush, endorsing his Freedom of Information Act request, the Department of Labor acknowledged 917 deaths, including at least 146 during the first quarter of 2007.

Another 12,000 have been wounded, and the numbers are almost certainly underestimate the true toll.

When they're injured or killed, contractors or their families often find it difficult to obtain health care or compensation. The industry is poorly regulated and regulated, and some contractors behind a thick corporate veil, give corporate giants an incentive to see the Iraq war prolonged and masks the true human costs of the war.

Contractors are deniable and disposable — like the 3,474 U.S. military casualties in Iraq, they too are killed in Iraq, they too are casualties of this seemingly endless war.

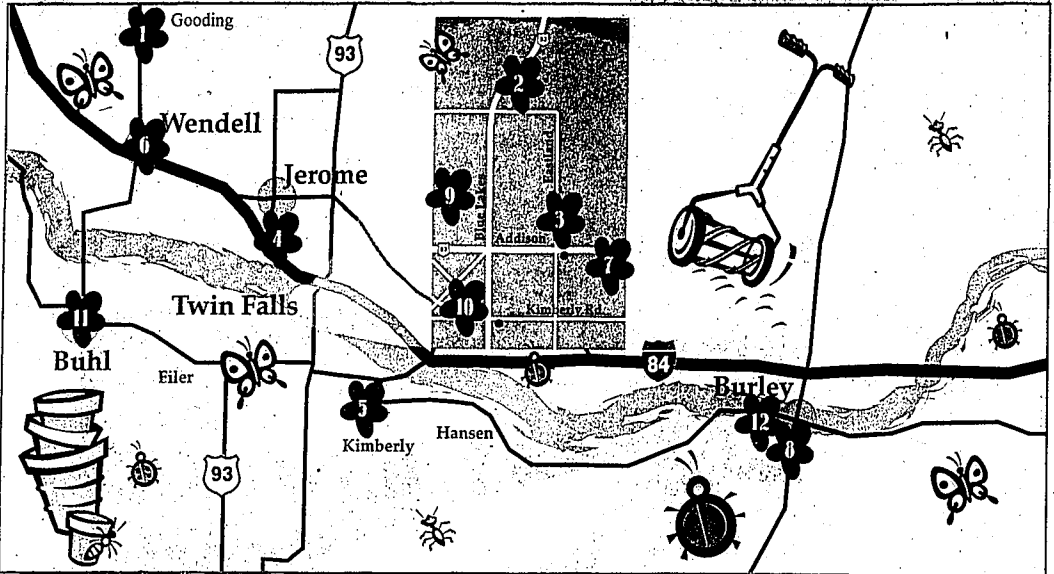

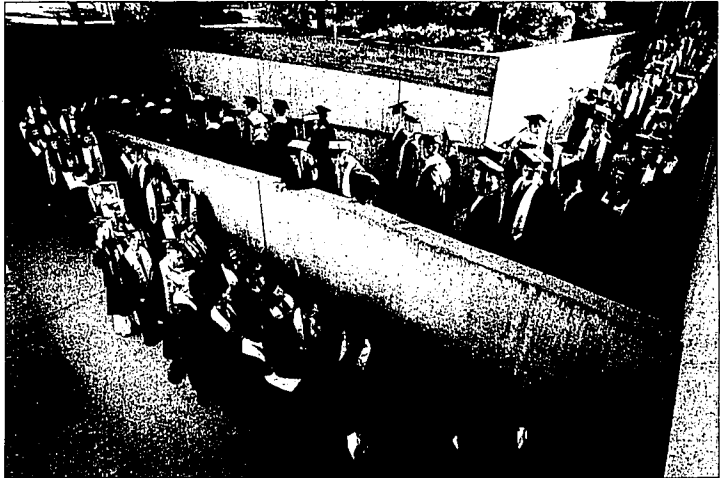

# Idaho Falls plans day care licensing after state balked

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A plan to strengthen day care licensing standards beyond what is mandated by the state is moving forward in this eastern Idaho city.

In a public meeting Wednesday attended by Mayor Jared Fuhrman and City Councilor Karen Cornwell, a proposal was put together that would require a minimum number of workers to watch over children.

"We have problems in our community without a doubt in regard to day care," Fuhrman said. "I'm not saying it's not safe now, but why take the risk?"

About 15 day care operators attended the meeting and raised their hands to show their approval for the proposed rules, the Post Register reported.

The meeting was described as a brainstorming session.

Idaho Falls officials are using nearby Anniston's day care rules as a model. Those rules include mandatory licensing for anyone paid to take care of at least one child,

random checks of day care facilities, and eight hours of training each year for workers.

Some day care providers were concerned smaller businesses could be hurt by the proposed rules.

"We're going to be obliterated by licensing," said Tina Miller, who runs a day care out of her home.

Fuhrman said the city will use the money from increased fees to pay for enforcing any new rules. He said for businesses will be needed to make sure rules are being followed at the city's 150 day care providers, but that he didn't want to increase fees so much that in-home day care workers were forced out of business.

The city of Anniston and the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare estimate fees at \$210 annually, which includes building and health inspections, background checks, tuberculosis testing, and CPR certification.

Idaho Falls officials plan another meeting next month to consider other ideas concerning day cares in the city.

# Park Service, state reach bison management agreement

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — The National Park Service and the state of Montana agreed Friday to truck a renegade group of bison into Yellowstone National Park if the animals resist the latest hazing efforts — an effort aimed at preventing the slaughter of week-old bison calves.

Gov. Brian Schweitzer announced the plan with Suzanne Lewis, superintendent of Yellowstone National Park. Schweitzer said it was hammered out with the help of U.S. Interior Secretary Dirk Kempthorne.

The plan would preclude sending the cows and calves to slaughter — an issue that had brought intense scrutiny from bison advocates. "A pardon has been granted," Schweitzer said. The agreement received mixed reaction from both sides of the debate: ranchers who want the bison off their summer feed ground and worry they will transmit disease to their livestock and those who want free range for the Yellowstone animals.

About 300 bison, including 100 calves born this spring, have been rounded up in summer cattle grazing lands near West Yellowstone in recent weeks, despite several hazing attempts. On Thursday and Friday, state agents on horses and in a helicopter, pushed them back into the park. About 280 were hazed back on Thursday, and another 35 were pushed back into the park on Friday. The hazing came after the Montana Livestock

Department postponed a plan to shoot or slaughter.

Schweitzer said the park service agreed to bend its rules and allow them to truck the bison deep into the park should they come back out. He called it a "middle ground" agreement.

"This is unprecedented that the bison were getting hazed back into the park and not staying there," the governor said. "The park has never agreed to do this before, but we have not ever been in this situation before."

Schweitzer said early reports, however, showed the latest hazing effort may work. Many of the bison, hazed 7 miles into the park, appeared to be heading deeper into Yellowstone.

If the bison come out, however, they will be loaded into trucks and released in a capture facility near Gardiner near the park's northern border. The bison would be moved from there back into a different region of the park.

"I think we took a step in the right direction," Lewis said at a news conference with Schweitzer.

Lewis said more discussions are needed on managing the bison. "Clearly, finding places for bison on the landscape outside the park remains a big goal," she said.

The Buffalo Field Campaign, a group that advocates for a free-roaming wild bison herd, said the agencies bucked amid public backlash to plans for an unprecedented slaughter of 50 or more calves.

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# Teen's lawyer: Co-conspirator was lone stabber in Idaho slaying

POCAHELLO (AP) — The defense strategy of a teen accused of killing his 16-year-old classmate emerged during the opening day of his trial, as attorneys for Torey Adamcik told jurors his alleged co-conspirator wielded the knife that ended Cassie Jo Stoddard's life.

The 6th District Court trial of Adamcik, 16, is the second in Stoddard's slaying. Brian Draper, also 16, was convicted April 17 of first-degree murder and conspiracy to commit first-degree murder in the homicide on Sept. 22, 2006.

Adamcik's lawyer, Aaron Thompson, told jurors during his opening statements Thursday that a videotape made by Adamcik and Draper before and after the slaying indicates it was Draper, not Adamcik, who killed Stoddard. Thompson described Draper as a troubled teen with a police record and a fascination with the 1999 Columbine High School massacre in Colorado.

Stoddard," Thompson said, quoting from the video. "I did not say 'we.' It says, 'I killed Cassie.'"

Stoddard was housesitting for relatives when police say Draper and Adamcik entered the home and stabbed her. They say Stoddard's boyfriend had left the house previously; otherwise, he also could have been killed, police say.

At Draper's six-day trial in April, jurors saw video footage of Stoddard starting at the high school on the morning of the attack. It also shows Draper and Adamcik discussing what appears to be a murder plan. The same video will also be the centerpiece of Adamcik's trial.

"We are making our plan for tonight," Adamcik says on the videotape.

"It's going happen tonight," Draper adds.

In the video, Draper talks of how he and Adamcik have tried several times to kill somebody before but "they" were not home.

"Tonight, they will be alone," Draper says. "I'm sorry Cassie... She's going to die tonight."

Adamcik says, "We are listening to the greatest rock group ever, Pink Floyd, before we commit the ultimate crime: murder."

Adamcik's lawyer, however, told jurors on Thursday that the videotape's renewed playing — and other evidence such as DNA on a T-shirt and glove — would tell the story of a lone killer.

"You will see he (Draper) is obsessed with Columbine," Thompson said. "You are going to hear that he had writings fantasizing about school shootings. All the evidence is

consistent with one murderer and they already caught him. His name is Brian Lee Draper."

Prosecutors countered that jurors would hear a different story, one in which a pair of troubled teens in a fever of violence hatched a plan to kill Stoddard, then carried it out with key efficiency and a lack of remorse.

"The videotape is a pretty compelling piece of evidence," Bannock County Prosecutor Mark Hiedelman told jurors. "Throughout the tape (Adamcik and Draper) plan and conspire to kill Cassie Jo Stoddard."

In other testimony Thursday, Allison Contreras, a relative of Stoddard and owner of the home where the killing took place, described returning from a weekend away to find her second cousin's body on their family room floor.

## Bear numbers in Grand Teton rise

JACKSON, Wyo. (AP) — Increasing bear activity in Grand Teton National Park has prompted park officials to step up efforts to prevent human-bear conflicts and encounters.

Park spokeswoman Jackie Skaggs said last summer there was more bear activity around campgrounds and other areas, including Colter Bay, Signal Mountain and Jenny Lake.

"We had bears that were becoming a little more interested in approaching people than we wanted," she said. A black bear was killed by rangers near Colter Bay after it became increasingly aggressive toward people.

Skaggs said rangers found people were not complying with food storage requirements. Those requirements include never leaving food and backpacks unattended, and storing all food and bear attractants, including sunscreen, canned drinks and toothpaste, in areas where bears cannot reach in campgrounds.

Patrols will be stepped up in campgrounds this year, and violations of food storage orders can result in citations.

In the backcountry, food

should be hung from a tree, or backpackers can borrow food-storage containers from ranger stations. Next year, canisters will be required.

Park officials now estimate that at least 50 to 100 grizzly bears inhabit Grand Teton. There's no estimate available on the number of black bears. "People think of Yellowstone as a grizzly park, and they don't think of them in Grand Teton," Skaggs said.

But protection of the grizzly under the Endangered Species Act has widened their habitat range. Skaggs said park biologists now consider the entire Grand Teton park to be grizzly habitat.


Park officials are reminding visitors to keep a distance from all bears and advising hikers to carry bear spray and not hike alone.

Sea lions may have taken record toll on salmon

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Most of the California sea lions have left their feeding station below Bonneville Dam, but may have made eaten record numbers of spring chinook salmon, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers reports.

Researchers observed 3,557 salmon taken below the dam. The previous record in the six years observations have been made was 3,533 in 2004 — 1.9 percent of the run that year. This year predation below the dam is expected to be 4.1 percent because the run was smaller.

"We had a relatively low fish run" this year, said Robert Stenseth, who heads up the research effort for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, which operates the dam.

He said sea lion consumption and fish numbers will be reviewed and updated over the summer and that an analysis of the hazing effort will be conducted.

The male sea lions have appeared at the dam in growing numbers in recent years, apparently because of an increase in the size of the spring chinook run.

One sea lion with the brand C265 was trapped and weighed near the river mouth in March at 559 pounds. He was found there again after spending more than two months below the dam and weighed 1,043 pounds.

# One last time?

## Bruin Stadium renovation may or may not happen this summer

TWIN FALLS — The 30th Annual All-Star Shrine Football Games are supposed to be the last played in the current incarnation of Bruin Stadium at Twin Falls High School. However, that may or may not be the case right now.

The blue-painted wood boards of Bruin Stadium were thought to come down this summer and make way for a new structure that would feature aluminum seating and, possibly, a new press box. The bleachers are budgeted for approximately \$300,000 and just one of many projects — along with work on the chemistry labs, cafeteria and the new ninth-grade wing — Twin Falls High planned as part of the voter-approved bond that will also build Canyon Ridge High.

According to Dale Thornsbury, construction supervisor for the Twin Falls School District, it would be difficult to be able to meet the late-August deadline. Demolition would have begun during the first week of June, but that's off the table.

"We have not bid this project yet," Thornsbury said. "Our goal was to have this demolition starting next week, but it hasn't because it's not big." While the blueprints for a base bid — a structure that could seat 1,200 patrons — are on paper, actual work is at least three weeks away. That is, if they think construction can be finished by Aug. 23 when Bruin Junior varsity hosts Nampa JV and the following Friday, Aug. 24, when Lighthouse Christian is set to open its season. It's just one of four games the Lions have scheduled for Bruin Stadium.

"If they tore it down and it wasn't ready by August, it would affect us," Lions athletic director and head football coach Nick Karavadas said. "We consider our home field, and we play well there. The folks at the (Twin Falls School) district have been very first to us."

First, the project has to come open for bids, which must be reviewed and then awarded by the school board. It's a process that would put the physical

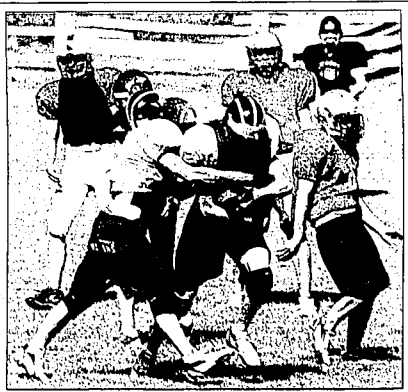

On Wednesday morning, a link to the poll was placed on a University of Idaho fan web site and Vandal faithful were encouraged to vote. They did. Over and over again. Suddenly, U of I had nearly 1,000 votes and the poll wasn't 24 hours old.

After the Vandals vandalized the poll, Boise State and Brigham Young University fans saw their school's early deficits and got in on the act as well. Message boards for both schools encouraged fans to vote. One board even contained instructions on how to get around the poll's mechanisms for blocking repeat votes from the same computer. And the free-for-all was on.

As of Friday evening, more than 7,500 votes had been cast, with nearly 90 percent of the vote going to Idaho, Boise State and BYU. In a span of only a few hours Friday, the Broncos total jumped by nearly 1,500 votes to narrowly overtake the Vandals.

As for the poll's usefulness? Not completely. Two main things have been learned.

First, there are a lot of people out there who enjoy depressing news. How else to explain the 2,500-plus votes for an Idaho program that has been mired in mediocrity for nearly a decade?

But you certainly can't call the Vandals fair-weather fans. Second, passionate college football fans don't want to see their team lose at anything, whether on the field or online.

While new Idaho coach Robb Akey is enthusiastic, his team likely won't win more than three or four games this fall. So maybe Vandal fans will see the poll as a rare chance to beat Boise State in something football related.

One conscientious Idaho fan e-mailed the Times-News sports desk on Thursday, admitting to the busy ballot box stuffing by fans in the Moscow area. Sadly, it appears Dennis Erickson's not-so-high-road approach to college football and NCAA rules rubbied off on a few Idaho fans.

But the "Vandalizers" are not alone. The ballot-box-stuffers on the Bronco and Cougar bandwagons share responsibility as well. While

## BYU, Utah work to get games on satellite TV

SALT LAKE CITY — Frustrated over efforts to get DirecTV and the Dish Network to broadcast Mountain West Conference football games, rivals Brigham Young and Utah are teaming up — to hire a sports broadcasting lawyer.

Kelly Crabbs, who has negotiated Olympic broadcasting deals, was hired to "explore all possible options available so that all our fans have access to the games on television," said University of Utah President Michael K. Young.

The satellite providers carry the ESPN sports channel, but that channel covers only selected college games. Comcast Corp. and CSTV offer Mountain West Sports Network, also known as The Mtn., for Mountain West games, "but many places in Utah cannot get cable," said Utah athletics spokeswoman Liz Abel.

Three months from football season, Young and BYU President Cecil O. Samuelson said it wasn't clear if the "distribution problem" would be solved. Abel said they were referring to negotiations between the conference and satellite TV systems.

In a statement, Young and Samuelson said they "find this situation unacceptable."

Conference spokesman Javon Hedlund said those negotiations involve Comcast and its partner CSTV and the satellite providers.

Comcast SportsNet didn't immediately return a call Friday from The Associated Press. Nor did El Segundo, Calif.-based DirecTV.

EchoStar Communications Corp., based in Englewood, Colo., said it doesn't discuss channel negotiations.

Utah fans are upset, and Samuelson said he and Young are asking Crabbs to recommend a new course of action. In a written statement, Kim Carver, vice president and general manager of The Mtn., said the network is working aggressively to further expand our audience," including through satellite TV.

# Donovan leaves Gators for shot at NBA success

ORLANDO, Fla. — For Billy Donovan, it's the perfect mix: the money, the team, the location.

After leading Florida to two straight NCAA titles and building a budding dynasty in 11 years at the school, he's off to the NBA, ready to coach the Orlando Magic.

"I feel like I've got great passion," Donovan said Friday. "I feel like I've got a tremendous work ethic. I feel like I love the game. I know I'm going to work very hard at that, and I am excited about that kind of challenge."

Now he has a 5-year, \$27.5 million contract that takes him far from home as he tries to fashion a winner out of young talent.

Donovan, whose Gators became the first back-to-back champions in 15 years, said the decision was a struggle.

"I felt like the future for me was how do I grow as a coach, as a person? How do I get better?" Donovan said at a news conference. "And I think the way you get better is taking on more challenges."

Donovan was the country's hottest college coach, and the Magic weren't the first to run at him. In April, Donovan declined an offer at Kentucky, where he began as an assistant 17 years ago. He also was linked to the Memphis Grizzlies job.

But Orlando was the right fit. The 42-year-old coach has four children, and they can stay in Gainesville for now. He'll make the 115-mile trip from Orlando to see them when he can, Orlando is coming off its first playoff appearance in four years and is on the cusp of securing public funding for a new arena.

"Certainly, I could've stayed at Florida... It was a comfortable decision with four children and our family being happy there," Donovan said. "I know the athletic director. We've obviously had tremendous success. I know I've just stayed and waited... I think in this day and age with so much publicity and so much attention on college and professional basketball now, it's really hard to stay at place for a long period of time. I'm talking about 20, 25, 30 years."

Already, Donovan's star power is selling tickets. The Magic took orders for more than 200 season packages within 24 hours of his hiring.

He replaces Brian Hinkle, who was fired after 10 consecutive losing seasons. Hinkle's ouster followed the Magic's first playoff appearance in four years, which ended in the first round against Detroit.

## Gators focus coaching search on VCU's Grant

GAINESVILLE, Fla. — (Two-time defending national champion Florida hopes to have a new coach in the near future, and it could be a familiar face.

Athletic director Jeremy Foley planned to meet with Virginia Commonwealth coach Anthony Grant on Saturday, a person familiar with the search process told The Associated Press. The search will offer him the job. The person spoke on condition of anonymity because the search is ongoing.

Grant spent 12 years as one of Billy Donovan's top assistants, including two seasons in Gainesville. He left the Gators for VCU in 2006 — his contract pays \$400,000 annually — and led the Rams to the NCAA tournament in his first season. VCU upset Duke in the opening round. "We're excited to fill the spot quickly."

DUBLIN, Ohio — Adam Scott was frustrated by hitting good shots and signing for mediocre scores. After a spiced chat with his caddie, both were determined to squeeze everything they could out of the second round at the Memorial.

Scott flirted-with perfection Friday at Muirfield Village, missing four putts inside 12 feet and still shooting a 10-under 62.

It was another day of good scoring conditions, with soft, rolling heat, mild breezes, fairways with plenty of roll and greens that held approach shots and rolled smoothly.

That wasn't the case for Tiger Woods.

The three-time Memorial champion hit the ball decently enough, but couldn't make anything outside 6 feet until he rolled in a 10-foot birdie on the final hole for a 72, leaving him with a 10-under 134.

"You look at a lot of guys up there, they're making a bunch of putts, and not just from 6, 7, 8 feet. They're making them from 20 feet," Woods said. "I just haven't done that."

When LeBron James' moment arrived, he was ready, just like another No. 23.

Call it LeBronesque. With a four-de-force performance that was one of the best in NBA playoff history, James shook LeBron 1 out of the Pistons in Game 5 on Thursday night in 50 spellbinding minutes that included two nerve-racking overtime.

The 22-year-old superstar soared like never before. He scored 48 points and shot 12-of-20 from the free-throw line. He carried his last 30 — to carry Cleveland within one win of its first trip to the NBA finals.

At Detroit's suburban Palace, King James ruled.

James' reign wouldn't let us down. Cavaliers guard Damon Jones said.

James stamped his growing reputation with all the fury of one of his thunderous slam dunks. He drove past Detroit's defenders, elevated to shoot over the Pistons — twisted through their double and triple teams as if in a playground back home in Akron.

The 48 points were spectacular, but hardly tell the whole story. He scored them in the biggest game of his four-year career. He scored them in the most important game in Cleveland's 37-year history. He scored them on the road, against the Pistons, one of the league's toughest defensive

## Spurs still waiting for finals foe

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The Detroit Pistons and Cleveland Cavaliers on Friday were trying to recover the day after their double-overtime thriller, while also preparing for Game 6 of the Eastern Conference finals.

a serious injury or illness the chance to meet drivers, get a few autographs and sit in a few cars.

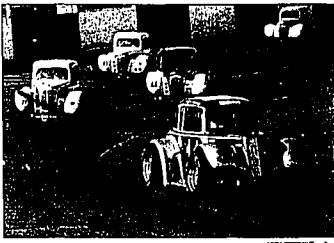

## First win lifts Mears' confidence

DOVER, Del. (AP) — Week after week, Casey Mears watched his Hendrick Motorsports teammates take turns edging in Victory Lane. He wondered when his time would come.

Buried near the bottom of the points standings, Mears would have been thrilled with even a top 10 finish in the Coca-Cola 600 to take the heat off the miserable start to his first season with the NASCAR powerhouse team.

While teammates Jimmie Johnson and Jeff Gordon are both NASCAR champions, and Kyle Busch is in contention for a Nextel Cup title, Mears has merely been an afterthought.

"I'm probably more relieved than happy," Mears said Friday before qualifying for the race at Dover International Speedway. "It's been so long. It was nice to sit back and take a deep breath this week."

Mears had reason for a celebratory exhale, and could even breathe easy, for once, this week.

His first career win in 156 starts lifted him from 35th in the standings to 29th, taking him off the bubble of failing to make the race each week.

This time, it was Mears' turn to drive home a winner for car owner Rick Hendrick. When other drivers last week ducked onto pit road for a splash of gas, Mears pushed his car to the finish, running out of fuel only moments after taking his first checkered flag.

Mears called it a "slight" gamble because even if they did run out of gas, he figures his car would have finished around 10th to 12th place anyway, and that still would have provided a confidence boost.

"I was a small risk and obviously we made it," he said. "It was Hendrick's fifth straight win and the ninth in the past 10 Nextel Cup races. I'm really happy to be one of my closest friends to win a race for us, but I know for Rick, personally, it's got to be very special to have all four cars in Victory Lane this year," Johnson said.

The victory gave Mears two top-10 fin-

ishes this season, but now comes the hard part — keeping the momentum. After his 10th-place finish at Bristol, he plummeted to 42nd and the next race at Martinsville Speedway.

Even with the painfully slow start, Mears hasn't regretted his defection from Chip Ganassi Racing, even though the big move to Hendrick came with Monster Mile-sized expectations.

While Johnson and Mears are best buds off the track, the two have little in common on it. Johnson is the defending Nextel Cup champ and a former Daytona 500 winner. Gordon leads this year's points race and is a four-time Cup champ, and Busch is ninth in the points race.

"I know it's something he's proud of, but also relieved at the same time," Johnson said after taking his qualifying run. "It reminds me a little bit of us winning the championship. We were close and didn't do it. When we finally did it, there was a lot of relief."

Mears knew winning wouldn't be as simple as hopping into the cockpit.

"People think that just because you sign with Hendrick Motorsports, all of a sudden everything's great and you should be able to win races right out of the gate," Mears said.

The team was nowhere close to great for Mears, who had to adjust to a Chevrolet after four years of driving a Dodge. Mears got a new crew chief, Darlan Grubbs, only 10 days before the season-opening Daytona 500 and he finished no better than 20th in the first four races.

"We're probably about 15 percent into 100 percent of our potential," Mears said. "I was just expecting a similar drop-off on Sunday at Dover International Speedway, where he's recorded one top 10 finish."

He said the No. 25 Chevrolet — considered the weakest of Hendrick's four-team fleet — was finally starting to come together after the unsettling start.

With his crew chief suspended and contract negotiations for next season still ongoing, nothing seemingly has served as a distraction of late on the track for the surging Earnhardt. With his second straight pole to celebrate until he was bumped off late Friday by Ryan Newman for the top spot for the race at Dover International Speedway. Newman followed last week's front-row start with his second straight pole and 40th overall with a lap at 152.925 mph.

Earnhardt was second at 152.387 and Bobby Labonte third in 152.264 for Sunday's race on the mile concrete track.

"Second was close and we can have a sense of pride in that accomplishment," Earnhardt said.

Although he was denied his first pole in 164 races, racing these days comes a whole lot easier for Junior than talking about where he might end up after this season. Decision day is looming for the wildly popular NASCAR driver, who says three or four teams are still in serious contention to land the free agent once he ends his run at Dale Earnhardt Inc.

"I can tell you that things are positive," Earnhardt said. "I've just been overwhelmed with the personalities I met."

Earnhardt's 13th in the season standings, only 13 points behind Jamie McMurray for the 12th and final spot in the Chase for the Nextel Cup championship. Earnhardt finished eighth in each of the last two races and added what was a season-high fourth-place start last week in the Coca-Cola 600.

And he was just edged out of the pole on Friday, even without crew chief Tony Eury. Eury is sitting out the second race of a six-race suspension

## Twin Falls County posts 1.9 percent unemployment rate

TWIN FALLS — No wonder help wanted signs are up all over Twin Falls.

Twin Falls County posted an unemployment rate in May of 1.9 percent, state officials said Friday. That compares to an unemployment rate of 3.2 percent in the same month of last year.

Statewide, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate hit a new low in May of 2.3

percent, according to the Idaho Commerce & Labor Department.

"The numbers are likely a statistical aberration that overstate how low unemployment numbers are across the state, said Jan Iloer, regional economist for the department in Twin Falls.

"We have a very tight job market, but it's not quite that low," she said. "It's a projection" that will likely be adjusted in a few months.

Statewide, April's unemploy-

ment rate was 2.8 percent. And May was the fourth straight month that Idaho's jobless rate has been below 3 percent and the 25th month in a row it has been under 4 percent.

The number of Idahoans with jobs in May set a record for the third time in the past four months, hitting 737,800. That was 4,300 more than in April and nearly 16,000 more than a year earlier.

In addition to Twin Falls County, unemployment rates below 2 percent were

# U.S. jobs picture looks strong

WASHINGTON — The country's economic health may be improving. Employers nearly doubled the number of jobs they added to payrolls in May, allowing the unemployment rate to hold steady at a relatively low 4.5 percent.

The fresh employment picture provided by the Labor Department on Friday showed job creation bounced back, with payrolls growing by 157,000 last month. That was an improvement over the 80,000 new jobs generated in April, the fewest in two and a half years.

Jobseekers found more opportunities last month in health care, education, accounting, engineering, Internet-related activities, banking, food services and government. However, they met fewer job availabilities in manufacturing and retailing, which cut positions. Construction jobs were flat. Those pockets of weakness mostly reflected problems related to the troubled housing and automotive industries.

"I think for jobseekers the climate is pretty good right now but it does vary," observed Mark Vitner, economist at Wachovia. "But I think companies are looking at each new hire more carefully than in the past. No question about that," he added.

The 157,000 jobs generated in May is good — not fantastic — but it does bode well for the hoped-for economic rebound in the current April-to-June quarter. Vitner and other analysts said.

Many economists believe the economy in the current quarter is growing at a pace of around 2.3 percent. Others think economic growth will be better — topping 3 percent. Either way, it would mark a considerable pickup from the anemic 0.6 percent growth rate registered in the January-to-March quarter, the worst in more than four years.

Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke and his colleagues also are betting economic growth will perk up. In another hopeful sign for the anticipated rebound, factories gained ground last month.

The Institute for Supply Management's manufacturing index rose to 55 in May, the best showing in a year. A reading above 50 indicates growth, while a reading below 50 indicates contraction.

On Wall Street, investors also were encouraged by the latest batch of economic data. The Dow Jones industrial gained 40.47 points to close at 13,688.11, the index's 25th record close for the year.

In the labor report, the performance was better than economists were expecting. They were forecasting that employers would add 135,000 jobs in May.

## Dow Jones family clears the way for an auction

NEW YORK — The family that controls Dow Jones & Co. says it is warming to the idea of selling the company to Rupert Murdoch or someone else, citing the "evolving competitive environment" in which the publisher of the Wall Street Journal operates.

To get an idea of just how fast that world is evolving, look no further than a blockbuster deal to combine two major financial news providers, Thomson Corp. and Reuters Group PLC, which first leaked out just two days after the Bancroft family's initial dismissal of Murdoch's bid in early May.

That deal, currently worth \$17.8 billion, will create the world's largest provider of real-time financial news and information, putting Dow Jones in an even tougher spot as it tries to expand its presence in electronic media.

Dow Jones has been diversifying beyond printed newspapers for years, building up its paid subscription Web site, consolidating its ownership of the news database Factiva and acquiring an online financial news site called MarketWatch.

But with a behemoth like Thomson-Reuters about to be created, its very profitable business-focused electronic media could come under even more pressure.

Dow Jones has been a pioneer in providing real-time financial news to investors, but it's a business that's been "commoditized over the years," says Jamie Rizzo, a media and entertainment analyst at First Ratings, a risk analysis firm. "You have Reuters, Bloomberg and Yahoo — it's a different ball game to say."

## New \$4.5M building should be ready by end of January

JEROME — Idaho's No. 1 resident found a job Friday he can fall back on if things don't work out — in the governor's office.

Gov. Butch Otter grabbed a ceremonial golden shovel to break ground on a \$4.5 million Con Paulos General Motors dealership at Exit 168 on Interstate 84 in Jerome.

"Valures, dig your own dirt," Otter told other dignitaries who joined him in breaking the parched and rock-hard soil.

The 28-year-old dealership should move into the state-of-the-art 30,000-square-foot building by the end of January, owner Con Paulos said. He said construction is scheduled to begin June 11.

The two-story building will feature offices and a community room on the upper level

and an elevator. The sales, parts and services departments will be on the main floor of the building.

"We expect to have the finest facility — the most technologically advanced GM

facility in the state," Paulos told a crowd of about 200 people. "We're betting our future on this piece of real estate."

The ceremony was delayed for a few minutes while

organizers waited for Otter's arrival.

"He's... been a great champion of Idaho," Otter said of Paulos.

"That's what civic virtue is all about."

The governor said the car dealership in Jerome illustrates the growth of the automotive business in Idaho, which he called an important part of the state's economy. The state's average income is about \$32,600, Otter said, adding that the average automotive job in Idaho pays \$37,752.

"Those jobs that are growing in higher-paying sectors are important," Otter said.

In addition to investing in the community and the state, Otter said the new dealership signals something equally as important.

"Now we know you're going to stay for sure," he told Paulos.

TORONTO — The Canadian dollar breached 94 cents for the first time in 30 years on Friday and analysts are speculating it will be worth as much as the struggling U.S. greenback by year end.

Known as the loonie because of the loon pictured on the \$1 coin, the dollar traded at \$94.18 cents in early afternoon trading — the highest it has been since July 1977.

It hit an all-time low of \$61.79 on Jan. 21, 2002. The latest surge comes after CIBC World Markets economists predicted the Canadian dollar will be worth as much as the greenback by the end of

the year. That last happened in November 1976.

The CIBC report cites an expected rise in Canadian interest rates and stronger-than-expected economic growth, along with hot commodity prices and an "avalanche" of corporate takeovers that require foreign acquirers to deal in Canadian dollars.

"Between red-hot commodity and energy markets and huge capital inflows associated with an avalanche of (acquisition) deals, the Canadian dollar has plenty of oomph left to take a concerted run toward parity against the greenback," CIBC World Markets chief economist Jeff Rubin said.

Meanwhile, the U.S. Federal

Reserve looks set to cut rates late in the year, reducing the attractiveness of the American dollar, Rubin said.

Bank of Montreal economist Sal Guatieri said the Canadian dollar could surpass the U.S. dollar in the coming years.

"The Canadian dollar is not considered a weakling currency as it was when it was trading at the 60 cent range, so that negative stigma attached to the weak loonie four or five years ago could completely evaporate if we do hit par with the U.S. dollar and that might spur our currency to even greater gains," Guatieri said.

Equipped with increased purchasing power, Canadians are shopping for everything

from cars to furniture and electronics, both at home and across the border. Their freer spending boosted retail sales by 1.9 percent in March, a Statistics Canada report showed. "Travel by Canadians in the U.S. and internationally has risen."

While this increase in living standards may seem attractive, not everyone is happily throwing back vacation-resort margaritas with news of Canada's rising dollar.

Canada's manufacturing sector used to enjoy that the struggling currency made their goods less expensive in the U.S. and internationally. Now their return on investment is lower due to a less

favorable currency conversion, and analysts predict some manufacturers could eventually be priced out of global markets.

"Contracts they put in place early in the year that they thought were worth a million dollars are now worth 10 percent less, so when they get paid, they're going to be paid a lot less than they contracted for," said Jayson Myers, senior vice president and chief economist at the Canadian Manufacturers and Exporters.

While it's too early to measure manufacturing job losses as a result of the rising dollar, there has been a dampening in industrial activity in export-dependent eastern Canada.

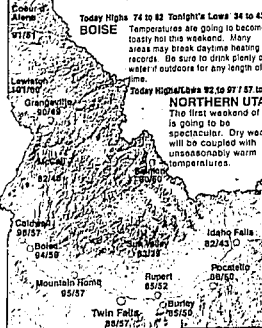

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Tower-ific! Paris offers free scuba diving lessons — looking up the Eiffel Tower

PARIS (AP) — The weather was nippy and overcast as the water just chest-high, but a new scuba-diving pool in Paris has something Ball, Belize and other diving hotspots don't: a terrific view of the Eiffel Tower.
To promote the sport, scuba instructors began offering free lessons Friday — with suits, scuba gear and even a biodegradable towel — at the foot of the French capital's famed landmark.
'Through the water you can see the monument. It's magnificent,' said New Zealand tourist Adrian Carter, one of the first to try it.
He and a group of friends had planned to go to the 1,063-foot high Eiffel Tower, but opted for a dip instead.
'This is better than the Eiffel Tower,' said Carter, a 28-year-old computer programmer, his hair dripping from the 30-minute dive — his first ever.
The lessons include a safety lecture and a how-to demonstration in which instructors share tips. One first-time diver did a double-take when his guide told him to spit into his goggles to help keep them from fogging up.
The above-ground pool is under the Tower, between its four legs. It's small, at half the size of a basketball court, just 4 feet deep. It's safe for beginners and children aged 8 and older, said the event's organizers, an umbrella group of scuba associations. To add a touch of realism, the bottom of the pool is studded with

waterproof photos of fluorescent fish.
Though heated, the water temperature hovered Friday around a cool 71 degrees.
That, combined with icy winds that whistled down the Champs de Mars, a grassy promenade leading to the tower, dissuaded many

would-be divers. More people milled around the pool's perimeter — watching the instructors as they floated on their backs staring up at the tower's steel girders — than actually queuing up for a lesson.
This was not the first time the Eiffel Tower has become a sporting venue. Three winters ago, an ice-skating rink was installed on the lower of its three observation decks to draw Parisians to the monument that mostly attracts tourists.
Organizers of the 10-day diving event said they were angling for tourists and Parisians alike.
'We want to give as many people as possible a taste of scuba-diving,' said Gerard Puit, the pool's manager and head of a diving company on France's Mediterranean coast.
He said organizers also hope the diving experience will focus attention on the environmental dangers threatening the ocean.
'Once you're underwater and face-to-face with all sorts of creatures, you can't remain insensitive to the destruction of the sea,' he said.
Organizers expect up to 3,000 people to take the plunge before the lessons end June 10 — so long as the dismal weather improves.
Another first-time diver who took the plunge, English tourist Jonathan Doncey, said the experience was 'awesome' despite the cold.
'I'm still shivering,' he said through chattering teeth. 'I'm going again tomorrow.'

Graduation cheering ban means no diploma for 5 students in Illinois

GALESBURG, Ill. — Celsia Gayles graduated with honors last month, but she is still waiting for her diploma. The reason: the whoops of joy from the audience as she crossed the stage.
Gayles was one of five students denied diplomas from the lone public high school in Galesburg after enthusiastic friends or family members cheered for them during commencement.
About a month before the May 27 ceremony, Galesburg High students and their parents had to sign a contract promising to act in dignified way. Violators were warned they could be denied their diplomas and barred from the after-graduation party.
Many schools across the country ask spectators to hold people back until the end of graduation. But few of them enforce the policy with what some in Galesburg say are strong-arm tactics.
'It was like one of the worst days of my life,' said Gayles, who had a 3.4 grade-point average and officially graduated, but does not have the keepsake diploma to hang on her wall. 'You walk across the stage and then you can't get your diploma because of other people cheering for you. It was devastating, actually.'

In Indianapolis, public school officials this year started kicking out parents and relatives who cheer at school, the superintendent interrupted last month's graduation to order police to remove a woman from the gymnasium.
'It's an important, solemn occasion. There's plenty of time for celebration before and after,' said Clarke Campbell, president of the Indianapolis school board.
In Galesburg, the issue has taken on added controversy with accusations that the students were denied diplomas because of their race — four are black and one is Hispanic. Parents say cheers also erupted for white students, and none of them was denied a diploma.
Principal Tom Chiles said administrators who monitored the more than 2,000-seat auditorium reported only disruptions they considered "significant," and all turned in the same five names.
'It had to do with whatever,' Chiles said. 'It's the amount of disruption at the time of the incident.'

School officials said they will hear students and parents out if they appeal. Meanwhile, the school said the five students can still get their diplomas by completing eight hours of public service work, answering phones, sorting books or doing other chores for the district, situated about 150 miles southwest of Chicago.
Gayles' mother said she plans to fight the school board — in court if necessary — to get her daughter's diploma. The noise 'was like three seconds. It was like "Yay" and that was it," Carolyn Gayles said.

American Civil Liberties Union spokesman Edward Yohnka said Galesburg's policy raises no red flags as long as it is enforced equitably. He said the school board's school's ability to control the decorum at an event like this, he said.
Another student who was denied her diploma, Nadia Trent, said she will probably not let the school keep it if her appeals fail.
'It's not fair. Somebody could not like me and just decide to yell to get me in trouble. I can't control everyone, just the ones I gave tickets to,' Trent said.

FDA warns consumers to throw away toothpaste made in China

Agency says it might contain ingredient used in antifreeze

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government warned consumers on Friday to avoid using toothpaste made in China because it may contain a poisonous chemical used in antifreeze.
Out of caution, the Food and Drug Administration said, people should throw away toothpaste with labeling that states it was made in China. FDA is concerned the bottom of the tube may contain diethylene glycol.
The agency is not aware of any reports in the United States of poisoning from toothpaste, but it did find the antifreeze ingredient in a shipment at the U.S. border and at two retail stores: a Dollar Plus store in Miami and a Todo A

Peso store in Puerto Rico.
Officials said they are primarily concerned about toothpaste sold at bargain retail outlets. The ingredient in question, called DEG, is used as a lower-cost sweetener and thickening agent. The highest concentration of the chemical found in toothpaste so far was between 3-4 percent.
'It does not belong in toothpaste even in small concentrations,' said the FDA's Deborah M. Autor.
The FDA increased its scrutiny of toothpaste made in China because of reports of contamination in several countries, including Panama. The agency is particularly concerned about chronic exposure to DEG in children and in people with kidney or liver disease.
Agency officials said they had no estimate of how many tubes of tainted toothpaste might have made it into the U.S.
'Our concern today is potentially about all toothpaste that comes in from China,' Autor said. 'Our estimate is that China makes up about \$3.3 billion of the \$2 billion U.S. toothpaste market.'
The agency also issued an import alert for all dental products containing DEG.
'It does not belong in toothpaste from China will be stopped at the border, she said.
The alert states that DEG has been improperly used in a variety of sedatives, syrups and cough medicines worldwide. Most recently, a cough syrup containing DEG resulted in more than 40 deaths in Panama last September.
The alert says the agency found DEG in three products manufactured by Goldcrest International Trading in China.
The products are Cooldent Fluoride, Cooldent Spearment and Cooldent ICE.
An analysis of the products revealed that they contained between 3 percent and 4 percent DEG.
The agency also found the chemical in products manufactured by Suzhou City Inno Dental Manufacturing Co. in China. Analysis of that product, Shih Fresh Mint Fluoride Paste, found that it contained about 1 percent DEG.

## A divine mystery: One God, three persons

Most religious holy days celebrate a grand event that God brought to pass. The Feast of Trinity on Sunday is the only major holiday in the church year that honors a theological doctrine.

The escape of slaves from bondage, the birth of a savior, resurrection from the dead and other dramatic events are acts of God, according to scholars who use them to shape our understanding of God in theology. The concept of the Trinity stands without specific historical roots.

The word Trinity is not in the Bible, but most Christian scholars argue that Scripture implies a God who makes himself known to the faithful in three distinct persons as Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

It is that sense of a triune God that Christians embrace that brings much consternation to Judaism and Islam. They argue that the idea of three persons in one God, however nuanced, muddles monotheistic waters.

The late Episcopal Bishop Pike joked that Islam might be a more attractive religion than Christianity because Islam offered the faithful three wives and one God while Christians were stuck with one wife and three Gods.

There is no such levity in Trinitarian theology. The doctrine became critically important in early church struggles against those who refused to acknowledge the divinity of Jesus the Son and the independent divine work of the Spirit.

Clearly, trinitarians argued, there is evidence of three manifestations of one God at work in the process of salvation. Christianity is monistic, they insist, but that one God makes himself known in three distinct manners.

That doctrine, carved out of the political religious struggle of the first four centuries, is the subject of Sunday's feast.

The faithful offered prayers and hymns related to the Trinity as early as the fourth century, but it was not until the 14th that Pope John XXII set a date for the feast of the Trinity on the Sunday after Pentecost, the feast of the Holy Spirit, itself 50 days following the Resurrection of Jesus.

St. Patrick may be the most famous saint associated with the Trinity. He used the shamrock, the three-leaf clover, to teach about the Trinity, three leaves, one clover.

Choirs will sing one of the great hymns of the church, St. Patrick's Breastplate, in many churches Sunday. Its refrain tells the tale:

"I bind unto myself the name, the strong name of the Trinity, by invocation of the Same, the Three in One and One in Three."

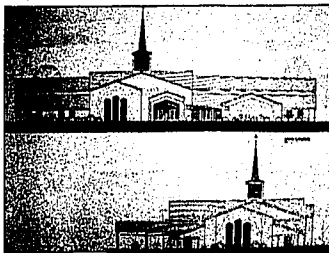
By early next spring, joyful noise will resonate within a new facility to be built near the north edge of town.

**Rural faithful struggle to define what makes a viable church**

HIG ISAAC, W.Va. — It's an idyllic setting for Sunday worship: a small, white church on the slope of a gentle hill. Outside the sanctuary, two dogs lie in the shade.

The only problem is there are just 20 worshippers inside, a situation that's become common in rural America as small churches struggle with dwindling memberships, aging congregations and less money to keep the lights on, let alone to pay full-time salary and benefits to a minister.

Across the denominational spectrum, rural churches are trying a variety of approaches to the challenge. Some are focusing on recruiting full-time ministers to rural towns. Others are adopting the style of suburban megachurches to attract those who might not normally attend services. Some are holding fast to the traditions of their forebears.

About 52 percent of American churches are in rural areas.

Yet more than half of weekly churchgoers attend services in places that are among the most populous 10 percent of congregations, according to the Hartford Institute on Religion Research.

That leaves some of the estimated 177,000 rural churches scattered across the country with as few as two regular worshippers.

The Jarvisville United Methodist Church, or circuit, in northern West Virginia is trying to lessen the strain by pooling resources of four rural

churches, including the one at Big Isaac, to keep the buildings in good repair and to support two part-time pastors. It's a practice sometimes referred to as "yoking" churches.

Danny Fleming is one of the pastors. Like the 19th century circuit riders who founded these churches, he travels

hundreds of miles a month to preach to all the congregations.

"I learned a long time ago that you get out of it what you put into it," he says. Although it may seem easier for the 80 regular worshippers in the Jarvisville Charge to travel to a single church, that isn't likely to happen. The small white buildings are not only the center of religious life for their members, but also of community life.

A United Methodist church has stood in Big Isaac since the 1860s. Drawings of the original log cabin sanctuary decorate the walls inside the new church, built in 1949. A plaque out front commemorates eight church members who died in a 1913 flood. For worshippers here, leaving the church for a larger gathering place is unthinkable.

"People can get lost in a megachurch," says Susie Richards, who plays piano during services. "Here, you walk in and if Mona Lee's not in her corner or Mary's not in her seat, you miss them."

"We may not be able to do as much as the bigger churches, but a lot of times the spirit is closer," she says.

The United Methodist Church has been hit hard by the decline in rural church membership, according to the Hartford Institute's Cynthia Woolver. The denomination once had more than 100,000 members in every U.S. county, a goal that stretched its resources.

# Support group for gay and lesbian Mormons marks 30th anniversary

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — When he was a teenager, Connell O'Donovan opened up to his Mormon seminary teacher and said that he was gay.

O'Donovan was greeted with kindness — and a prescription to chart the frequency of his sexual thoughts, fasting and praying when the urges came were suggested as a means of willing them away.

"He didn't know what to do," O'Donovan said of his teacher, who is now a church elder. "He was a super-nice guy, but just misinformed and all he had was the church handbook to go by."

Raised a member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, O'Donovan, a writer and historian, served a church mission and married in the church's Salt Lake City Temple. He came out in 1995 and eventually left the faith, unable to reconcile his gay identity with the teachings of the church.

"I had to throw the baby out with the bath water. I started from scratch and rebuilt myself," he said in an interview with The Associated Press last week. "I decided that I can use the word grace, but in a different way."

Last Sunday, the 43-year-old O'Donovan gave the keynote address at the 30th anniversary of Affirmation, a support group for gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgendered Mormons in Salt Lake City.

Founded in Provo, Utah, by a handful of students from the church-owned Brigham Young University, Affirmation grew out of concern over the increasing number of suicides among gay Mormons and from the frustration of living a closeted life. Today, the group, which is not recognized by or connected to the church, has chapters across

Buckley Jeppson, 48, a gay Mormon who lives in Washington, D.C. "That was useful. It was the first time I actually knew I wasn't the only person out there. It's comforting."

Officially, the Mormon church has taught that homosexuality is a sin and that traditional marriage is an institution ordained by God. In the 1990s, church elders modified that position to differentiate between homosexual orientation — same-gender attraction as they call it — and having an active gay sex life.

"The sin is in yielding to temptation," Elder Dallin H. Oaks said in an interview conducted by a public relations officer posted on the church Web site earlier this year.

Church officials declined to be interviewed for this story, instead referring the AP to the interview with Oaks and Elder Lance B. Wickman.

"What we know is that feelings can be controlled and behavior can be controlled," Oaks said.

Church President Gordon B. Hinckley has said gays who remain celibate can continue to enjoy full membership in the church, a standard seen in other faith traditions.

Affirmation's Salt Lake Chapter President Duane Jennings sees both positions as baby steps of progress. "They used to teach that the thoughts were evil," he said.

# Poll: 1 in 4 younger U.S. Muslims support suicide bombings

WASHINGTON (AP) — One in four younger U.S. Muslims said in a poll that suicide bombings to defend their religion are acceptable at least in some circumstances, though most Muslim Americans overwhelmingly reject the tactic and are critical of Islamic extremism and al-Qaida.

The survey by the Pew Research Center, one of the most exhaustive ever of the country's Muslims, revealed a community that in many ways blends comfortably into society.

Its largely mainstream members express nearly as much happiness with their lives and communities as the general public does, show a broad willingness to adopt American customs, and have income and education levels similar to others in the U.S.

Even so, the survey revealed noteworthy pockets of discontent. While nearly 80 percent of U.S. Muslims say suicide bombings of civilians to defend Islam cannot be justified, 13 percent say they can be, at least rarely.

That sentiment is strongest among those younger than 30. Two percent of them say it can often be justified, 13 percent say sometimes and 11 percent say rarely.

Southern Baptist Convention.

Thom Iltis, president of LifeWay Christian Resources, a Southern Baptist agency that conducts the annual survey, said the findings show that denominational lists had not been effective "stepping up" to the task of sharing the Gospel with a lost and dying world.

# St. Louis prelate aims to rein in the flock

ST. LOUIS — When it comes to expressing his views of church values, Roman Catholic Archbishop Raymond Burke has a habit of making headlines, not always to the satisfaction of his flock.

Burke memorably declared that he would deny communion to Sen. John F. Kerry, D-Mass., because the 2004 Democratic presidential nominee supports abortion rights. He fought unsuccessfully to keep singer Sheryl Crow, who supports embryonic stem cell research, from headlining an April fundraiser for the Cardinal Glennon Children's Medical Center, then resigned from the hospital foundation's board in protest.

Just this month, his office pushed St. Joseph's Academy, a Catholic high school, to change on its invitation to Sen. Claire McCaskill, D-Mo., to deliver this year's commencement address because of her abortion-rights position. Even though McCaskill's daughter was in the graduating class, McCaskill was uninvited.

At a time when significant

segments of the Catholic population are breaking with the church on such issues as embryonic stem cell research and abortion, Burke is adhering to Vatican orthodoxy endorsed by Pope Benedict XVI — and he expects the same of all Catholics in his archdiocese.

He tells his critics that he has "no agenda but the church." Burke's decisions — and their very public nature — have rolled the church in St. Louis, home to more than 500,000 Catholics. While some praise Burke for firmness in an era of moral laxity, others complain that the church under his direction seems out of touch.

There are certain parallels with Benedict's own experiences. The pope recently questioned the propriety of pro-choice legislators accepting Communion and told reporters that he agreed with excommunication for Mexican lawmakers who voted to legalize abortion.

In response, 18 Catholic members of Congress declared that "religious sanction in the political arena" violates American freedoms.

Judge eases restrictions on John W. Hinckley

A federal judge on Friday gave John W. Hinckley's doctors more flexibility to help the would-be presidential assassin regain society.

Hinckley, who said he shot President Reagan to impress actress Jodie Foster, was found not guilty by reason of insanity in 1982. Testimony at trial indicated he suffered from depression and a psychotic disorder that led to an obsession with Foster and he was committed to a psychiatric hospital.

Officials at St. Elizabeths Hospital here sought to loosen restrictions on how far in advance they may start the Secret Service when they take Hinckley into the community to attend baseball games, the theater and other events.

Such outings would allow doctors to observe Hinckley in social situations and get him more comfortable in public, the hospital said.

The hospital receives unsold tickets to such events on very short notice but, under a 1987 agreement, hospital officials were required to alert the Secret Service of any outings two weeks in advance. That made Hinckley unable to attend.

Bush aide resigning to go into private business

WASHINGTON — Dan Bartlett, one of President Bush's most trusted advisers and his longest-serving aide, said Friday he is resigning to begin a career outside of government.

The move was announced

on Bartlett's 36th birthday. He has been a Bush aide for nearly 14 years, from Bush's first campaign as governor of Texas, through two races for the White House and more than six years of a presidency marked by costly wars in Iraq and Afghanistan and an ongoing battle against terrorism.

"His contribution has been immeasurable. I value his judgment and I treasure his friendship," Bush said in a statement. "Since coming to work for me fourteen years ago as I prepared to run for governor, Dan has become a husband and a father. I understand his decision to make his young family his first priority."

Friday's deaths raised to 34 the number of soldiers killed since fighting between the army and militants began on May 20.

Army battles into Palestinian camp

TRIPOLI — Lebanese tanks and armored vehicles pushed their way into the outer neighborhoods of a Palestinian refugee camp Friday in some of the heaviest fighting since violence broke out between the military and al-Qaida-inspired militants nearly two weeks ago.

The military demanded the Fatah Islam fighters hold up in the Mahr el-Bared camp in northern Lebanon surrender and promised to pursue them if they did not.

Two Lebanese soldiers were killed and 10 wounded in Friday's fighting, according to security officials who spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to address the media. They said a unit of Fatah Islam militants was destroyed, but gave no casualty count.

GAZA STRIP

Kidnapped journalist says he's been treated well

GAZA CITY — Kidnapped British journalist Alan Johnston appeared Friday in a videotape posted on an Islamic Web, the first time he has been seen since he was abducted nearly three months ago.

"There was no way to tell when the video was recorded or why his captors released it. However, it was made public after a senior aide to Palestinian Prime Minister Ismail Haniyeh of Hamas visited Britain and said Johnston would be released soon.

The kidnappers appear to have some ties to the Islamic militant Hamas, and have demanded the release of prisoners held in Britain.

Johnston's family said they were pleased to see the pictures of the British Broadcasting Corp. correspondent, but were "very distressed" that he appeared in a kidnappers' video.

"Where we have been flexible is on myriad ways that a consulting process could lead the Iranians to a position where they could suspend," Rice said.

She said she saw no evidence that Thursday's talks in Madrid produced any momentum, but noted that the two negotiators had agreed to meet again in two weeks. Rice spoke to reporters as she flew from Berlin to Madrid for a visit unrelated to the nuclear talks.

Meanwhile, in what appeared to be an attempt to delay the threat of new U.N. sanctions, Iran pledged on Thursday to cooperate with the nuclear monitoring agency probing its atomic program, according to an official speaking to The Associated Press.

Rice: U.S. looking for ways to persuade Iran to halt nuclear activities

MADRID — Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice said Friday the United States is willing to look at creative ways to get Iran to halt nuclear

activities that could lead to a bomb. She held firm that the U.S. won't discuss rewards for Iran until it meets that condition.

The top U.S. diplomat signaled support for a high-level, science effort to strike a technical and semantic compromise that could allow Iran to stop, or suspend, disputed activities and open the door for international negotiations.

"Where we've been flexible is on how we get to suspension," Rice told reporters one day after inconclusive talks between European and Iranian nuclear negotiators.

The U.N. Security Council has demanded that Iran at least temporarily suspend its enrichment of uranium, an ingredient both for nuclear energy or nuclear weapons, before talks on a package of incentives could begin.

"Each of these cities has seen an unacceptable increase in homicides or other violent crimes," Attorney General Alberto Gonzales told employees at the Washington headquarters of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives. "Authorities in each have come forward and asked for our help."

Defying critics who have demanded his resignation over the firings of U.S. attorneys, Gonzales said he would spend the final 18 months of his tenure "in a sprint" to curb violent crime.

The influx of agents brings the number of ATF Violent Crime Impact Teams, which first deployed three years ago, to 29 cities.

The FBI is also adding to its more than 180 Safe Streets Task Forces by sending teams to Orlando, which Gonzales said has been plagued by gang violence.

Orlando police spokeswoman Barbara Jones said the department "welcomes any additional federal support in our efforts to combat violent crime."

No additional funds of grants are expected to be funneled to communities to bolster their own law enforcement efforts, Justice officials said.

Gonzales also called anew for new laws to strengthen penalties against criminals, including imposing mandatory minimum sentences on federal convicts.

The report, released Friday by Justice Department Inspector General Glenn A. Fine, warned of problems with federal crime-fighting task forces.

It concluded the teams duplicate efforts and compete for help from local authorities while failing to communicate among themselves.

The poor communication, in particular, resulted in three so-called "blue-on-blue" cases where federal agents mistook each other for criminals.

Justice Department sends crime-fighting teams to 4 more cities

WASHINGTON — A violent crime spike in four cities led the Justice Department on Friday to dispatch additional teams of federal agents to combat gangs, gangs or surging murder rates in Mesa, Ariz.; Orlando, Fla.; San Bernardino, Calif.; and San Juan, Puerto Rico.

The four-city push comes to report a 1.3 percent rise in violent crime nationwide in 2006 — an increase for the second straight year.

At the same time, a new internal Justice report rapped crime-busting task forces for failing to coordinate efforts and potentially endangering agents' lives.

WASHINGTON — Republican Fred Thompson took the first formal step toward a widely expected bid for the presidency, establishing a preliminary campaign committee on Friday.

The "testing the waters" committee allows Thompson — a former Tennessee senator and actor best known for his film and television roles, including as a prosecutor on NBC's "Law & Order" — to raise money, hire staff and gauge support without officially committing to a White House bid and without having to publicly disclose donations or expenditures.

The "Friends of Fred Thompson" committee was incorporated in papers filed with the Secretary of State in Nashville, Tenn., to "promote the potential candidacy of Fred Thompson for the office of president of the United States."

Thompson, 64, a Southern conservative with a right-leaning Senate record, would shake up an already unsettled race for the GOP nomination led by Rudy Giuliani, John

McCain and Mitt Romney. Many conservatives have expressed dissatisfaction with the current field of 10 candidates.

By creating the committee now, Thompson, an advocate in the Senate of a campaign finance reform bill requiring greater disclosure of contributions, avoids having to report to the Federal Election Commission his fundraising totals, donor identities or expenditures on July 15. That's the filing deadline for the second quarter of the year, and the top-tier GOP candidates, as well as seven underdog contenders, must abide by it.

Thompson's timing could significantly dampen the fundraising ability of his potential GOP rivals during the hot money stretch of the second quarter financial reporting period. Donors who otherwise would have contributed to other Republicans, instead, may choose to give to Thompson.

Kidney donation reality show revealed as a hoax in Netherlands

AMSTERDAM, Netherlands (AP) — A television show in which a woman wanted to donate a kidney to a contestant was revealed as a hoax Friday, with presenters saying they were trying to pressure the government into reforming organ donation laws.

Shortly before, the controversial program was to air, Patrick Lodiers of the "Big Donor Show" said the woman was not actually dying of a brain tumor and the entire exercise was intended to put pressure on the government and raise awareness of the need for organs.

The three prospective recipients were real patients in need of transplants and had been in on the hoax, the show said.

The program concerned criticism had widespread criticism for being tasteless and unethical.

But Lodiers said that it was "real" that was shocking"

because around 200 people die annually in the Netherlands while waiting for a kidney, and the average waiting time is more than four years.

"I thought it was brilliant, really," said Caroline Klingers, a kidney patient who was watching the show at a kidney treatment center in Bussum, Netherlands.

"I know these transplant doctors, and I thought they'll never go and actually do it. But it's good for the publicity and there are no losers."

During the show, 25 kidney patients were vetted by "Lisas," and most were quickly dismissed for being too old, too young, smokers, alcoholics or unmarried. Contestants gave moving pleas for why they should receive the organ.

Viewers were called on to express an opinion or vote for their favorite candidate by SMS text message for 47 cents.

# Traffic stop yields more than a ton of pot — and 20 tons of candy

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — Two men hauling more than 40,000 pounds of jawbreaker candies also had some not-so-sweet freight, the Minnesota State Patrol said: nearly 1½ tons of marijuana.

Luis Rene Avila and Juan Carlos appeared in federal court Thursday on charges of intent to distribute marijuana. A search using a drug-sniff-

dog turned up the load during a traffic stop Tuesday near St. Paul. The 41 boxes of marijuana were surrounded by 28 pallets of boxes containing the hard candy, authorities said.

Kent Ballie, acting special agent in charge of the Minneapolis-St. Paul office of the Drug Enforcement Administration, said the marijuana would be incinerated

and the candy probably would be destroyed as well.

"I initially thought about how we could give that away to kids forever and ever... But I couldn't take the risk," he said. "Even though they were in colophane and they're boxed, that package has been sitting, somewhere for a month with a ton and a half of marijuana next to it."

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**THE ACES ON BRIDGE®** Bobby Wolff

In today's deal North constructed an intelligent auction, first transferring to spades to show five cards in the suit, then jumping to four no-trump as a quantitative sequence, letting South advance with a maximum and three-card support. As it turned out, though, slam was nothing special, because of the wasted values in diamonds.

On the lead of the heart queen to dummy's ace, South advanced the spade queen from dummy and ran it, West contributing the 10. Since this particular West had never sacrificed a high card in his life, South played for the 10 to be singleton. He cashed the three top diamonds, then took the two top clubs and ruffed a club. At this point he led a heart to his king and played a third heart, putting West on lead.

In the three-card ending, dummy had the J-9 of spades, declarer the doubleton spade ace and the 13th heart, while East had king-third of spades. When West perforce led a minor-suit card, declarer ruffed in dummy. East could overruff or underuff as he saw fit, but his trump trick was just about to vanish into thin air! This maneuver is called a Smother Coup, and it is as unusual as it is elegant.

The hand was beautifully played by South. Note that, at double-dummy, it was essential that he not repeat the spade finesse at trick three. Had he done so, a psychic West might have pitched a heart honor and set the hand.
