## City: Bacteria found, but water fine

Follow-up tests are negative, no reason to panic, T.F. officials say

TWIN FALLS — A strain of bacteria that commonly indicates the presence of E. coli was discovered last month in the city's drinking water, a city official said Thursday.

Four of 44 water samples gathered in July tested positive for total coliform, a bacterium abundant in animal feces, said Mike Schroeder, superintendent of Twin Falls' water department. Officials say, however, there is little reason for worry and that city water is safe to drink.

Samples taken July 16 (tested positive for coliform) from water taps at St. Edward's Catholic School, Immanuel Lutheran School, Walgreens and the Twin Falls Municipal Golf Course. Thirty-two follow-up samples taken over the next two days all

## Four murder suspects plead guilty

TWIN FALLS — Four defendants charged in the planned December murder of 19-year-old Jessica Aaron Coates have pleaded guilty.

The pleas brought no closure for Coates' mother Judy Coates, who attended three change of plea hearings on Aug. 9 and one this past Tuesday. But she's glad she won't be put through their trials, which she would have felt forced to observe.

"They were guilty," Coates said. "They ought to admit to it and get it over with."

Fredy Heredia-Juarez and James Roy John Jr. had participated in a spree of local robberies with Coates when they grew concerned Coates might expose their scheme, according to a Twin Falls County Sheriff's affidavit filed between Dec. 15 and 18, they and two others drove Coates to the South Hills where Heredia-Juarez and John Jr. shot him. Coates likely froze to death and his body stayed in the South Hills until a man walking his dogs found him the afternoon of Dec. 20.

For three guilty pleas made before a judge in district court last Thursday, the prosecutor will recommend that:

• Heredia-Juarez serve 35 to life for first-degree murder

## Not just another car theft

Idaho National Guard loses drive with soldiers' data

TWIN FALLS — Personal information on every Army National Guard member in Idaho, including Social Security numbers, is in the hands of a random car thief — but he may not realize what he has.

The information, a year-old file that should have been deleted, was on a small computer "thumb" drive belonging to a soldier traveling in the Boise area for a training event, 1st Lt. Doug Uphoff said Thursday.

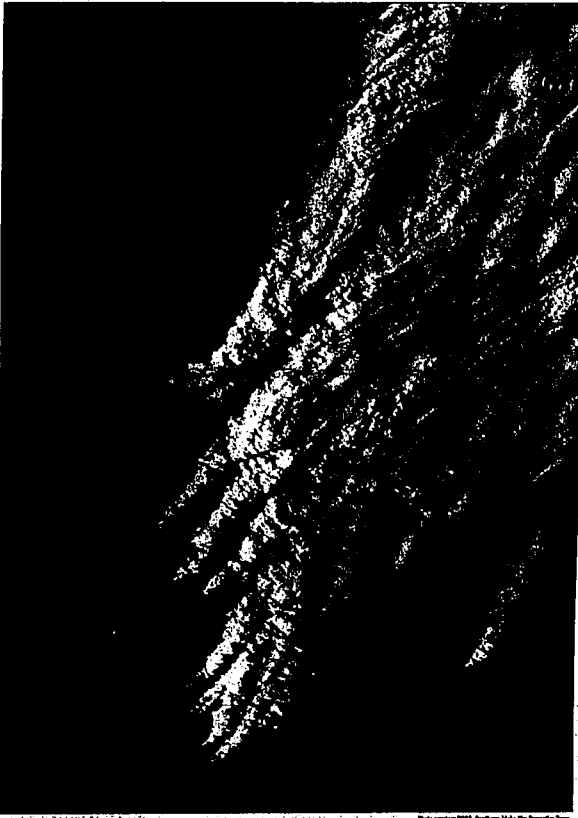
It was taken Monday night by someone who broke into the soldier's car, which was fully packed in preparation for leaving the event.

"It was just some criminal that saw an opportunity to break into a vehicle," said Uphoff, with the 116th Battalion in Twin Falls. "He thought he was going to steal a nice Sirius radio."

What he stole instead was enough data to commit

## Crews battle wildfire near Carey

CAREY — Smoke snaking its way north through the Wood River Valley is from the Phillips Canyon Fire, which burned Thursday evening on about 2,500 acres northeast of Carey.

It began about 9 a.m. Thursday and burned through sagebrush on Bureau of Land Management, state and private land. Firefighters believe the fire was caused by lightning.

Carey Rural Fire contained the fire alone, which burned in a small section of Phillips Canyon throughout the morning. Winds had increased before

noon, causing the blaze to spread. "There's only one road, not a lot of breaks and continuous fuel," said Ben Sliz, of the BLM.

The only entrance is an unpaved route called Road Canyon, which lies just west of the fire and runs to the top of the canyon ridge.

Homes were not in immediate danger, Sliz said, although the fire was burning within sight of a number of homes on Peck Road — a few miles east of Carey on Highway 20. Sliz said a canal and road lie between the fire and the homes. These elements will

## Cameron eyes primary fix

Lawmakers could preserve independent primary vote

TWIN FALLS — If a court rules in favor of a controversial lawsuit seeking to close primary elections to everyone but registered party members, the state Legislature will still draft legislation in 2008 to expand elections to independent voters, a senior state lawmaker from the Magic Valley said this week.

Sen. Dean Cameron, R-Rupert, Idaho's second-most tenured senator, said Wednesday that if the case prevails and Idaho's primary system is found unconstitutional, he expects legislation that will allow independent voters to participate in primary elections.

"If the lawsuit is successful, we will draft legislation to open them to independents," said Cameron, a nine-term legislator. "To tag onto that, if it is not successful, then we don't need to do anything in my opinion."

In July, a group of 71 Republicans sued Idaho Secretary of State Ben Yursa — an elected Republican — in U.S. District Court in

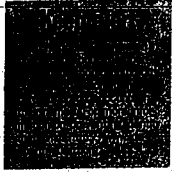

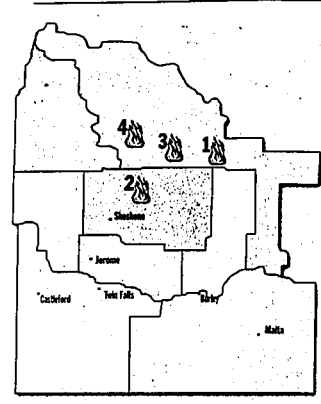

were contaminated by something other than city water, especially since the samples were gathered miles apart.

"I think we should know, the sampler may have touched the lids of the samples," Schroeder said.

Could he be? Doug Howard, regional administrator for the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality's Twin Falls office.

"If the sample taker's hands are soiled, total coliform could easily be transferred to the sample," Howard wrote in an e-mail response to questions by the *Times-News*.

Sample takers are not required to wear gloves.

But Schroeder and Howard said other things could be to blame: broken water pipes and contamination of the sample bottles, storage reservoirs or lab environment.

The four positive tests are the city's first since 2005, but this is the first time, Schroeder

## How water samples are gathered

1. The sample taker should wash and dry his hands.
2. The sample location should be examined to ensure it's clean and not obviously contaminated.
3. The tap should be flushed between two and five minutes.
4. The sample should come from a constant, pencil-thin stream.
5. The sample bottle should never be opened until the sample is taken, and bottles should never come in contact with other samples.
6. The sample bottle is sent to a lab for testing.

said, multiple samples have tested positive.

The city will include a statement on coliform tests in residents' water bills this month. Had follow-up tests indicated contamination, a press release would have been issued to alert renters who don't receive a water bill, Schroeder said.

The city will continue to test for coliform, but for now, the city considers the

matter resolved.

Boise to close primary elections to non-party members. The lawsuit said the state's open primary system violates the Republicans' right to associate in a political party. It was not filed by the state party, but followed a supportive decision in June in *Burley* by the party's state committee.

Ystersma recently asked the case be dismissed. The U.S. Supreme Court ruled in a 2000 California case that states can't force political parties to associate with those who don't share their political beliefs.

House Majority Leader Mike Moyle, R-Star, said he's not sure legislation would be drafted if the lawsuit is successful. He said, in talking with other state officials, legislation could not trump a ruling by any courts, including similar ones like in California.

"You can't just let the independents in if the plaintiffs win, that lawsuit," he said. "That's my understanding of

that lawsuit."

He said that the state could be sued a second time if any bills are passed that aren't supported by the plaintiffs.

"I'd assume that if the legislation were to act against their wishes, they wouldn't look too favorably on the legislators," Moyle said. "It's kind of an ugly issue."

Keith Allred, president of the non-partisan group the Common Interest, said Cameron is correct. While a court could demand the open primaries be closed, it is more likely to rule the current system is unconstitutionally. The plaintiffs need to make the case why the only suitable system is completely closed.

"Most of these suits have not gotten everything they wanted out that front," said Allred, a Twin Falls native. "That's not the way these cases have typi-

cally gone. Courts don't want to get very detailed. They'll just say, this is wrong."

Allred said that after the court decides whether the system is constitutional, it will likely determine how to remedy that. It could make further demands, but it could also ask the Legislature to take action.

That second half of a decision will decide whether the state's nearly one-third independent voters must choose sides.

The issue has divided the GOP, with some wondering why the party wants to alter a system that helped Republicans win 79 of 105 positions in the state Legislature and all statewide positions. Allred said what is likely to emerge is modified-closed primaries, which keep registered voters tied to their parties but give a choice to independents.

serve as barriers should the fire spread that far down the canyon, he said.

Harmer Ryan Peck looked on as the flames burned in the 160 acres he owns in front of the BLM land.

The fire, he said, was within 20 miles of his 200 head of cattle.

As Peck and his neighbors looked on, aerial tankers dropped retardant on the flames.

Nine aerial tankers were assigned to the fire, although some were possibly going to

be diverted to another wildfire that sparked Thursday near Richfield.

These two, combined with other fires in the state, had fire crews stretched thin.

In addition to the air tankers, five engines and two bulldozers were fighting the blaze.

Other firefighters may be called in as needed.

Private landowners were also working to install a culvert to protect homes closest to the fire.

At the earliest, containment is estimated for 8 p.m. Friday.

identity theft against about 3,400 soldiers. While details such as soldiers' bank account numbers weren't on the device,

Uphoff said, identity theft is the Guard's No. 1 concern right now. Soldiers are currently being told how to protect their identity and credit, Uphoff said, and many in the Twin Falls area don't seem too worried.

"I actually haven't received any phone calls or concerns about that," Uphoff said. "I think information was being distributed well through Guard members. They're not panicking."

Uphoff said he is reassured by the fact that the thief didn't seem to be targeting the Guard or looking for personal data.

"A lot of times, these thefts, they're not directed toward getting this information," he said.

The question, he said, is why the information was still on the drive. It wasn't needed for the training session, and it appeared the soldier had sim-

ply forgotten the drive contained it.

Such information is only given to a select few individuals who need it for their work, Uphoff said, and there are policies governing its use, especially in the wake of recent national thefts of Veterans Affairs computers. The soldier will likely at least be retrained on proper procedures for handling sensitive information, he said.

The information was not likely password-protected or encrypted, Uphoff said. Though drives on laptops and other computers are, thumb drives vary.

"That will probably be changing," he said.

"It's an unfortunate situation, and I think that we just need to retrain our soldiers that have that sensitive information on those proper procedures again so they're fresh in their minds."

and one count armed robbery.

John Jr. serve 30 years to life for first-degree murder and one count armed robbery.

The prosecutor dismissed two other counts of armed robbery for both John Jr. and Heredia-Juarez.

Michael Lee John, who is John Jr.'s brother, also pleaded guilty Aug. 9, to second-degree murder. The prosecutor dropped a conspiracy charge and will recommend John spend five to 15 years in prison.

The final guilty plea came on Tuesday.

Nicole Lea Baker pleaded guilty before the same judge to first-degree murder and conspiracy to commit murder. The prosecutor agreed to cap his recommendation at 12 years to life.

"It was rough," Contes said about watching the four plead guilty in court. "It just (wanted) to get it over with."

All four are now headed for sentencing in late October.

John Jr. is scheduled to be sentenced at 8:30 a.m., with his brother to be sentenced afterward at 1:30 p.m., both on Oct. 23.

Heredia-Juarez is scheduled to be sentenced at 9 a.m. Oct. 24.

Baker's sentencing hearing is slated for 9 a.m. Oct. 25.

# Padilla, two others convicted

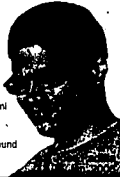
## Padilla awaits Dec. 5 sentencing date

**Miami** — Jose Padilla, a U.S. citizen held for 3½ years as an enemy combatant, was convicted Thursday of helping Islamic extremists and plotting overseas attacks in a case that came to symbolize the Bush administration's zeal to clamp down on terrorism.

But it was hardly a complete victory for the government. When Padilla was arrested in the months following the 2001 terrorist attacks, authorities touted him as a key al-Qaida operative who planned to detonate a radioactive "dirty bomb" in a U.S. city. That allegation never made it to court.

Instead, after a three-month trial and only a day and a half of deliberations, the 36-year-old Padilla and his foreign-born co-defendants were convicted of conspiracy to murder, kidnap and maim people and two counts of providing material support to terrorists.

Padilla showed no emotion and stared straight ahead as he

heard the verdict that could bring him a life prison sentence. One person in the family section started to sob.

The three were accused of being part of a North American support cell that provided supplies, money and recruits to groups of Islamic extremists. The defense contended they were trying to help persecuted Muslims in war zones with relief and humanitarian aid.

The White House thanked the jury for a "just" verdict.

"We commend the jury for its work in this trial and thank it for upholding a core American principle of impartial justice for all," said Gordon Johndrow, a spokesman for the National Security Council at the White House. "Jose Padilla received a fair trial and a just verdict."

Attorney General Alberto Gonzales called the verdict "a significant victory in our efforts to fight the threat posed by terrorists and their supporters."

# Rescuers aim fourth drill at mountain to find six trapped Utah miners

**HUNTINGTON, Utah** — Rescuers searching for six coal miners trapped for 10 days were drilling yet another hole into mine Thursday, this time aiming for a spot where they had detected mysterious vibrations in the mountain.

Officials said Thursday that the latest of three holes previously drilled reached an intact chamber, with potentially breathable air.

Video images were obscured by water running down that bore hole, but officials said they could see beyond it to an

undamaged chamber in the rear of the mine. It yielded no sign the miners had been there.

The drill holes can be used to pump air and send food down the mine, but the rescue effort is taking place underground, where miners have advanced to only 828 feet in nine days. They still have 1,200 feet to go to reach the area

where the men were working.

The digging was most recently set back Wednesday night, when a coal excavating machine was half buried by rubble by seismic shaking. Another so-called "mountain bump" interrupted work briefly Thursday morning.

"The seismic activity underground has just been relentless. The mountain is still alive, and we cannot endanger the rescue workers as we drive toward these trapped miners," Bob Murray, chief of Murray Energy Corp., the co-owner and operator of the Granddall Canyon Mine, said Thursday.

# No more colorful Idaho congressmen, please

Once upon a time, there was an Idaho politician named Glen Taylor who got himself elected to the United States Senate. In July 1947, Taylor was asked by a United Press reporter what he thought about reports that remnants of a UFO had been found by the Air Force near Roswell, N.M.

"Taylor replied that he almost hoped flying saucers would turn out to be spaceships from another planet. They could end our petty arguments on earth."

The Democratic senator went on to say that no matter what the UFOs turned out to be, they "can't be laughed off."

"Even if it is only a psychological phenomenon, it is a sign of what the world is coming to," Taylor explained. "If we don't ease the tensions, the whole world will be full of psychological cases and eventually turn into a global nuthouse."

Idaho has a long and colorful history of sending embarrassing people to Washington, D.C. The latest, of course, is Idaho's irrepressible 1st District congressman, Bill Sali, who who offered when a Hindu prayer was performed on the floor of the U.S. Senate last month.

"The question is, is multiculturalism good or not?" he said in a subsequent interview with the *Idaho Press-Tribune* of Nampa. "I don't think the Founding Fathers were multicultural ... Christian principles work, and they show up in a lot of different areas ... Most of the hospitals in this country have Christian names. If you think Hindu prayer is great, where are the Hindu hospitals in this country? Go down the list. Where are the atheist hospitals in this country?"

This is the same Bill Sali who in January introduced the *Obesity Reduction and Health Promotion Act* that sought to repeal the law of gravity.

Angered by the passage of a bill to increase the federal minimum wage, Sali says he was trying to make a point that measures to dictate wages and reduce gravity both defy "natural laws."

Getting rid of the force that attracts objects to one another would lower obesity rates, the freshman Republican explained.

For that kind of special insight, we're paying him \$165,000 a year.

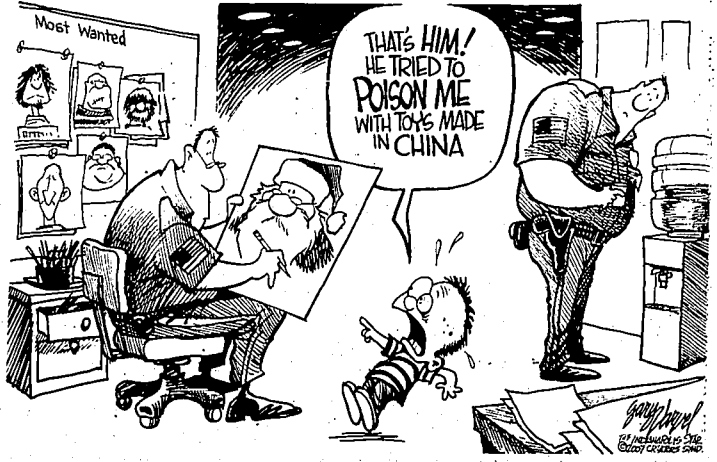
Before Sali, of course, Republican Helen Chenoweth-Hage represented the 1st Congressional District in Washington for six years. She complained about federal government "black helicopters" shadowing Idahoans, and once said, "Don't let anything like trees in the Clearwater National Forest get in the way of providing jobs and fueling the economy, even if that means cutting down every last tree in the state."

And before Chenoweth-Hage there was Republican George Hansen, who represented the 2nd Congressional District for seven terms. Hansen took it upon himself to go to Tehran 1979 in the middle of the Iran hostage crisis to try to negotiate with militants through the fence of the U.S. Embassy, and once called the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.'s 1968 assassination "the chickens coming home to roost."

Idaho voters get such interesting representation in Washington because we tend to elect conservatives — and sometimes ideologues. But being an ideologue is one thing; rendering yourself completely ineffective at getting things done for your state is quite another.

Sali, a first-term member of the minority party in the House of Representatives from a small Western state, arguably has become the least-effective congressman in Washington, D.C., today. And he talked himself into it.

# Parents and the glories of kid vid

And here I thought I was an OK dad. What a bummer to learn that I was making my kids dumb.

Researchers at the University of Washington and the Seattle Children's Hospital Research Institute published a paper this month in the *Journal of Pediatrics* that could blow the lid off the multibillion-dollar baby video and DVD industry. According to the study — and to the shock of parents everywhere — we've been pumping into our precious progenies' soft skulls are potentially turning them into mini-moons.

The most important fact to come from this study, claimed lead author Frederick Zimmerman, "is there is no clear evidence of a benefit coming from baby DVDs and videos, and there is some suggestion of harm."

Crammed with damning data (and not a small amount of disapproving smugness), the report found that for every hour the tiniest test subjects (8 to 16 months old) spent watching baby tapes and DVDs, they understood six to eight fewer words than their fellow tots, whose obstreperous parents prefer not to park their ryles in front of the Sony Trinitron.

In other words, all that time you've invested in hoarding those colorful clips of flowering flowers — backed up, of course, by synapse-sparking snippets of Mozart — could, in fact, guarantee like Timmy a life behind the counter at

Burger King. Gimme a break.

What I lack in a knack for science I more than make up for in field study. As the DVD reviewer for *Parenting* magazine, I have watched hundreds, if not thousands, of programs designed to divert the babble-and-drool contingent, from spoon-feeders primers on the ABCs to lavamp-laden dream tapes intended to keep baby blissfully bug-eyed (while, yes, the weary parents grab 10 minutes to make a call, answer an e-mail or, God forbid, take a shower).

I have sat through morphing monkeys, armies of puppets and enough footage of Cookie Monster to qualify me as the guy's biographer.

And here's my report: With the exception of a single disc (a computer-animated tale called "Doggie Poo," starring — I you got it — a talking pile of doggy poo), I have yet to click "play" on anything I would hesitate to show my kids.

But it's not just the content that's the problem, say the researchers. It's also the amount of screen time — especially when this viewing robs baby of real-life interaction.

"There are only a fixed number of hours that young babies are awake and alert," coauthor Andrew Meltzoff said. "If the 'alert time' is

spent in front of baby DVDs and videos instead of with people speaking in 'parentese' ... the babies are not getting the same linguistic experience.

Well, duh. I don't know a parent alive who doesn't feel a pang of shame when flipping on the tube to baby-sit; and most of us make an effort to regulate TV time and any frivolity that keeps our kids locked in their own world.

But where the wheels come off this study is in its methodology: The researchers never laid eyes on their little subjects. Instead, they interviewed parents by telephone for 45 minutes (oops — there goes that vital face-time with baby), grilling them about their kids' vocabularies. From these results, numbers were crunched and determinations were made.

Granted, baby's little lexicon might be one indicator in this sort of scientific sleuthing, but where was the human factor? Did the researchers witness (as I have) the sparkle in a child's eyes whenever Barney the Dinosaur transforms his neighborhood into "the land of make-believe"? Did the data-collectors observe (as I did, with one of my daughters) a baby's delighted urge to imitate whenever the Teletubbies whip up another batch of Tubby Tubs?

Did any of the scribbling scientists spot and truly capture (as millions do, on countless home movies) the sheer

magic of a 10-month-old, who's barely mastered the act of sitting up, clapping and singing along with the Wiggles?

To their credit, the researchers mean well. This study is part of a wider analysis of the effects of media-viewing during the first two years of life. And the authors understandably have cast a discerning eye on the so-called smart baby fare — such as the "Baby Einstein" and "Brainy Baby" series — whose glow-a-genius marketing claims make them plump targets for debunking.

But there are infinite other ways in which kid vid can widen the minds of little viewers. When created with care (and most children's media producers do a decent amount of research in child development), baby and toddler programs can teach self-esteem, encourage role-play, invite interactivity and stretch the imagination. And when viewed with a parent, which nearly all of these products recommend, they can foster bonding.

Speaking of which, in the two hours it's taken me to write this, my daughters (8 and 12) have watched one Disney sitcom and one full-length movie, while my wife cuddled up with a book. Naturally, we feel guilty about abandoning the kids — but guess what? They'll live.

# Oh, Allah, won't you buy me a Mercedes Benz?

I was bound to happen — and it is amazing that a cleric named Tiny would think of it.

Roman Catholic Bishop Tiny Muskens of the Netherlands has decided that the way to ease Muslim tensions is to start using "Allah" instead of "God." Noting that God does not care what we call him, Muskens thought, why not yield a little to Muslim ways? Or would that be submit, the literal meaning of "Islam"? "Allah is a very beautiful word for God," Muskens said on Dutch television a few days ago. "Shouldn't we all say that from now on we will name God Allah?"

Muskens pointed out that in Indonesia, the world's most populous Muslim country where he spent eight years, priests use the word "Allah" in Catholic Mass. For the sake of peace, prosperity and clarity in the shire, let the record reflect that Muslims did not ask for this,

though some in the Netherlands embraced the idea as a conciliatory gesture and in the United States, some Muslims greeted the suggestion with enthusiasm.

Abraham Hooper, spokesman for the Council on American Islamic Relations, told FoxNews.com that calling God "Allah" wouldn't require a theological leap for Christians. "It reinforces the fact that Muslims, Christians and Jews all worship the same God," Hooper said. It's not hard to understand why Muskens would tilt toward compromise. The Netherlands, which is now home to 1 million Muslims, hasn't been quite the peace 'n' love axis of the multicultural

world, despite clouds of Silver Blue cannabis wafting from the city's famously mellow coffee houses.

Between the 2004 murder of Theo van Gogh, guilty of making a documentary film critical of Islam, death threats against fellow documentarian Ayman Hirsi Ali, and the recent Muslim attack of the head of a Dutch group for "ex-Muslims," one could begin to think of invoking Allah as a savvy survival technique.

Besides, as Muskens pointed out, Allah is a lovely sounding word. Thus, in the spirit of Christian charity and Western tolerance, I've been trying it out with mixed results.

The Doxology of my Protestant childhood is problematic with the two-syllable Allah instead of the monosyllabic God, but from whom: Praise Allah, from whom all blessings flow. Praise him, all creatures here below. Not perfect, but workable. America's familiar child-

hood blessing is downright euphonious: Allah is great, Allah is good, let us thank him for our food. But the Apostle's Creed is a mess: I believe in Allah the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ his only son ... Oops.

Contrary to Hooper's one god claim, Christians and Muslims don't really worship the same god. Although both religions are monotheistic — and I there's just one god, there's just one god — Christians believe Jesus was the Son of God and Muslims think otherwise.

That's not a small doctrinal difference. In fact, at the risk of exhausting the obvious, Christianity doesn't exist without, um, Christ. Of course we could rewrite the Apostle's Creed to include Muhammad: "I believe in Allah the Father Almighty ... and in Muhammad, his favorite prophet ..."

Contrary to Hooper's one god claim, Christians and Muslims don't really worship the same god. Although both religions are monotheistic — and I there's just one god, there's just one god — Christians believe Jesus was the Son of God and Muslims think otherwise.

That's not a small doctrinal difference. In fact, at the risk of exhausting the obvious, Christianity doesn't exist without, um, Christ. Of course we could rewrite the Apostle's Creed to include Muhammad: "I believe in Allah the Father Almighty ... and in Muhammad, his favorite prophet ..."

The possibilities are infinite, really. Alternatively, we could pretend to be sane and suggest that everybody go to his or her own house of worship, pray to his or her own version of the Creator, and otherwise get a life.

Changing Western language symbols and making other accommodations to ease relations between old Europe and pass-over even more appeasement is only a conciliatory gesture or even mere appeasement. It is submission by any other name.

Language may be a main limitation, as Jamaan Hashim said, speaking for the Council of Islamic Organizations of Greater Chicago, which endorses Muskens' idea. But language is not meaningless. The words we use to define and express ourselves are the foundations of cultural and social identity.

John Stuart Mill put it this way: "Language is the light of the mind."

Muskens, who retires in a few weeks, conceded that his idea likely wouldn't catch on right away. We might need another 100 years or so, but he predicted that, eventually, Allah will be the word.

Given that European Muslims are proliferating at three times the rate of non-Muslims — and given the "logarithmic rate" of growth of jihadist ideology in the United States, according to a new report by the New York Police Department's Intelligence Division — it may be sooner than that.

## If at first you don't succeed, lie, lie again

Spearfishing, Daniel Pearl's widow is suddenly being lavishly praised by the Tronson Lobby. 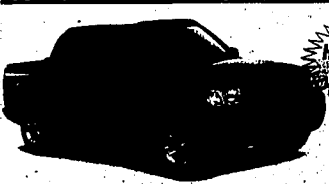

## It's a toss up: Tharp and Hamdan battle

BOISE — The quarterback of the football team is the player who makes the greatest impact on the game. He calls the plays. He makes audibles. He and his center are the only two people who touch the ball on every play. He hands off, passes, runs and makes the split-second decisions that determine the outcome of the contest.

The Boise State Broncos are in a pivotal stage of the fall training camp. The coaches must choose a starting quarterback.

At this point there are two in the running: senior Taylor Tharp and junior Bush Hamdan. Hamdan has been nursing a bruised hand. He missed the scrimmage last Saturday and a few practices this week.

"Any injury will set a quarterback back," Hamdan said. "I kind of started camp really well with a lot of confidence and things like that. And any time you aren't getting reps you do step a little bit back. Just missed a couple of practices here and there."

Hamdan is still listed No. 1 on the depth chart for the Broncos, but Tharp is in a virtual tie for the starting position. There is some trepidation and anxiousness lingering over both quarterbacks as they wait for a starter to be named.

"(The coaches) are going to do it whenever they are ready ... it might not even be until the third scrimmage," Tharp said. "The coaches I know have been talking and they have met about it a few times. When they have decided on a guy I am sure they will let us know."

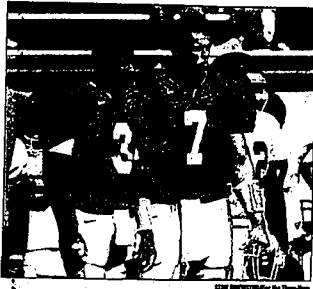
With the exit of senior quarterback Jared Zabransky, the

Broncos are faced with a question they haven't had to answer for three years.

"Zabransky was the winningest quarterback in the country over the last three seasons, going 33-5 as a starter."

"We've got some big shoes to fill at quarterback," head coach Chris Petersen said. "Tharp was the backup for Zabransky the last two seasons, but never got a lot of playing time. He went 11-for-13 last season in mop-up duty, throwing for 88 yards and a touchdown. He played in eight games two years ago, relieving Zabransky during the debate at Georgia

## More returns, injuries expected with kickoff moved to 30-yard line

INDIANAPOLIS — NCAA officials expect more excitement — and perhaps more injuries — as kickoffs move back to the 30-yard line for this college football season.

The NCAA rules oversight panel's decision in March to push the kickoff back from the 35-yard line to the NFL's starting point was one of several offseason changes designed to keep the game moving and the energy level high.

Purdue coach Joe Tiller has been among the critics of moving the kickoff. He says it's the most violent play in football, and the few extra returns won't be worth it if injuries, such as concussions, increase.

"So now they're moving back 5 yards so we can create more force as these kids are running into each other," he said. "I'm not in favor of moving it back 5 yards. I think about the health and safety of the players, first and foremost."

"It's probably going to add a few more injuries that we didn't have in the past. And maybe a few more kicks will be returned."

Ron Courson, head trainer at Georgia and a member of the National Athletic Trainers association, said the NCAA will keep track of injuries and make changes in the future if necessary.

"We do know that you do have a tendency to get more injuries on a special teams play where you have more high-impact, open-field running," he said. "However, I think we need to reserve judgment until we have data."

Dave Parry, national coordinator of NCAA football officiating, said he expects the results to be positive.

"It will create a little more excitement, and we'll get a little more movement of the ball," he said. "We do believe it will eliminate some touchbacks. This will be pleasing to the fans."

Other rule changes this year were geared toward adding

## Giambi escapes: Selig doesn't punish slugger

NEW YORK — With a bright-eyed smile stretched across his rosy face, Jason Giambi bounced around the field during batting practice and posed for photos with fans.

The New York Yankees slugger had plenty to be happy about Thursday.

Giambi escaped punishment from commissioner Bud Selig because of his charitable work and cooperation with baseball's steroids investigator.

"It's over and done with. I'm tickled with it. He did what he needed to do ... now I can go forward," Giambi said before the Yankees hosted Detroit in the opener of an important four-game series. "I can go forward without hurt the ballclub with a suspension."

Selig, speaking on the second

and final day of an owners meeting in Toronto, called this an "unprecedented decision."

Giambi has acknowledged a "personal history regarding steroids." He agreed to speak with former Sen. George Mitchell last month after Selig threatened to discipline him if he refused to cooperate.

"He's doing a lot of public-service work, and I think that's terribly important," Selig said. "I think it's more important for us to keep getting the message out. He was, I think, very frank and candid with Sen.

Marin's first goal-bound effort, which he headed past Bartlett as they both went for a high-bounding ball, looked destined for the back of the net until defender Silas Thompson cleared it off the line. Bartlett returned Thompson's pick-me-up with an excellent party on Marin's second attempt, after the forward unlocked the Bruin defense and had just the keeper to beat.

"It feels good to go out there and play our best," Thompson said. "(Bartlett) is a good keeper, and he picks us up a lot." The excitement was not nearly limited to the boys' varsity field — each school's girls team was every bit as entertaining, with many runs and clever diagonal passing.

"This has been a really good test, but we've seen some weaknesses we need to figure out," said Twin Falls girls soccer coach Kate Kauffman, adding that finding weakness in her team isn't necessarily a bad thing at this early stage in the season.

## Beck leads Dolphins to late score in win over Chiefs

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Patrick Cobbs scored on a 7-yard run and John Beck slipped into the end zone for the 2-point conversion with 4:20 left, leading Miami past Kansas City 11-10 Thursday night and making the Dolphins 2-0 in preseason games for the first time since 1982.

Beck, the third Miami quarterback to start in the sloppily played game, hit Kerry Reed for 17 yards and Courtney Anderson for 25 in a seven-play, 73-yard scoring drive. Trent Green, whose 82.3 passer rating in his first season is the best in Chiefs history, played the first two

series for the Dolphins in a much-awaited return to Arrowhead Stadium, and was 4-for-7 for 41 yards. He led one drive that failed when Jared Allen stopped Chase Chatham for a 1-yard loss on fourth-and-goal from the 3.

Kansas City threw the challenge flag after Beck leaned across the goal line, but the ruling held up, leaving Kansas City 0-2 in the exhibition season and looking very much in need of Larry Johnson, its Pro Bowl running back who's held out all summer in a contract dispute. The Chiefs rushed for 81 yards. Brodie Croyle, bidding to take

Green's old job, hit his first four passes and led the Chiefs to their only offensive touchdown in two preseason games, but also threw an ill-advised interception.

Damon Huard, the veteran backup Croyle is competing with, was 3-for-5 for only 26 yards as the Chiefs stalled for the second straight game with out Johnson.

Croyle, known for his rifle arm but sometimes-poor decisions, atoned for a miserable performance in the Chiefs' first exhibition outing when he engineered an eight-play, 73-yard touchdown march, capped by a 21-yard touchdown pass to Chris

Hannon in the second quarter.

But a few minutes later, showing the inexperience of a second-year pro who played only briefly as a rookie, Croyle threw a terrible pass off his back foot that was intercepted in the end zone by Michael Lehan.

Croyle was 6-for-11 for 82 yards. "There were a few scattered boos when Green took the field for Miami's first series. But the reception for the Chiefs starting quarterback of the past six seasons was mostly respectful.

Miami's retooled offensive line opened holes after hole for Ronnie Brown, who had gains of 12 and 10 yards to get Green's best drive of 65 yards started.

# Goodell insists Vick case is not overshadowing season

ALLEN PARK, Mich. (AP) — Roger Goodell wants to talk football. Michael Vick keeps getting in the way. The NFL commissioner, making a tour of training camps, raved about Detroit Lions coach Rod Marinelli and his players after visiting them Thursday. He spoke to them mostly about their responsibilities as players. As soon as Goodell started asking questions during a news conference, however, he was asked about Vick. And the questions kept coming.

There has been an unflinching comment of the commissioner, Vick who is charged with running a dog-fighting ring on his Virginia property. Goodell insists this is not eclipsing enthusiasm about the game itself. "I don't think it's overshadowing the season," he said. "I think our fans are excited about football, but I understand the interest in the story."

Vick is facing increased pressure to settle a deal with prosecutors in his federal dogfighting conspiracy case. He conferred with his lawyers for

hours Wednesday. "We're going to do what we always said we were going to do, which is rely on the facts," Goodell said. "If there is some type of a plea agreement, then we will obviously take the time to understand what that plea is and we'll see how it fits into our personal conduct (policy)."

Goodell barred Vick from taking

part in training camp while the league investigates. The commissioner said the league is monitoring talks between Vick's lawyers and prosecutors. He wants the legal process to run its course before he rules on Vick's future in the league.

Under NFL policy, a player can be banned for life for illegal gambling or associating with gamblers, and Vick might face that penalty. "The gambling is certainly an issue," Goodell said after meeting with the Cleveland Browns at their year-round training facility. "Law enforcement may be concerned about certain things about this. We may be concerned about other aspects of this. That's why we want to evaluate what the government has. We don't know all of the facts on that. Michael's team may not know all of the facts at this point in time."

The quarterback was linked to betting in New York City's games behind first-place Boston in the AL East.

with the government, and the July 17 indictment.

Two other co-defendants — Purnell Peace and Quanitt Phillips — are to enter plea agreements Friday. Prosecutors have said they will seek a superseding indictment later this month that could mean additional charges against Vick.

Vick has pleaded not guilty to conspiracy to travel in interstate commerce in aid of unlawful activities and conspiring to sponsor a dog in an animal fighting venture. If convicted, he faces up to five years in prison and a fine of up to \$250,000.

According to the statement signed by Thytor as part of his plea agreement, Vick financed virtually all of the "Bad News" Kennel's dogfighting enterprise on Vick's property.

A search of his property in April turned up dozens of pit bulls, some of them injured, as well as equipment commonly used in dogfighting. The indictment said dogs that lost fights or fared poorly in test fights were

sometimes executed by hanging, electrocution or other brutal means. The grisly details have fueled public protests against Vick and have cost him some lucrative endorsement deals.

Vick's charges have also hurt the NFL's image in an off-season also marked by suspensions of Adam "Pacman" Jones, Tank Johnson and Chris Henry for off-field conduct. Goodell contends just four players out of about 2,000 in the league are generating most of the scrutiny.

"I've said to Pacman and any player, 'You have to earn your way back into the National Football League and you have to do it through your conduct,'" Goodell said. "It's not about what you tell the commissioner, or what you tell anyone. It's your conduct and your activities. I was disappointed with some of the activities that Pacman got involved this spring after we had met and had a lot of discussions. 'Michael knows exactly how I feel.'"

# Cards get key sweep of Brewers

MILWAUKEE — Adam Wainwright gave up two hits in seven scoreless innings and Yadier Molina put on a rare power display with two homers as the St. Louis Cardinals completed a crucial three-game sweep of the Brewers with an 8-0 victory on Thursday.

It was the first career multihomer game for Molina, who came into Thursday's game with only one home run this season. He drove in all three of the Cardinals' runs through the first eight innings as the third-place Cardinals closed to within 2½ games of the NL Central division lead for the first time since April 20.

The Brewers, who have lost 13 of 18, were swept at home for the first time since Florida took three games at Miller Park last September. The Cardinals outscored the Brewers 28-7 in the series.

Wainwright (11-9), in his first year as a starter after starting as a reliever during the Cardinals' World Series run last year, struck out a career-high eight while walking three.

With two outs in the second inning, Molina drove a 2-2 pitch from Brewers starter Dave Bush (8-9) into the second deck in left field, putting the Cardinals ahead 1-0.

The Cardinals added five runs in the ninth on Adam Eckstein's three-run double, capped by Albert Pujols, and an error by outfielder Geoff Jenkins.

"I think that is tough," Hamdan said. "And that is something that is downhill for not having a guy earlier. You kind of want to step up. You kind of want to lead, but at the same time you haven't been named the team in two weeks who's ready to go against Weber State."

No matter whom the quarterback is the team will adapt. "I see some of the guys won't play as well because there is a different guy calling

the plays. This team isn't like that. But they do need someone to lead them.

"As a quarterback, being a leader is natural, well it's not natural; it's something that is a part of you," Tharp said. "It can be a little hard, not knowing who is that solidified number one guy, because you want to have the feeling that everyone is behind you when you really don't know for sure what the situation is."

"You just try and go out there every day and do what is expected of you as a quarterback and leadership comes with that."

Whoever the coaches choose, there will be a quality quarterback in blue and orange this season. Both of these guys will play their hearts out to win for BSU. "I think it would definitely be important," Tharp said. "I would be 'blowing it' either way. I have been here five years and seeing how this pro-

gram has grown and being behind some great quarterbacks, with Jared (Zabransky) and (Ryan) Lindvidde during my first year. For me to be the next quarterback in that line and kind of leave my own work on Boise State and its tradition would be really great."

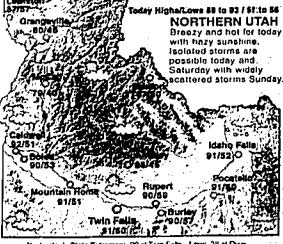

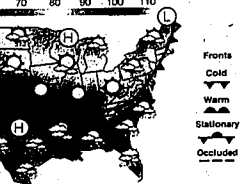

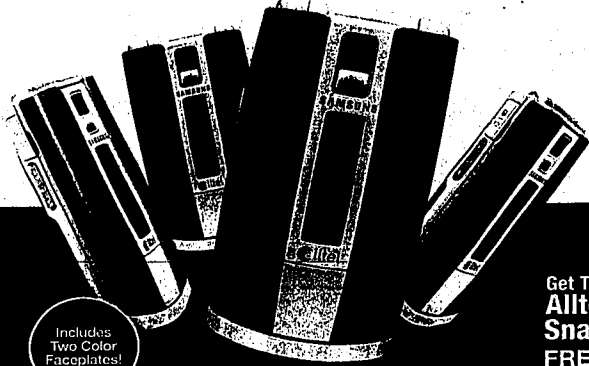

plays to the game that were eliminated by rule changes the previous year. The clock now will stop on possession changes and won't start on kickoffs until the receiving team touches the ball.
Some coaches complained the 2006 changes, which resulted in about 14 fewer plays per game in Division I-A, had altered the game too much. Others said it prevented teams from rallying late in games.
In February, the football rules committee recommended going back to the old system. After meeting with the American Football Coaches Association in March, the oversight panel agreed.
Last year's rule changes reduced game times by an average of about 14 minutes, and some of that progress is expected to be lost with the new tweaks. But other changes were made to help the NCAA reach its goal of three-hour, 15-minute games.
After media timeouts during televised games, teams will have less time to run plays. Previously, teams had a 25-second play clock; now it will be 15 seconds.
Officials expect the kickoff returns to make the game last longer, but say they could cut into dead periods and make them more

## Concerns return over YMCA pool

City wants details on pool expenses

TWIN FALLS — The current reawakened Thursday and the waxes picked up in speed.

During Thursday's city of Twin Falls pool advisory board meeting, a city official criticized the YMCA of Twin Falls for failing to provide required financial information for at least two years, and questions continually were raised over whether the YMCA has adequately staffed the facility.

For two years, the YMCA has not told the city how profitable managing the city pool is, despite the disclosure being required in its contract, said Gretchen Scott, the city's management assistant. The reason for the quarterly disclosures is for the city to assess whether it needs to make budget adjustments, Scott said. It gives the YMCA \$50,000 annually to manage the city pool, but pays more than \$100,000 in utilities for the facility.

"Whether it's a revenue source, whether it's a break-even, whether it's a deficit, we don't know," Scott said. "We would expect them to pick up some other bills or reduce the subsidy we're paying because the city's demands and expenses continue to grow. It's difficult for us to make that change unless we know how much the

pool is affecting the Y." Luree Welch, a past board president and current executive committee member for the Y, sitting in the audience, asked Scott why the city needed the information.

"Do you do that with the sewage company and other stuff, too? They have to give all their financial records to you?" Welch asked.

"They do," Scott said. Scott said that in 2005, according to GuideStar.com, a Web site that tracks nonprofit groups, the YMCA took in \$222,275. The YMCA has managed the city pool since 2002.

"We don't know what that money is because you don't feel like you have to explain that to us," said Scott.

The YMCA has sought to reassert itself after a string of publicized disputes between employees and management. Staffing concerns and other issues have taken increased priority with the contract between the YMCA and the city up for renewal this fall. "We don't know what parents questioned whether the YMCA has followed through on several promises made earlier in the contract, including adequately staffing the facility."

Steve Wright, the new aquatic director, said that all staffing issues have been "stabilized," but that he is still "trying to fill lifeguard positions vacated by students returning to college." "You can never have too many lifeguards," he said.

In the ongoing effort to fight West Nile-spreading mosquitoes, several communities are telling the bugs to

## Twin Falls County, three cities work to keep mosquitoes out

TWIN FALLS — When street crews in Twin Falls completed work on storm drains this summer, they left an extra something behind.

The city distributed small briquettes in the drains, retention ponds and pressurized irrigation ponds to sterilize standing water in the drains and prevent mosquitoes from breeding there. Twin Falls city streets supervisor Bruce Stephens said. The "mosquito biscuits" were given to the city by Twin Falls County as part of the county's efforts to cut the number of cases of West Nile virus.

For the city, the briquettes are mostly preventative, Stephens said — the drains didn't attract many mosquitoes last year. But across the county, the briquettes, paired with water-soluble pouches containing a biological larvicide, have made a difference in the number of West Nile

cases, said Kell Van Leeuwen, county weed and pest control supervisor.

According to numbers from the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare, only one case of West Nile has been found in Twin Falls County this year. In 2006, 39 cases were reported to the state agency — a noticeable difference, Van Leeuwen said.

## Filer School Board approves bond election

FILER — Looks like voters will be invited to the polls. The Filer School Board unanimously approved a resolution to schedule a \$14.8 million bond election for Oct. 11.

The decision was made Wednesday evening after the board heard recommendations from a long range planning committee regarding the expansion of district facilities to meet projected growth over the next 15 years.

The committee proposed to spend about \$11 million to construct a 45,000-square-foot "intermediate"

school northwest of Filer Elementary School. The new school would accommodate fourth through sixth grades and free up classroom space at both the elementary and middle schools.

Placing the new school next to the elementary would reduce costs by allowing both buildings to share administration. Though the school would be set up for a full kitchen, committee members say meals could initially be prepared at the elementary school and sent to the new building.

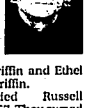
the lodge, and felt it to be a real privilege. Mike always had a friendly word for everyone and a place in his heart for anyone in need.

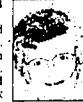

and repairs in for a full kitchen, but run it as a satellite kitchen as long as we can and save costs on personnel," said Jim Hughes, a committee member. "This is something we really need to look hard at and not saddle the school board with trying to come up with \$150,000 to finish the kitchen."

Based on projected residential growth and a 2.5-percent growth in student population, the committee projects from 3 percent to 10 percent growth over the next decade.

About \$1.2 million of the

bond would go toward construction of six new classrooms at Filer High; \$500,000 would be earmarked for repairs to the elementary school's roof, and \$250,000 used to resurface the middle school's parking lot.

The committee also plans to review the possibility of purchasing land for future construction of a new middle school. The current middle school property, on U.S. Highway 30, could then be sold for commercial use.

Some \$100,000 of the bond would also be used to make

roof repairs and construct teacher restrooms at Hollister Elementary.

"We don't want to leave anyone out or just throw money out there; we want it to go for legitimate needs," Hughes said. "Asbestos in the floors of that old of a building could cause problems and make new upstairs bathrooms cost prohibitive, but the architect and construction manager feel confident that fixing that leaking roof is a double project."

A second part of the bond residents will be asked to fund on separately is \$800,000 for

the completion of a football field at the high school, and locker rooms, restrooms, a concession stand, bleachers and lighting.

"We figured that splitting it up this way might make the bond easier to pass," Hughes said. "This way people can vote for or against one or the other, but they're not a piece of me that thinks they'll vote for the athletics and not our academic building needs."

Polls will open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Oct. 11 at Filer High School and Hollister Elementary School.

"We don't seem to be hearing as much this year about people getting sick," she said. "The money for the larvicide and briquettes — harmless for humans and animals in the county, Van Leeuwen said — came from \$90,000 county commissioner set aside in May for emergency pest control. The biological agents have been distributed in ponds, water troughs and areas that are flooded for irrigation purposes, she said. As many as 8,000 pouches have been distributed across

the county.

Three cities benefit from the funds — Filer and Buhl also received briquettes for their storm drain systems. Stephens said the briquettes, which fall to the bottom so they aren't washed through the system, are good for 150 days, and those placed in pressurized irrigation systems are good for one month. Though the anti-mosquito measures aren't cheap, Van Leeuwen said, it's worth the money to make sure West Nile isn't as much of a problem this year. Out of 50 traps the

county has set so far for the bugs, only two mosquitoes have tested positive for West Nile. And unlike last year, when the larvicide was handed out to those who requested them, the county has

actively sought out ponds and worked with property owners to distribute it this year, she said.

"Can you put a price tag on the disease and the sickness?" she asked.

after youths in at least two other vehicles — a Ford Explorer and Dodge Neon.

Wright allegedly began firing shots at the other cars with a .40-caliber Ruger, Gonzalez said. The number of shots fired is not known, he said.

A Nevada Highway Patrol trooper pulled over the three cars for speeding and subsequently arrested Haddad and Wright.

The trooper did not witness the shooting.

Haddad is being charged with attempted murder. Bond

# Death toll rises to 450 from strong earthquake in Peru

PISCO, Peru — Hundreds of worshippers crowded the San Clemente church on Pisco's main plaza for the joyous Mass that annually celebrates the Virgin Mary's assumption into heaven. Then the ground began to shake — and the soaring church ceiling began to tear apart.

The heaving lasted an agonizing two minutes, tumbling stones, bricks, wood and dust onto the congregation, burying at least 200 people, the town's mayor said Thursday. Only two stone columns were still standing, poking up out of the giant pile of rubble.

As the toll of known dead rose to 450 across the Peruvian desert region hit by the quake at 6:40 p.m. Wednesday, searchers at the church pulled bodies out all day and lined them up on the plaza — at least 60 by late afternoon. Civil defense workers arrived and began zipping the dead into body bags. But people searching desperately for missing relatives opened the bags, crying hysterically when they recognized a familiar face.

Jose Nez, who went into the rubble dozens of times, said

workers would keep at it "until the end." His wife shouted at the bodies of his man and two small daughters as workers carried them from the rubble: "Why did you go? Why?"

The church in the gritty fishing port of Pisco was perhaps the single deadliest spot in the magnitude-8 earthquake, which devastated hamlets of adobe and brick across Peru's southern desert. At least 450 died and more than 1,500 were injured, Davarian officials told the U.N.

"The dead are scattered by the dozens on the streets," Pisco Mayor Juan Mendoza told U.N. radio station CIPN, sobbing. "We don't have lights, water, communications. Most houses have fallen. Churches, stores, hotels — everything is destroyed."

The dead and injured were taken in bloodstained sheets to damaged hospitals and morgues in Pisco as well as the nearby coastal city of Ica and the coastal town of Chichua, among other places.

Doctors struggled to help as hundreds of bleeding people lay on cots in the open air, fearing more aftershocks would send hospital walls crashing down.

"It is quite likely that the numbers will continue to go

up since the destruction of the houses in this area is quite total," said U.N. Assistant Secretary-General Margarita Wahlstrom.

Seventeen other people were killed in a church in Ica, according to the Canal N cable news station. The historic San Juan de Luren church was among several heavily damaged in Ica, where at least 57 bodies were taken to the morgue.

# Iraqi leaders forge new political alliance

BAGHDAD — Iraq's political leaders emerged Thursday from three days of crisis talks with a new alliance that seeks to save the crumbling U.S.-backed government. But the reshaped power bloc included no Sunnis and immediately raised questions about its legitimacy as a unifying force.

The political gambit came as tens of thousands rallied the grim figures from the deadliest wave of suicide attacks of the war and — in a rare moment of joy since Tuesday's devastation — pulled four chil-

dren alive from the rubble. "We didn't hear them calling out for help until moments before a bulldozer would have killed them as it cleared the rubble," said Saad Muhammad, a municipal council member in the Qadisiya region, where four bomb-laden trucks turned clay and stone homes into tombs for hundreds belonging to a small religious group considered as infidels by

hard-line Muslims. Interior Ministry spokesman Brig. Gen. Abdul-Karim Khalaf said Thursday that at least 400 were dead — apparently all members of the ancient Yazidi sect that mixes elements of Islam, Christianity and other faiths. Some authorities outside the central government had said at least 500 people died and have not revised that figure downward.

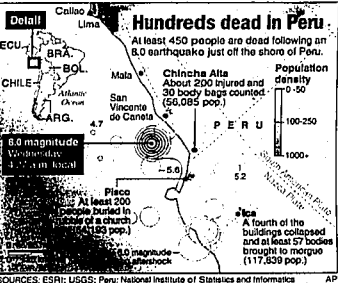

# Idaho ranks eighth in high school graduation rate

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A Washington, D.C.-based education think tank is commending Idaho on its goal of a 90 percent high school graduation rate, but taking the state to task for allowing minuscule increases on the way to that goal.

The Education Trust also said many states are inflating their graduation rates, but said Idaho reported numbers not that much higher than expected.

The Education Trust's report, "Graduation Matters:

Improving Accountability for High School Graduation," looked at graduation requirements across the country under the No Child Left Behind Act. For its report released earlier this month, it used 2005 numbers.

That year, Idaho ranked eighth in the nation in its graduation rate, according to the U.S. Department of Education. By comparing what the federal agency and what states themselves report, as well as various other organizations, the Education Trust concluded

that many states were inflating their graduation rates.

The Department of Education reported that Idaho had a graduation rate of 91 percent in 2005, 6% percentage points behind the top state, Nebraska.

Idaho officials reported a graduation rate of 95.6 percent for the class of 2005. "Having accurate numbers not only insures you know what's happening to your students, you truly know how many are getting a diploma," Anna Habash, a policy analyst

with the Education Trust, told The Associated Press on Thursday. "Based on the data you would know which areas to target."

Habash said Idaho's numbers are fairly close to the graduation rate figured from federal numbers. She said some states, such as Mississippi, reported a graduation rate 20 percent higher than what the federal agency reported.

She said the difference in reported graduation rates was the result of the federal agency and individual states

using different databases to calculate graduation rates. She said some states inflated rates by counting dropouts as graduates if the state was not sure a student had dropped out.

Habash said that while Idaho had a respectable graduation rate and laudible graduation rate goal, it set a low bar on what it considered acceptable improvement toward that goal.

The state considers any improvement as satisfactory, even if it only raises a graduation rate by the smallest of percentages, Habash said. Idaho should increase what it considers acceptable improvement.

"I think that would be Idaho's next step," she said.

The Education Trust said a better system is needed to calculate graduation rates. Variables that are hard to track include students who leave a state or school district to continue their education in another and dropouts who later earn general equivalency diplomas.

Habash told The Spokesman-Review of Spokane, Wash., that the best way to track students would be for states to follow the lead of Massachusetts, which assigns an identification number to each student and tracks with him or her all the way through school.

## Conservation groups offer reward to catch wolf shooter

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Conservation groups are offering a \$4,000 reward for information leading to the conviction of the person who shot a wolf that migrated into northeastern Oregon.

The reward comes on top of \$5,000 offered by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The female gray wolf — protected as an endangered species — was found last May outside Elgin.

It had apparently crossed the Snake River from Idaho, where packs were introduced in 1995 and 1996.

Steve Hedley of Oregon Wild and Noah Greenwald of the Center for Biological Diversity say the shooting highlights the need to maintain federal protection for wolves, a key to restoring healthy ecosystems, despite efforts to take them off the endangered species list.

## State to move inmates from private Texas prison

BOISE (AP) — Idaho Department of Correction Director Brent Reinke says he intends to move 56 Idaho inmates from a troubled Texas prison and into a newer, cleaner penitentiary near the Texas-Mexico border by the end of September.

Reinke also told Gov. C.L. "Buck" Otter, and other top state officials on Thursday that the department plans to send another 280 Idaho prisoners to the Val Verde Correctional Facility, in Del Rio, Texas, and to a private prison in western Oklahoma over the next six months to ease overcrowding in Idaho.

"The decisions come after reports of appalling conditions and other problems at the Dickens County Correction Center in Spur, Texas, and the Correction Department's own oversight of inmates at that facility."

Currently, 33 percent of Idaho's 7,361 inmates are in housed in Idaho county jails or in private prisons outside the state.

After visiting the two new prisons last month, Reinke said he is confident Idaho inmates can expect better living conditions, medical treatment and programs until the state can find a permanent solution for its growing prison population.

"The visit to Val Verde was a pleasant surprise," Reinke told the Board of Examiners meeting Thursday. "The bottom line is... it's clean and well run."

As many as 40 Idaho inmates will be shipped to Val Verde later this year, and another 240 will be transported this fall and early next year to the North Fork Correctional Facility in Sayre, Okla., Reinke said. Reinke, who took over in January, has acknowledged the department didn't do enough

in previous years to monitor inmates housed at Dickens and other Texas prisons.

Criticism of those conditions peaked last month after The Associated Press reported on the March 4 suicide of Scot Noble Payne, a convicted sex offender, and a subsequent investigation at Dickens, which led one Idaho prison official to describe conditions there as "beyond repair."

Other problems included a lack of treatment and education programs in the facility, which is operated by the Florida-based private prison firm The GEO Group.

GEO also runs Val Verde, an 875-bed prison built in 2001 and expanded with another 600 beds this year. The department has a three-year contract with Val Verde that pays GEO \$51 a day for each inmate, Reinke said.

"Our relationship with GEO is something we need to hold on to until we have other options in the state," Reinke told AP on Thursday.

Don Houston, senior vice president at GEO, said the company has severed its contract with Dickens after several years the facility failed to make infrastructure modifications sought by GEO.

"It was a business decision," he said.

Houston also told the board that Val Verde health officials, with help from the Texas public health officials and the federal Centers for Disease Control, are investigating what may have caused the deaths of two inmates last month and sickened two others. All four inmates are immigrants recently brought to the complex, he said.

"We're not certain what the problem is," Houston told the board.

## Otter prepares for closed health summit

BOISE — Select health industry leaders from around Idaho are preparing for Gov. C.L. "Buck" Otter's health summit here next week.

As of Thursday, Otter revealed little beyond a vague agenda for the Aug. 21-22 meeting, and some health leaders felt left out of the invitation-only event. The meeting is closed to the public, except for a short address by Otter.

"What we're hoping to accomplish is identifying and setting priorities for making health care more affordable and accessible in Idaho," Otter spokesman Jon Hanlan said. "They're coming up with recommendations that may or may not be adopted."

The meeting is closed because Otter "wants to ensure that these issues aren't politicized," Hanlan said. "His goal will be able to get more accomplished if we let folks get together and have a frank, free-flowing exchange of ideas that might be tem-

pered if cameras were rolling on everything that is said."

The list of those invited includes representatives from eight hospitals as well as the Idaho Hospital Association — which reports along with the licensing boards of den-

istry, nursing and medicine. Some small business owners are included — such as restaurateur John Mortimer and Gary Babble of Babbles Cleaners — along with representatives of some low-income health care clinics, the heads of insurance companies and seven state lawmakers.

But the Idaho Medical Association — which represents 75 percent of Idaho's physicians — wasn't invited. When the association's executive director, Bob Sechusen, heard about the event, he

asked to attend and was turned down, he said. "I suggested to Joyce McRoberts (the Otter staffer organizing the meeting) that our president, or members of our board, or that I attend, and we haven't been invited to the party. It's kind of interesting," Sechusen said. "There's no one representing the providers there."

Other invitees weren't sure why they were chosen. Sen. Diane Bilyeu, D-Pocatello, said she was happy to attend although since she's not on any health-related legislative committees, she was surprised when she made the list. Bilyeu was dismayed to learn the meeting was closed to the news media and public; the invitation didn't include such information.

"Health care is vitally important to the citizens of this state," Bilyeu said. "I just can't imagine why they would close it. You need the light of day on any issue."

The agenda for the two-day meeting at Boise State University offers few details: After hearing from Otter and a representative of the National Governors Association on Tuesday, attendees will listen to "panel discussions" and take part in "facilitated discussions" with no topics listed.

On Wednesday, more facilitated discussion is scheduled, with a special note that solutions — to the as-yet-undefined problems and recommendations will be made to the governor.

Dr. Ted Epperly, chairman and program director of the Family Medicine Residency of Idaho, will take part in a panel discussion with Medicaid Administrator Leslie Clement, Idaho Department of Insurance head Bill Deal and Karen Meeker, state Board of Education interim executive director. Epperly said he was told they'd be discussing the creation of a medical school in Idaho, among other topics.

# Census Bureau asks immigration enforcement officials to suspend raids while it counts illegal aliens for 2010 tally

WASHINGTON (AP) — Census workers know it will be difficult counting illegal immigrants for the 2010 population tally and even tougher if those immigrants are hiding from enforcement agents.

"If you have federal officials going door to door trying to count people, and federal officials going door to door trying to deport people, it doesn't work," said Arturo Vargas, executive director of the National Association of Latino Elected and Appointed Officials.

To make it easier, the Census Bureau wants immigration agents to suspend enforcement raids during the population count, the Census Bureau's second-ranking official said in an Associated Press interview.

Deputy Director Preston Jay Walte said immigration enforcement officials did not conduct raids for several months before and after the 2000 census. But today's political climate is even more volatile on the issue of illegal immigration.

Enforcement agents "have a job to do," Walte said. "They may not be able to give us as much of a break" in 2010.

An Immigration and Customs Enforcement spokesman declined to say whether immigration officials would halt raids. "If we were, we wouldn't talk about it," Pat Reilly said.

"For us to suspend that enforcement would probably take a lot more than one meeting," Reilly said. "We would have to discuss this at the highest levels of both agencies."

The issue arises as the U.S. struggles to resolve the fate of an estimated 12 million illegal immigrants. After Congress failed to pass an immigration overhaul sought by the president, the Bush administration last week said it would step up efforts to enforce immigration laws.

One lawmaker said she thinks "it's nuts" for the Census Bureau to ask for a break in enforcement.

"I don't know what country the Census Bureau is living in," Rep. Candice Miller, R-Mich.,

said in a telephone interview from her district. "I can tell them the American people have grown sick and tired of their immigration laws not being enforced. They are not going to tolerate enforcement being suspended for any amount of time."

The Constitution requires the Census Bureau to count everyone, including illegal immigrants. The once-a-decade population count is then used to apportion seats in Congress and to appropriate billions of dollars in federal spending each year.

Miller has introduced a companion bill that would apportion seats in Congress based only on the number of U.S. citizens in each state.

The Census Bureau plans to approach all federal agencies for help in getting an accurate count, Walte said.

Illegal immigrants are notoriously hard to count, although outside experts estimate that census workers count 85 percent to 90 percent of them.

Census workers ask immigrants if they are citizens; they do not ask if they are in the country legally.

"We're supposed to count every resident. If you go out and ask, 'Are you here illegally?' they are going to run," said Kenneth Prewitt, who directed the Census Bureau during the 2000 census.

Prewitt said the public already is suspicious of government workers knocking on their doors and asking personal questions. Those suspicions are amplified among illegal immigrants, even though personal information collected by Census Bureau is private by law.

Prewitt said immigration officials informally agreed to cooperate with the Census Bureau during the 2000 census by not conducting any large-scale raids.

"If they had a reason to think it was important to carry out an action, they would have done so," Prewitt said. "But they did offer to cooperate as much as possible so they didn't create a climate of fear. They did not carry out any major raids."

Reilly, the immigration enforcement spokeswoman, said she could not confirm any informal agreements to scale back enforcement during the 2000 census.

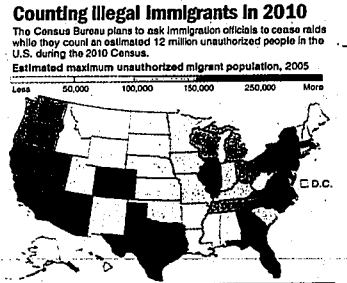

# Army says stress of war is boosting suicides

WASHINGTON — It's not just the war. Or the hardship of being far from home. Often it's the age-old, heartbreaking "Dear John" notes from wives and sweethearts that drive soldiers to suicide.

Love and marriage problems were cited Thursday as the main reasons for the record rate of suicides in an Army stretched and stressed by two simultaneous wars.

Announcing a new report on suicides, officials said nearly a third of 99 committed in 2006 were among soldiers serving in Iraq and Afghanistan at the time of their deaths. Iraq

accounted for the overwhelming number of those — 27 of the 30. About half the Army suicides last year, the most since the first Iraq war, in 1991, were soldiers who hadn't reached their 25th birthdays.

And the primary factor in 70 percent to 80 percent of the cases was "failed intimate relationships, failed marriages,"

said Col. Elspeth Ritchie, psychiatric consultant to the Army surgeon general.

"Very often a young soldier gets a 'Dear John' or 'Dear Jane' e-mail and then takes his weapon and shoots himself," she explained.

Ritchie told a Pentagon news

conference that although the military is worried about the stress caused by repeat deployments and tours of duty that have been stretched to 15 months, it has not found a direct relationship between suicides and combat or deployment.


"However, we do know that frequent deployments put a

real strain on relationships, especially on marriages," she said. "So we believe that part of the increase is related to the increased stress in relationships."

The report resonated on Army bases and among war supporters and critics around the nation.

"It can get pretty depressing

even when you're not in harm's way," said Sgt. Catherine Bishop, a 25-year-old from Heading, Pa., who serves in the 10th Mountain Division and returned from Iraq in May. "You're away from home, you have to put your life on hold. I know soldiers whose marriages have broken up or who couldn't pay their bills."

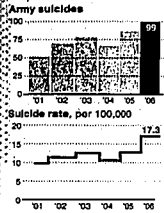



Ninety-nine U.S. Army soldiers killed themselves last year, the highest suicide rate in 26 years, a report found.





NASA decides no shuttle repairs needed

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — NASA decided Thursday that no repairs are needed for a damage in Endeavour's belly and the space shuttle is safe to fly home.

Mission Control notified the seven shuttle astronauts of the decision right before they went to sleep, putting an end to a week of engineering analyses and anxious uncertainty — both in orbit and on Earth.

"Please pass along our thanks for all the hard work," radioed Endeavour's commander, Scott Kelly.

Mission Control replied, "It's great we finally have a decision and we can press forward."

The astronauts had spent much of the day running through the never-before-attempted repair methods, just in case they were ordered.

After meeting for five hours, mission managers opted Thursday night against any risky spacewalk repairs, after receiving the results of one final thermal test. The massive amount of data indicated Endeavour would suffer no serious structural damage during next week's re-entry.

Temporary jump in U.S. troop levels expected

WASHINGTON — The number of U.S. troops in Iraq could jump to 171,000 this fall, a record high for the war, as military leaders expect stepped-up insurgent attacks timed to a progress report from American commanders in Baghdad.

Army Lt. Gen. Carter Ham, director for operations for the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said Thursday the planned rotations of five brigades moving out of Iraq and their replacements coming in will create the temporary increase in U.S. forces.

Once the transitions are complete, Ham said the troop level will drop back down to about 162,000, which is where it is today. He said current plans are to stay about at that number into early next year, unless commanders recommend in their report next month a reduction in forces.

Gen. David Petraeus, the top U.S. commander in Iraq, and Ambassador Ryan Crocker are expected to provide a progress report to President Bush and Congress before Sept. 15. They, as well as Defense Secretary Robert Gates and Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice, are likely to testify before Congress on the report and any recommendations on troop levels.

Congress has pressed the administration to begin drawing troops out of Iraq.

Giuliani tells questioner 'leave my family alone'

DERRY — Republican Rudy Giuliani said Thursday that people should "leave my family alone" when asked by a New Hampshire woman why the presidential candidate should expect loyalty from voters when he doesn't get it from his children.

Giuliani has a daughter who has indicated support for Democrat Barack Obama and a son who said he didn't speak to his father for some time. His ugly divorce from their mother, Donna Hanover, was waged publicly while Giuliani was mayor of New York. Giuliani has since remarried.

Answering questions at a town-hall meeting, Giuliani was asked why he should expect loyalty from GOP voters when his children aren't backing him.

"I love my family very, very much and will do anything for them. There are complexities in every family in America," Giuliani said calmly and quietly. "The best thing I can say is kind of, 'Leave my family alone, just like I'll leave your family alone.'"

His comments were greeted with a smattering of applause from the audience of about 120 people. Giuliani urged them to judge him based on his performance as mayor and a federal prosecutor, and

he launched into a list of his successes such as reducing crime and welfare and prosecuting organized crime figures and drug dealers.

TEXAS

Erin brings torrential rain to parts of Texas

HOUSTON — Tropical Storm Erin remnants soaked a rain-weary state Thursday, inundating intersections and shutting down freeway ramps ahead of rush hour and killing

at least one person as the thunderstorms moved into soggy central Texas.

In the Atlantic, Hurricane Dean strengthened to a Category 2 storm as it moved closer to islands in the eastern Caribbean, the National Hurricane Center said. Hurricane warnings were issued for some islands, and a tropical storm watch was issued for the U.S. Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico.

At 5 p.m. EDT, the Atlantic season's first hurricane had top sustained winds of 100 mph, up from 90 mph earlier

in the day. Dean's center should be near the Lesser Antilles early Friday, forecasters said.

INDIA

Wildlife groups create ID cards for elephants

NEW DELHI — Wildlife groups have created individual photo identification cards for wild elephants in southern India to help track the effects of poaching, conservationists said Thursday.

By being able to specifically identify animals, researchers get a better idea of elephant numbers and movements in an area. It can also help law enforcement in the event that an elephant carcass is discovered, said the New-York based Wildlife Conservation Society, which is working with several Indian groups on the effort.

The project focused on male elephants because "unlike African elephants, where both males and females have tusks, only male Asian elephants have valuable tusks, so they are specifically







targeted by poachers," said WCS researcher Varun Goswami, the main author of the study.


Goswami said the researchers recently took more than 2,400 photographs of 134 elephants in reserves in the Indian state of Karnataka. Using the pictures, scientists recorded data such as tusk length, thickness, angle, arrangement, as well as other characteristics like ear shape, shoulder height, tail length, and scars, the statement said.

Camaraderie, confidence, and a cause: Group of women climbs mountains

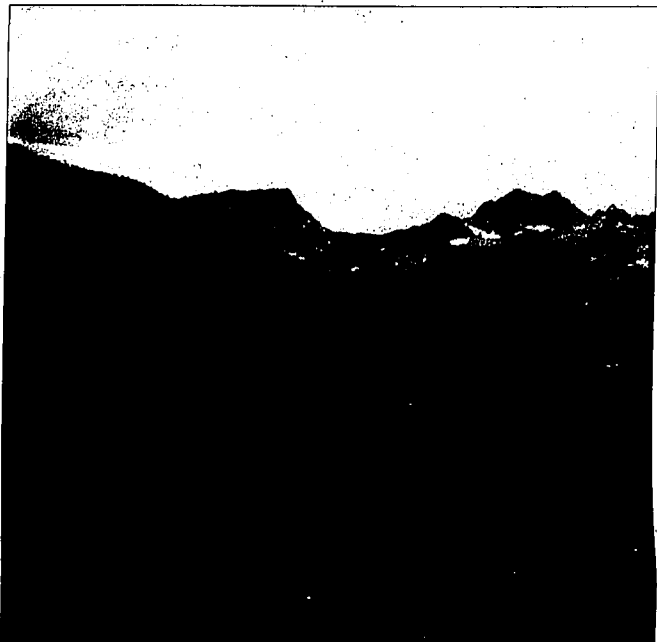
I pulled the dirt filled socks from my feet, gently peeling away duct tape wrapped between my toes and around the backs of my ankles. It had worked beautifully protecting my once tender skin from blisters. After nearly three months of hiking, my feet now felt like pumice stone. I stepped in the shower and watched mountain dust run in tiny streams off my legs and down the drain. Hot water washed away sticky sweat and soothed my aching knees. This had become a Saturday evening ritual.

I felt relieved, knowing there would be no more waking up at 4 a.m. on Saturdays. I also felt emotionally deflated, knowing the weekly laugh attacks were finished. The final hike was a celebration. We altered our plans. Instead of roping off and donning helmets to climb Horstmann, we agreed that a gentler 12-mile hike better suited our weary bodies. We splashed across Red Fish Lake in the water taxi and, in similar fashion to the previous six weeks, divided into groups and headed up the switchbacks.

The purpose of climbing mountains varied for each woman. For me it was to rediscover my life's passion — playing outdoors. Other Seven Peaks in Seven Weeks' participants began climbing mountains this spring because of the physical and emotional challenges climbing presented.

For Celia Charland, reaching the summits was a triumph and a tribute. "The challenge," she said, "was to see if I could do it, push myself. I thought it would be a good thing to do for my 50th summer, to be strong and healthy and live well." Her weekly determination, like many others, was inspired in part from personal tragedy. "On a personal note," Celia added, "my sister was diagnosed with cancer when she was 50 and died at the age of 52 so I wanted '50' to look a little different for

## Plenty of sage grouse means the hunt goes on as scheduled

Yes, there will be a Sage Grouse season in spite of the dearth of cover in the southwestern part of the state; after a range fire west of the Diamond D Ranch (the Murphy Complex) devoured 650,000 acres of sage land.

"Lots and lots and lots of sage grouse were displaced," said Kelton Hatch, Idaho State Fish & Game Regional Conservation Educator. This fire destroyed leks (breeding grounds), but the population of grouse is established in the spring, when those leks were intact. "There was a good hatch, and assuming that many of the grouse relocated, the population of birds should remain substantial south of the Snake River."

The limit south of the Snake River is one bird per day, but north of the Snake River there is a two-bird limit per day. However, "the northern region," Hatch said, "shows a slight reduction in sage grouse populations. The cause is not known. Speculation persists that it is due to West Nile, but Hatch cautioned that nothing has been substantiated."

In addition to ongoing field assessments and wing

studies, Idaho Fish and Game received a grant from AmeriCorp to study sage grouse. That fieldwork is headed by Ed Papenberg, who last spring asked for volunteers to help locate leks and other sage grouse data.

"I had 26 volunteers," Papenberg said, "who put in 600 volunteer hours and drove 6,950 miles. They located 134 leks."

It is evident Papenberg is grateful for the help and is content with the results, although the study is far from over. The field study — supervised by Randy Smith, a Regional Wildlife Biologist for Idaho Fish and Game — must continue. It's not just good management practice; it provides important information to the upland bird hunters.

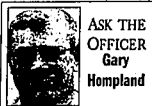

**Use of artificial water sources to aid hunt a gray area**

**Question:** "I've been looking for a place to hunt during the archery antelope season and have noticed several livestock water troughs being used by the top. The ranchers have removed their cattle and some of the troughs are running out of water. Can I haul water to keep the trough full and then place my hunting blind nearby?"

**Answer:** Locating a natural water source such as a spring or stream that is frequented by game is a lawful and often a successful technique for archery big game hunting.

When relying on the attraction of man-made water sources such as livestock water troughs for hunting antelope can also be lawful under certain circumstances.

The definition of bait is: "any substance placed to attract big game animals, except liquid scent for deer and elk."

Putting water in a stock trough would constitute an unlawful bait if it was done solely as an attraction for hunting.

Hunting over a water trough used as a legitimate part of a livestock operation provide water for cattle or sheep in the area is lawful.

A hunter hauling water to a stock trough to entice antelope within bow range is quite different from hunting over a stock trough containing water for livestock. In one case, the hunter manipulates the water to his advantage to attract game for hunting. In the other case the water trough is used for legitimate livestock management and an animal distribution. In the second case, the hunter cannot manipulate the attraction, in this case water.

Generally, the use of bait to attract game for the purposes of hunting is unlawful except by Commission Rule for black bears. There are also well known state and federal rules that prohibit the use of bait for hunting waterfowl and game birds.

Most violations in the past have focused food or mineral baits. Only recently, with the extreme dry conditions, have rules about hauling water as an attraction or enticement been explored and discussed as bait.

If you are hauling water to a stock trough or water device to attract or entice antelope within bow hunting range, then you are unlawfully baiting antelope.

**The Cordwood Canyon of Sailor Creek**

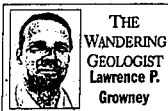
Follow 3700 N west to the V intersection just over one mile past Balanced Rock and take the gravel fork to the left. This is identified as Balanced Rock Road on some maps. Proceed approximately six miles beyond this intersection, where the road drops into the shallow canyon of Sailor Creek.

As the road continues up and around the hill out of the canyon, a poor dirt road just beyond the curve takes you back down to the stream channel. Park just above the channel at the south end of the makeshift basalt dam, and walk down the dirt road that parallels the stream.

This road takes you through a monotonous and nondescript landscape of rounded, moderately steep, grass-covered slopes developed on the rhyolite ashflows of this area. The monotony is occasionally interrupted by small, dark reddish brown, thinly-layered rhyolite outcrops along the channel. The monotony of the terrain is broken about one mile from the parking spots when, rounding a corner, one can see that the stream has cut into a larger outcrop of thinly layered rhyolite about 50 feet high, exposed for about 120 yards along the north side of the channel.

The plates of rhyolite in this outcrop are nearly horizontal. As a result, the stream, over time, has produced a number of flat-topped pinnacles separated by a dense slope cover of rhyolite plates that conjure up the impression of collapsed cords of firewood. This location is rather dramatic, not only because of the abundance of rhyolite plates, but even more so, because of the unstable appearance of the remaining outcrops. Some of these features look ready to collapse at any moment. Others are actually unraveling and falling apart.

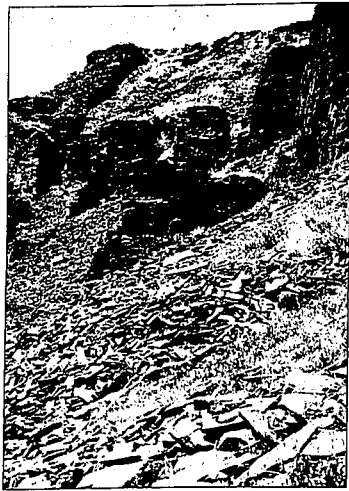
This pattern of disaggregation, and the longevity of the rhyolite ashflow itself, is due to the nature of the ash cloud that formed the rock and the topography over which it was deposited. Rhyolite is a more viscous igneous material. So when a dense, ground-hugging blanket of the material flowed across a fairly level

surface, the ash cloud — as it cooled from the bottom up — was able to form layer upon layer of nearly horizontal, thin sheets. To visualize this, consider the example of a deck of playing cards sliding slowly across a table. When the bottom card stops, the one above continues moving for a moment before it, too, stops. In the ashflow, the process would continue until the entire ashflow hardened, creating a stack of thin plates. As the plates were forming, the portion of the ash cloud that had not yet hardened continued to move slowly across the surface of the underlying layer so that a fracture, or zone of weakness, formed in the plate, formed above and below each plate. Over time, weathering focused on the weak areas between the plates creating the separations seen in the outcrop.

Since the plates lie horizontally, the outcrop has persisted for as long as it has. If the plates had been tilted, either when formed or sometime later, the outcrop would have fallen apart fairly quickly and all we would see today would be a long, smooth grassy slope as can be found elsewhere along the shallow canyon.

to petition for the sage grouse to be placed on the Endangered Species list. If accomplished, it would affect sage grouse hunting altogether.

Fortunately for Idaho bird hunters, the information being collected at check stations and wing barrels, and gathered by Papenberg and his volunteers is positive. It shows that, at present, Idaho's overall sage grouse population is on the rise.

"Last year," according to Hatch, "the barrels contain 30 percent adult and 70 percent young wings. This data indicates that there was a healthy hatch last year."

This increase in sage grouse and the recent fire may cause the population density of some areas to increase, yet some birds will look for a suitable habitat in their primary areas: draws and patches of sage brush that were left behind, and so on. Abnormal concentrations of birds will certainly affect hunter behavior. There will be more hunters in areas where birds have relocated. This congestion will test manners and cooperation.

It is also likely there will be more Fish & Game officers about, "since there is less need for them to patrol the burned areas," Hatch said.

Cardinality must be the rule for hunters.

Besides the abnormal conditions caused by the burn, there are still other factors with which the Fish & Game has to contend.

"In the northern region, we are seeing a few cases of hunters posing public land," Hatch said. "It's an increasing

It's always advisable to distinguish private from public land. Knowing the boundaries for private land can be difficult in wide-open range, but it's the hunter's responsibility. The same goes for public land. The Bureau of Land Management and Forest Service have maps for sale that delineate reasonable boundary lines between private and public lands. Such maps are handy tools when hunting upland birds.

Don't mope or worry. Sage grouse hunting will be good, and good for the pup you have on a leash waiting to be turned loose on the strong and tested sent of a sage grouse flock.

## Northern Idaho town battles hungry deer

FERNAN VILLAGE (AP) — Residents of northern Idaho's tiny Fernan Village enjoy the local's easy access to nearby forests and lovely neighborhood landscaping.

But so does a herd of hungry deer, and that's a problem.

The increasingly bold herd of deer regularly browses on ornamental shrubs and plants, and townsfolk are getting tired of it. So the Idaho Fish and Game Department has given preliminary approval to the town's plan to trap and relocate the animals.

The agency has agreed to loan the town net traps and a horse trailer, but when it comes to actually wrestling the deer out of the nets and into the trailer, the roughly 200 Fernan Village residents are on their own.

"It's worse than a lacrosse match," Fish and Game Department employee Mark Taylor told the *Spokane-Review*. "In fact, it's much the same gear when you're dealing with deer."

If the community's effort is successful, the Fish and Game Department may use its plan as a model for other towns grappling with burgeoning deer herds, Taylor said.

The trap-and-move plan isn't Fernan Village's first attempt at controlling the animals. Earlier this year the town passed an ordinance banning feeding of wildlife.

"Fernan stepped up to the plate," Taylor said. "People ought to quit feeding them."

Trapping could begin this winter, once the Fish and Game Department holds a meeting to hear from residents, Taylor said. If there's enough support for the plan, the agency will train volunteers.

Once trapped, the deer would be taken to forested public land far from Fernan or other towns, though the exact spot has not been chosen, he said.

Trapping and relocating deer isn't easy for humans or the deer. Some biologists think a better answer is hiring sharpshooters or extending hunting seasons, but town leaders fear lethal methods would spark an outcry. Fernan Councilwoman Mary Ann Tierney said,

"Everybody would think we're killing Bambi," she said. "In her own town, Tierney uses a motion-detector device attached to a lawn sprinkler to scare away deer, but the device doesn't work in winter. Even shooting the animals away has little effect.

"They just stand there and look at me," she said. "It used to be exciting to see deer. Now when I see them I just think, 'Oh boy.'"

Last year, the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife approved a special archery hunt to help control an urban deer herd in Clarkston. The ongoing drought in the region is sending more deer into rural and suburban towns in search of food, but the agency has no plans to trap or move deer, spokeswoman Madonna Luers said. Hunting will remain the tool of choice.

"We're not shuffling deer around. It's way too spendy," she said. "There's too much risk involved in handling large animals. Whitetails are incredibly feisty when you trap them."

Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks Department spokesman Tom Palmer said later this month the state will consider an proposal from Helena officials to have sharpshooters kill 334 mule deer inside city limits. Game wardens in that city have shot several deer in recent years because of reported aggressive behavior.

## Sheep rancher seeks peace with wolves

KETCHUM — It's about as thickly populated by wolves as anywhere in the region, but environmentally conscious sheep producer Lava Lake Land & Livestock is developing a track record of minimal conflicts in and around the rugged Boulder Mountains of Central Idaho.

The methods are varied, but the gist remains. The huge Hatley-based sheep producer has not lost sheep to wolves since 2005 when 25 sheep and a guard dog were killed in two consecutive nights. The sheep were killed northwest of Ketchum on the North Fork of the Big Lost River in the eastern Boulder Mountains.

Lava Lake President Mike Stevens said the developing track record is, in part, due to preventative measures the company is taking to minimize the number of dead sheep and, therefore, dead wolves.

"It's an issue of how can we coexist," he said.

The summer of 2002 marked the first time Lava had experienced sheep depredation by wolves. At the time, ranch managers believed they were on the far southern perimeter of wolf country.

"In our minds the wolves were somewhere else," Stevens said.

But a three-night period changed that. Lava Lake lost 16 ewes and lambs in the Muldoon Creek area north of Carey.

"I really had no idea what it was," said Stevens, a former biologist with The Nature Conservancy of Idaho. The huge ranching operation has created out of several sheep outfits bought in 2000 by San Francisco couple Brian and Kathleen Bean. The ranch's holdings include the 24,000-acre Lava Lake National grazing privileges on 730,000 acres of public land allotments that range among the Boulder and Pioneer mountains as well as on the Snake River Plain.

The summer of 2005 in the North Fork of the Big Lost was the last time the ranching operation lost sheep to wolves. "That was obviously extremely upsetting," Stevens said of the 25 lost sheep and guard dog.

Working with U.S. Department of Agriculture Wildlife Services agent Rick Williamson since 2002, Lava Lake ranchers and biologists instituted a number of preventative measures in an attempt to avert additional depredations and avoid lethal control measures for the wolves.

Among the measures is arming shepherders with radio telemetry equipment they use to monitor the movements of nearby wolves. In many cases, including this year, herders have detected wolves within less than a quarter mile of the sheep, Stevens said.

Under Williamson's tutelage, Lava Lake also brought on additional guard dogs for the North Fork band they use to graze 200 ewes. The arming herders with single-barrel shotguns loaded with non-lethal "cracker shells" and rubber bullets. The purpose with cracker shells is to either scare off wolves with a loud overhead shot, or with rubber bullets to scare them off with a painful but not deadly direct shot.

The best way to use this method is to wait to shoot until a wolf sees the sheep, Stevens said. Under such a scenario, a wolf will hopefully

turn and run away with a newly conditioned association of sheep and pain.

"They learn that they just don't want to be in the vicinity of a sheep band," Stevens said.

Another preventative measure Lava Lake uses is an electrified night pen, which is a square-shaped, half-acre enclosure composed of 3-foot-tall fiberglass poles and a single strand of electrified metal wire. Hanging from solar-powered electrical wires are 1.5-foot-long red ribbons called turbo-flicks.

The modern night pens borrow from a centuries-old practice herders in Mongolia used to control wolf success, Stevens said. Because the vast majority of sheep depredations happen after nightfall, Lava Lake shepherders use the pens to control the band of some 1,000 ewes into the enclosure at dusk.

Asked Tuesday if the North Fork band had considered requiring grazers to institute similar preventative measures to keep wolves away from livestock, Ketchum District Ranger Kevin Nelson said such a policy decision would have to come from a much higher level in the U.S. Forest Service than the district level, he said.

Still, Nelson said local forest officials do encourage livestock producers grazing Sawtooth National Forest land to consider the impact of their operation on carnivore species. They also ask grazers to institute sound grazing practices like the removal and burial of sheep carcasses, he said.

Since their last incident in 2005, Lava Lake has successfully grazed sheep in the North Fork area, but knowing full well that wolves were actively using the same area, Stevens said. Of all the ranch's federal grazing allotments, the North Fork is the most actively used wolf country.

Several hours after daybreak on July 27, Stevens discussed his company's approach to grazing in wolf country while standing within sight of smoke-shrouded Kent and Ryan peaks near the headwaters of the North Fork of the Big Lost River. The isolated mountain valley falls within the Salmon-Challis National Forest's North Fork allotment.

It's also prime wolf habitat. Standing with Stevens were Vilcapoma and Orihuele. Vilcapoma has been grazing sheep in the North Fork Big Lost area for 13 years and is in charge of keeping watch over Lava Lake's North Fork band, Orihuele said.

Assigned to the North Fork band to provide an extra eye for the remainder of the 2007 grazing season.

Friday morning, Vilcapoma picked up signals from several radio-collared wolves using a handheld radio telemetry receiver provided to Lava Lake by Defenders of Wildlife, a

national nonprofit dedicated to preventing conflicts between wolves and people by supporting the use of preventative measures. Frequencies emitted by different radio collars not only indicate a wolf's position, but also its direction of travel.

Private parties like Lava Lake also use radio telemetry to monitor wolves in Idaho's forests and rangeland must first acquire the correct frequencies for individual wolves from the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

One of the signals Vilcapoma detected Friday came from the radio collar of a wolf belonging to the Phantom Hill wolf pack, which dened last spring north of Ketchum in the Big Lost area. The wolf's detection was somewhat surprising, Stevens said, because the pack's home range is considered to be farther west. A Phantom Hill wolf on the errand was what radio telemetry signals can bounce off terrain features such as high peaks, Stevens said.

But the presence of a preventative measure Lava Lake has used is a last resort decision to simply remove sheep from a grazing allotment if a case arises.

Earlier this year, the company did just that after Idaho Department of Fish and Game biologists confirmed the presence of a wolf dening a wolf pack, the Wood River Valley's first documented denning pair since the 1995 reintroduction. Rather than worry about the wolf dening the pack and its three pups within the North Fork Boulder grazing allotment, Lava Lake chose to forgo grazing the area this season.

While the company has built into its business plan the flexibility to move sheep around, the rangers do have limits, Stevens admitted. He is keenly aware that his company's run of good luck could end in as little as one night, and it's not lost on Stevens that his operation is atypical.

The organization has vast grazing privileges on a variety of public land allotments, and that gives it management flexibility. Moreover, the fundamental business model for the operation is to provide both grazing and foraging for a large livestock operation and the opportunity to have a significant impact on conservation," says the company's Web site. "Our vision is of a working landscape that is rich with healthy wildlife populations and functioning ecosystems, preserving the wild nature of the land while using it carefully."

From the company's perspective, agreeing to live with wolves is the least it can do in exchange for being granted the right to graze public lands. "Ultimately, it's a business strategy," Stevens said. "We know that it's important to our customers."

However, the Bankruptcy Code specifically identifies inheritances as property of the estate just as if the inheritance had existed on the date your case was filed. The Bankruptcy Court would not approve dismissal because your creditors are entitled to the money in your case. Since Idaho law does not exempt your inheritance, unless Donald's bequest to you will be used to pay the claims of your creditors and to pay administrative expenses of your case. After the expenses and claims are paid, the rest of the money will be returned to you.

## Dell to restate earnings in wake of scandal

SAN FRANCISCO — Dell Inc. said Thursday that it fired and resigned some employees, instituted stricter controls and planned to restate past financial results by up to \$150 million after an internal investigation found the computer maker had manipulated numbers to hit performance targets.

The scandal has dogged Dell and cast doubt on its financial reports since the company disclosed last year that the Securities and Exchange Commission was investigating its accounting practices.

Dell, based in Round Rock, Texas, said the restatement would knock \$50 million to \$150 million from the more than \$12 billion in profit the company had reported over the last four fiscal years.

"This has been a difficult period for our company and employees," said Donald Carry, Dell's chief financial officer.

But analysts and investors who had feared much worse breathed a sigh of relief. Dell shares fell 37 cents to \$25.93 in regular trading, then rose 53 cents to \$26.45 following the announcement.

"This falls on the lower rungs of what could be a problem," said Chuck

Ross, a white-collar criminal-defense lawyer at the New York law firm Charles A. Ross & Associates. "My bet is that the SEC does not sue Dell and doesn't bring regulatory action against them."

Others were less sure.

"It's a scary indication that there could be more out there," said Craig Siro, a forensic accountant at Virchow Krause & Co. "What would concern me is that they didn't find it internally, and they needed the SEC to say something goofy is going on there."

The results of the internal investigation, overseen by Dell's audit committee, were released at a time when Dell

is trying to regain its footing amid turmoil.

Dell said it found evidence that employees, sometimes at the behest or with the knowledge of senior executives, had improperly boosted financial results for their business units to meet quarterly performance objectives.

The internal audit painted a picture of a company that for years understated revenue in some quarters and overstated it in others. The practice, known as "smoothing," helps companies better predict earnings, meet Wall Street's expectations and protect the stock from volatility.

## Countrywide taps \$11.5 billion credit line

NEW YORK — The nation's largest mortgage lender borrowed \$11.5 billion from a group of 40 banks to fund loans in a move that shows just how deep the lending crisis has become.

Countrywide Financial Corp. said Thursday it made the move amid a credit crunch that has driven a number of its smaller peers to bankruptcy. Shares opened down more than 12 percent.

"Countrywide has taken decisive steps which we believe will address the challenges arising in this environment and enable the company to meet its funding needs and continue growing its franchise," Countrywide

President and Chief Operating Officer David Sambol said in a statement.

The credit worries have grown as the secondary market for mortgages all but disappeared in recent weeks. Investors have worried about the value of loans and rising delinquencies and defaults.

Mortgage lenders rely on the secondary markets to borrow money to make more loans. The problems started as subprime mortgages — loans given to customers with poor credit history — started going delinquent and defaulting at faster rates.

The problems have spread to the broader mortgage market, making investors nervous about nearly all types of loans that cannot be purchased by Fannie Mae or Freddie Mac.

## Home construction falls in July to slowest pace in more than a decade

WASHINGTON — Construction of new homes fell to the lowest level in more than a decade in July as builders continued to struggle with the deepest housing slump since 1991.

Although Idaho is slightly above the national average, cumulative five-month reports still show that the state is also experiencing a decline in new home construction.

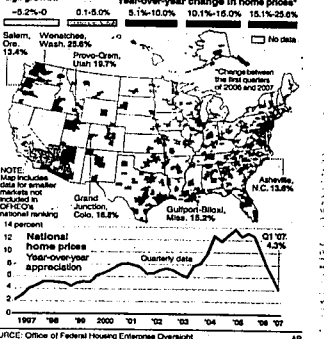
In Twin Falls, construction of new homes and apart-

ments declined 63 percent, or about 190 fewer homes, compared to the same period last year, according to the Idaho Construction Report.

New home construction in Jerome decline 46 percent.

Nationwide, the Commerce Department reported Thursday that construction of new homes and apartments dropped 6.1 percent last month to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 1.38 million units; that was down 20.9 percent from the pace of activity a year ago and represented the slowest pace since January 1997.

Nationwide appreciation in home prices has slowed considerably, but some smaller markets, particularly in the West, continue to have double-digit growth.

# A monk success story: Divine inspiration and a lot of black ink

MONROE COUNTY, Wis. — Nearly a decade ago, a tiny group of monks in this rural stretch of western Wisconsin realized they might have been too successful at following a vow of poverty.

Their income a pittance, their homes desperately in need of repair and with few prospects for help, the six monks of the Cistercian Abbey of Our Lady of Spring Bank prayed for divine intervention — and brainstormed within the brotherhood for businesses they might start.

One day as the Rev. Bernard McCoy was printing out entrepreneurial ideas on the monastery's aging computer, an idea came to him: Ink — for printer cartridges.

Two hundred years ago, our forefathers were charged with making ink and creating the tools for illuminating manuscripts," said McCoy, 40, chief executive of the company they would found. "We figured, 'Why can't we do the same thing now?'" Today, thanks to LaserMonks Inc., which sells computer printing and office supplies over the Internet — the abbey is rich. LaserMonks pulled in about \$4 million in sales last fiscal year, and is expected to reach nearly \$7 million in 2007.

The bounty has raised a strange dilemma. It has allowed the monastery to donate hundreds of thousands of dollars to nonprofit groups around the world. But it also has brought a standard of living that could be seen as excessive — for monks, at least.

They own a plane to take them to the motivational speeches they give around the country to would-be entrepreneurs. They bought two purebred Peruvian Paso horses. They've built a private art studio for one monk with a talent for oil painting, and a well-stocked wood shop for another skilled in sculpture. They've splurged on an elaborate model train set and matching 1200s river town in the basement.

"I don't care whether you're an executive on Wall Street or a monk in the Midwest, the business spirit is like it or not, pretty universal," said Charles Elson, director of the University of Delaware's Weinberg Center for Corporate Governance.

Just because you're a monk, it doesn't mean you're exempt from asking the same questions: How much do you enjoy your success? And how much do you give away to help others?

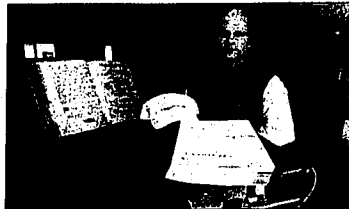
Each morning, around 4, a digital bell gently tolls the two-story, tan-colored abbey, where by windows look out onto rolling hills of emerald-green conifers and dense groves of oak trees.

On the second floor, the monks rise from their rough-hewn beds. Each sleeps inside a modest cell, no bigger than a large walk-in closet. In the dark, the men slip first into casual attire — jeans and button-down shirts on cooler days, shorts and T-shirts when the weather turns warm — and then don their robes. The white tunic, with full sleeves that drape over their hands like fabric bells, is paired with a simple black scapular.

They head downstairs to the abbey's main living area and chapel.

Structuring their days around the credo ora et labora (pray and work), the monks gather eight times a day to chant and pray. In between, they help a trio of lay workers with bookkeeping. They take computer marketing plans and develop customer inquiries about the latest deals on toner.

The entrepreneurial spirit that has driven LaserMonks to success is as innate for Cistercians as their fondness for Gregorian chant. The order historically has been innovative, as members tended to come from well-educated, upper-class families, said E. Rozanne Elder, director of the Institute of Cistercian Studies at Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo. In the Middle Ages, the order engineered water sources to gener-

ate power and create central heating systems. Cistercian monks became renowned for their meticulous hand-copying of religious texts. "Whenever the most up-to-date way to support themselves, they did it," Elder said. "It was thought that no matter how marginal the land or opportunity, through thrift and hard work the Cistercians would make it prosperous."

Such was the case with the Cistercian abbey here in western Wisconsin. The order set up its first monastery in 1928 in Oconomowoc, Wis., about 30 miles west of Milwaukee. Drawn to the region for its rich farmland and strong Catholic community, the monks moved into a manor house and began raising livestock.

But as the area's population grew and nearby Oconomowoc Lake evolved into a popular tourist spot, the monks found it increasingly difficult to find solitude for prayer, McCoy said. In the mid-1980s, a group of monks decided to relocate about 160 miles to the northwest, to a stretch of farmland outside the town of Sparta (population 6,700). They relied heavily on farm leases and renters to pay their bills, and used the profits to buy more real estate around their 600 acres.

But their quarters were far from comfortable. For years, their sanctuary was a double-wide trailer with a leaking roof. Just as they finished work on a new chapel and the first wing of the monastery in 1995, crop prices fell and their rental income dwindled to nearly nothing.

Their options were limited by the small number of men who called the abbey home and could help pull in enough money to pay the bills.

McCoy led his brethren in trying to find a solution. Between prayers, they wandered along the gravel roads that crisscross their farmland and tossed around ideas.

"There are only five of us, ranging in age from 31 to 50, healthy enough to work," McCoy said. (The abbey's sixth monk, retired Abbot Blaise Fuez, 85, lives in a residential nursing facility nearby.) "We didn't have enough hands to do the work and still have time to pray."

It was while McCoy was printing out a list of the proposals that inspiration hit. His printer ran out of ink.

He began comparison shopping on the Internet for a replacement toner cartridge. The prices made him blanch: \$200 or more for one. The most expensive would be nearly enough to cover one-third of the monthly grocery bill.

In fall 2002, the monks launched a Web site and became an online clearinghouse for printer cartridges. Envisioning themselves as a "monkish" version of Amazon.com, they focused on two things: low prices and marketing themselves as trustworthy business folks. With the slogan "Saving You Money, Serving Those In Need," the company

pulled in \$2,000 in Internet sales in fiscal 2002.

Three years later, as the monks expanded to include other office supplies, business furniture and computer laptop accessories, the enterprise grossed more than \$2 million.

Strong, roomy and comfortable, Dodge Ram 2500 pickup features a weight-bearing frame designed to meet and exceed the needs of the heavy-duty truck buyer. With carlike handling behind the wheel, brute-force strength at the draw bar and plenty of room for up to three large adults, Dodge is in its "take no prisoners" mode.

Last year, Dodge gave the Ram 2500 a freshened exterior look and redesigned interior amenities. Exterior changes included a new front fascia; fully chrome grille, larger headlamps, new fenders and wheels.

The 2500 Regular Cab body is offered in ST, SRT, Sport, Power Wagon and TRX1 Off-Road trim levels and available in two- or four-wheel drive configurations. The long (8 ft) cargo bed is the only cargo bed available for the Regular Cab.

Base power for the big Ram pickup is generated by a 5.7L HEMI V8 engine. A Cummins 5.9L six-cylinder High Output turbo diesel was an available option (until January, 2007).

The big news is the availability of an all-new 6.7L Cummins I-6 turbo diesel engine that became available earlier this year. The new 6.7L Cummins Turbo Diesel engine features life-to-major-overhaul intervals of 350,000 miles, providing more than a 100,000-mile advantage over the competition, as well as standard duty oil change intervals of 7,500 miles.

Torque is communicated to the ground through a choice of gearboxes: Getrag G56 six-speed manual, 48RE four-speed automatic with overdrive and a new 68RFE Orion six-speed automatic transmission for the new Cummins motor.

On the road, the Ram 2500 equipped with the Cummins turbo-diesel engine is strong and responsive. Despite all that power at the ready, the large Dodge truck is actually

quite easy to drive with above average road manners.

Maximum capability are the watchwords in this segment - and the Dodge starts with a robust chassis that features a full-length, hydroformed heavy-duty frame. The frame utilizes stiff "boxed" sections - resulting in reduced NVH (noise, vibration and harshness) characteristics. Improved steering and handling precision. Other benefits of the hydroformed, boxed frame

# THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Reaching seven hearts is the easy part of today's deal; making it is the challenge. Almost any line you follow will need trumps 3-2, but you can try to set up either hand.

The critical question is whether to try to ruff your hand good or to ruff dummy good. In this situation you should first ask yourself which hand will be easier to access after taking the ruffs and drawing trumps. Normally, that is the stronger hand. You must also ask yourself how many ruffs it will take to set up one hand. In this case it looks as if you need two ruffs to set up your hand, and two or three to set up dummy.

Since indications point both ways, let's project the play if you win the lead in hand, take the diamond ace, ruff a diamond, then play the spade ace and ruff a spade. Now you lead your last trump to dummy and draw trumps. This line needs diamonds to be 4-3, about a 60 percent chance.

Let's look at winning the opening heart lead in dummy, followed by the club ace and a club ruff. If everyone follows, you draw another trump, ruff a club high, cash the diamond and spade aces, ruff a spade to hand, and draw the last trump. Now your hand is high.

This line needs only to find clubs 3-2, a 70 percent chance, so it looks like the better approach.

**ANSWER:** In second seat, where your pre-empt should be close to flawless, it seems wrong to me to open three clubs. In third seat a pre-empt is the next best thing to automatic, and in first chair at favorable vulnerability I might also pre-empt. Here, though, the hearts look just too good to shut out by opening three clubs or four clubs, so I would pass relatively.

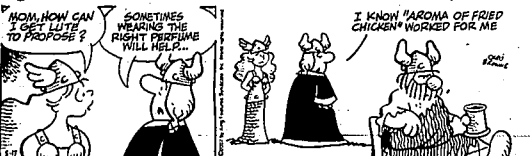

In 1985, more than 1,400 meatpackers walked off the job at the Geo. A. Hormel and Company's main plant in Austin, Minn., in a bitter strike that lasted just over a year.

In 1987, Rudolf Hess, the last member of Adolf Hitler's inner circle, died at Spandau Prison at age 93, an apparent suicide.

In 1995, the Reform Party

announced. Ross Perot had won its nomination to be its first-ever presidential candidate.

# Man pleads guilty in glass-eating scheme; says he and his wife needed the money

**BOSTON (AP)** — A man pleaded guilty Wednesday to his role in a multistate scheme in which prosecutors say he and his wife intentionally ate glass at restaurants and collected more than \$200,000 in compensation.

Ronald Evano, 49, pleaded guilty to 20 federal counts, including conspiracy, mail fraud, wire fraud and identity theft. Prosecutors dropped four counts of identity fraud and health care fraud in the plea agreement.

Prosecutors say Evano and his wife, Mary, filed fraudulent insurance claims worth more than \$200,000, collected more

than \$200,000 and left a trail of unpaid medical bills totaling more than \$100,000 in several states between 1997 and 2005.

Prosecutors said the two were treated at hospitals for glass ingestions at 18 Boston-area hospitals. They collected payments from insurance companies but never paid their hospital bills. In one instance, they took a \$45,000 payment directly from a restaurant.

An arrest warrant was issued last year for Mary Evano on the same charges as her husband. She is still being sought.

Evano said in court that he and his wife ate the glass

because they needed money. "We would go to a restaurant, and I'd say I had glass in my food," Evano said. "Then I would go to the hospital and say I was in pain."

Over the years, one or both claimed to have eaten glass establishments in Braintree and Quincy, Mass.; Bethesda and Gaithersburg, Md.; Washington, D.C.; Providence, R.I.; and Midlothian, Va. The couple used false names, Social Security numbers and identity cards.

Evano is in custody and is to be sentenced next month. He could receive up to 100 years in prison.
