## Burned body found in Hailey

Victim may be missing 16-year-old Hispanic girl

**HAILEY** — The body of a girl was found at about 7:24 a.m. Friday in front of a trash bin near a home construction site at 3250 Mountain Ash Rd.

She is believed to be a 16-year-old Hispanic girl who was missing from her home in Hailey Friday morning.

Police said the body, which was badly burned, will have to be identified through dental records today in a scheduled autopsy in Boise.

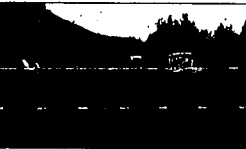
A multi-agency task force including the Blaine County Sheriff's Office, Hailey Police

Department and the Idaho State Police has been formed to investigate the death. Blaine County Sheriff Walt Felling said there were no suspects in the case at this time.

The body was removed Friday afternoon and investigators were still working to identify possible evidence at the scene.

There is currently no information regarding the cause of death, or what leads officers are investigating.

The task force is requesting anyone with information of suspicious activity in the South Woodside area of Hailey late Thursday or early Friday to contact Detective Steve Hankins of the Blaine County Sheriff's Office at 788-5515, or Jeff Gunter from the Hailey Police Department at 788-3531.

## Miner rescue effort suspended indefinitely

**HUNTINGTON, Utah** — After 10 days of setbacks, nerve-jangling "bumps" and a second mine collapse that killed three workers trying to rescue their comrades, authorities Friday conceded defeat to a mountain that appeared to be slowly crumbling.

"Is there any possible way we can continue this underground operation and provide safety for the rescue

workers? At this point we don't have an answer," federal Mine Safety and Health Administration chief Richard Stickley said as he announced that officials had suspended the rescue operation indefinitely.

## School districts work to fill teacher vacancies

**TWIN FALLS** — Despite schools in Idaho facing a hard market for teachers, the Twin Falls School District should start the year with only a couple of possible vacancies in its teaching staff, administrators said Friday.

Sonia DeLeon, the district's human relations specialist, said she expects empty positions for a high school special education teacher and an elementary counselor to be filled within the next week, despite difficulties statewide in finding

educators in those areas.

Teachers for special education, math and science have been hard to find for some time, and this year elementary school teachers joined that list, Twin Falls Superintendent Wiley Dobbs said. It's the first time since he joined the district that elementary teachers were scarce, he said, and he's even talking to Idaho State University about placing one or two interns in classrooms to help out for 12 to 16 weeks.

Two junior high teachers weren't hired until Tuesday, DeLeon said. In all, the district hired 46 teachers for the coming

school year, which for Twin Falls begins on Aug. 27.

Patricia O'Dell, the district's new associate superintendent, said math and science teachers are increasingly lured away by higher salaries in related fields and special ed teachers suffer from high burnout rates. The shortages are more than a regional problem.

"It's become pretty apparent in recent years that we as a state are facing a teacher shortage," she said.

State efforts, such as Increasing Base

## Sali apologizes for remarks about Muslim colleague

**BOISE** — U.S. Rep. Bill Sali has apologized to a Muslim colleague for remarks suggesting the nation's founders never intended for Muslims to serve in Congress.

In the interview with the Christian-based American Family News Network, Sali, a Republican freshman from Idaho's 1st District, referred to his U.S. House colleague

Rep. Keith Ellison, D-Minn., who last fall became the first Muslim elected to Congress.

The Aug. 6 report also includes Sali questioning the wisdom of Senate leaders, who last month invited a Hindu clergyman to give the morning prayer in the chamber.

"I have not only a Hindu prayer being offered in the Senate, we have a Muslim member of the House of Representatives now," Sali is quoted as saying on the network's Web site.

"Those are changes, and they are not what was envisioned by the Founding Fathers."

The comments sparked criticism from liberal bloggers and Idaho Democrats. A former Idaho Democratic congressman called for Sali to either apologize or resign.

Sali responded days later, sending Ellison an e-mail explaining he meant no offense.

## IDWR extends moratorium on geothermal pumps near Twin Falls

**TWIN FALLS** — It'll be at least five more years before Twin Falls' buildings are warmed by geothermal heat.

The Idaho Department of Water Resources decided Friday to extend a moratorium

on geothermal pumping — drawing warm, underground water to heat buildings or create energy — in a 140-square-mile area near Twin Falls. The ruling means the power of geothermal waters, lauded by environmentalists and scientists as a clean way to produce energy, won't be tapped in Twin Falls

for another half-decade.

The area has been under a moratorium since 1997, when scientists discovered the geothermal groundwater system was losing artesian pressure. The moratorium has been extended four times since — in 1992, 1997 and 2002 — including Friday.

The College of Southern Idaho asked IDWR in June to extend the moratorium again, so more data could be collected. Aquifer conditions, says IDWR, have not changed since the moratorium was last extended in 2002, though data from the past 20 years indicate the rate of artesian pressure is

slowing. Artesian pressure exists when an underground water system is tapped down slope from its source. The more taps below the source, the lower the pressure.

Other parts of Idaho tap geothermal water. A geothermal power plant is under construction near Malta, where steam

will power turbines to create electricity. Communities in the Treasure Valley, including Boise, use geothermal heat to warm buildings during winter.

The Twin Falls moratorium will last until Sept. 1, 2012. Any petition for reconsideration or exceptions to IDWR's decision must be filed before Aug. 31.

salaries to \$31,000 and creating a three-year interim teaching certificate for out-of-state teachers, have both O'Neil said. But the problem still persists, and districts in the area regularly share their candidate pools if they have problems filling a position.

Shoshone Superintendent Mel Wiseman said he thinks fewer students are getting degrees in education, depleting the ranks of potential teachers. His district is missing one middle-school teacher this year, though other teachers have shifted internally to cover for the vacancy.

Kimberly, Superintendent John Garner said one of his district's ads used to get 20 to 30 responses. Now, it'll produce about six.

"You still find quality people," he said, "but instead of 10 really good people, you may have two."

The fault, Garner said, is with the compensation. More

and more people looking for teaching jobs are drawn to nearby states with higher pay, such as Nevada, he said.

"If people aren't tied here, they aren't going to come here," he said.

Even administrators aren't sticking around, though Dobbs said the Twin Falls School Board is considering replacing current one-year contracts with those lasting for two years to make the positions more attractive.

In other Twin Falls School District news:

Twin Falls school board members gave first approval to the contracts for new teachers and administrators at its board meeting Monday. Brady Dickinson, recently named vice-principal of Robert Stuart Junior High, served as the negotiator for the Twin Falls Educators' Association this year and said negotiations went smoothly.

"It was not a controversial year," he said. "We were very

happy with the way and the spirit of the negotiations this year."

District Superintendent Wiley Dobbs agreed, saying his teachers seem to be content at the moment.

"We're very busy right now, but I'm sensing a great feeling from around our district," Dobbs said.

Teacher satisfaction partly results from a change in the format of the negotiations, Dickinson said. But it's also due to the fact that any salary frustrations are directed at the state and not the district, he said.

"Our biggest frustration is the artificial base created by the state," he said. "People were happy this year that the state did come forward with money for increases."

Teachers will vote on the 2007-08 contract on Friday, after which it will return to the School Board for final approval at its Aug. 29 meeting.

"He said that he wanted to make sure that Congressman Ellison understood that he meant no harm or disrespect," Sali spokesman Wayne Hoffman said.

Hoffman declined to release a copy of the e-mail, saying it was a private communication.

Ellison is traveling outside the country, but his spokesman said the congressman typically doesn't take such remarks personally.

"We will take him to his word," Rick Iacuri said Friday. "That would be in keeping

with Kellie and the other-check mortality. He figures if someone has a bad day, chooses their words poorly, we'll give them the benefit of the doubt."

A spokesman for a national Islamic civil rights group said the organization is satisfied with Sali's response.

"Obviously we wish it hadn't occurred in the first place," said Ibrahim Hooper, of the Council on American-Islamic Relations, based in Washington D.C. "But we think he did the right thing. We hope he will have learned a

little more about the American Muslim community and will be more sensitive about his comments in the future."

Idaho Democrats have not been so forgiving.

Last week, Richard Stallings, state Democratic Party chairman and a former 2nd District congressman, suggested Sali should resign.

And Democrat Larry Grant, who is opposing Sali in the 2008 election, wrote Ellison a note calling Sali's comments "thoughtless and uninformed."

The collapse Thursday night killed three rescue workers and injured six others who were trying to tunnel through rubble to reach six men trapped since Aug. 6 after a massive cave-in.

Crews on Friday were still drilling a fourth hole into the mountain to look for any sign of the missing men.

"Without question, we have suffered a setback, and we have learned an incredible lesson. But this team remains focused on the task at hand — the rescue of the miners, said Rob Moore, vice president of Murray Energy Corp., owner of the Cranford Canyon Mine.

Said Utah Gov. Jon Huntsman, who ordered flags lowered to half staff: "We went from a tragedy to a catastrophe."

Huntsman continued to call the effort a "rescue operation," but he said the digging would not resume until workers' safety could be guaranteed.

"Let us ensure that we have no more injuries. We have suffered enough as a state," he said.

The rescuers had been working beneath 2,000 feet of sandstone.

Stickler said the weight of the mountain created tremendous pressure on the cavern, blowing out reinforced walls with a force that could break a 40-ton mining machine in half.

"When that energy gets released, it's like an explosion," he said.

Rescuers frantically dug out the injured men, buried under 5 feet of coal, by hand and rushed them from the mine on the beds of pickup trucks.

Conducted at the scene, said Kevin Surickin, MSHA's administrator for coal mine safety.

Two of the dead were identified as MSHA inspectors Gary Jensen, 53, of Redmond, and miner Dale Black, 48, of Huntington.

President Bush called Huntsman Friday afternoon to express his condolences for those who died or were injured in the mine rescue. "He wanted the governor and the people of Utah to know that they are in his thoughts and prayers," White House spokesman Gordon Johndrow said.

Moeck's cousin in Salt Lake City, Salvador Jimenez, said he spoke with Huntsman and urged him to continue the rescue effort. While experts need to study the best way to do it safely, "this effort should not be interrupted," Jimenez said.

Three of the six men still trapped are Mexican nationals.

The cave-in at the mine was believed to be caused by a "mountain bump," in which shifting layers of earth forced chunks of rock from the walls.

The force from the bump registered a magnitude 1.6 at the University of Utah seismograph stations in Salt Lake City.

"These events seem to be related to ongoing settling of the rock mass following the main event," university spokesman Lee Siegel said. "I don't think I'm going too far to say that this mountain is collapsing in slow motion."

Stickler said the bump unleashed a massive blast of coal and support material that buried the miners working in clear rubble from the underground tunnel. The blast created a destruction zone about 30 feet long along a wall of the chamber and knocked out steel posts, chain link fencing and the cables that tied everything

## Fed cuts discount rate by a half-percentage point

WASHINGTON — The Federal Reserve approved a half-percentage point cut in its discount rate on loans to banks Friday, a dramatic move designed to stabilize financial markets roiled by a widening credit crisis.

The action had an immediate positive impact, sending stocks soaring on Friday right

at the opening bell. The Dow Jones Industrial average surged by more than 200 points at the start of trading.

The decision means that the discount rate, the interest rate that the Fed charges to make direct loans to banks, will be lowered to 5.75 percent, down from 6.25 percent.

The Fed did not change its target for the more important federal funds rate, which has remained at 5.25 percent for

more than a year. Friday's move was not expected to have an immediate impact on consumer borrowing.

However, it has been infusing billions of dollars in money into the banking system over the past week to keep that rate from rising above the target level.

Private economists praised the action by Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke and his colleagues, saying it

should help steady jittery markets although many expect a cut in the federal funds rate to follow.

"This is fine for temporary relief, but I think they will still have to cut the funds rate because the markets will still be turbulent," said David Wyss, chief economist at Standard & Poor's in New York.

The move to cut the discount rate will not have a major impact on consumer

interest rates in the way that cutting the federal funds rate triggers an immediate drop in banks' prime lending rate, the benchmark for millions of consumer and business loans.

However, Friday's move was expected to help with a severe cash crunch facing many businesses, including mortgage companies, which are having trouble getting loans for short-term financing needs.

## POSSIBLE END TO AG ESTATE TAX



### Sen. Crapo co-sponsors bill to protect farmers from federal tax

TWIN FALLS — Idaho Senator Mike Crapo is busy visiting with constituents while Congress is on its August recess, but he had one last piece of legislation to get on the books before leaving Washington.

With Senators Ken Salazar, D-Colo., and Pat Roberts, R-Kan., Crapo introduced the Family Farm and Ranch Act of 2007 on Aug. 5. The bill is an effort to protect farmers and ranchers from onerous federal estate taxes, he said. The bipartisan bill outlines specific language protecting family farms and ranchers from the duplicate taxation dilemma presented by estate, or death, taxes.

The proposal repeats the estate tax for operations specifically but does not apply to the estate tax in the gener-

al population. Crapo said he will continue to work on ending the estate tax entirely.

"While my top priority continues to be the outright elimination of the death tax, this legislation is a good step that will protect many hard-working people in American agriculture," he said. "What is most important is we keep pushing to end the double-taxation standard that death taxes represent."

The legislation takes into account the fact that land values for farm land have skyrocketed in recent years and that

many farm and ranch families face having to sell their assets to deal with taxes if there is a death in the family, he said. The legislation recognizes the importance of family-run operations and seeks to keep them in business.

While the bill is a good start, Crapo said he has a couple of concerns with it. No. 1, he said, is that if the land is not used for agriculture or is sold, the government will recapture the estate taxes from which the operation was exempt. "I don't think that's right," he said. "I'm going to be working toward an

amendment ... for a complete repeal for ag."

Under the present bill's provisions, a farmer and rancher would pay no estate tax as long as the following conditions are met:

In the past eight years before the decedent's death, the decedent or a member of his or her family owned the farm or ranch for a cumulative period of at least five years.

In the past eight years before the decedent's death, the decedent or a member of his or her family must have been actively involved in the management and operation of the farm or ranch for a cumulative period of at least five years.

The decedent of a member of his/her family must be using the land for farming/ranching purposes on the date of death and the decedent must be a U.S. citizen.

## A very Hot August Nite

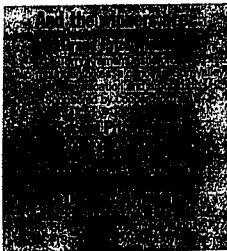

### Intermountain Gas proposes price reduction

TWIN FALLS — Intermountain Gas Company filed its annual Purchased Gas Cost Adjustment Application with the Idaho Public Utilities Commission on Thursday seeking to decrease prices for its residential and commercial customers.

PISCO, Peru — Hungry earthquake survivors ransacked a public market Friday, while other mobs looted a refrigerator trailer and blocked aid trucks, prompting Peru's president to appeal for calm. Aid finally arrived to the disaster zone after about 36 hours without much help.

Few buildings still stood in the fishing city of Pisco Friday in the wake of a magnitude-8 earthquake that killed 510 people. Many of the structures not reduced to rubble were rickety deathtraps waiting to fall.

President Alan Garcia, on the scene for the second straight day, vowed that no one would die of hunger or thirst. "I understand your desperation, your anxiety," he said. "There is no reason to fall into exaggerated desperation."

Garcia predicted "a situation approaching normalcy" in 10 days, but acknowledged that reconstruction would take far longer.

Sunrises after the earthquake all but leveled this city of 90,000 people on Peru's desert southern coast, workers continued to pull bodies from rubble, the region lacked water and electricity, and officials began to worry about the outbreak of disease.

The death count stood at 510, according to Peru's fire department, and hopes of finding more survivors diminished. At least 1,500 people suffered injuries and Garcia said 80,000 people had lost loved ones, homes or both.

Brig. Maj. Jorge Vera, chief of the rescue operation, said 85 percent of Pisco's downtown was rubble.

The relief effort was finally getting organized. Police identified bodies and civil defense teams freed in food. Housing

officials assessed the need for new homes, and in several towns long lines formed under an intense sun to collect water from soldiers.

In the capital of Lima, Peruvians donated tons of supplies as food, water, tents and blankets began arriving in the quake zone.

Peruvian soldiers also began distributing aluminum caskets, allowing the first funerals. In Pisco's cemetery, lined with collapsed tombs and tumbled crosses, a man painted the

names of the dead on headstones — some 200 were lined up. Grieving relatives lowered coffins into shallow graves.

"My dear child, Gloria!" wailed Julia Siguis, her hands spread over two small coffins holding her cousin and niece. "Who am I going to call now? Who am I going to call?"

All day, people with no way to refrigerate corpses rushed coffins through the cemetery gates, which leaned dangerously until a bulldozer came to knock it down.

## AROUND THE WORLD

### RUSSIA

#### Russia sends message, renews border flights

CHEBARKUL TESTING RANGE — President Vladimir Putin placed strategic bombers back on long-range patrol for the first time since the Soviet breakup, sending a tough message to the United States on Friday hours after a major Russian military exercise with China.

Putin reviewed the first Russian-Chinese joint exercise on Russian soil before announcing that 20 strategic bombers had been sent far over the Atlantic, Pacific and Arctic oceans — showing off Moscow's muscular new posture and its growing military ties with Beijing.

"Starting today, such tours of duty will be conducted regularly and on the strategic scale," Putin said. "Our pilots have been training for a long time. They are happy to start a new life."

Putin said halting long-range bombers after the Soviet collapse had long been a security headache for other nations — an oblique reference to the United States — had continued such missions.

### CHINA

#### Chinese officials put ban on reporting on bridge collapse

BEIJING — Communist authorities have banned most state media from reporting on the "deadly-collapse-of-a-bridge in southern China, with local officials punishing and chasing reporters from the scene, reporters said Friday. 11

The harassment and the reporting ban, issued by the Communist Party's Propaganda Department, came Thursday while reporters swarmed the tourist town of Fenghuang to report on Monday's accident. Unidentified officials roughed up a group of five newspaper and magazine reporters as they interviewed families of those killed, according to a photographer and a reporter whose colleague was among the journalists involved.

The collapse of the bridge, which was under construction, left at least 47 people dead, making it one of the worst building accidents in China in recent years.

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### IOWA

#### State agrees to settlement of suit filed by orphan

DES MOINES — The state has agreed to pay \$925,000 to unwinding subjects of an infamous 1930s suturing experiment — orphans who were badgered and belittled as children by University of Iowa researchers trying to induce speech impediments.

Johnson County District Court Judge Denver Dillard issued an order approving the settlement Friday morning. It still must be ratified by the State Appeal Board, which next meets Sept. 3.

The six plaintiffs, who said the experiment left lifelong psychological and emotional scars, had originally sought \$13.5 million.

"We believe this is a fair and appropriate settlement," Attorney General Tom Miller said in a statement. "For the plaintiffs, we hope and believe it will help provide closure relating to experiences from long ago and to memories going back almost 70 years."

### ST. LUCIA

#### Hurricane Dean sweeps into east Caribbean

CASTRIES, St. Lucia — Hurricane Dean roared into the eastern Caribbean on Friday, tearing away roofs, flooding streets and causing at least three deaths on small islands as the powerful storm headed on a collision course with Jamaica and Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula.

The Atlantic season's first hurricane grew into a Category 3 storm with sustained winds of 123 mph after crossing over the warm waters of the

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Caribbean and forecasters warned it could grow into a monster tempest with 150 mph winds before steering next week into the Gulf of Mexico, with its 4,000 oil and gas platforms.

Dean could threaten the United States by Wednesday, forecasters said, and Texas Gov. Rick Perry's office suggested people get ready.

On tiny St. Lucia, fierce winds tore corrugated metal roofs from dozens of houses and a hospital's pediatric ward, whose patients had been evacuated hours earlier.

### WASHINGTON

#### White House press secretary Snow will leave job early

WASHINGTON — White House press secretary Tony Snow said Friday he'll leave before the end of the Bush presidency because he needs to make more money.

"I'm going to stay as long as I can," he said without elaborating on a departure date.

Snow's comment caught White House colleagues by surprise, and they said they could not hazard a guess about when he might leave.

The 52-year-old Snow, the father of three children, earns \$168,000 as an assistant to the president but made considerably more as a conservative pundit and syndicated talk-show host on Fox News Radio. He was named press secretary on April 26, 2006.

White House press secre-

taries in recent administrations have found the speechmaking circuit to be lucrative once they've stepped down.

Snow was eagerly sought by Republican audiences before the elections last year, and in a break with tradition he made a number of fundraising speeches for GOP candidates.

### FLORIDA

#### Astronauts relieved about skipping shuttle repairs

CAPE CANAVERAL — Endeavour's astronauts said Friday they were relieved by NASA's decision to skip repairs to the deep gouge on their spaceship's belly, and noted it would have been tough to pull the job off.

"We're not looking forward to doing it only because there was a lot of risk involved," said Rick Mastracchio, who would have been the main repairman.

It would have been difficult to prepare all the tools and get to the gouge on Endeavour's underside, Mastracchio said. The actual repair — applying black paint and caulk-like goo to the crevice — would have been the shortest part, he said.

Endeavour's commander, Scott Kelly, said the crew was concerned about potentially causing more damage to the underside of the shuttle. All seven shuttle astronauts and even the three crewmen on the international space station supported the decision, he noted.

# U.S. plans quick strikes on al-Qaida

WASHINGTON (AP) — The No. 2 American commander in Iraq said Friday that coalition forces are planning "quick strike raids" aimed at smashing al-Qaida and other insurgents in far-flung parts of the country before the U.S. brings some of its buildup troops home.

Army Lt. Gen. Ray Odierno said that in a nation torn by violence from Sunni insurgents, Shiite militias and al-Qaida terrorists, right now al-Qaida is the biggest threat because it wants to establish a safe haven in Iraq.

"If we can, we want to finish them off," he said of al-Qaida. Speaking in Pentagon reporters by video conference from Baghdad, he also said commanders are planning in

April to start withdrawing troops sent in as part of President Bush's buildup — and complete the drawdown to pre-escalation levels by August 2008.

Military operations launched since the escalation have helped coalition forces capture and kill insurgent leaders, disrupt their operations and retake some territory from them in main population centers, he said. Odierno asserted that coalition forces now "have a chance to really go after them and defeat them."

Officials believe extremists are trying to regroup in northern Iraq, where American troop presence is much lighter after being driven from strongholds in and around Baghdad.

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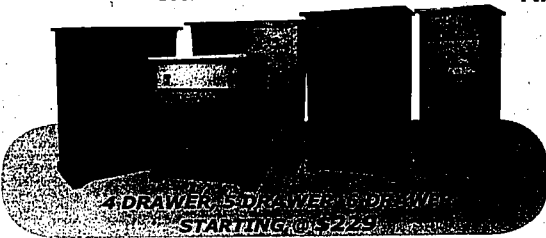
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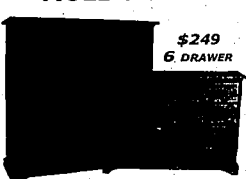
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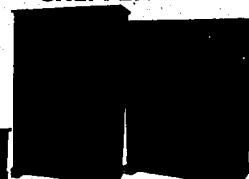


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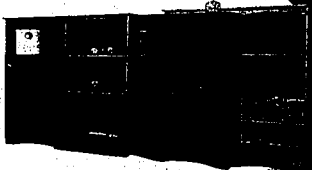
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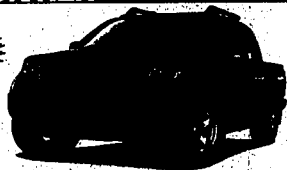

## Buhl withholds \$500,000 from construction company

**Unfinished work on road project causes dispute**

smiling. That's because Debo Construction of Orofino, Idaho, vacated the job site before wrapping up tasks the company promised to complete.

The company not only left the job hanging, but was behind schedule.

Completion of the project was originally planned for early this month.

The delay has prompted the city of Buhl to withhold \$500,000 from Debo until the company finishes the work it promised to do. The city could also start assessing monetary fines to the company, said city engineer Scott Bybee.

Bybee, who updated the City Council on the project Monday, said a main concern

is that the contractor left the job before critical work was finished.

"There is a little work to be completed on the original contract, and some additional work to be done," Chuck Martinez, project manager, told the *Times-News*. "We hope to have the work completed sometime in September."

Martinez said crews were pulled off the job to wrap up work in McCall and in Montana, and that the penalties for not getting those jobs

completed would cost "the company more than if they stayed to finish the Buhl project."

Even so, the city wants the renovation project wrapped up.

"The issue at hand... is how hard do we push the company without a degradation in relationship?" Bybee said.

The city sent Debo a letter dated Aug. 7 that outlined areas needing additional work.

## Semitrailer crash kills one, spills livestock

Truck overturns on Highway 75, landing on car

**KETCHUM** — A two-vehicle crash on state Highway 75 Thursday killed one person and injured another when a semitrailer overturned and landed on top of a car.

Martine Triplett, a 66-year-old Leaviston resident was killed when a semitrailer driven by Larry Grimm, a 59-year-old resident of Castelford, tipped onto her vehicle as it rounded a curve north of Galena Summit, said the Idaho State Police.

Grimm's rig crossed the centerline as it traveled northbound about 1:30 p.m. and flipped onto its side, crushing Triplett's vehicle. The woman was pronounced dead at the scene.

Grimm was transported by air ambulance to St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise. He was listed in fair condition, as of Friday.

Both Grimm and Triplett were wearing seatbelts.

The crash prompted temporary one-lane closures at about 2:40 p.m. along a 13-mile stretch of Highway 75 between mileposts 152 and 165, according to the Idaho Transportation Department.

An unknown number of cattle in the trailer also spilled onto the highway. They were rounded up and removed by about 5:30 p.m., when lead investigator Sgt. Keith Thompson of the Idaho State Police arrived on scene.

The crash is under investigation by the ISR.

**JEROME** — Kevin Costner has nothing on Dane Brown, a Jerome farmer.

## Wendell schools push for crosswalk safety

**WENDELL** — While walking to school last fall, a student was hit near the Main Street and Gooding Street intersection.

The student walked away from the accident, but Wendell School District Superintendent Greg Lowe wants to make sure another accident doesn't happen.

So, he approached the City Council Thursday to see if any progress had been made on

installing crosswalks or securing intersection flags for the busy thoroughfare.

"After the child was hit, it was the mayor's and the city's idea to put in a crosswalk or purchase flags or something that would make it safer for students walking to school," Lowe said. "So far there has been no follow-through with that, and we need to do something before another child is hit."

Lowe said the district hopes to see progress made on the issue before the new school

year started. But the city hasn't had the time or money to install crosswalks, said Mayor Rex Setchell. The city looked at possible costs, but the project is still being worked out, he said.

"It wasn't budgeted for last year, but it will be this year," Setchell said. "It is a question of finances. After the accident last year we put an officer at the elementary school to help students cross Idaho street. We don't want something like this to happen again."

However, officers were not placed at the intersection where the accident happened.

The city aims to set a plan in motion, officials said — though it remains unknown what that plan will be.

"I think we can figure something out with the school," Councilman Jason Hoiser told Lowe after the meeting. "We need to do something soon."

## Fire prompts Blaine County to declare emergency

**HAILEY** — Blaine County Commissioners called an emergency meeting Friday to add the county to the list of state counties under a fire emergency.

Three fires currently burning in Blaine County have made the request necessary. Idaho code allows intergovernmental agencies to extend the seven-day declaration with approval of governing bodies.

The commissioners agreed that a 30-day duration would be appropriate. "I hereby declare Blaine County an area of disaster because of extreme fire conditions on public and private lands," Commissioner Tom Bowman said, as he declared the state of local emergency.

The declaration will allow access to additional state resources and also make important agencies and the public aware of the seriousness of the situation.

"There are three active fires in Blaine County," Bowman continued, noting a 2,500-acre fire in Carey, a fire up Muldoon Canyon in Bellevue and a fire near Warm Springs that scorched about 30 acres in Heavy timber.

Bowman described the Warm Springs scene, saying that the air drops were holding the fire and that 10 smoke jumpers were activated along with a hot shot crew and a Native American ground crew.

Bowman described the location as 12 miles out, near Placer Creek. Chuck Turner, just back from Ferny Lake, added that the location was on the south or Baldy side of Warm Springs, over the first face and that while the fire was not visible from the road, way the smoke indeed was.

Turner said the fire was being referred to as the Castle Rock Fire and that he expected containment by Sunday.

Bowman said that what was really needed were ground crews with chain saws to get through heavy timber. County Administrator Michael McNeas added that he hopes this will help people to be cognizant of the presence of these crews and give them the space to do their jobs.

Bowman emphasized that many agencies are currently stretched thin and that it would be appreciated if all would use extra patience for administrative types of calls and processes during this period.

# Man charged with two counts of aggravated murder in deaths of former Burley resident

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — A man charged in a drive-by shooting at a party after a wedding could face the possibility of a capital trial.

Rigo Mariano Perera, 19, was charged Thursday in 2nd District Court with two counts of aggravated murder and two counts of attempted murder with injury.

The case is being reviewed to determine whether prosecutors should seek the death penalty, said Weber County Attorney Mark DeCaria.

Early Aug. 5, at a party after a wedding at an Ogden home, 10 shots were fired into a crowd of about 35, police said.

Killed were Sabrina Prieto, 22, and Resendo-Nava

Navarez, 29, formerly of Burley. Two others were wounded.

In interviews with two newspapers, Perera said he wasn't the shooter and planned to recant his confession to police.

He also said a gang code of silence would not allow him to name the gunman, even if it meant he is charged with the crimes. He said the shooting

was in reaction to a rival gang member shouting insults.

If prosecutors decided to make the case a capital one, it would be the first in Weber County since 2001, when Richard Jeremy Funk was charged in the shooting of his ex-wife and her mother in Pleasant View. Funk died of cancer in jail before his case

went to trial.

Under revisions to the states capital homicide statute made this year, prosecutors do not have to immediately declare whether they will seek the death penalty in a case. A notice of intent must be filed within 60 days of the arraignment scheduled after a preliminary hearing.

# Immigration officials say they won't halt raids during 2010 census

WASHINGTON (AP) — Immigration officials sharpened their message a day after being coy about whether they would agree to suspend enforcement raids during the 2010 census.

"We won't entertain any request to scale back our efforts," Immigration and Customs Enforcement spokesman Kelly Nantel said Friday.

Census officials had planned to speak with immigration agents about curbing enforcement during the population count, the Census Bureau's second-ranking official said in an interview earlier this week.

Raids during the population count would make an already distrustful group even less likely to cooperate with government workers who are supposed to include them in the headcount, Deputy Director Preston J. White said.

When asked Thursday if the immigration enforcement agency would consider suspending raids during the census, spokeswoman Pat Heilly said, "If we were, we wouldn't talk about it."

"We're an investigative agency," she added. "We don't talk about how we target our enforcement activities."

The Constitution requires the Census Bureau to count everyone, including illegal immigrants, in the census.

Immigration agents informally agreed to cooperate with the Census Bureau during the 2000 census by not conducting any large-scale raids, said Waite and Kenneth Prewitt, who directed the Census Bureau during the 2000 count.

Public discussion about possibly repeating the policy in 2010 knocked the Bush administration off schedule a week after two members of the president's Cabinet announced stepped-up efforts to enforce the nation's immigration laws.

Nantel said she wanted to clarify the enforcement agency's position.

"I don't want there to be any question in the American people's mind as to whether or not ICE would suspend enforcement efforts," Nantel said. "The answer to that is emphatically no."

# Rain stalls fire threatening lodge near Yellowstone

PAHASKA TEPPEE, Wyo. (AP) — Rain and cooler weather Friday halted the advance of a large forest fire that had pushed toward a century-old hunting lodge built by Buffalo Bill Cody. But officials remained cautious as swarms, dry conditions were forecast to return early next week.

The Columbia fire has burned 29 square miles since it began Aug. 9, after a lightning strike inside Yellowstone National Park.

"It's good to smell rain after smelling smoke for so long," said Laurie Ash, owner of the Green Creek Inn in nearby Wapiti.

Strong winds drove the fire out of the park and into Park County on Wednesday and Thursday. That sent firefighters scrambling to protect about 100 cabins, lodges and vacation homes — including the Buffalo Bill lodge at the Pahaska Teepee Resort.

The fire also forced closure of the park's East Entrance gate from Tuesday afternoon until Friday morning, when steady rains reduced the danger level and the gate reopened.

Ash said business dropped off sharply after its closure. During July, more than 3,300 people passed through the East Entrance daily.

Seven-tenths of an inch of rain had been recorded by Friday afternoon. Fire com-

mander Mark Grant said that shows prospects for a blaze for at least four or five days.

Meanwhile, 40 newly arrived, elite firefighters were putting out hot spots along the fire's northern flank.

"It's looking rosy," Grant said. "The fire is not moving at all. It's just kind of smoldering around the edge."

About 205 firefighters were working the blaze. With the improved conditions, Grant said an order for 100 more firefighters had been canceled.

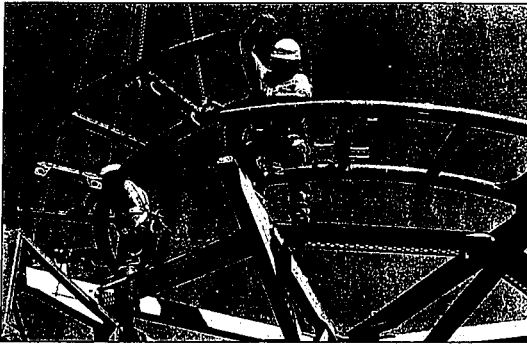
A Yellowstone spokesman, Al Nash, denied claims made by some area residents that the National Park Service allowed the fire to get out of control by not putting enough resources on the blaze when it first started.

"It has been a challenge to get the personnel and equipment simply because they are so much in need around the West," Nash said. "But we have not been letting it burn. We have been working from the start to attack this fire. It just wasn't working."

A community meeting to discuss the fire was set for Saturday afternoon at the Wapiti School in Wapiti.

Representatives of the Shoshone National Forest, Yellowstone and the interagency team managing the blaze planned to pass along information about their efforts and answer questions.

# Duncan in default of lawsuit brought by Shasta Groene's father

BOISE — Convicted murderer and sex offender Joseph Duncan III failed to reply in time to a wrongful death lawsuit filed by the father of the children Duncan is accused of killing or kidnapping, according to a finding entered into federal court Friday.

Duncan was found in default of the lawsuit filed by Steven Groene. The finding, entered by a clerk in U.S. District Court here at Groene's request, allows Groene to ask Judge B. Lynn Withnall to rule in his favor in the civil suit

without hearing from Duncan.

Groene filed the lawsuit last October. A 11 e g i n g Duncan was responsible for the 2005 deaths of 13-year-old Shasta Groene, 9-year-old Dylan

Groene and their mother, Brenda Groene. Steven Groene also claimed that Duncan caused intentional infliction of emotional distress and battery against Shasta Groene, who was 8 at the time.

Duncan has pleaded guilty in Idaho state court to killing three members of the family at their home on May 16, 2005. Brenda Groene; her fiancé, Mark McKenzie; and Shasta

Groene were fatally bludgeoned with a hammer.

Duncan still faces a federal trial in January on charges of kidnapping the family's two younger children, Shasta and Dylan, and later killing Dylan at a remote Montana campsite. Shasta was rescued weeks later when Duncan was arrested at a Coeur d'Alene restaurant.

In the lawsuit, Groene asked

the judge to prevent Duncan from profiting from the crimes by writing books, providing television or movie content or any other activities. He also asked for a jury trial and monetary damages in an amount to be proven in court.

Though Duncan was served with the lawsuit on Dec. 21, 2006, he did not file anything in the case or otherwise respond, Groene's attorney

Jon Simmons, said in a court document. Simmons and Groene did not immediately return telephone and e-mail messages Friday seeking comment.

The court has no record of an attorney representing Duncan in the civil lawsuit; attorneys representing him on the federal criminal charges could not be reached by The Associated Press.

## Convicted murderer seeks to change plea

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Convicted Lawrence Banderob is asking the Idaho Supreme Court to throw out his guilty plea and overturn his prison sentence, according to court documents.

Banderob, 39, was sentenced in June to 25 years to life for killing a 76-year-old woman who refused to let him use her car to get his vehicle out of a ditch.

In February, he pleaded guilty to first-degree murder in the death of Miriam Walch, whose body was found in her burning home on Feb. 5, 2006.

As part of the plea deal, the prosecution agreed to drop a first-degree arson charge and not seek the death penalty, while Banderob agreed not to appeal his conviction. Under the deal, the case was handled by 1st District Judge Fred Gibler. Banderob will not be eligible for parole until 2042.

But in a motion filed with the Supreme Court Aug. 1, Banderob denied he had anything to do with the slaying. He also asked for a court-appointed attorney and that the state turn over all evidence in the case.

"The court sentenced me to prison, in part of which was a murder that I pleaded guilty for unsaid reasons, of which I did not commit," Banderob wrote. "Therefore, (I) seek to withdraw my plea to the murder charge."

## Map to find money for Idaho highways money is unclear

HAYDEN (AP) — Idaho lawmakers will likely not support an increase in gas taxes to fix the state's road system, a northern Idaho lawmaker says.

Rep. Frank Henderson, R-Prest Falls, told the Idaho Transportation Board on Thursday that raising gas taxes would be difficult during the 2008 legislative session.

"The acceptance of a higher state fuel tax will be hard to achieve," Henderson told the board, the Coeur d'Alene Press reported.

"Leave the more difficult battles for a non-election year," Henderson said.

Idaho's gas tax has been 25 cents per gallon since 1996. But the state estimates roads will cost \$20 billion over the next 30 years, while revenue is coming up \$200 million short each year.

"It's an emotional issue," said board member Monte McClure. "Everybody sees a great need to raise money, but there's a great disparity in how we do it."







Henderson, who wrote the transportation appropriation bill during the last session, said the Transportation Board should consider higher vehicle registration fees, rental car fees, and increases in other fees such as title transfers.


He said Idahoans would probably accept higher registration fees, as many now believe they are getting a bargain.

It is hard to concentrate when your body bulges in the heat, beaten by the sun and the orders so judiciously dealt out by coaches, their whistles at the ready.

I hated what my defensive line coach did to me in high school, but by I learned to respect the man. Not really because of who he was (I've never really known our coaches as men), but because of what he made me into. He punished us to build us into football players, mean and cruel and strong and passionate. Our energy was focused toward the success of the team and the responsibilities of each individual, because we knew that if it was not focused energy, then come Monday morning we would pay for our dereliction.

The college game is a little different. These days with worries about heat and concerns for the health of players, exceptions are made. They still work hard, but these days the training staffs understand the need for hydration.

Trainers implemented the use of chocolate milk this fall following practice, because of how it hydrates and replenishes the body.

The focus on dehydration is a facet of college football. With the deaths of players on the football field who have been overworked, over-stimulated and certainly over-drugged, there is a great concern for the well being of athletes. No longer can they do drugs — even their supplement usage has been curtailed because of negative effects on the body. Ephedrine is outlawed. (It is one of the key ingredients in methamphetamine).

The players have to work through a much longer day in days gone by. They are all looking to get ahead in the game, but not to the destruction of their bodies.

The greatest thing about the dog days of summer is that they end. Night comes sooner. The earth cools and the sweat stops drying, but it keeps pouring. The work ethic established in these few weeks will carry over into the regular season. The lessons learned in the heat will transfer into realizations under the lights.

The players will never forget the dog days. None of us should.

Friday's scrimmage didn't start as well as he needed it to either. On Hamdan's first snap of the night he fumbled from under center. On his first series he went 2-for-4 for 10 yards. The drive was capped by a 51-yard field goal from freshman Kyle Brotzman.

"Sometimes we were just having center exchange problems," Hamdan said. "It's on me. I turned the ball over and we can't have that."

Hamdan finished the scrimmage 5-for-11 for 37 yards with a six-yard touchdown pass to Junior Tynion

Bissell. Hamdan's QB counterpart, senior Taylor Tharp, provided another solid outing for the Broncos. Tharp finished 6-for-10 for 52 yards and a 103.68 passer rating. For the second consecutive week, Tharp didn't exactly wow the Bronco coaching staff, failing to throw a touchdown pass in either scrimmage of the fall. Most importantly, however, he didn't commit many mistakes, playing without a fumble or an interception.

"I can always get better," Tharp said. "There is always room for improvement. It was limited reps, but obviously it felt like we just weren't clicking tonight."

Standout running back Ian Johnson did not play in the scrimmage in a

TWIN FALLS — The competition on the race track between the drivers is obvious in the sport of auto racing. But there is another competition going on in the stands every Saturday night at Magic Valley Speedway that may not be as well understood.

Knowing fall well the Idaho summer is all too short, business owners who rely on the fair-weather season are in plenty of competition for the dollars the public is willing to spend on entertainment.

Magic Valley Speedway is no different and drawing spectators is a big part of the contest each and every week throughout the season.

Eddy McKean, who purchased MVS from 21-year veteran promoter Steve York, has learned that while the cries of "There's nothing to do in Twin Falls," have not been completely silenced, they have been muted. As with growth to any area, there also comes more options for entertainment.

"There is a lot of stuff going on every weekend," McKean said. "If people are going come to the races they'll come to the races. But you still have to do different stuff or it gets old."

One of the more popular events has

proven over and over to be the trailer races, where older cars hook up utility, camping or boat trailers packed with whatever they can load on to it and are let loose to wreak havoc on the track. The result is a lot of smashed up and broken items requiring heavy equipment and plenty of manpower in the clean up. But the fans love it.

"I have no idea why," McKean said. "But you can tell by the gate entries, the trailer races are two of the biggest nights we have."

McKean's most recent undertaking to provide some thing different for those in the stands has been the school bus races. Not unique to short tracks across the country it is new to MVS this season. And by the reaction from the fans, the buses are sure to make more stops at the Twin Falls track in the future.

"I have had drivers tell me they have more fun in the bus race than in the trailer race," McKean said. "And it's a lot safer."

Also new this season is the ride-along, where a lucky fan or two can

experience the view from the race track first-hand as they take a few laps around the track, usually with Premier Series driver Norm Hauke.

McKean has sunk a lot of dollars into the speedway since purchasing it this past April. As a former driver both at MVS and nationally, McKean can rely on his knowledge of what the drivers like and don't like from their standpoint. Now as a track owner and promoter, McKean is working both sides of the fence trying to make a night at Magic Valley Speedway the best experience possible for fans and drivers alike.

McKean has added approximately 14 concrete pads in the pits which the drivers may rent for the season. He has rerouted the parking area and added a new sign-in area for the drivers as they enter the pits. Soon to be completed is the NAPA tech building, where the drivers, crew members and officials can get out of the infamous Magic Valley sun or the blazing sun of the summer. For the fans and sponsors, the Pepsi Pavilion has already hosted numerous events in a secure area at ground level. Landscaping has also been added and more improvements are already in the works for next year.

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## Co-defendant links Vick to killing of at least 8 dogs

RICHMOND, Va. — It's up to Michael Vick now.

His last two co-defendants pleaded guilty Friday and implicated Vick in bankrolling gambling on dogfights. One of them said the Atlanta Falcons quarterback helped drown or hang dogs that didn't do well.

With his NFL career in jeopardy and a superseding indictment adding more charges in the weeks that left Vick with a hard choice: Cutting his own deal to hold jail time under a year or go to trial and sit through detailed descriptions of the glushy operation known as "Bad Newz Kennels."

Falcons owner Arthur Blank said Vick's attorneys were negotiating with prosecutors as of late afternoon, trying to hammer out a plea deal.

"It seems to be a pretty clear indication there will be some sort of plea entered," Blank said before the Falcons preseason game at Buffalo. "When? I'm not positive."

Quanis Phillips of Atlanta and Purnell Peace of Virginia Beach entered plea agreements and agreed to testify against Vick. A third member of the dogfighting ring, Tony Taylor, struck a similar deal last month.

One of Vick's attorneys, Lawrence Woodward, attended the plea hearings but declined to answer questions about the progress of the negotiations as he left the courthouse.

"Did you conspire with these folks to sponsor a dogfighting venture?" U.S. District Judge Henry Hudson asked Peace.

"Yes, sir," he replied.

As part of his plea agreement, Phillips signed a statement that said Vick joined in executing at least eight dogs that didn't do well in test fights by various methods, including hanging and drowning.

Phillips agrees and stipulates that these dogs all died as

Making a BCS bowl was a great deal for Utah — and for Florida, which celebrated the "Utes" success by hiring away their coach.

Louisville overcame injuries and adversity to finally hit the big-time, the Orange Bowl. For a game against... Wake Forest? And who will ever forget Boise State's incredible comeback against Oklahoma last season in the Fiesta Bowl? Certainly, none of those Boise State fans.

For all the hype these big trips to the BCS create, many schools are finding there are

other byproducts of hitting the big-time. The schools often find themselves saying goodbye to their good, young coaches or paying more to keep them. Sometimes, the supposed recruiting bump associated with big bowl games never comes. Then, there are the sometimes unrealistic expectations that come with winning.

"Fans want you to win and win now," said Chuck Neinas, the longtime director of the College Football Association who now heads a search firm for schools looking for new football coaches and athletic directors.

"We're in an age of instant

gratification," Neinas said. "So, they see you went undefeated. They don't know how many things have to bounce the right way for a team to go undefeated."

In the end, Neinas says any team going to a BCS game will get a net benefit, though often only a mere fraction of those much-ballyhooped \$13 million BCS payouts actually end up in the school's coffers.

Most conferences have deals in place to split bowl money evenly among all members, with a little more going toward the school that makes it, though that's normally used to

Bill Miles is currently in the lead in the division — five points on top of Jason Whitlatch and seven up on Josh Pitiz. Miles has one Chase win and once spoiler Jonathan Gomez, who is racing in two divisions at MVS, has the other.

Meanwhile Shawn Nee, Trent Champilin and Kevin Grubbs are still searching for their first wins and while the road ahead of them for the championship will be rough, each would like to make a trip to the winner's circle before the gates are closed on the season.

## Unrepentant Knaus and Letarte back at the track, getting teams ready for Chase

BROOKLYN, Mich. (AP) — Since NASCAR put them on suspension in June, Chad Knaus and Steve Letarte have managed to stay busy. That hasn't kept the two Nextel Cup crew chiefs from being frustrated.

"I'm not going to lie to you, it's tough," Knaus said Friday after rejoining reigning Cup champion Jimmie Johnson and his No. 48 Hendrick Motorsports team to prepare for Sunday's 3M Performance 400 at Michigan International Speedway.

Knaus and Letarte, who works with the No. 24 of four-time Cup champion Jeff Gordon on the elite Hendrick team, were banned from attending six races after NASCAR technical inspectors found unapproved front fenders on their entries before the June 24 race at Sonoma.

"I've never done anything else my whole life and Steve's in the same boat," said Knaus, who has gone through suspensions in the past. "In '24, 25 years of racing, I've been gone every weekend, every week I'm gone somewhere else, some other town going racing."

"When you install that kind of competitive nature into your blood, it's kind of difficult to unplug yourself. But it's what happens, you just have to deal with it. I didn't enjoy it, but that's for sure. It's good to be back."

Letarte, ending his first suspension, echoed Knaus, one of his mentors.

"It's very frustrating," Letarte said. "I (could) do everything Monday through Thursday to prepare them, give them my notes, give them my ideas. It is how the last race went, this is how the next race might go. But, when they leave and come out to the track, they're kind of on their own."

Both teams have done a decent job in the absence of their leaders.

Gordon, leading the season standings, has posted top-10 finishes in all six races and increased his points lead over runner-up Denny Hamlin from 171 — after NASCAR docked both Gordon and Johnson 100 points for "fender-gate" — to 344.

## Gordon cruised to win sixth pole

BROOKLYN, Mich. (AP) — Qualifying has provided Jeff Gordon with some real surprises this season.

The four-time NASCAR champion had another one Friday, winning his series-leading sixth pole of 2007 after having to wait for all the rest of the cars entered in the 3M Performance 400 to make their qualifying runs.

"Wow! Wow!" Gordon said into his radio after crew chief Steve Letarte, back at the track after a six-race suspension, told him he had just won another pole.

"We've been decent in practice, but we didn't get a best in Gordon said. "But, obviously, we communicated well on the adjustments we needed. It just didn't feel like a pole-winning lap." "Obviously, I've got to thank this team and someone like Steve Letarte. Man, that's awesome. We've got good chemistry and I think that laid track really, really played out for us."

Greg Biffle, who went out just ahead of Gordon in the 48-car qualifying line, posted a lap of 188.684 mph, knocking Casey Kahne (188.516) off the top spot. Gordon then went out and raised the top speed to 189.026.

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they can see that we're putting something back, not just taking out the money. We'll do even more next year probably, especially in the concessions area."

Beside injecting some new forms of entertainment and wishing to make the track more comfortable, McKean has stuck with much of what York introduced at MVS over the years besides the trailer races, although whether or not those things will continue is still up in the air.

For example, the cone. An orange highway cone, the same type everyone who travels in a car on the roads this time of year is all too familiar with, is placed in Turn 1 with both speed and grace by corner flagman Lee Schmidt after a caution has interrupted the race. The drivers must then decide whether to take the inside lane or the outside lane for the restart. The theory is to place the cars side-by-side as well as bunch the group back together, thus intensifying the outcome of the race.

Some drivers love it, some despise it. Usually it just depends on what kind of a night you're having out on the track. Drivers who are in the lead don't have the same favorable view as those having a rough night, but it does add to the sense of belonging for those in the stands as they try and anticipate what course the driver will take.

"It's great for the fans and you have to keep fans well, coming or it doesn't matter," McKean noted. "But we'll probably visit that issue with the drivers over the winter. Maybe we'll keep it for next year, maybe we won't."

Another uncommon twist at MVS is the Chase for the Championship, which the drivers are right in the midst of at this very time. Formed after the Nextel Cup Chase, the driver's points are reset for the five remaining races on the schedule, usually preventing a runaway to the championship by any one driver.

Short-track owners have been facing an uphill battle in the modern era of digital entertainment and many have closed the gates for good. Therefore, innovations and new concepts are a must in keeping any short track going — and in walking the fine line between the drivers' need for competition and the fans' desire for non-stop entertainment is not always easy.

"Some things work well, some not so well," McKean said. "But you have to keep trying."

# Woods to skip first playoff event in FedEx Cup

NEW YORK (AP) — The PGA Tour has touted its new FedEx Cup competition by making references to Green Day Packers and New York Yankees... but when golf's version of the playoffs begin next week in New York, it won't include Tiger Woods.

Golf's star attraction said Friday he will not attend the first playoff event at the Barclays, saying he was worn out from back-to-back victories at Firestone and Southern Hills.

"My body is not what it used to be," Woods said on his Web site. The announcement was a setback for the PGA Tour, which had promoted the FedEx Cup as a "new era in golf" and instead was left with an old-fashioned, contentious format that golf was still relevant after the majors were over.

The FedEx Cup is a season-long points race that culminates with the four tournaments through the Tour Championship. The winner gets a \$10 million annuity from a \$35 million bonus pool.

Woods is the No. 1 seed and will win the FedEx Cup despite skipping The Barclays. He is the defending champion at the Deutsche Bank Championship outside Boston, and he is a three-time winner at the BMW Championship outside Chicago. The Tour Championship is held in Atlanta at East Lake, where Woods has twice been runner-up.

There were indications last week that Woods might skip the Barclays, even though he said he "intended" to play them all.

He won the Bridgestone Invitational at Firestone, which played as tough as a major — Woods was the only player to break par. He followed that with a victory at the PGA Championship, which featured 100-degree weather the entire week.

Woods said majors are grueling and require more time to recover. Plus, he has never finished in the top 10 at Westchester Country Club, site of The Barclays.

"This is in no way a knock on Barclays, their new event next week or the new FedEx Cup series, which I fully support," Woods said in his statement. "I just hope that this extra week of rest will rejuvenate me for the final three playoff events and Presidents Cup. It is still my goal to win the FedEx Cup and I am hopeful this will give me the best opportunity to finish the year strong."

Woods was not at Kapalua in January when the FedEx Cup began, with tour officials asking players to deposit their golf ball into the trophy to signal the start of this new era. And he won't be at Westchester for the start of the playoffs.

"We're disappointed that Tiger will not be playing The Barclays next week," PGA Tour spokesman Ty Vitaw said. "His clear from Tiger's statement he wants focused on winning the FedEx Cup. Whether he can do it will be one of the many exciting things our fans will be following over the next four weeks."

Tour officials had suggested that players would have to play all four weeks to have a serious chance at winning.

Woods' superlative season gave him an 11,000-point lead over Vijay Singh at the end of the regular season, although the rest reduced his lead to only 1,600 points — and 15,300 points over the 14th and final seed — going into the playoffs.

PGA Tour commissioner Tim Finchem last year compared that to the New York Yankees winning the AL East by 20 games, then starting from scratch in the playoffs. More recently, PGA Tour spokesman Ric Charson spoke of the significance of the FedEx Cup by suggesting the Green Bay Packers did not know in 1967 that their league championship would become known as the Super Bowl.

Despite not having Woods at Westchester, the PGA Tour most likely will have the best players in the world — Woods included — over the final three weeks of the season. That kind of participation after the majors are over is unprecedented.

The biggest issue is 2008 and beyond. After the Tour Championship, most players will get one week off before the Presidents Cup at Royal Canadian.

Next year, the top players will be asked to complete four consecutive weeks and then go straight to the Ryder Cup, one of the most draining weeks in golf. It is not likely that Woods or others will play all the playoff events.

Woods was among those who asked Finchem to shorten the regular season, and some thought he would show his support by playing in all four of the tour's marketing campaign. One spot showed Woods lacing up his golf shoes in the locker room while whistling the song, "Eye of the Tiger."

## Inkster gets share of lead; Wie misses cut

EDMONTON, Alberta — Hall of Famer Jull Inkster shot a 5-under 66 on Friday for a share of the second-round lead in the Canadian Women's Open while 17-year-old Michelle Wie had a 74 to miss the cut at Royal Mayfair.

The 47-year-old Inkster, a 31-time winner on the LPGA Tour, matched South Korea's Shi Hyun Ahn (67) at 8-under 134. Ahn had a hole-in-one on the 157-yard 16th.

Wie had a 7-over 149 total, leaving her 15 strokes behind the leaders.

## Webb tosses another shutout

# Former NHL player gets 2-year probation for running sports gambling ring

NIGHT HOLLY, N.J. (AP) — A former NHL player and assistant coach who ran an illegal sports gambling ring went to seven jail days despite international headlines linking the case to hockey's biggest star.

Hick Toecheit was ordered Friday to serve two years' probation for his role in the five-year ring.

Toecheit, 43, could have received up to five years in state prison. However, there is a presumption against incarceration for first-time offenders who plead guilty to third- or fourth-degree crimes.

That means the retired Philadelphia Flyer is unlikely to serve any time for his crimes, said Mark Ellides, the deputy attorney general who prosecuted the case.

The state made no sentencing recommendation, leaving it to the discretion of the court. Afterward, Toecheit's lawyer, Kevin Marino, said his client long ago acknowledged having made a mistake by becoming involved in illegal gambling. Marino pointed out that the more sensational allegations in the case — including rumors of mob ties and game fixing — never materialized.

"Mr. Toecheit never placed a bet on professional hockey. Mr. Toecheit never took a bet on professional hockey," Marino said. "He in no way compromised the integrity of the game of hockey or the National Hockey League."

Before being sentenced on Friday, Toecheit told the judge, "I'm sorry to the court, my family and friends was involved in this."

An assistant coach with the Phoenix Coyotes under legendary Wayne Gretzky, Toecheit parlayed his hockey state trooper and another man in a sports betting venture they ran for five years. He has been on indefinite leave from his job since being charged, but Marino said Toecheit hopes to return to the sport now that the case has been resolved.

NHL commissioner Gary Bettman hired lawyer Robert Cleary to conduct an internal investigation. A former federal prosecutor, Cleary is best known for prosecuting Unabomber Theodore Kaczynski.

"In light of today's events, Mr. Cleary is now in a position to conclude his independent investigation," NHL spokesman Gary McHugh said in a statement on Friday. "Once the commissioner receives Mr. Cleary's report, it is probable that he will want to meet with Mr. Toecheit before making a determination."

He would not answer any questions, including whether Toecheit has a future in professional hockey.

James Harney, the trooper who has since been forced to give up his badge, was sentenced earlier this month to five years in prison. The other man, James Ulmer, will be sentenced on Aug. 24.

The case became one of the biggest stories in hockey in February 2006, when the men were charged, because authorities said several of the bettors were people connected to the game. The only name revealed was James Jones, Gretzky's wife of Gretzky. But authorities quickly said neither she nor other bettors would be charged.

The case remained international news throughout the 2006 Olympics in Turin, Italy, where Gretzky was executive director of Team Canada. In the investigation that followed, authorities and hockey officials said there's no evidence of betting on hockey. However, the betting was heavy on other sports. In the 40 days that led up to the charges, the ring handed \$1.7 million in bets, including college football bowl games and the Super Bowl.

The business was lucrative for Harney and Ulmer. It lasted. When he was arrested, police took 32 watches and nine televisions from his home, and he forfeited his home, his interest in his wife's home and cash.

His assets were seized from Toecheit, and he was not assessed any fines. Toecheit, a married father of one, can complete probation in his home state of Arizona, Judge Thomas Smith Jr. said.

# Titans best Pats on late field goal



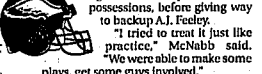

## McNabb looks solid in return Eagles take big preseason victory against Panthers

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The way Donovan McNabb is completing passes, it won't matter if he has lost a step.

Playing his first game since tearing a knee ligament last November, McNabb did everything but scramble in the Philadelphia Eagles' 27-10 victory over the Carolina Panthers on Friday night.

The live-time Pro Bowl quarterback put on an aerial display in the first quarter, finishing 6-for-9 for 138 yards, including a 58-yard strike to tight end Matt Schobel. He led the Eagles (1-1) to 10 points on four possessions, before giving way to backup A.J. Feeley.



"I tried to treat it just like practice," McNabb said. "We were able to make some plays, get some guys involved."

While McNabb shined, Jake Delhomme struggled for the Panthers (1-1) after a promising start under new offensive coordinator Jeff Davidson in Carolina's preseason opener against the New York Giants.

Delhomme, coming off a subpar season, was 9-for-16 for 78 yards, got sacked three times and threw one interception that was returned 40 yards for a touchdown by Lito Sheppard.

Wearing a bulky protective brace on his surgically repaired right knee, McNabb hardly needed to escape the pocket. He was flushed out to the right on one and threw an incomplete pass. On his final play, McNabb was intercepted by Stanley McClellan and Thomas Davis. He got right up and walked to the sideline.

Overall, it was an impressive return for McNabb, who went down in Week 11 last season against the Tennessee Titans.

"I have a long way to go, but the exciting part is just what we can do," McNabb said. "I tried to get us back to the point where we were when I left. Hopefully we can get back to that, but it's going to take some time."

McNabb came out firing, completing a 27-yard pass to Kevin Curtis on the first play on scrimmage.

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. — Vince Young might have been better off staying home again.

After being benched for Tennessee's exhibition opener for spending the previous night at his house instead of the team hotel, Young was sacked four times Friday night. His leg was tucked just short of the goal line of his final play in the Titans' 27-24 win over New England.

Young completed five of 17 passes for 102 yards and ran four times for 9 yards. Last season's offensive Rookie of the Year played the entire first half before Kerry Collins started the third quarter.

Collins led Tennessee back with a 17-7 halftime deficit on a 15-yard pass to Roydeell Williams. John Vaughn's 31-yard field goal and Dontrell Moore's 4-yard run.

Vaughn's 22-yard field goal finished the winning points with 1:39 left after New England quarterback Matt Gutierrez scrambled for a 2-yard touchdown.

Brady was knocked hard to the ground on two passes that turned into interceptions and was slow getting up both times.

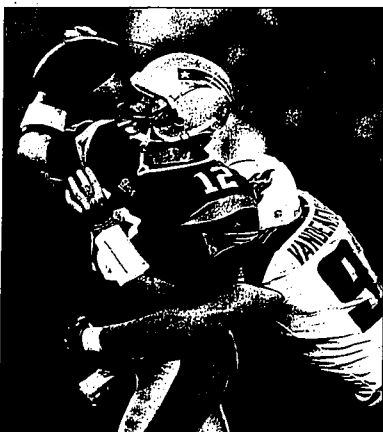

## School district gets former president's name wrong

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — The Ogden School District needs a big eraser. After officially naming a new school James A. Madison Elementary School in May, a history teacher pointed out this month that the fourth president of the United States didn't have a middle initial. "I'm blindsided," said Ogden school board member John Gullo. "I hate being embarrassed."

Gullo heads the American Dream Foundation, which donated a large painting of the former president to the school. An accompanying plaque does not have the mystery initial. Word of the mistake reverberated through the district. Neel Zabriskie, who verified it and called the company that was making a sign for the new school, Zabriskie's call came in time for the error to be fixed

on the sign, which is scheduled to be installed Friday. Some school letterheads will need to be replaced. The board voted May 23 to approve the school name as James A. Madison. The majority of board members chose Madison because the school honors James Madison Avenue. Several board members also said they feel James Madison was a great president.

# 2 matches in 2 days

## David Beckham plans soccer marathon after callup to England

NEW YORK (AP) — David Beckham's life is moving at mind-bending speed. The soccer cliner to preside over news conferences to attend, flights to catch and somewhere in there, a little bit of soccer, too. Especially after he was chosen Friday to play for England next week against Germany.

He's got it all planned out, though. After Wednesday night's exhibition ("I'm not sure any game against Germany at Wembley is a friendly"), he intends to fly to Los Angeles in time to play in the Galaxy's game against Chelsea USA that night at 7 p.m. local time — or 3 a.m. Friday in London.

"I haven't done that since I was probably 8 years old or 9 years old when we used to play games Saturday-Sunday," Beckham said. "I'm honored to be called into the England squad again. That's something I've always taken seriously and always will take seriously."

Beckham was busy enough Friday, holding an afternoon soccer clinic in Harlem with New York Red Bulls stars Loren Ahlender and Juan Pablo Angel before facing a room full of about a hundred media members and a couple dozen TV cameras.

Once he leaves for England, he might not spend enough time on the ground to develop much in the way of jet lag. He plans to fly to London on Sunday, the morning after what figures to be his first

Major League Soccer start against the Red Bulls.

Beckham was chosen to play for England despite a balky ankle that has limited his play in the States to just one start and a handful of appearances as a substitute.

The match at London's new Wembley Stadium is England's only game before European Championship qualifiers against Israel and Russia in early September. Both opponents are fourth-place England in their group.

But before Becks can focus on Germany, he's got Saturday's game on Giants Stadium's artificial turf to consider. The surface won't be kind to his ankle, and he's almost certain to be substituted. But it should be worth it for nearly all involved.

"I can tell that everyone on this team is really looking forward to this opportunity. David is a great guy and he just didn't become famous in January," said Red Bulls midfielder and former U.S. captain Claudio Reyna, an English Premier League veteran like Beckham. "I'm a soccer fan and I'm a Beckham fan, and honestly, I'm glad he's here. We appreciate the attention he brings to the game."

Sunday morning, Beckham will be off to England to rest up before his second set of two matches separated by eight time zones, 5,400 miles and about 29 hours from the conclusion of the Germany match, and the start of the one against Chile.

## When life turns the world upside down

For more than a week now, national media attention has been focused on a small mining community in the mountains not far from where I live, as anxious families wait to learn the fate of six miners who have been trapped deep within a coal mine.

I can't even imagine the pain and anguish of loved ones as they wait and wonder, clinging to every small glimmer of hope that is offered despite the ominous possibilities that loom larger with each passing hour. Nor can I begin to understand what may or may not have been going on inside the mine behind the wall of rubble. To be honest, I try not to think about it, although I do find myself praying for them.

"I don't think I'm alone in that. I'm sure countless prayers have been offered for the miners and their families during the past week or so. Nothing mobilizes and energizes this nation's faith like a crisis. Americans are believers, by and large, and we are quick to exercise our faith when it is needed.

But there also have been impressed by those who have been exercising more than their faith in behalf of the trapped miners. Miners have risked their own lives as they clawed at the rocks and debris, sometimes with bare hands. Rescue efforts turned deadly Thursday night as a collapse claimed the lives of three of these searchers. Miners from all around the world have come and are working shoulder-to-shoulder with local miners in a desperate race against time.

"Every hour of every day. 'Those are good men down there,' said one miner, obviously weary after a long shift pulling rocks and dirt and who knows what else out of the mine. 'They're our brothers, and you never give up on your buddies.'

And so they work — grueling, hard, exhausting work — hour after hour, day after day, in a mine that has already trampled six of their colleagues. At this point, they don't know if their function is rescue or recovery. To be honest, they don't really care: The moment the ceiling of the mine collapses, they are pulling them from six fellow miners, this stopped being a job. Now, it's more of a mission — a quest. And it's personal — deeply, intimately, painfully so.

"We're all kind of a family up here," one grizzled veteran said as he strapped on his safety gear and prepared to enter the mine one more time. "We watch out for each other and we take care of each other no matter what. That's what families do."

At least that's what families should do. But as I watch how these men and women cling to each other through this heart-wrenching ordeal, it occurs to me that our families could probably learn a few things from the way this "family" functions: how they love each other. How they respect each other. How they care about each other. And how they are there for each other. No matter what.

Of course, crisis has a way of bringing together even the most dysfunctional families. But there is something real among these miners — something solid that binds them together and gives them strength. And somehow you understand that the tangible synergy of this "family" will see them through whatever the future holds for them.

Just as it can for our families. No matter what.

# Up from the rubble

## Sun Valley's Our Lady of the Snows Catholic church yields to its successor

SUN VALLEY — This week started with a crash at the site of the new Our Lady of the Snows Catholic Church on Sun Valley Road as the old church was demolished on Monday.

With the 39-year-old building on the ground, a new, taller church built behind the original structure was clearly revealed. The Most Rev. Michael Driscoll, bishop of the Diocese of Boise, blessed the site of the new church last summer, and construction started in September 2006.

The new stone-and-glass structure, standing 15 feet taller than its predecessor, is scheduled to open by Christmas. In the meantime, Mass is being said at Warm Springs Lodge with the Rev. Jorge Garcia presiding. Garcia was ordained in Cali, Colombia, in 1986, and was assigned to Our Lady of the Snows in July after the Rev. John Morgan retired.

The final Mass in the original Our Lady of the Snows took place on July 23. Parishioners contributed \$4.5 million to build the new church. Architect Jim McLaughlin drew up the plans, with Dave Wilson Construction building the facility.

"The new, 11,290-square-foot building has a smaller footprint because its classrooms and parish hall were placed underneath the church in a daylight basement. The original structure had two wings constructed at the rear of the church housing a kitchen and classrooms. Those wings and an overflow seating area at the back of the church were removed last summer to allow the new building to be erected."

In addition to serving as a place of worship, Our Lady of the Snows has long been the site of performing arts events.

# Sacred science: God, nature and the stock market

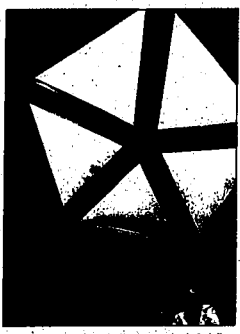
Brad Stewart was a teenage stock trader in 1996 when he wrote a financial book in Los Angeles and stumbled across a strange, smoke-filled back room devoted to an odd science.

The co-owner of the store, Jerome Baumring, sat with his cowboy-booted feet on a desk and chain-smoked while staring through owl-shaped glasses at a computer screen filled with stock market quotes. Baumring was surrounded on three sides by stacks of books, mostly rare original editions about financial markets, music theory, astrophysics and mysticism.

If properly understood, he told Stewart, the books offered the astute investor a better understanding not just of life but of the world of finance.

Soon Stewart was "buying hundreds of books I needed to understand the subject."

Over time, Stewart amassed a library of tomes on such things as Pythagorean harmonics, celestial mechanics

and Jewish mysticism, and he established himself as the source for such material among financial traders with

similar interests.

Now, at age 40, he presides over the Sacred Science Institute, a small publishing company specializing in English translations of some of the most complicated and convoluted tracts ever written.

The audience: people who see geometrical connections between the architecture of Hindu temples and fluctuations in the Dow Jones Industrial average.

Stewart operates out of a domed, chalet outside the mountain town of Idyllwild, about 110 miles east of Los Angeles. The company operates under an unusual working relationship between scholars and translators with

an academic interest in rare scientific and religious works, and Stewart's clients — about 400 people he likes to call "my financial guys." These book buyers tend to live in the world's financial centers, such as New York, Singapore and London.

The Sacred Science Institute is 12 years old and has published about 500 books, mostly rare financial-market treatises. Stewart's 100 or so best-selling titles offer more conventional business advice and provide the income he needs to cover the costs of translating his mystical texts.

Most of his clients are fans of financial wizard W.D. Gann, whose century-old books are so dense that many students give up before gaining an inkling of his "square of nine" investment techniques. Stewart's clients aren't reading these texts in find coded references to Dell's stock price on a specific date. They read to discern larger patterns in how the universe operates.

Setting up a chair at a large wooden table in his liv-

ing room and opening a elephantine edition filled with esoteric symbols and algebraic formulas, Stewart said, "I'll show you why my guys are into this."

"This baby begins with Pascal's arithmetical triangle and logarithmic spirals," he said, "and then just keeps going and going through Hindu chakras, the Egyptian alphabet and the harmonic patterns in the stained-glass windows of medieval cathedrals."

"The point is that this is a mysteriously organized universe," he said. "The market — its prices and times — move in accordance with its harmonic rhythms; there's a non-random element to it all."

The big book on the table had an equally hefty title: "Natural Architecture: A Report by Petrus Tafelmansius on the Establishment of a Golden Rule," According to the Principles of Tautism, Theism, Pythagoreanism and

### Church membership swells in Tanzania

SIXKONGE, Tanzania — In a village thousands of miles from his Pennsylvania home, the Rev. Gordon Mower listened spellbound to the harmonizing voices clapping hands and electric guitars in the concrete church in Africa. That night, he dreamed of his own death. Haunted by the dream the next morning, Mower, a retired minister turned missionary in the Moravian Church in the United States, concluded, "The church, as it is, is dying."

In the shadow of Mount Kilimanjaro, not in Europe where the church was born, or North America where it has existed for more than 260 years, a majority of the world's Moravian church members now live. But this East African land of stunning beauty also is ravaged by AIDS and hunger, and its home to many swollen-bellied children.

That is why Mower, 70, with his wife, daughter and teenage grandson, joined four other missionaries from Bethlehem, Pa., for a 2006 trip that church leaders hoped would bridge the gap

between the largely white, wealthier U.S. Moravian Church and the growing but poor church in Tanzania. They also hoped to reimagine the church's historic missionary role.

Spawned from the religious turmoil of the 15th century, the Moravian Church branched from Central Europe to North America in 1741 when missionaries founded Bethlehem, the first permanent Moravian community in North America.

Today, there are about 800,000 Moravian members in the world, more than at any time in the church's 550-year history. The complexion of the church, however, has changed, as it has in Christian denominations globally. In 1900, about 80 percent of Christians lived in

Europe or North America. Now, only 40 percent do.

Membership in the Tanzanian Moravian Church has more than tripled in a quarter century, while membership in the United States has dropped almost 18 percent.

What the missionaries found after landing on a dirt strip in the Tanzanian town of Taboga was faith.

By a tiny church, walling brought Mower's wife, Mary, and daughter Ruthie Huron, rushing in. More than a half-dozen people rocked back and forth in the pews, crying and praying with clenched fists that punched the walls. A woman fell to her hands outstretched and tears streaming down her face.

"When I was hungry, you

gave me food. I was cold and you gave me clothing," they sang in Swahili. "All you have done to me God will pay you back."

Those people who don't, Jesus will tell them to go to the everlasting fire."

Bishop Isaac Nicodemus, in pressed shirt and slacks, made his pitch to Mower. Nicodemus, whose province boasts 85,000 church members, asked for money to train nurses, buy used cars for church leaders, build an orphan center, a women's center, a vocational school, an Internet cafe. To "put the hand of love to those who need it," he said.

Nicodemus asked for books, computers, \$3,000 to drill wells and two-way radios so villages could communicate. Finally, he suggested an exchange program to bring more missionaries from the United States.

"There is no way we can conquer all of these needs," said Huron, 40, the next morning.

## Assemblies of God elect veteran administrator new chief executive

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — The Assemblies of God, one of the nation's largest Pentecostal denominations, has elected a seasoned church leader as its new chief executive.

George O. Wood, who has served as general secretary since 1983, was elected to the top post of general superintendent at the denomination's 52nd General Council meeting here.

Thomas Trask, who was elected to the top spot in 1993, is stepping down two years before his term expires. Wood will fill the remainder of that term.

Wood was ordained in 1967. The son of missionaries, Wood was born in China and was pastor of Newport-Mesa

Christian Center in Costa Mesa, Calif., for 17 years.

A general secretary, Wood oversaw the credentialing of ministers and church charting, among other responsibilities.

Based in Springfield, Mo., the Assemblies of God claims over 12,200 congregations in the United States with some 2.7 million members and adherents.

The denomination also elected an African-American to its executive leadership team for the first time. Zelle L. Smith Jr., president of the National Blue Fellowship of the Assemblies of God, was elected new executive director of U.S. missions.

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## Evangelicals among those seeking code of conduct for religious conversions

GENEVA (AP) — Evangelical groups have joined efforts spearheaded by Roman Catholic, Orthodox and mainstream Protestant churches to create a common code of conduct for religious conversions that would preserve the right of Christians to spread their religion while avoiding conflict among different faiths.

The World Council of Churches, which joined the Vatican last year in launching talks on a code, said Wednesday that the process was formally joined by the World Evangelical Alliance at a meeting earlier this month in France.

The code aims to ease tensions with Muslims, Hindus and other religious groups that fear losing adherents and resort to punishments as extreme as imprisonment and even death for converts from their faith and foreign missionaries.

The Taliban kidnapping of 23 South Korean Christians in Afghanistan last month under-

scored tensions. Two of the 23 have been killed. The accusations against the South Koreans include wanting to meet with former converts from Islam. But their church has denied they were trying to spread Christianity. The hard-line Islamic militants freed two women on Monday.

WCC said the code of conduct should serve as an "advocacy tool in discussions with governments considering anti-conversion laws (and) help to advance the cause of religious freedom." The rules should also address concerns in other religions about Christians seeking converts, and inspire those faiths to "consider their own codes of conduct," it added.

The council noted, however, that "none of the partners involved intend — nor have the means — to impose the code of conduct on their constituencies, but they all trust that it will be able to impact hearts and minds and allow for 'moral and peer pressure.'"

## Go to church, get a break on your children's tuition.

WISCONSINOWOC, Wis. (AP) — Parents whose children attend St. Jerome Parish School here can save \$1,400 off the annual tuition if they sign a contract agreeing to attend church regularly.

"Parents are the primary educators in the way of faith," said the Rev. John Voyce of St. Jerome Parish, which operates day school. "This is a call to inactive parents to renew their religious practices."

So Voyce, 63, created the new policy, which will begin when the new school year starts in September. Parents who want the stipend had to sign a contract agreeing to attend church at least seven of every 10 Sundays. Those who refuse to sign the contract or who don't meet the 70 percent cutoff must pay the regular annual tuition, of \$4,500 per child.

# FDA leans toward more cautious drug approval

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) — Under growing scrutiny since the blockbuster painkiller Vioxx was pulled from the market, the Food and Drug Administration in recent months has rejected a slew of experimental drugs or delayed their approval and required more data.

Besides keeping drugs some patients might desperately need off the market, the rejections have battered drug company stock prices and are expected to increase the cost and time it takes to develop a new drug, not to mention the price of developing future ones.

Denials and delays have hit everyone from pharmaceutical giants such as GlaxoSmithKline PLC, Merck & Co., Novartis AG, Sanofi-Aventis and Wyeth down to struggling startups trying to get their first drug on the market. The FDA also has recently stiffened warnings on several drugs, most prominently diabetes drugs Avandia and Actos, and five months ago made Novartis withdraw its

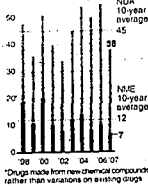

played any role in our actions is very hard to quantify."

But Chris Milne, associate director of the Tufts Center for the Study of Drug Development, said Friday the FDA has systematically implemented more controls for scrutinizing drugs, particularly for heart and liver side effects. While he thinks the trend on approvals is not yet clear, he said the FDA now is requiring experimental drugs similar to ones already on sale to be more effective and safer than their predecessors.

# Wars trigger ammunition shortage

## Law officer training sometimes curtailed

Troops training for and fighting the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan are firing more than 1 billion bullets a year, contributing to ammunition shortages hitting police departments nationwide and preventing some officers from training with the weapons they carry on patrol.

An Associated Press review of dozens of police and sheriff's departments found that many are struggling with delays of as long as a year for both handgun and rifle ammunition. And the shortages are resulting in prices as much as double what departments were paying just a year ago.

"There were warehouses full of it. Now that isn't the case," said Al Aden, police chief in Pierre, S.D.

Departments in all parts of the country reported delays or reductions in training and, in at least one case, a proposal to use point-ball guns in firing drills as a way to conserve real ammo.

Forgoing proper, repetitive weapons training comes with a price on the tickets, police say, in diminished accuracy, quickness on the draw and basic decision-making skills.

"You are not going to be as

sharp or as good, especially if an emergency situation comes up," said Sgt. James MacGillis, range master for the Milwaukee police. "The better-trained officer is the one that is less likely to use force."

The pinch is blamed on a skyrocketing demand for ammunition that followed the start of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, driven by the training needs of a military at war, and, ironically, police departments increasing their own practice regimens following the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks. The increasingly voracious demand for copper and lead overseas, especially in China, has also been a factor.

The military is in no danger

of running out because it gets the overwhelming majority of its ammunition from a dedicated plant outside Kansas City. But police are at the mercy of commercial manufacturers.

None of the departments surveyed by the AP said it had pulled guns off the street, and no departments reported problems buying ammunition. But others told the AP they face higher prices and months-long delays.

In Oklahoma City, for example, officers cannot qualify with AR-15 rifles because the department does not have enough. 223-caliber ammunition — a round similar to that fired by the military's M-16 and M4 rifles. Last fall, an

ammunition shortage forced the department to cancel qualification courses for several different guns.

"We've got to teach the officers how to use the weapon, and they've got to be able to go to the range and qualify with the weapon and show proficiency," said department spokesman Capt. Steve McCool. "And you can't do that unless you have the rounds."

In Milwaukee, supplies of 40-caliber handgun bullets and 223-caliber rifle rounds have gotten so low the department has repeatedly dipped into its ammunition reserves. Some weapons training has already been cut by 30 percent, and lessons on rifles have been altered to conserve bullets.

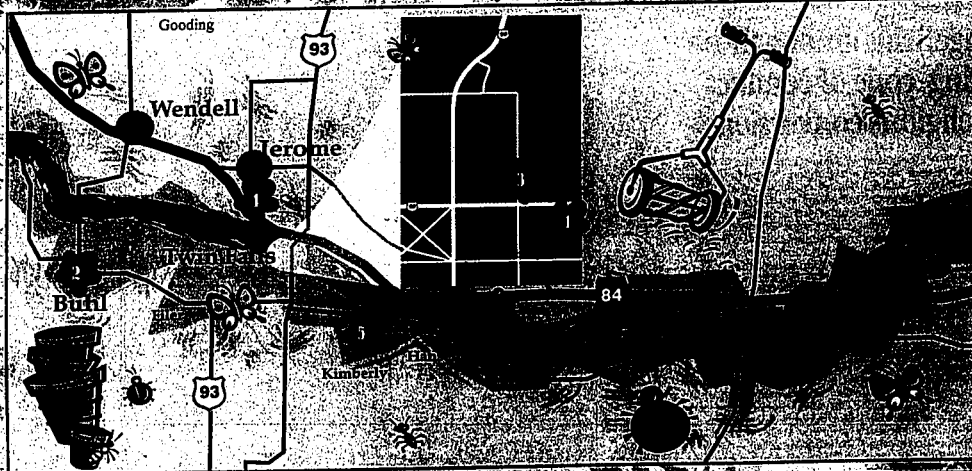
Unlike troops in an active war zone, patrol officers rarely fire their weapons in the line of duty. Even then, an officer in a firefight isn't likely to shoot more than a dozen rounds, said Asheville, N.C., police training officer Lt. Gary Gudac. That, he said, makes training with live ammunition for real-life situations — such as a vehicle stop — so essential.

"We spend a lot of money and time making sure the officers are able to shoot a moving target or shoot back into a vehicle," Gudac said. "Any time we have a deadly force encounter, one of the first things we pull is the officer's qualification records."
