## Committee takes a look at revamping state alcohol laws.

TWIN FALLS — A committee appointed by Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter composed of lobbyists, lawmakers and state officials that meets in private has begun examining Idaho's alcohol laws, including the possibility of eliminating the notion of limiting liquor licenses in cities.

The committee, which was formed in February and has met three times, has been asked to analyze the state's Alcohol Beverage Control, including the organization's administration, the state's enforcement of laws and the system of liquor licenses.

## Barnes family threatens lawsuit against city, county

TWIN FALLS — The parents of Josh Barnes, who fatally shot himself in February while surrounded by city and county special tactics teams, have signaled they may sue, alleging misconduct.

On the night of Feb. 7, 18-year-old Joshua Barnes shot himself in the head with a shotgun after an 11-hour standoff with police at the RV Barn on Addison Avenue West. Police said Barnes, who was charged with aggravated battery, had barricaded himself inside the business. He was accused of stabbing his girlfriend the night before in his bedroom at his parents' Twin Falls home.

The Times-News learned this week that Barnes' parents, Don and Kathy Barnes, sent a tort claim June 29, stating they may sue Twin Falls city and county within two years after the incident. By filing the lawsuit, the plaintiffs argued the government must file a precursor to a suit within 180 days to keep open an

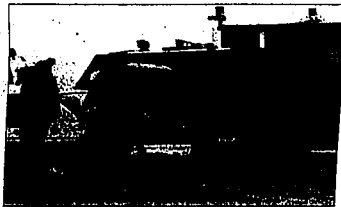

option of later suing.

An investigation by Idaho State Police found officers acted appropriately, but the case remains open, ISP Sgt. Gary Kaufman said Friday.

The parents' attorney, Laird Stone, served papers to both city and county offices that claim the parents may seek more than \$3 million in damages for their son's death. Stone reached that rough figure by calculating Josh Barnes' lost earnings over a lifetime.

## Jerome official says no to public comment

JEROME — At least one property owner next to the location of a proposed feedlot was allegedly not allowed to submit written testimony for debating this month. It remains unclear whether a county official was justified in doing so.

Dean Dimond, who lives next to the proposed Big Sky 13,000-animal feedlot, said he was not allowed to submit written comment Friday

because Jerome County Administrator Art Brown said he was one day too late. Under county code, individuals may submit comments for 15 days after a public notice is published in a local newspaper — which Dimond said gave him until Aug. 3.

The notice was printed in the July 19 edition of the *Northern Side News*, said Rich Carlson, an attorney representing Dimond, said that he

## State seeks dismissal of GOP primary suit

### Magic Valley residents among plaintiffs

BOISE — Idaho Secretary of State Ben Yursa has asked a federal judge in Boise to dismiss a lawsuit against the state by conservative Republican Party members demanding that Idaho close its primary election.

Seventy-two Idaho Republicans sued Yursa in July to have the GOP primary closed to voters not registered with the party. In early June, a majority of the state GOP's Central Committee meeting in Burley approved a resolution seeking a

closed primary. Among the plaintiffs in the lawsuit are several Magic Valley residents, including Marilyn Hempleman, Roscoe Patton, former Twin Falls County Commissioner Gary Grindstaff, Christopher Harriman, George Deweller and John Cox, all of Twin Falls; Del Kohtz, chairman of the Jerome County Republican "Committee"; Blaine County resident Dale D. Eversen; and Cassia County resident Donna Kunau.

The lawsuit has split the state's dominant political party, as a faction led by former state Sen. Rod Beck argued that letting everyone vote in GOP primaries for the last three decades has produced candidates who don't reflect the party's conservative ideals.

Yursa, represented by Attorney General Lawrence Wasden, filed his motion for dismissal on Thursday in U.S. District Court. He contends that because Beck and others who sued don't officially represent the state party, they lack standing to bring a lawsuit. For the suit to be valid, Yursa said it would have to be endorsed by the party itself, which hasn't happened.

"The individuals suing don't have standing to sue, based upon the party rule," said Yursa, a Republican.

## Peace puppets Soldier takes hands-on approach to war

WASHINGTON — The reaction was immediate when Army 1st Sgt. Bruce Reges strolled into the classroom in the Baghdad suburb of Baqubah, in the volatile Diyala province. At 6-foot-5 and wearing full body armor, Reges, 57, looked fearsome to the children. Outside, two armored vehicles blocked the street. An armed

security detail was checking out the roof and classrooms.

Reges is assigned to an Army civil affairs unit, working to reconstruct and support schools, irrigation projects and honey farms in Diyala. The team was visiting the school in May to assess what could be done to help, but the young students were terrified.

"Two of the girls started to cry and escape somehow, and the teacher had to calm them down

and tell them that we were there to help them, not to hurt them," Reges recalled. "It was emotionally tough for me to see a child so traumatized by U.S. soldiers that they reacted that way."

That night, Reges e-mailed his mother, Jean Reges Burn, at her home in Reston, Va. Could she send him two small puppets to carry?

 relevant to the Alcohol Beverage Control would be rewritten.  
 The ongoing process is expected to result in changes to allow for licensing to be less complicated, said Wells. He said that "licensing should be an easier process," but that making the law so anyone would be eligible for a license would be "extremely incorrect."

The committee — chosen by Otter, who has yet to attend a meeting — includes three state lawmakers and a handful of people from Meridian, one of the state's fastest-growing cities. Although the meetings are not public, those attending are not on their free time and no taxpayers' money is used, Wells said. The next meeting is Aug. 14.

Administration, enforcement or quotas in regard to licenses have been the main topics, those involved said.  
 "I think we're going to see some legislation in at least one of those areas," said Dan Chamwick, of the Idaho Association Counties, who sits on the committee.

The governor hopes to develop a more uniform set of liquor laws — which he said are currently archaic — that will make it easier for law enforcement and bar and restaurant

owners, said spokesman Jon Hanlan.

"It's kind of arbitrary and subjective as to how some of these laws are interpreted, and we want some of that subjectivity out and put in much more clear (language)," Hanlan said. "He wants to streamline the process."

But some people are skeptical about the committee, and point out that similar ones in the past have proved futile.  
 Denise Rogers, who worked for the ABC for 13 years and was executive director of the Idaho Licensed Beverage Association until she resigned three weeks ago, said that she was told the governor wants to

eliminate the liquor license system.

Liquor licenses in Idaho are awarded on a per-capita basis: for every 1,500-person increase in population a city receives a license. It's common knowledge in Idaho that licenses — which can be sold or leased for an unlimited amount — are smart investing.

Doing so, she said, would dewild them and hurt individuals who have made hefty investments between \$100,000 and \$200,000.

"It's the governor's intent to get rid of the quota system," she said. "It's a huge issue, and it's really under the radar."

 "It's really giving notice that there may be a basis," Stone said.  
 "They could respond by saying, 'We deny the claim,' or by saying, 'Yes, there is something here. Let's talk.'"  
 Typically, in tort cases, agencies respond within 90 days of the claim. Not responding within that period indicates that the agency denies a basis exists, Stone said.

The claim opens a range of possible suits. It threatens to

take action on the basis that officers may have deviated from reasonable standards of conduct and negligently performed their duties.

The claim, however, targets no individual officers.

was told by Brown that the 15 days started July 13 — making the deadline Aug. 2 — since the newspaper could be purchased late that evening, even though subscribers would receive it the following morning.

Carlson, an attorney with the Idaho Rural Council, said the decision was arbitrary and there will likely be "consequences" through he said he was unsure what action might be taken.

"This is another example of making rules up on the fly," Carlson said. "It's arbitrary to every known legal precedent, the Jerome County Zoning Ordinance and state law."

When the commissioners set aside Aug. 14 and 15 for the hearings last month they adopted a set of hearing guidelines. Brown said then that county code permits him to accept written testimony from primary residence owners within a one-mile radius of the property for 15 days after the hearing dates are published.

Brown did not return several messages left at his office and his home.

County Commission Chairman Charlie Howell said he understood the discrepancy in dates, but that he agreed with Brown.

"I told him to take the papers (submitted comment) and we'll iron it out," he said. "I can read it either way."

Jerome County Prosecutor Mike Seib said that he interprets the 15-day period to begin the day after a legal notice is published. The deadline, thereby would be Aug. 3.

"That would be my advice," Seib said. "That's usually how the Idaho statutes work."

Commissioner Dianna Obenaus called Brown's decision unfair and outside his authority.

"The average citizen does not or will not have access when

they are publishing it in the print form. They will have it when it hits the streets in the morning," she said. "If we're going to split hairs, let's split hairs on the side of the public."

Dimond also tried submitting comments for Jim Stewart, a member of the county's planning commission who was out of town. When asked why Dimond — who routinely attends meetings on the feedlot — walked until Friday to submit comments, Carlson said that the application was lengthy and required a lot of preparation.

This is the second request by Big Sky, owned by Eden businessman Don McFarland, for the feedlot. The newest proposal is nearly a one-third reduction from the original request for 18,555 animals, which drew opposition from nearby citizens and activists.

"I thought, we need some way to let them know we are human, too — fathers, brothers, sisters, mothers," Reges said. "So I thought, two smart puppets in my cargo pocket would be helpful in bridging the gap."

Burn quickly shipped a package of puppets. "It's a big man, and when he has his armor on, he needs something to soften that appearance," Burn said.

The puppets had the desired effect on the children.

"He wrote back and said, 'Mom, I need as many puppets as you can send, as quickly as possible,'" Burn said.

This was born Peace Through Puppets, a nonprofit organization operated by Burn and her friends that is dedicated to helping U.S. soldiers stationed in Iraq communicate with children affected by the war by keeping them supplied with hand puppets.

Burn, 60, was uniquely qualified to act on her son's request. "Long ago and far away, I was once a professional puppeteer," said Burn, who made marionettes and performed a variety show. These days she is still a puppetmaker but has given up performing.

Burn, her eldest son, "grew up with that, and I trained him," Burn said.

That training has been put to good use in Iraq, where Reges pulls out a small puppet at almost any opportunity with a child.

"The reaction is immediate," Reges wrote in a recent e-mail. "The child reaches out, and I look at the mom and raise my eyebrows — like, 'Is it OK? I have never had a parent say no.'"

"They put them on and disappear behind Mom's skirt. I gave one to a little guy — and his mom and an aunt and so much — it really meant a lot to me."

## Hedge fund tax break under fire

**WASHINGTON** — The most controversial tax break on Wall Street, known simply as the Carry, is not authorized by any law and was never approved by Congress.

Unchallenged by lawmakers, it swelled into a benefit that, by one back-of-the-envelope estimate, spares a small band of the country's richest and most powerful financiers \$6 billion a year in personal income taxes.

The astonishing cost of this tax break to the federal government has riveted attention on Wall Street's titans of the moment, the extraordinarily wealthy managers of private-equity firms and hedge funds.

At the heart of the dispute is the way the fund manager's profits are taxed. Known as carried interest, or the Carry, those profits are taxed as capital gains, for which the rate is usually 15 percent. That is less than half the 35 percent rate paid on regular income.

The Carry came into focus when private-equity firms, also known as buyout firms, recently began to sell themselves to the public. The transactions forced the firms to disclose how much their managers earn. The amounts were staggering.

Several key Democrats attacked the Carry as an unfair tax break that Congress would never have granted and are pushing a bill that would subject it to a higher tax rate, the one paid by ordinary taxpayers.

# Idaho unemployment up

## Magic Valley unemployment slightly below state average

**TWIN FALLS** — Idaho's seasonal unemployment rate increased slightly in May, further indicating that the state's economy is settling into a more sustainable growth rate.

The Idaho Department of Commerce & Labor released on Friday its report on Idaho's unemployment rate, which also showed that the Magic Valley area also experienced a slight increase in unemployment.

However, despite the increase, Idaho still remained more than one percentage point below the national unemployment rate of 4.6 percent.

The unemployment rate in counties throughout Magic Valley saw a slight decline in unemployment with the exception of Blaine, Jerome and Shoshone counties, which increased about one percentage point.

Officials at the Department of Commerce & Labor say Idaho's economy appears to be leveling off after two years of "super-heated" growth.

"The labor force is still tight, and we're seeing an upward pressure on wages," said Bob Uhlenkott, Idaho Commerce & Labor's chief research officer. "People who were in lower-wage jobs are moving up to higher-paying employers, making the search for qualified workers more difficult in industry sectors with lower pay scales."

The Southern Idaho Economic Development Organization (SIEDO), together with the College of Southern Idaho and other economic development organizations, is planning a workforce summit that will address similar issues regarding qualified employees in south-central Idaho.

A concern throughout the Magic Valley area is how to retool construction laborers for growing industries as the region expands for slower growth in residential construction.

# National unemployment rate up to 4.6 percent

**WASHINGTON** — The nation's unemployment rate inched up to a six-month high of 4.6 percent in July as hiring simmered down. Workers' wages, meanwhile, grew modestly.

The latest snapshot of conditions around the country, released by the Labor Department Friday, showed that new job creation has slowed. Employers increased payrolls by 52,000 last month, down from 125,000 in June. It marked the fewest add-ons in a month since February.

Healthy job cuts by the government were a major factor in the subdued employment picture. Jobs also were eliminat-

ed by construction companies, factories and retailers — in part reflecting the toll of the sour housing market and the sluggishness of the U.S. auto industry.

Employment in health care, food services, architecture and engineering, computer design and in other industries expanded.

There are some indications that the job market may be easing up a tad but the fundamentals still remain quite solid," said Lynn Resser, chief economist at Bank of America's Investment Strategies Group.

So for people looking for work there are still opportunities, but some areas are much more active in seeking work-

ers than others," she said.

Even with the uptick from June's 4.5 percent, the current jobless rate is still low by historical standards. The lowest unemployment rate in a generation — 3.8 percent — was logged in 2000. In contrast, the rate topped 10 percent in the early 1980s.

July's jobless rate was the highest since January, when it also was 4.6 percent. The last time it was higher was August 2006.

The cooler hiring climate affected groups differently. The unemployment rate for Hispanics climbed to 5.9 percent in July, the highest since late 2005. However, the rate for blacks declined to 8 percent, the lowest in five

months. Teenagers were still finding summer jobs. Their unemployment rate dipped to 15.2 percent, a four-month low.

A separate report showed that the service sector — an engine of the U.S. economy — lost momentum in July.

The Institute for Supply Management's index dipped to 55.8, from 60.7 in June.

Readings above 50 indicate expansion, while those below 50 indicate contraction.

On Wall Street, stocks sank Friday.

The Dow Jones Industrials were down 50 points in afternoon trading.

# A survivor of Bosnia's civil war, T.F. soldier fights for his new country

**CHEERS:** To U.S. Army Spc. Samir Smirko of Twin Falls, who survived the civil war in his native Bosnia-Herzegovina as a child only to volunteer to fight in Iraq for his adopted nation.

Smirko returned to Twin Falls on July 22 after an 11-month tour of duty in Iraq with the 134th Brigade Combat Team. As a youngster, he and his family were forced to flee their hometown of Derвента during fighting between the majority Bosnian army and the Serb-led government. Smirko's father, drafted into the Bosnian military, was wounded in the conflict.

Smirko, who's 21, could probably have lived the rest of his life without again stepping into bar's way, but like the hundreds of other south-central Idaho residents who were served in Iraq and Afghanistan, he felt a moral obligation to his neighbors and to his country.

He's done them proud.

**Snake River too important to us all to allow dumping**

As drought conditions reduce water volumes in the Snake River, it is increasingly important that water quality is maintained in order to provide all the beneficiaries to downstream users. It was recently revealed that the Simplot fertilizer plant discharges 438,000 lbs. of phosphorus each year to a tributary of the Snake River in Pocatello.

Phosphorus is a nutrient that causes unwanted algae growth which then robs the downstream water of oxygen, creating dead zones where trout and other beneficial species cannot thrive. The algae also clogs the river, making it difficult for downstream users to receive their regular supply of irrigation water. The state water quality standards are not being met.

Twin Falls-area fisheries, agriculture, recreation and economic development could greatly benefit if citizen and local government participation could take place to bring about needed reduction in Simplot's pollutant discharges to the Snake River system. Stopping the biggest pollutant dischargers first is the most logical path to cleaner water.

I urge you to contact Idaho DEQ (236-6160), the EPA (202-326-7000) and your local elected officials to bring about beneficial improvements to the water quality of the Snake River.

It pains me to have paid taxes for more than 30 years to the College of Southern Idaho and see it turn into a liberal, politically correct institution.

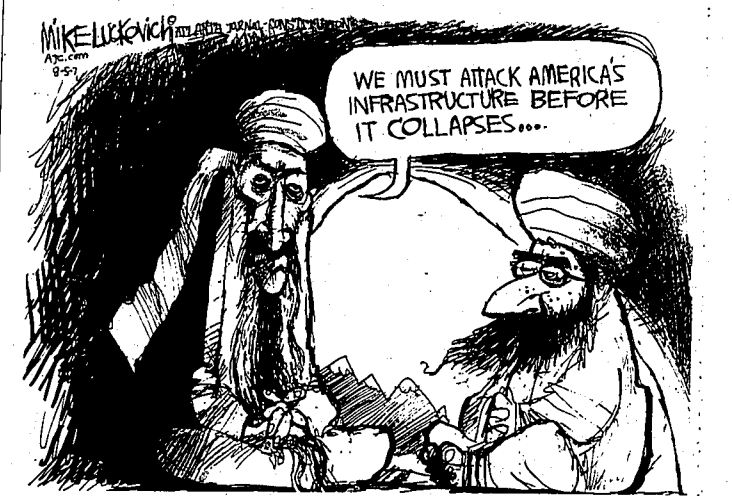

# Wisconsin teen sentenced to life for murder of principal

BARABOO, Wis. (AP) — A teenager sat emotionless as he was sentenced to life in prison on Friday for gunning down his principal after prosecutors argued that the boy hasn't taken any responsibility for the shooting.

Sauk County Circuit Judge Patrick Tiggart handed down a 16-year-old Eric Hainstock's sentence one day after a jury convicted him of first-degree murder in the death of Weston Schools Principal John Klang last fall.

Klang's wife, Sue, told the judge that Klang was her high school sweetheart and that life without him is "horror, agony, emptiness, despair." She called Hainstock callous.

"The only one who hasn't shed a tear is Eric," she said.

and pleas from Hainstock's attorneys, Tiggart said the teen could apply for parole

in 30 years. The judge also recommended that the Department of

Corrections place Hainstock at a juvenile facility and that he take anger management classes.

Weston Schools lies just outside Cazenovia, about 65 miles northwest of Madison. Hainstock was a 15-year-old freshman there when he walked into school on the morning of Sept. 29 armed with his father's shotgun and .22 revolver.

A custodian tore the shotgun from him, but Hainstock pulled out the revolver and moved into the hallway, working his way around homecoming decorations. That's where he met Klang.

The principal tackled him, but Hainstock shot him three times, fatally wounding him. Hainstock's attorneys have said the shooting was an accident.

They said Hainstock suffers from attention deficit disorder,

was abused repeatedly by his father and endured relentless teasing at school. He went to Weston with guns not to kill but to make Klang and teachers listen to his problems, they said.

Hainstock's attorney Rhoda Riccardi, said Hainstock is an immature boy. When she came to speak to him in jail before the sentencing, she found him watching "Spongebob SquarePants."

Sauk County District Attorney Pat Barrett said the boy's anger toward Klang had been growing for days. The principal had kicked him out of school after he threw a stapler at a teacher and had given him in-school suspension the day before the shooting. Hainstock had kicked him out for having chewing tobacco.

Barrett also said the boy has shown no remorse and uses his troubled past as an excuse for the killings.

## Court says FBI violated Constitution in raid on congressman's office

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department trampled on congressional independence when raiding U.S. Rep. William Jefferson's office last year, a federal appeals court ruled Friday, siding with Congress in a constitutional showdown.

In a rare textbook case involving all three branches of government, the court held that investigators violated the Constitution by reviewing legislative documents as part of a corruption investigation.

The court ordered the Justice Department to return any legislative documents it seized from the Louisiana Democrat's office at Capitol Hill. Still undecided is whether prosecutors can use other records it confiscated as part of their bribery case against Jefferson.

The raid was part of a 16-month international bribery investigation of Jefferson, who is accused of accepting \$100,000 from a telecommunications businessman, \$90,000 of which was later recovered in a freezer in the congressman's Washington home.

Jefferson pleaded not guilty in June to charges of soliciting more than \$500,000 in bribes while using his office to broker business deals in Africa.

"The Justice Department has predicted a ruling such as the one Friday will turn Congress into a haven where lawmakers can keep evidence of corruption off-limits to prosecutors.

That's not the case, said the three-judge panel of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit. The raid itself was constitutional, the court held. But the FBI crossed the line when it viewed every record in the office without allowing Jefferson to argue that some involved legislative business.

The Constitution prohibits the executive branch from using its law enforcement powers to interfere with the lawmaking process.

"The review of the congressman's paper files when the search was executed exposed legislative material to the executive and violated the Constitution, the court wrote. "The congressman is entitled to the return of documents that the court determines to be privileged."

The court did not rule whether, because portions of the search were illegal, prosecutors should be barred from using any of the records in their case against Jefferson. That will be decided by a Virginia federal judge presiding over the criminal case, which is scheduled for trial in January.

Defense attorney Robert Trout said that fight is lost. He accused the government of "overreaching" in its investigation.

"This was an illegal search," Trout said. "And anything they got, privileged or not, was unlawfully obtained."

The Justice Department said Friday it was pleased prosecutors were allowed to keep records unrelated to legislative business. Spokesman Brian Roche-kasse said the department was disappointed, however, because the ruling required authorities to notify lawmakers before any raid.

The court did not say lawmakers could have had advance notice of the FBI's arrival. Rather, the court said the Justice Department can't broadly review legislative records. One solution mentioned in the opinion was for FBI agents to lock down the office, then allow the lawmakers to set aside disputed documents. It would be up to a judge — not the FBI — to decide whether the records could be seized.

## Submarine replica sets off security alert

NEW YORK — It was September 1976 when a crude submarine known as the "Turtle" failed in its attempt to blow up a British ship in New York Harbor during the Revolutionary War.

Friday, a homemade replica of the Turtle caused its own commotion near the passenger ship Queen Mary 2, being towed by an inflatable raft, and the aquatic entourage pulled to within 25 yards of the cruise ship.

Police harbor units leapt

into action Friday morning after a police detective saw two vessels approaching a security zone around the Queen Mary, officials said. One vessel, a pear-shaped wooden submersible with a height of about eight feet, was being towed by an inflatable raft, and the aquatic entourage pulled to within 25 yards of the cruise ship.

"They appear to have put the raft in the water and tied it to the Queen Mary," said state Deputy Public Safety Secretary Michael Balboni, who happened to be flying over the harbor in a heli-

copter to examine port security.

"It looked like a big sea buoy bobbing in the water," said Balboni. "It was about 25 yards from the stern of the Queen Mary."

A spokesman for the U.S. Coast Guard in New York said the submersible, also dubbed the "Turtle," had only a pedal system for propulsion and had no other means of power or steering mechanism. One man was in the submersible craft while two others were on the inflatable craft, a group of people police Commissioner Ray Kelly described as "three adventuresome individuals" involved in some "marine mischief."

The nautical adventure appears to have been the idea of Duke Riley, a 35-year-old Brooklyn native described by a friend as an artist with a penchant for the odd "guerilla sort of project." Police identified his two cohorts on the raft as being Michael Cushing, 41, and Jesse Bushnell, 41, both of Rhode Island. A law enforcement source said Bushnell claimed to be a relative of the original submarine designer, David Bushnell.

## Armless driver gets 5 years in prison on latest traffic charges

NEW PORT RICHEY, Fla. (AP) — A man with no arms and one leg who wouldn't stop driving despite a long list of traffic violations was sentenced to five years in prison Friday on felony driving and drug charges.

Michael Francis Wiley, 40, also was sentenced to 15 years of drug offender probation. He pleaded no contest in June to the charges.

"I'd just like to say I know what I did was wrong," Wiley said in court Friday. "I am truly sorry your honor, I am."

Wiley taught himself to drive after losing both arms and a leg in an electrical accident when he was 13. He has already spent more than three years in prison for habitually driving without a license, kicking a state trooper and other charges.

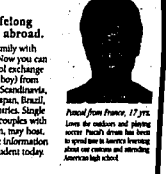
He once had a valid license, but it has been suspended several times since 1985, according to his attorney. He starts the car with his toes, shifts with his knee and steers with the stump of his left arm. He turns on the lights with his teeth.

In his most recent brush with the law last May, Wiley sped off in a Ford Explorer when police approached him at a convenience store, officials said. Officers pursued, but called off the chase after eight minutes because they did not want to put others in danger, police said.

Defense attorney John Hooker pleaded for leniency and a minimum sentence of 2½ years. He cited his client's need for treatment for his many physical and mental health problems, including anxiety, panic attacks, depression and a pain disorder related to his amputations.

# Death toll from bridge collapse may be far lower than feared

**MINNEAPOLIS** — More than 100 cars and trucks and a school bus crawling bumper-to-bumper on a bridge that suddenly crashes into the Mississippi River seemed like a recipe for a massive death count.

But on Friday came what this city's fire chief called a miraculous turn of events: the prospect that relatively few lives were lost.

Divers still scurried through the swirling, muddy currents for cars and bodies. However, the death toll remained at five from Wednesday's collapse, and authorities cast doubt on an earlier estimate that as many as 30 people were missing. They even said it could be as few as eight.

Of the roughly 100 injured, 20 remain hospitalized and only five were critical. "We were surprised that we didn't have more people seriously injured and killed," Minneapolis Fire Chief Jim Check told The Associated Press. "I think it was something of a miracle."

Check cited a list of reasons: a bridge design that minimized falling debris, a quick response by rescue crews and the rush-hour crawl that gave vehicles little momentum to plunge into the river.

In addition, experts say the speed and depth of the water in the Mississippi River were much lower than normal on the day of the collapse — largely the result of a drought. That may have made it easier for people to escape the disaster.

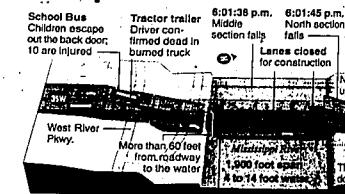
"It's a horrible, tragic event. But it could have been a hell of a lot worse," said Kent Harries, assistant professor of civil and environmental engineering in the University of Pittsburgh's

School of Engineering. Minnesota officials say they don't yet know how many cars were traveling the span during the collapse. But based on the length of road, the lanes that were open, time of day and widely accepted traffic formulas, Northwestern University engineering professor Joseph Scholer estimated that between 100 and 150 vehicles were on the bridge.

Despite the low death toll, divers were still contending with a treacherous combination of sunken cars, broken cliffs of concrete and jagged rebar as they searched for bodies.

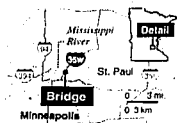
Firefighters pulled the fifth victim, the driver of a tractor-trailer that was engulfed in flames, from the wreckage late Thursday. Video of the burning rig — nose down in the crevasse between two broken concrete slabs — was among the most compelling images shown in the immediate aftermath of the collapse. The driver was identified as Paul Eckstadt, 51, of Mounts View. Early in the day authorities said that as few as eight people were still missing. However, they cautioned later that num-

Minnesota transportation officials spent another day dealing with scrutiny arising from a series of reports and inspections over the years that raised alarm about the bridge, including rust-eaten steel beams, missing bolts and cracks in the welding that held load-bearing parts together.

A consulting company that thoroughly examined the bridge noted that one possible fix — steel plating of fractures — carried a "relatively high cost," according to a January report. Transportation officials deny that cost pressures swayed their decisions.

President Bush was scheduled to visit today, and first lady Laura Bush toured the scene Friday morning. She praised the rescuers who rushed to the bridge in the chaos after the collapse — a sentiment echoed by the fire chief in explaining why more people didn't die. Because the bridge was located near the heart of downtown, several emergency crews and residents were close by.

"We could not have done it as firefighters alone. It took more people than we had. It was organized. It was pretty calm," Check said.

ber could rise, in part because there was no way to know how many victims were in the water. Some people without family in the area may not have been reported missing, said Police Lt. Amelia Huffman, a spokeswoman.

The missing included a 23-year-old pregnant woman and her 2-year-old daughter, who was in the back seat of the family's car when the bridge crumbled. Sadiya Sahal, a 23-year-old immigrant from Somalia, called her family at 8:30 p.m., saying she was stuck in traffic, said Omar Jamal, executive director of the Somali Justice Advocacy Center. That was her last phone call. "Her husband is destroyed. He's in shock," Jamal said.

Authorities still do not know what caused the 8:05 p.m. collapse. Engineers had numerous theories, including heavy traffic and construction work being done on the road at the time that might have put an undue burden on the span. The bridge was deemed "structurally deficient" by the federal government as far back as 1990.

## T.F. County assessor finishes '07 evaluations

### Three appeals mark end of rush to finish 36,000 assessments

TWIN FALLS — New Year's Day 2007 won't wound County Assessor Gerry Bowden anymore.

Three people representing eight land parcels appealed to the Twin Falls County commissioners that the Jan. 1 values of the parcels were

assessed too high. The commissioners agreed Friday to lower the value of two parcels.

The three appeals represented the final leg of the Assessor's Office's rush to evaluate 36,000 land parcels by last month. By last October, the office had fallen behind its evaluation schedule by about three months. Assessors evaluated as many as 442 parcels a

week to catch up.

"It's good to close the books on the 2007 evaluations and start on the 2008 program," Bowden said.

Sitting in his office, Bowden waved his arm at stacks of paper to show he has no shortage of work ahead of him.

The final changes made to the 2007 parcel values, both

happened to Tensco, Inc. All six parcels Tensco appealed are in a subdivision located near Filer Avenue and Eastland Drive North.

One parcel's value was lowered by about \$2,000 due to its proximity to a higher-traffic road, and another was lowered by about \$2,600 to better reflect the value of surrounding parcels, said Commissioner Terry Kramer.

The commissioners left values on the other two appeals, each representing a single

parcel, and the other four Tensco parcels.

Kramer said the six parcels the commission left alone all fell within the 90 to 110-percent range of the parcel's market value, even though the assessment might be at the high end. The value of one appealed parcel fell at about 108 percent of market value.

Bowden said the appeals could have come from the idea that higher property value results in higher property tax.

## Family reports missing nanny

# Advancing AP courses

### CSI provides options for high school students aiming for college credit

TWIN FALLS — As the state Board of Education pushed for more high school students to have access to Advanced Placement or dual-enrollment courses for college credit, high schools had to find ways to offer those courses.

It's up to each district to decide how to do so, whether in the school or via an online service. Many southern Idaho districts are relying on the College of Southern Idaho for a helping hand.

John Miller, a dean in the Office of Instructional Administration at CSI, oversees the college's Concurrent Enrollment program and said the college got a shade fewer than 1,800 students from various District IV schools last school year.

Hansen High School and Wendell High School are just examples. Jon Goss, principal at Wendell High, said the school doesn't have AP courses and encourages students to learn through CSI. Same goes for some AP sub-

jects at Hansen High. "We're close enough to CSI so that students can (take AP classes) at CSI," Hansen School District Superintendent Dennis Coulter said. "We'll move senior requirements to the morning so they can take classes at CSI in the afternoon."

Some advanced subjects

such as math and literature can easily be taught at the high schools as in Hansen's case, depending on the number of students enrolled.

Hansen Principal Bert Hurski said calculus teacher Roger Ceresa is one of the few high school teachers who has instructed an AP course off and on for many years but

hasn't needed additional certification as part of the state's new requirements. For other subjects, students have a block of time set aside to utilize the computer lab for

online courses from institutions such as CSI or the Idaho Digital Learning Academy.

Within the Glenns Ferry School District, it's the same

story: Advanced options are off-site.

"We would like to offer AP courses," Superintendent Wayne Rush said. "But we're meeting requirements through Tech Prep (online classes), and most kids are able to get college-level credit."

## Scarlet fever in the school? No worries

### Schools say fever's return unlikely

JEROME — The Jerome School District made headlines this spring when an outbreak of scarlet fever hit a couple of its schools. But after learning about the disease and speaking with health officials, district staff aren't too worried about a repeat when school resumes this month.

"Scarlet fever was ... not something to be concerned about to the level maybe some people thought it was," Jerome Superintendent Jim Cobble said Friday.

Caused by the same bacteria as strep throat, scarlet fever has a reputation as a killer, thanks in large part to books such as "Little Women" and "The Velveteen Rabbit." But that depiction isn't accurate in this day and age, said Tom Machala, director of communicable disease and prevention for South Central District Health.

The only difference between strep and Scarlet Fever, Machala said, is the rash that appears most often on children under 16. The typical red bumps, which appear first on the chest and abdomen and feel like rough sandpaper, can frighten parents, he said. But the fever is as easy to treat as strep, and Machala said he doesn't think schools in the area — many of which get their nursing services through District Health — will take any more steps than usual.

"We've been talking about hand-washing for schools," Machala said. "But kids will be kids."

Even if the disease was worse, Cobble said, the chances of it showing up again are likely "minimal" at best. Janet Avery, assistant principal at Jerome Middle School, said this spring was the first time she'd seen in Jerome.

"Normally at the middle school we never have to send home letters," Avery said. "I don't even remember seeing (scarlet fever) when I was little."

# Whoops ... Rodeo Queen mix-up causes stir

"The reason people have come to us is because we're a neutral party," Kindig said.

Shelley Reincke, mother of Britney Adams, second runner-up in the Senior Princess contest, said she came to believe an error had been made in declaring the contest winners when she noticed the participant number on her daughter's scorecard was incorrect.

She said she spoke with Heinz about the matter.

"If she did make a mistake, why didn't she say, 'I made a mistake'?" Reincke said. Heinz admitted Friday she had made a mistake in naming the winners of the horsemanship and speech and modeling portions of the Senior Princess contest. But, she said, her mistake did not affect the overall outcome of the contest.

"I inadvertently switched the name of the girl that won horsemanship and the girl that won speech and modeling," she said.

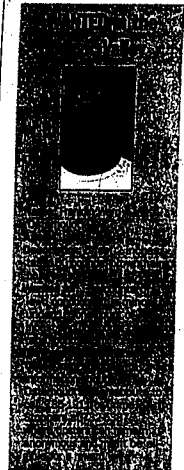

We don't always have access to the colleges, so we're looking at online classes and the digital academy."

However, subjects like biology and chemistry still require hands-on or virtual labs. The lab requirements set by the College Board, which accredits schools' AP courses. When a high school can't offer a lab setting with the proper equipment, it turns to CSI.

"It's very difficult to duplicate some lab experiences at local high schools because they may not have the proper equipment, the level students need," Miller said, adding that many high school students elect to take the labs in the afternoons or evenings on Saturdays. "We can do this in any of the remote

campuses as well, such as the Adlai-Cassidy Center or at the North Side Center in Gooding. Of the nearly 2,000 students signed up through CSI, Miller estimated that 100 show up to the main campus in Twin Falls.

Others use the satellite schools, which have many of the same labs.

More AP classes could be added soon in Idaho schools, as Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter approved \$500,000 for funding that was difficult in April. Even so, Miller said, CSI is actively looking to boost current enrollment.

"Our goal is to expand the service," he said. "As requirements go up with more math and more science, we can help our state students get ready for college."

Department of Transportation. The funds were used to purchase a digital video system for one of the city's police cars. Installed this week, which will better monitor traffic violations.

"Age plays a large factor in aggressive driving, and many of our stop were drivers under the age of 21," Johnson said.

The new video system is an upgrade for the department, but this one is state of the art technology. As an extra precaution, aggressive drivers are reminded that fines and citations can lead to higher insurance premiums and a loss of a license for younger drivers. Johnson also suggests several ways drivers can reduce the stresses of traffic and practice safe driving habits — allow extra travel time, maintain a safe braking distance from the car in front, use signals when turning or making lane changes, and always come to a full stop at stop signs.

The more common diseases, said, are ones like head lice. And even when pinkeye or strep throat is started with home established guidelines for dealing with them. At Immanuel Lutheran day care in Twin Falls, the staff responded to a recent episode of pinkeye by closing down the rooms the children were in and cleaning everything, including toys. The school sent a letter to parents asking them to wash hands with soap on pinkeye, strep throat and other minor viruses that some of the kids have come down with.

"The pinkeye was the biggest, but I think we on the clear with that one now," said Sherry

Hardin, an administrative assistant and early childhood specialist with the day care.

The day care handles 85 kids, Hardin said, and like other child-care providers, the staff work hard to keep them all healthy when they're all next to each other every day. The diseases, especially pinkeye, are normal for the summer, she said. Staff members just have to stay vigilant and try to catch bugs with the first children they infect.

They're not fun, and you have to really work on it."

# Sen. Craig opposes Snake River headwaters bill

JACKSON, Wyo. (AP) — A bill introduced by the late Sen. Craig Thomas to protect portions of the Snake River headwaters under the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act is drawing opposition from Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho. Craig, who sits on the Senate's Energy and Natural Resources Committee, has said he is concerned the designation of 42 miles of the Snake River between Jackson Lake Dam and Pallsades Reservoir would harm water rights held by Idaho farmers.

"That water is used to irrigate farmland in southeast Idaho," Craig

spokesman Dan Whiting said Thursday. "His concern is that with the designation it wouldn't be managed for irrigators."

Irrigators in Idaho hold the rights to about 95 percent of the water in Jackson Lake.

Shortly before his death in June, Thomas, R-Wyo., introduced the Snake River headwaters Legacy Act of 2007. It would protect the "outstanding, remarkable values" of 397 river miles from things like degradation of water quality and dam building.

Rivers and streams in the bill include Blackrock Creek, Pacific

Creek, Granite Creek, Willow Creek, portions of the Buffalo Fork and segments of the Gros Ventre, Hoback, Lewis and Snake rivers.

Protected status does not affect private-property rights and uses or water rights, supporters of the bill stressed.

U.S. Sen. John Barrasso, who was appointed to temporarily replace Thomas, also does not believe the bill affects any existing water rights on the river, his press secretary Cameron Thrud said.

Hardy said Barrasso and Craig have been discussing the issue and

Barrasso would be willing to add additional language clarifying the sanctity of those rights.

But Whiting said Craig would not support the bill as long as it includes those 42 miles of the Snake River.

"It is an over-400-mile stretch of river and we are talking about 10 percent, so it seems pretty reasonable, especially if the stretch is between a couple dams," Whiting said. "It doesn't seem particularly wild and scenic."

Tom Farcicelli, executive director for the Campaign for the Snake Headwaters, said removing the 42

miles would essentially gut the bill.

"It's hard to have a Snake Headwaters Legacy Act without the Snake River in it," he said.

Farcicelli noted the Idaho already has more than 600 miles of rivers and streams that are protected under some form of wild and scenic designation and said the designation "works well" for Idaho businesses and irrigators. Wyoming has 29 river miles protected under the act.

The bill has had one hearing in the Senate energy committee, but the committee has not voted to move it to the Senate floor for a vote.

## Owner of downtown Boise site files for bankruptcy protection

BOISE (AP) — The owner of a downtown Boise site where a 31-story, \$126 million condominium and hotel project is proposed has filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection.

Gary D. Rogers filed for the protection on Thursday. He said his company, Charterhouse Properties Downtown Properties U.S.C. of McCall, still plans to build Boise Place on the site.

"This (the bankruptcy) will allow us to complete some strategic planning that we will be doing while we work out our reorganization plan," Rogers told the Idaho Statesman.

Rogers said his company had the financial backing to complete the project but declined to provide details. Rob Perez, a commercial lender with U.S. Bank in Boise, said creative financing will now likely be required to complete the project.

(The bankruptcy) would negate traditional financing," Perez said. "Banks do not make loans to companies that have had a recent bankruptcy."

The building, originally called the Boise Tower, was being developed by Rick Peterson and Boise Tower Associates. But financial problems stopped construction in 2001 after only the foundation was built.

Capital City Development Corp., Boise's urban renewal district, filed in 2004 to renege possession of the property it sold to Peterson in 1997 for \$265,000.

The donation was announced this week by Ketchum Police Chief Cory Lyman, who added the couple has ties to the city but wish to remain anonymous.

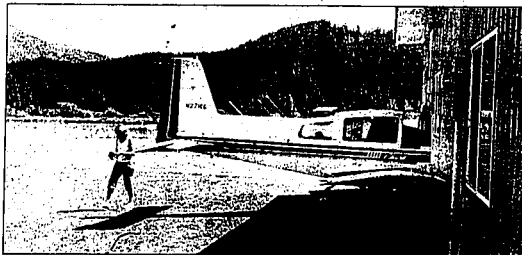
"They said they wanted to do something for the department," Lyman said.

## E. Idaho woman sentenced in death of 4-year-old son

POCATELLO (AP) — An eastern Idaho mother convicted of involuntary manslaughter after her carelessness with a marijuana pipe caused a house fire that killed one of her children has been sentenced to 7½ years in prison.

Savannah Berrey, who will be eligible for parole after 18 months, sobbed uncontrollably Thursday after receiving the sentence in 7th District Court, the *Post Register* reported.

"Every day, I live knowing Eric is not here, and I am responsible for it," Berrey told 7th District Judge William Woodland before she was sentenced.

Woodland said the death of her son will prevent Berrey from using drugs again, but that the sentence Berrey received lets others know the risks involved of using drugs around their children.

"The determine of others is something I have to take into account," said Woodland. "I have a feeling that if the community of eastern Idaho knew that children were being raised where recreational drug use is taking place, they would be shocked."

Berrey's attorney, Jordan Crane, disputed the presentence investigation report that said Berrey didn't feel remorse for the death of her son.

"Your honor, the statement that she doesn't feel remorse is flat-out false," he said. "From the very beginning, she just wanted to know how that fire started."

Crane also argued for a suspended prison term and probation on the basis that Berrey has had clean drug tests for 15 months, taken part in alcohol and drug treatment, and has been allowed to live with her two other children after they spent time in foster care.

"If she was a threat to society, I don't think we'd be placing children back in her care," Crane said.

Bonneville County Prosecutor Dane Watkins agreed that Berrey had made progress, but argued that a life was lost and that had to be considered in the sentencing.

"She made the decision to smoke marijuana in that room, but Eric paid the price, the ultimate price," he said.

## General's memo to Bush contradicted medal citation

SAN FRANCISCO — Just a day after approving a medal claiming former NFL player Pat Tillman had been cut down by "devastating enemy fire" in Afghanistan, a high-ranking general tried to warn President Bush that the story might not be true by a return to testimony obtained by The Associated Press.

giving the award with one hand and then with the other hand saying it was something different," he protested. "But that's exactly the opposite of the way I felt and feel now."

McChrystal told the investigators that he believed Tillman deserved the award, and that he wanted to warn top U.S. military and political leadership that friendly fire was a possibility.

Despite this apparent contradiction, Lt. Gen. Stanley McChrystal was spared punishment in the latest review of Tillman's shooting. On Tuesday, the Army ordered that a Pentagon recommendation that he be held accountable for his "mistaken" actions.

"I thought it was friendly fire I thought it was important that key attendees know that that theory could become the finding of the investigation, and if they were going to make a statement about 'killed by enemy fire,' it might not be certain," McChrystal said.

The "secret back-channel message" was a memo known as a P4 that McChrystal wrote on April 29, 2004, to Gen. John Abizaid, head of Central Command, and to two other generals.

In a sometimes contentious November interview under oath and via videoconference, Pentagon investigators sharply questioned McChrystal about the conflicting accounts, according to the testimony obtained by the AP under the Freedom of Information Act.

McChrystal acknowledged he had suspected several days prior to approving the Silver Star citation on April 28, 2004, that Tillman may have died by fratricide.

He said that suspicion led him to send a memo to top generals imploring "our nation's leaders," specifically "POTUS" an acronym for president of the United States — to avoid cribbing the "devastating enemy fire" explanation from the award citation for their speeches.

The P4 noted rumors that Bush and other top officials "might include comments during the award ceremony and his approved Silver Star medal in speeches." He warned that it "might cause public embarrassment" if the circumstances of Tillman's death were released.

In the Silver Star citation, McChrystal had praised Tillman for placing himself "in the line of devastating enemy fire."

Tillman's comrades who were nearby in the moments before he was killed have testified that fellow Americans were shooting at him. A few also have testified that the enemy may have been firing as well, but ineffectively. No enemy bullets, rocket or mortar appeared to come close to Tillman during his last minutes on a barren hillside in eastern Afghanistan.

"Why did you recommend the Silver Star one day and then the next day send a secret back-channel message warning the country's leaders about using information from the Silver Star in public speeches because they might be embarrassed if they do?" an investigator asked McChrystal.

Despite numerous questions, the general never directly explained the discrepancies.

"That question seems to imply the fact that we were

remains commander of the covert Joint Special Operations Command, the military's clandestine "black ops" groups, which fights in the shadows of battles in Iraq, Afghanistan and beyond.

Among those who work with him, McChrystal is respected and admired for his leadership and integrity. He also has the trust of Bush, who publicly praised him last year when al-Qaida in Iraq leader Abu Musab al-Zarqawi was killed in a U.S. airstrike.

## Nevada court gives police more vehicle search powers

CARSON CITY, Nev. (AP) — The Nevada Supreme Court has broadened the authority of police to conduct searches of vehicles and their contents, citing a 7-2 U.S. Supreme Court decision in which dissenting justices raised constitutional concerns.

The Nevada high court's ruling Thursday tossed out a Clark County District Court judge's finding that an officer went too far when he moved a detached center console in a man's car and found a handgun and three baggies of marijuana.

The earlier state high court ruling, and relies instead on the U.S. Supreme Court's 1991 Florida v. Jimeno decision that said the "totality of circumstances" must be considered in determining whether a vehicle search was proper.

In following the Jimeno case, Parraguirre said the key is whether an "objectively reasonable" officer believes that a suspect's consent to a vehicle search permitted the way in which the search was conducted.

The U.S. Supreme Court's 7-2 opinion in the Jimeno case focused on "objectively reasonable" in finding that a suspect's permission to let an officer search the interior of his car also extended to a closed paper bag on the floorboards. Police found cocaine in the bag.

In dissenting, then-Justice Thurgood Marshall said an officer conducting a consensual vehicle search should get additional consent to search any containers.

# Marine sergeant sentenced to 15 years in prison for murder of an Iraqi civilian

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif. — A jury sentenced a Marine sergeant Friday to 15 years in prison for the murder of an Iraqi civilian during a fruitless search for an insurgent.

Sgt. Lawrence G. Hutchins III also was dishonorably discharged, reduced in rank to private and given a written reprimand.

Hutchins stood at attention and looked straight ahead as his sentence was announced. He then sat down, briefly put his head on the table in front of him and looked up with red eyes.

His wife, Reyna Hutchins, burst into tears, and other relatives appeared stunned, with his mother slumping in her chair.

On Thursday, Hutchins became the first and only member of an eight-member squad to be convicted of murder in the killing. Hutchins had been charged with premeditated murder, but jurors struck premeditation from the verdict, meaning Hutchins will instead face a mandatory life sentence.

Testimony from several of his comrades pointed to him as the mastermind of the plot to kidnap and kill a suspected insurgent.

The Iraqi civilian was pulled from his Hamdania home in April 2006 and shot in a hole in a KAFB. The hole was placed nearby to make him look like an insurgent planting a bomb, according to the prosecution.

Unlike several of his squad mates, Hutchins never expressed remorse, saying he believed he was doing what his superiors wanted.

"I think that had a significant impact on the jury," Hutchins' attorney Rich Brannon said. "We had a tragic mistake, although I think it was command-influenced, and I think it is very difficult emotionally for Larry to deal with that mistake."

Brannon said he would ask Lt. Gen. James Mattis, the commanding general who has jurisdiction over Hutchins, to review the sentence.

Hutchins, of Plymouth, Mass., also was convicted of conspiracy to commit murder,

making a false official statement and larceny. He was acquitted of kidnapping, assault and housebreaking.

Testimony showed the victim was kidnapped and killed when the squad couldn't find the suspected insurgent.

Prosecutors previously identified the victim as Hashim Ibrahim Awad, 52. The name, however, was dropped from charge sheets.

All eight members of the squad were initially charged with murder and kidnapping.

Four lower-ranking Marines and a Navy corpsman cut deals with prosecutors in exchange for their testimony and received sentences ranging from one to eight

years in prison.

Earlier in the day, a separate jury sentenced a Marine corporal to time served and reduced his rank to private for conspiring to murder an Iraqi civilian.

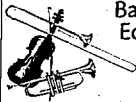
Cpl. Marshall Magno, 24, has already served 418 days in custody and was to be freed Friday.

"I was very happy that I got a fair trial," Magno said after his sentencing. "I feel really good, and I feel proud to serve as a Marine."

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## Muted homecoming for Iraqi soccer champs

BAGHDAD, Iraq — The Asian Cup soccer champions arrived in Baghdad on Friday evening for a celebration that was closed to the public and did not include the team captain.

Younis Mahmoud, the 24-year-old captain who scored the winning goal in Iraq's victory over Saudi Arabia last Sunday, refused to come to Baghdad, saying he feared for his safety. Two of the team's other stars, Nashed Akram and Hawar Mohammed, also did not attend.

Very few of the players live in Iraq, and the team has not played a game in the country in 17 years. Practices are generally held in Jordan.

"If I go back with the team, anybody could kill me or try to hurt me," Mahmoud said after Sunday's game.

The celebration for Iraq's first-ever Asian Cup championship was held in the newly fortified Green Zone, preventing the public — millions of whom are passionate supporters of the team — from attend-

ing. Government and military leaders, including Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki, sponsored the gathering, presenting bonuses and other gifts to the players.

In the meantime, police announced Friday that a senior aide to Grand Ayatollah Ali al-Sistani was killed Thursday night in Najaf, the second time an adviser to Iraq's top Shiite cleric has been assassinated in the past two weeks.

Fadhil Akli, who was responsible for collecting religious taxes from al-Sistani supporters, was shot to death as he walked home from a mosque in Najaf, police said. Sistani's legal adviser, Abdullah Falaj, was slain July 20 in his office next to Sistani's home. In that case, four suspects were arrested, including at least one bodyguard at the cleric's compound.

Al-Sistani, one of the most influential religious leaders in Iraq, was the target of an assassination attempt in January, aides said. They are worried about his safety. Several clerics, politicians and academics have been murdered in Najaf in the past several months.

## Back to business: BSU football begins fall camp

**BOISE** — Did you miss them? No longer do Boise State fans need to sit idle in the summer heat, waiting and waiting for their first glimpse of their beloved Broncos. Fall camp started Friday at East Junior High in Boise and the season opener is 25 days away.

The current roster has more than 115 players. Many of those will not make the regular-season roster. Some will be redshirted due to injury or the improbability of getting playing time. But the bulk will make the team.

The Broncos earned a wonderful piece of hardware Jan. 1 with its thrilling Fiesta Bowl win over Oklahoma. But that

team only exists in memories and on stat books.

This team is wholly new. A new signal-caller will lead the Broncos this season. Bush Hamdan, a 6-1, 191-pound junior is the front-runner for the position over senior and three-year backup Taylor Tharp.

There is strict division between the needs and strengths of this offense.

The offensive line returns four starters and has 10 young men ready to back it up.

But the skill players on offense are gone, all of them except a guy named Ian Johnson. Johnson set BSU records last season in yards rushing (1,713) and touch-

downs (25). He averaged 142.83 yards per game last season behind essentially the same offensive line.

The recently-married Johnson has a lot to live up to, but with the power-house running game the Broncos employ, this could be another big year for the junior.

Korey Hill and Colt Brooks are gone at linebacker, but there are underclassmen ready

and able to take their spots.

The biggest losses come at the wide receiving corps. All of the starters are gone. The Broncos lost three senior receivers (Legedu Nancee, Detsan James and Jerard Rabib), the starting tight end (Derek Schouman) and the four-year starter at fullback (Brad Lau) to the National Football League. That's cool for the guys gone and for those with names like Alona Key and Jeremy Childs, who will be scoring the points for the ball club this fall.

About half the positions on the football team are still open and dozens of young men are fighting for the spots. Forget rebuilding, this is a reloading

season. The players stepping into roles have been in the system for years, biding their time, waiting for their chance to shine. Here it is. Now is their time. ## MVS drivers ready to lap it up tonight

TWIN FALLS — Tonight Magic Valley Speedway will present only the second of 200-lap main-event race in the history of Rocky Mountain Challenge Series racing, but the track will also throw in a completely different format for the drivers to deal with along the way.

The Platt Electric 200 will be split into three segments — 25 laps, 50 laps and 75 laps — with a 10-minute break at the end of the first two segments allowing the drivers and crew members to make minimal adjustments to the cars.

The first segment will begin with a 20-car invert based on the time trials. The following two segments may also be inverted, or MVS drivers in the heat will have the option to drop back and accumulate pass-points as they make their way towards the front. Points for the final finishing order will also be awarded. At the end of the event the top three finishers will be honored and the driver who accrues the most points will be crowned the Platt Electric 200 champion.

Twin Falls residents Bobby Latham III and John Newhouse are tied for third in the current standings going into tonight's event, 61 points behind leader and 2006 RMCS Champion Dave Minegar and 15 back of Tom Hill, both of the Boise area. Driver Bruce Quale, also of Twin Falls, currently sits fifth in points.

Latham has been steadily sneaking up in the standings and realizes this evening's event, running at the same track where he captured the 2006 Premier Series Championship, could yield a title to his hands.

"We had a win here in the Pepsi 125 and we know we can do well at this track," Latham said. "We have a lot of momentum coming into tonight and it should be a good points night for us. The special seg-

ment race will be good for the fans though. There's going to be a lot of close racing."

Newhouse, in the same boat as Latham, also knows that with only three races remaining on the schedule the competition will simply get tougher.

Former track champion Steve Jones holds the upper hand in the division with Woodhall five points behind. But Woodhall

is far from handing over the title to Jones especially at this point.

"I just got a new woodoo doll and I put a goutee and Oakley sunglasses on it," Woodhall said. "Then I got a toy race car, painted it gold and put a No. 3 on it. Next I'm going to flatten the tires, put in too much right side weight and go from there. Other than that, we're going to go out there and do our best. But (Jones) is tough to beat."

Only a single point separates Bill Miles and Jason Whitted in the run for the NAPA Pony Stocks Championship and both drivers have been riding strong in recent weeks. Whitted started the season with a win right out of the starting gate and finally rounded up another trip to the winner's circle July 21, while Miles has put back-to-back wins together during the year. Miles was the main-event winner last time out, so if the past is any indication she will be a good bet to capture tonight's race.

"My goal is to finish up front tonight with a couple of guys behind me," Miles said.

Josh Pitz is nine points back of Miles, but has to be looked at in much more than just a dark horse in the running for the title. Handly Grubbs and Shawn Nice, fourth and fifth, respectively, in the standings, will have to shine over the next four events to keep pace with the leaders.

The Mankers' Landscaping Teen Bees race was a driver's education teacher's nightmare last time out, but the 14- and 15-year-olds will be perfectly willing to take another spin around the one-fifth mile track.

Lano Buddenhegy leads Anthony Avalos by just two points in the standings while Lyndsey Deary continues to hunt for her first main-event win.

Gates at MVS open at 4 p.m. Qualifying for the IMCS begins at 6:20 and green flag racing begins at 7:05.

# Pitz hopes this year is his

TWIN FALLS — NAPA Pony Stocks driver Josh Pitz would like nothing more than to capture the 2007 season championship at Magic Valley Speedway. But he has a couple of obstacles in his way before he can accomplish that goal. Namely, Bill Miles and Jason Whitted, the two former champions in the division who currently happen to be ahead of Pitz in the point standings.

Pitz is hoping this is his year, however, as the Chase for the Championship has spelled nothing but disaster for the 26-year-old driver in previous seasons.

The first year of the Chase the motor blew up about six laps into the first race," Pitz recalls. "Then we put in the backup motor and it lasted about seven laps, so we had two more races. Last year I ran awesome the week before, but the first night of the championship it blew up in the last six laps of practice. Pitz has been able to breathe a sigh of relief this season as he made it through the first "chase for the championship" race last weekend without any major problems — although he admits he did have somewhat of a scare during the main event.

"It seemed like everything was running OK, but about halfway through the race I looked down at my temperature gauge and it was maxed out. I thought 'Not again.' But it lasted the whole race and cooled right down afterward. But I was having flashbacks that it was going to blow up again."

Now in his fourth year in the division, the driver of the No. 47 car began his racing career not unlike others currently

racing at the speedway, starting out as a fan.

"I went out to the track one weekend and thought it looked like fun," Pitz said. "I played sports all year round in high school. — First football, then went right into wrestling, then track then baseball. After high school I didn't have anything to do except work. But after I went to the track that one time I thought that would be something to do."

"We built a Hornet car and ran that at first, and then Sam Harris, Jr. talked me into joining into the Pony Stocks class. We built three cars in three years. The first year I felt we didn't know what we were doing. But we learned as we learned each year and built a better one."

Pitz admits he took on a sport he knew nothing about. "I knew you were supposed to change wheels every three months. That's about as much as I knew about cars. But I've learned a ton in the

last few years."

Fortunately Pitz has had help along the way, relying on his dad, John Pitz, and friend Larry Newhall.

"Dad helps me out more than anything and Larry, who owns Filer Auto Parts, helps out a ton because he knows about engines and all that stuff. I met him through my dad. He's a sponsor the first year and when my dad was gone last year, I asked him if he would come out and help. Now he's doing all there time and really liking it."

Pitz has a good idea of what it will take to tie down the track title — but getting there will take both skill and luck.

"I think the key is to stay consistent. — Our cars are so much alike, a lot of times it's who can get to the front first and hope you can hold it. You have to hope you don't have any engine problems or any wrecks. And if we can avoid those I think we'll be OK."

Miles just happens to have a pit stall adjacent to Pitz and has sent a spot a lot of time next to the young driver both on and off the track.

"We've gotten to know him quite well," Miles said. "I feel very comfortable pitting next to him, and my husband Dale and Jostis dad talk a lot about set-ups. Josh is very respectable out on the track. I can't say he's overly aggressive, but he will stand his ground."

If Pitz does capture the Pony Stocks division title, he does have one reservation regarding the usual duty of the division's winner this October.

"The only thing I'm worried about if I win is having to speak at the banquet," Pitz admits. "I'm not very good at speaking in front of a crowd because it makes my stuttering about 10 times worse."

Further broadening his business portfolio, the Cavaliers' forward has signed Ginn, the former Ohio State's speedster, now a rookie wide receiver for the Miami Dolphins, to a marketing contract.

Ginn is the first athlete signed by LRM Marketing, James' budding sports marketing company.

"To do this, not so much for money but to make sure you get on a Sprite commercial with LeBron or anything, that'd be fun," Ginn said.

Ginn, who signed a five-year contract worth more than \$13 million last week, said knowing James for years made the decision an easy one. "A lot of football guys don't get a lot of marketing their first couple years coming out," he said. "You've got to do big things to do that. He's been a good friend to me for the last four or five years, so the best thing for me is to get involved with someone like him."

James formed the marketing firm two years ago with childhood friends Richard Paul, Maverick Carter and Randy Mims. The company takes its name from the initials of the four's first names.

# Michael Vick dogfighting case opens racial divide

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — The difference between those sporting Michael Vick jerseys and those urging his conviction on dogfighting charges is glaring: Vick's supporters are mostly black; his critics are mostly white.

The racial divide emerged early in the case against the Atlanta Falcons quarterback, apparent at rallies filled with cheering — and overwhelmingly black — Vick supporters and at anti-Vick protests that are noticeably white.

Vick's opponents say the evidence against him is overwhelming. For many black supporters, that judgment evokes uncomfortable questions about race and guilt in America.

"White folks 'been grindin' on an ax ... and that ax ain't got sharp enough for them," said Earnest Hardy Sr., who called the case a "witch hunt targeting a successful black man."

Hardy's Surry County home borders Vick's property, where an April raid turned up evidence of dogfighting. Federal authorities indicted Vick on dogfighting charges and he faces jail time and fines. He has pleaded not guilty.

In the rural county split 50-50 between whites and blacks, the case quickly took a racial bent. At the county courthouse, angry letters urged that whites "take back their town." Critics accuse the commonwealth's attorney, Gerald F. Schneider, of stalling an investigation to protect one of his own.

"The only thing I'm doing is protecting my personal integrity and protecting the integrity of the office," said Schneider, who is black. "I'm not going to be pushed into bringing charges that won't stand."

Hardy spotted Surry's racial divisions long ago. In the farmland developers are creeping up and selling at prices working-class folks can't afford, and in the new neighbors who don't look like him.

Hardy suspects that Vick — famous, rich and black — is just the fall guy behind big issues.

"A hundred-million-dollar black man" he believed. "They can't stand it." His view is reflected from the Newport News region where Vick was

raised to Atlanta, where a rally supporting the former Virginia Tech standout drew several hundred fans, but barely 50 whites, said Gerald Blum, with Atlanta-based New Order National Human Rights Organization.

Rose said the outcry stems from what he said is Vick's premature conviction in the media — not support for dogfighting. But he said the case also awakens anger over a perceived smear campaign targeting famous black men from Kobe Bryant to Michael Jackson.

He argues black men who struggle draw excessive scrutiny and especially harsh public judgment.

"It's been too many cases involving African-Americans (where) they've been through the court of law, they've been

found not guilty, but damage has been done," Rose said.

Vick and two co-defendants are scheduled to stand trial Nov. 26. The Southern Christian Leadership Conference plans to recognize Vick at its annual convention, which began Friday in Atlanta.

"We're in support of Michael as a human being," SCLC president Charles Steele said. "Right now, he's feeling discarded, ostracized by people who are rushing to judgment. It's our responsibility to save him."

Temper flared at Vick's July 26 arraignment in Richmond, where outside the courthouse blacks and whites debated everything from animal rights to slavery.

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# Hall ready to receive Irvin

CANTON, Ohio (AP) — Of the six players about to be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, Michael Irvin was the only one to make headlines off the field. Irvin knows he isn't a good thing.

The Dallas Cowboys receiver recognizes that his troubles easily could have kept him from the shrine in Canton, where he will be inducted Saturday.

"Mistakes will cost you. That's the reality," Irvin said. "You have to pay the price for your mistakes, but, also, don't give up. Keep going and try to overcome that. That's the reality, too. I like that it worked out the way it worked out."

The way it worked out, Irvin was voted into the hall in his third year of eligibility, joining former "Triple T" Troy Aikman, his quarterback back with the Cowboys.

In a few years, the third part of that remarkable offensive juggernaut, its entire leading rusher Emmitt Smith will make it, too.

Irvin knows he made it difficult on himself, his teammates and NFL fans.

"I don't know if (his stats) gets overlooked, but sometimes the good stuff may get overshadowed," Irvin said. "Whether I like it or not, I made those bad decisions and you're going to take all those things into account when you're dealing with me."

A few weeks after the Cowboys won their third Super Bowl with the Triplets leading the way, police found Irvin, marijuana and a handgun in a hotel room for his 30th birthday party. He pleaded no contest to felony cocaine possession and was put on probation for four years.

"This was one of several problems with police. And Irvin wondered if he'd burned his chance for making the hall."

"A few days before the vote, a current player called me and said, 'They're just trying to keep you out because once you go in, the rest of us player-boys will, too.'"

"I never coached a player who had as much passion for the game as Michael Irvin," said Jimmy Johnson, his coach for much of Irvin's career. "He also was the guy who I knew at crunch time I could depend on to come through with a key play."

Just as Thomas did for the Buffalo Bills, "I wish I could've won a Super Bowl so I could feel what that felt like," Thomas said. "But if it's anything like this, I don't think there's anything you can compare it to."

Comparing Matthews to any other offensive linemen would be fruitless. No one is more versatile: In his 236 games, more than any full-time positional player in league history when he retired, Thomas spent 99 at left guard, 87 at center, 37 at right guard, 22 at right tackle and 17 at left tackle.

"When Irvin was approached about a move, I told him, 'Well, the coach has faith this is going to make the team better. The least I can do is believe the same thing,'" Matthews said. "It never felt like a sacrifice or like I was doing anything special."

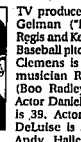

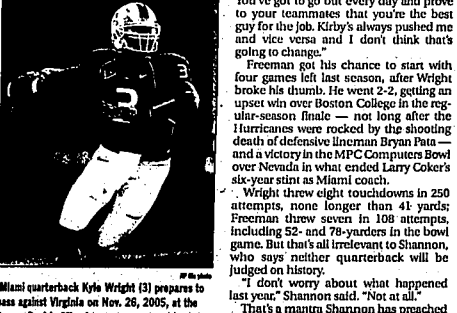

Wright, Freeman to resume race for Hurricanes' starting quarterback job

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) — Kyle Wright and Kirby Freeman walked into the gymnasium together, took seats alongside one another and spent much of the next hour saying exactly the same things to one another.
For now, they're equals. Over the next month, as they vie to become Miami's starting quarterback, that will change.
At the place long known as "Quarterback U," the letter stands these days for "uncertainty." Wright and Freeman will enter Hurricanes' training camp Saturday knotted in the race for the starting spot — which both believe they've earned.

"I feel like we could start with either quarterback right now," wide receiver Lance Leggett said.

He's 4-7 in the role, with 4,058 yards and a 60 percent completion rate for his career, but only 26 touchdown passes in those starts — a bit of a low ratio for someone once expected to be the next great star at a school that produced Vinny Testaverde, Steve Walsh, Jim Kelly, Bernie Kosar, Craig Erickson and Ken Dorsey.
"You've got to prove you're the best player every day," Wright said. "And that shouldn't matter whether you're a guy who's three- or four-year starter or a new guy coming in as first-year starter."

## No one religion holds patent on God's truth

The pope recently approved a document that claimed that his church alone is the true church and has the whole truth. Of course, that's what Osama bin Laden says about Islam.

Evangelical Christians and Orthodox Jews say the same thing. There is no hope for peace among nations or, for that matter, for the survival of the world if this intolerant attitude toward other faiths does not stop.

The arrogance of insisting that one's faith has a lock on the truth is astonishing. Religions at best are means of seeking truth. None possesses it absolutely, though most of them end up insisting that only they do. They then argue that all others are either false or lacking in some necessary aspect of God's intended order.

The pope claims his church has the only truth because, it teaches, Jesus gave Peter an exclusive franchise, though Jesus probably never intended to do anything more than reform his own faith, Judaism.

The church in Rome ultimately won out over the Orthodox church in Constantinople simply because it was more politically astute than the Eastern Church whose roots are, in fact, older. Still, Benedict XVI calls the Orthodox a "sister church" but denies that Protestants can even claim they have churches. The arrogance is astonishing.

Evangelicals, Jews and Muslims also use or misuse their scripture to claim exclusive truth.

A verse from the Gospel of John may be the most notorious example of a literal interpretation of a 2,000-year-old quote of Jesus. It was written at least a generation after Jesus died and has passed through many translations from his Aramaic tongue, but the faithful insist on its literal accuracy and their interpretation of its meaning.

"No one comes to the father except through me," (John 14:6 New Revised Standard Version). That claim fuels the evangelicals' fervor to call all people to accept their faith or accrue no benefits of heavenly grace.

There will be no peace with Islam or any other religious movement until Christians, Jews and Muslims can accept each other's faith as a valid means for seeking the truth of God and his people. That will not be easy.

The underlying cause for the claim of exclusivity has more to do with self-justification than with religious truth. The faithful feel that if their faith is not exclusively true, they do not have a lock on the mysteries of life and death, of God and his people, they have no reason to cling to it. If there is not exclusive, any faith will do.

People of faith claim religious exclusivity to justify their religion, not God's truth.

## Joyful silence

### Burley family on a mission to bring the gospel to the deaf

BURLEY — Two weeks ago, Rachael, Natalie, Travis and Joshua Montoya got a new sister. She's 3-year-old Feng Xue Juan, from China. They call her "Emily" and she hears them — through sign.

Emily is deaf.

Although Emily was orphaned as an infant, today she could be in better hands.

"She's my China doll," said Ray Montoya, her new dad, "and I'm overjoyed."

Such delight is no stranger to the Montoya family.

In Ray and Kathryn Montoya's home, American Sign Language is a well-established, second language. And though they "weren't looking to adopt," finding Emily is yet another part of what the Montoyas have gleaned since establishing their Commissioned Believers Deaf Ministry program four years ago.

While their shared concern for the deaf was the catalyst for the CB Deaf Ministry, the Montoyas' outreach took root many years earlier through the love of the gospel.

But even with an innate "desire" to spread the word of God to those who have never heard a spoken word, their task is enormous.

According to Kathryn, of the 300 million deaf people in the world only 2 percent profess to be Christians. The Montoyas' vision is to reach a silent world with the message of salvation.

To make that happen, their quest is to provide an understanding of the needs of the deaf.

With a design that centered in simplicity, they're establishing deaf ministries in churches throughout the United States by helping individual congregations assess their own par-

ticular needs.

The follow-up they offer is training that fits individual situations. The Montoyas meet through sign through music and song, and through deaf-oriented programs that include books, videos, classes and workshops.

Their ministry also includes going into the community and visiting the deaf in their homes — or on college campuses or other locations.

And while the Montoyas' work is designed to spread the message of salvation to the deaf, it's reciprocal.

Their outreach gives the hearing participants a chance to learn ASL in a simple manner, and provides easy access to communicating one-on-one with the deaf.

And they're not alone in their evangelical efforts.

Under the umbrella of the Southern Baptist Convention, more doors are opening up to the hearing impaired.

"The commission empowers them to (more readily) reach out to others," said the Rev. Dennis Stoneman, pastor of the Hilland Baptist Church in Burley, where the Montoyas attend services. At Hilland Baptist, 20 family members — five of whom are deaf — have surrendered their lives to the gospel.

"It's an amazing thing," Stoneman said, "and I hold them in the highest regard."

And the benefits seem to permeate the church's other 500-some members.

"Through the ministry of interpreting you can sense the presence of Christ," he said, "and it has overflowed into the entire (church) body."

"It's a very positive thing," he

added.

For Kathryn, the grooming to learn to interpret began when she was a child.

At a young age, Kathryn read a biography of Helen Keller — the deaf and blind 20th century American author, activist and lecturer — and felt an immediate connection to Keller's teacher, Anne Sullivan.

"From that point, 'it's been my life,'" she said, and the "burden" she carries

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## A rare find

SALT LAKE CITY — It's a book collector's dream — rifling through the shelves of a second-hand store and finding a valuable text for a bargain price.

It happened Jan. 31 to a man who plunked down \$40 and took home eight books of sermons and writings from elders of a secretive and polygamous Mormon breakaway group, the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints.

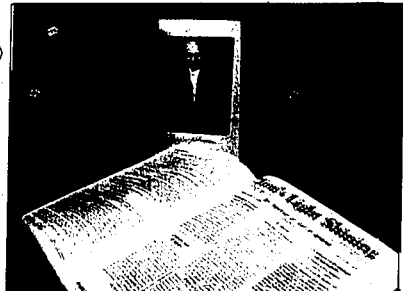
Adding interest to the find — the books are inked in red with a property stamp from Purgatory Correctional Facility, the jail in Hurricane where FLDS church president Warren Jeffs is awaiting trial on charges of rape by accomplice.

The volumes are rare and likely worth much more than the purchaser paid, say booksellers who trade in early writings from leaders of the mainstream Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. It's still a mystery how the books made their way to the thrift store.

"Those books are unbelievably scarce," said Tom Kimball, a collector and seller. "They could be worth thousands. It's every Mormon book nerd's fantasy."

Members of the FLDS live intensely private lives and shun most interaction with outsiders, including members of their own families who leave the faith. For decades, members have lived in the remote twin towns of

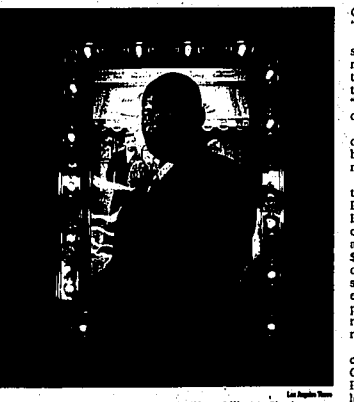
Filmmakers put their faith in the gospel

**HOLLYWOOD** — Jeff Clannagan wants to ride Terry's coat-tails. So does 20th Century Fox. They are pairing up to make several Gospel-inspired films that are much like the ones that have made Perry a sensation. Terry, a 37-year-old producer, writer, director and star, has shown Hollywood the gold to be mined from Gospel-inspired entertainment.

Fox and Clannagan are pinning their initial hopes on a movie version of the popular play "Mama I Want to Sing." Scheduled to come out in March, starring R&B singers Ciara and Patti LaBelle, "Mama" is the first of several films that Clannagan will make under a deal with Fox Home Entertainment division Fox Faith.

Clannagan's goal is to build a full-fledged studio that makes, markets and distributes theater movies for black and Hispanic audiences. His company, Codeblack Entertainment, already has seen success by making an eclectic group of low-budget movies distributed by Fox on DVD, such as Steve Harvey's comedy series. He's made a couple of faith-based films on

DVD, including "Preaching to the Choir." "These movies are not really recognized by the Hollywood elite," Clannagan said. "Mama" takes it to another level. After "Mama," Clannagan will release "A Good Man is Hard to Find," which has grossed \$10 million as a stage play. Clannagan will begin production on several faith-inspired novels by ReShonda Tate Billingsley, such as "Let the

Church Say Amen" and "Blessings in Disguise."

"Tyler was a pioneer in showing that gospel entertainment was more commercial than anyone had ever thought," Clannagan said. "Faith-based product will be our bread and butter."

Before Perry came along, few of the Hollywood majors dabbled in faith-based entertainment.

Two years ago, Fox passed up the opportunity to release Perry's film "Diary of a Mad Black Woman," which cost about \$20 million to make and market, went on to gross \$50 million at the domestic box office alone. Lions Gate, the studio that snatched up Perry, estimates that over a five-year period, he will deliver gross revenue of \$500 million to \$600 million.

The studio 20th Century Fox created Fox Faith after Mel Gibson's success with "The Passion of the Christ." Fox was looking to capitalize on the Christian market by making lower-budget films with limited theatrical release.

The division has distributed several Christian films including the DVD of "Woman Thou Art Loosed," a film based on the popular novel by the Rev. T.D. Jakes.

Sales of Christian books, gifts outpace their secular counterparts

**ATLANTA** — Jesus is a big and growing industry. The International Christian Retail Show at the Georgia World Congress Center is flexing its financial muscle in

Atlanta this week. How big? \$4.6 billion, according to the Association for Christian Retail. That includes sales of Christian books, jewelry, T-shirts, music and videos.

Christian book and gift sales have increased more than half a billion dol-

lars from 2000, the group says. Though Christian books make up about 10 percent of the market, their sales grew nearly 70 percent faster than secular books, according to the Book Industry Study Group in New York.

"I think in Western society there is a growing hunger for things that provide meaning, beauty and significance in life," said Jim Seybert of California, who consults with Christian companies on the sale of religious plaques. Bill Anderson, the president of CBA,

said aging baby boomers are wondering "what next?" People are looking for answers in the midst of global conflict and insecurity, he said, and families want to reinforce their values, so they shop for books, videos and clothing that reflect those.

# Bridging the gap

Evangelicals, once wary of some types of art, seek greater role as 'creators of culture'

There are no crosses in Makoto Fujimura's paintings. No images of Jesus gazelling into the distance, or serene scenes of churches in a snow-cloaked wood.

Fujimura's abstract works speak to his evangelical Christian faith. But to find it takes some digging. After the 2001 terrorist strikes on the World Trade Center, three blocks from Fujimura's home, his work explored the power of fire to both destroy and purify, themes drawn from the Christian Gospels and Dante's "The Divine Comedy."

"I am a Christian," says Fujimura, 46, who founded the nonprofit International Arts Movement to help bridge the gap between the religious and art communities. "I am also an artist and creative, and what I do is driven by my faith experience."

"But I am also a human being living in the 21st century, struggling with a lot of brokenness in my own, as well as the world's. I don't want to use the term 'Christian' to shield me away from the suffering or evil that I see, or to escape in some nice ghetto where everyone thinks the same."

By making a name for himself in the secular art world, Fujimura has become a role model for creative wired evangelicals. They believe that their churches have forsaken

the visual arts for too long — and that a renaissance has begun.

On the grass-roots and institutional level, evidence is mounting to support that view: Art galleries are opening in churches; prominent seminars are launching in new centers exploring theology and the arts; and, graduates from evangelical film schools are making Hollywood movies.

These artistic evangelicals, though still relatively small in number, are striving to be cre-

ators of culture rather than imitators, said Dick Staub, a Seattle-based radio talk show host and author of "The Culturally Savvy Christian: A Manifesto for Deepening Faith and Enriching Popular Culture in an Age of Christianity-Lite." There is a desire, he said, to avoid inventing a parallel arts universe with Christian knock-offs for Christian audiences. "They want to make art that connects to everybody," Staub said. "The call is first and foremost to make good art."

That doesn't necessarily mean overly religious art, but rather art informed by faith. Fujimura, for example, shares more with abstract expressionist Jackson Pollock than with Thomas Kinkadee, a self-described devout Christian whose brushwork of idyllic landscapes, crosses and churches are big sellers. As a result, Fujimura — whose work has been displayed at museums in Tokyo and Washington, D.C. — gets questions from his fellow

believers dubious about abstract and modern art.

"The Bible is full of abstraction," said Fujimura, an elder at a Greenwich Village church he helped start. "Think about this: God who created the universe, the heavens and the earth from nothing. In order to have faith you have to reach out to something, to a mystery."

It isn't always an easy sell.

Evangelical uneasiness with the visual arts dates to the Protestant Reformation of the 16th century. Andy Crouch, editorial director for Christianity Today's Christian Vision Project, which examines how evangelicals interact with the broader culture, notes that Protestantism traces its origins to an era when noses were snapped off sculptures in a rejection of Catholic visual tradition while the word of God was elevated.

## Student sues over dispute over LDS mission, scholarship

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (AP) — A Mormon student at West Virginia University is suing a state scholarship board for denying him a leave of absence to serve on a two-year church mission. In a lawsuit filed in federal court by the American Civil Liberties Union of West Virginia, political-science major David Hays claims the state's PROMISE scholarship board violated his First Amendment right to freely exercise his religion.

Hays, who is completing the second year of his mission this summer, has been helping disadvantaged people in eastern Nevada, eastern California and western Arizona. The Bridgeport native, a former Bridgeport High School valedictorian, wants to see his scholarship reinstated.

Hildale, Utah, and Colorado City, Ariz., dressing in 19th-century-style clothes, practicing the trappings of modernity and striving for perfect obedience to God.

Drawing on the early theology of the Mormon church, the sect continues to practice polygamy, believing that plural marriage brings exaltation in heaven. They consider their president Jeffs a prophet who communicates with God.

While some fundamentalist works are available, the nature of the various polygamous groups usually means printed materials circulate only internally, said Ken Sanders, owner of a rare books store in Salt Lake City.

"It's very, very rare," said Stan Larson, curator of manuscripts at the University of Utah's Marriott Library. "We

would be very glad to have them."

The volumes were produced between 1994 and 2006 by the Twin City Courier Press, of Hildale, a company owned and operated by a member of the fundamentalist church.

Each of the 8 1/2-by-11 books is hard-bound in a black cover with its title printed in gold leaf. Depending on the volume, publishing credits are either awarded to Jeffs or his predecessor and father, Ron Jafa.

Six of the books are the collected sermons of former FLDS President Leroy S. Johnson, who led the fundamentalist church from 1955 until his death in age 98 on Nov. 25, 1986. The sermons begin in 1950 and each reflects the occasion or location where it was delivered, including the southern Utah communities

originally called Short Creek, Salt Lake City and a small FLDS enclave in Canada. Some of the writings appear to be from Johnson's own hand, imparting his personal stories, reflections or anecdotes. Others draw primarily on scriptural

references from either the Bible or the Book of Mormon, and cite sermons or speeches from early leaders including Joseph Smith, Brigham Young and John Taylor.

Two of the books are collections of "Zion's Light Shining,"

a monthly FLDS newsletter that originated with Rulon Jeffs, who assumed leadership of the church in the 1980s. The newsletters, each about 40 pages, date back to February 1989 and contain similar material.

for the deaf is divinely inspired, Kathryn believes. "It's what I've dreamed you for all these years," Kathryn says, quoting God's injunction to her.

"Although the spiritual call to spread the gospel came later for 44-year-old Ray, the Mormons' ongoing mission is accomplished hand-in-hand.

With Kathryn acting as his interpreter, Ray writes many of the songs and serves as the leader of the church praise and worship band.

Every week, Kathryn helps write the curriculum for the Sunday school class that she teaches for the deaf, and interprets the weekly sermons and congregational songs.

"Together they maintain an Internet ministry with an international Deaf Ministries Web page that reaches around the world.

The CE Deaf Ministry is for all churches no matter their size or location, says Kathryn, adding that "the deaf are everywhere and need to be reached."

According to Kathryn, a pastor once told her that he had no need for a deaf ministry since he had never had a deaf person attend his church.

Her explanation was simple: "The more the deaf don't come to church is because there are no services there for them."

With that thought she paraphrases John 3:16: "For God so loved the (deaf) world that he gave his only begotten son, and whosoever believes in him, will not perish, but have everlasting life."

For Emily, her challenge to teach is placed on a more personal level.

But 18-year-old Rachael doesn't view that as a problem. "She (Mom) taught me to sign before I could talk," she said.

And while the lesson included "cookies," the words Rachael mastered at an early age were "more" and "please."

Brother Joshua, who's 9, doesn't worry much about getting his new little sister's attention.

"When you stomp on the floor, he explained, she can feel the vibrations."

Nevertheless, Emily is proving to be a quick learner and has already conquered the concept of "pretty," her mother said.

Still, with a lump in his throat and tears in his eyes, Ray is humbled and amazed. "Who am I that God would send me here around the world... and trust me with this little life?"

# Floods displace 19 million people in India, Bangladesh

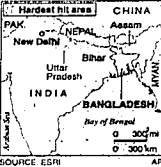
LUCKNOW, India — Torrents of water washed away homes, crops and cows, leaving hungry and frightened villagers perched in treetops or on roofs as the death toll rose Friday from monsoon rains across northern India and Bangladesh.

Vital to farmers, the annual rains are a blessing and a curse for the subcontinent — a fact highlighted by official tallies: At least 186 people have been killed and 19 million driven from their homes in recent days.

Even in areas where the rains are no worse than usual, the monsoon disrupted life. In Mumbai, the country's bustling financial capital, people waded through knee-deep water that

covered many streets Friday after severe overnight rains flooded sewers.

The South Asian monsoon season runs from June to September as the rains work their way across the subcon-

inent. It's always dangerous — last year more than 1,000 people died, most from drowning, landslides or house collapses.

This year, estimates of total deaths vary wildly from a few hundred to well over a thousand.

With hundreds of villages submerged across the fertile plains that stretch along the southern edge of the Himalayas, people were taking refuge wherever they could — in Uttar Pradesh state, in northern India, women and children were spotted screaming for help from treetops.

In parts of the state — where an additional 8 inches of rain fell on Friday alone — river levels rose so quickly that villagers had no time to save any belongings.

"The gush of water was so sudden we did not get the time

to react," Vinod Kumar, a resident of a flooded village in Basti district, told Enadu TV.

He made it out, but lost everything. "We do not have food, kerosene or even a match box," he said. "The officials are saying relief is coming, but nothing has come so far."

Health workers were fanning out across parts of Bangladesh and India to try to prevent the spread of waterborne diseases like diarrhea, typhoid and cholera.

The more immediate problem is finding food. With many farms and crops destroyed — costing an already poor region millions of dollars — food shortages were becoming a pressing problem.

One woman in Uttar Pradesh who identified herself only as Savitri said she had not "eaten anything for the last two days."



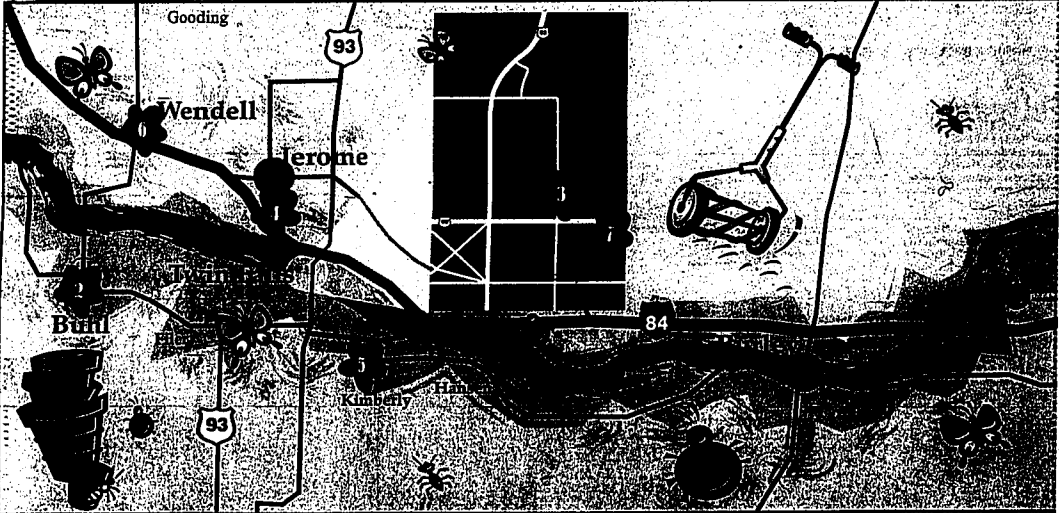
