BAGHDAD — A military panel acquitted U.S. Army Spc. Jorge G. Sandoval of two counts of murder Spc. lorge G. Sandoval of two counts of murder Friday, apparently swayed by testimony from fellow Army snipers, including one soldier from latho, that two facil men were killed on orders from a higher inhing soldier. Sandoval was convicted of a less serious charge of planting detonation wire on one of the bodies to make it look like the victim

Boy drowns in Jerome County pond

Toddler wandered through open gate

A 4-year-old boy drowned in a shal-low pond Thursday afternoon on his mother's property in Jerome County after apparently wandering through an open gate and falling into the water, authorities said.

Karla Maus called 911 shortly after 4 p.m. to report that she could not find her son. Chase Lucas. She had last seen Chase playing in the front yard at 308 West 350 South.

A neighbor who heard Karla yelling for her son began to search for the boy. The neighbor spotted something white in the four-foot deep pond. After he reached into the water yith a

rake and pulled out the toddler, he immediately began to administer CPR.

"When we got there the neighbor was just pulling him out of a pond on their (Karlas) property," said Jerome County Undersheriff Jocelyne Nunnally

took over CPR until paramedics
arrived on scene. The paramedics
rushed the child to St. Luke's Magic
Valley Regional Medical Center where

he was pronounced dead at 7:30 p.m.

said Nunnaily.
Maus had moved into the home
with the boy and his stepfather

Fighting off flu

State puts pandemic funds toward quick response

> By Nate Poppino Times News writer

t's a scenario no one wants to see. Businesses may lose one-fourth of

their employees. Schools and other facili-des may shut down to avoid becoming hotbeds for disease. And the federal gov-ernment has made it clear that Americans can't count on its services for solutions.

World health agencies are work-ing to delay a global influenza indemic, but one is likely to

happen eventually, Idaho Department of Health and Welfare spokesman Tom Shanahan said.
When it does, the state of

Idaho will be ready to respond, thanks to nearly \$4 million the state has received from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Since April 2006, the department has passed out hundreds of millions of dollars for pandemic preparedness to all 50 states, the District of Columbia, three large metropolitan areas and territories including the U.S. Virgin Islands and American Samoa. While Idaho, with its smaller population and national profile, received less money than most — the city of Chicago received more in national funds — the money has been well-spent, Shanahan said. The state should be able to respond quickly to a pandemic and, perhaps more important, stay open for business, something that may be difficult for government agenless and otherwital businesses if their staffs are sick or cairing for others.

Elmore Co. seizes record amount of pot

Authorities sacked the rgest pot bust in Elmore largest pot bust in Elmore County history on Wednesday, seizing 1,945 plants that had grown taller than eight feet, and another 225 plants hung to dry in a nearby camp-site, according to Elmore County Sheriff Rick Lawher.

The seizures followed almost immediately after a man hunting birds near King Hill called in a tip on

King Hill called in a up on Wednesday.

After the hunter led deputies to a section of a guich running along Glover Creek, off of U.S. Highway 30, they came upon the plantation and four suspects who fled into the fulls. Through an investigation initiated into the hills. Through an investigation initiated Thursday with the Idaho State Police, deputies ended up making six arrests — including three of the suspects who escaped the raid, Layher said.

Five of the arrested men have been charged with felony trafficking and a sixth has been charged with adding and abetting trafficking.
The plantation, which contained, fewer plants than a seizure earlier this year of 6,000 plants, nevertheless, yielded the

"Have somebody else trained in how to do pay-roll," she said. "The govern-ment needs and has a responsibility to stay in business, even if a pandem-ic miluenza should hit."

With another 5529,000 recently announced for health care entities in the state to stockpile critical medical equipment, both Goodale and Shanahan said they think the state is in they think the state is in good hands, thanks to the focus on local response.

I think we see that from "I think we see that from (Hurricane) Katrina," Shanahan said. "We need to have local response because that's where it's going to come from."

Alexander Flores, of Hayward, Callf., who was in the same squad as Sandoval on the day of the Aprik Rilling, testified their platoon leader said the suspect was 'our guy' and ordered them to 'move and the suspect was 'our guy' and ordered them to 'move the said the suspect was 'our guy'. The suspect, who wore dark clothing and used a sickle to cut grass in a field, matched the general description Iraqi soldiers had given the

Staff Sgt. Michael Hensley told
tim (Flores) to place the detonation wire on the body and

"He was just doing his job,

him to shoot a man who had
stumbled upon their snipers,

the soldiers.
"He (Hensley) asked me if I was ready. I had the pistol out. I heard the word shoot. I don't remember pulling the trigger. It took me a second to realize that the shot came from the pistol in my hand," Vela testified, crying. ed, crying. Vela sald as the Iraqi man

led, crying.

Vela said as the Iraqi man was convulsing on the ground. Hensley kind of laughed about it and hit the guy on the throat and said shoot again.

After he (the Iraqi man) was shot, Hensley pulled an AK-47 out of his rucksack and said, this is what we are going to say happened. Said Vela, who, testified on Thursday under a deal that bars his account of events from being used against him when he goes to trial. Sandoval, who was charged with murder because prosecutors said he did nothing to stop the killing also was acquitted Friday of charges he planted the weapph on the second man's body.

Health officials advise against giving cold and cough medicine to toddlers





Minidoka police probe rash of wild dog attacks

A recent rash of attacks by feral dogs in Minidoka County has left nearly 100 livestock dead, or injured and in danger of dying.

Between Sept. 4 and 18, at least six separate incidents in which dogs attacked sheep, goats and chickens were reported to the Minidoka County Sheriff's Office.

In responding to the inci-

Office.

In responding to the incidents, officers have shot and killed at least one dog and tranquilized two others, according to police reports.

Consistencies in descriptions of the dogs appear to indicate at least some of the dogs have to indicate at least some of the dogs have been involved in more than one attack on livestock.

"We do have a pack of feral dogs out in the county, and i know we've been able to take care of a few of them," Sheriff Kevin Halverson said the salay. Halverson said such incidents are more common in the early fall than other than the salay fall than other than the salay fall than other lives of the salay fall

have been devastating losses.

Jesse Rementeria said so far, dogs have killed about 18 of his sheep and wound-dabout 15 more. He estimated the cost of replacing the dead sheep at about \$2,000, not including the sheep that may die son from their wounds. He said he is frustrated because, although the Sheriff's Office is working to eliminate the pack of dogs that killed his sheep, he may never know whose dogs they are.

New phone scam targets seniors

Con artists prev on Medicare confusion among the elderly

As a smart medical technologist, adonna Hobbs said, she should have mown better.

Adonna Hobbs said, she should have known better.
But the man on the other end of the phone just kept pushing her to sign up for a Medicare card program she just "needed to have" to fill any prescriptons in the future. And Hobbs, a 61-year-old who doesn't yet use Medicare, finally greed, giving the man her bank routing information.

routing information.

That's when she learned from the man that her "free" program would actually cost between \$90 and \$300 — and possibly more, she said, if the scammers she fell victim to raided her

account.

"If they can con me, they can con. some of these older people," Hobbs said about her Wednesday experience. They can really rip them off bad." Older folks are the prime targets for the scam, which preys on people's uncertainties about Medicare parts A and B, Better Business Bureau spokes-woman Beve Bryant said. The bureaus



Boise office recently put out an alert about the scam, in which callers pur-porting to be from Med ProVision or Pharmaco Op call and offer drug dis-count cards that take advantage of the plans

plans.

They're hoping people won't really know enough information about that. Bryant said. There's so many choices when it comes to that. The seam isn't the first to use Medicare as a smoke screen, and its reliance on a Canadian company—locations in New York and Pennsylvania are apparently just dropboxes, the BBs reports — make it hard for local police to follow up on claims of fraud.

traud.
"It makes it very difficult when it's ut of the country," said Twin Falls olice Detective Erin Dayley, one of yo detectives assigned to financial

cases.

Though the department will try to follow up on phone numbers and names, Dayley said, they're restricted by interactional laws and the cost of artially flying witnesses and suspects.

into the country. The city prosecutor would have to pay to transport people into Idaho, she said, and Canada would have to shoulder some costs as well.

"Canada's probably not going to be jumping on the train either ... just because it costs so much money," she

because it costs so much money, she said.

In Hobbs' case, the sudden request for money at the end of the call tipped her to the scam, and she called the Better Business Bureau after hanging up. She changed her bank numbers the same day and approached police about the call, all good things, Dayley said. "(Victums) need to immediately contact their bank and tell them the situation," she said. "I've never had a bank that had a problem with it. ... They don't want to incur a loss either."

Though Med ProVision is listed by the Better Business Bureau, the caller probably got off this time. Calls to the number Hobbs provided could not be completed, and the only number the bureau supplied was a line to United HealthCare's SecureHortzons health care plans.

The ease with which scammers can operate these days wordes Hobbs, who said she definitely knew better.
"You don't know whether to do stuff on the Internet." She said. "You don't know what is safe anymore."

Cassia County adopts standards for police use of TASERs

Like officers for the sher-iff's department, Justice Center personnel will be required to complete a raining course before they are allowed to use a TASER.

TASER devices are

weapons designed to pro-vide guards and law enforce-ment officers with a non-

ment officers with a non-itabal alternative. In firefarms. When fired, a TASER deploys a pair of probes at a speed of about 180° feet per second. Connected to the TASER by insullated wires, the probes deliver an electrical impulse-to-the target they strike. Tresulting in an immedian-loss of the person's neuro-muscillar, control, and the ability to perform coordinat-

ed action for the duration of the impulse," according to TASERI Web aire.

Before using a TASER, jail personnel will be required to give verbal and visual warn-ing of their intent to use it, unless doing so would endanger other officers or would be impractical given the circumstances.

According to standards adopted Monday, the pur-pose, of glying warning -batine thing a TASER is to give the potential target 's

reasonable opportunity to voluntarily compil," as well as notify other officers that a TASER may be deployed. Standards also discourage officers from using TASER devices in a warlety of situations or to subdue certain targets, including pregnant women and elderly individuals.

After being subjected to use of a TASER, an individual must be medically cleared by no less than a certified Medical Technician.

Web sites had touted that restroom as a popular site of sex with strangers, and police reports over the summer.

On June 11, an undercover police officer was the men's room when Craig allegedly apped his feet and swiped his hand under the divider in way authorities sald was a sig-nal for someone wanted sex. Craig pleaded gullty to dis-orderly conduct, but when the incident became public, he denied ever seeking sex there

and said the officer misunder-stood his actions. Cruig Is now seeking to withdraw his guilty plea to the misdemeanor. The Minneapolis airport has more than 80 restrooms, but only two are being target-ed for the new divident of Craligs arrest. "These two have been the most problematic in terms of complaints from people and indications on Web sites that sexual activities are occurring

in them," said airport spokesman Patrick Hogan.
He said the dividers would, be installed within the next two months. Both restrooms, in the busy Northstar Crossing shopping area, had reputation on some Web sites as good places for bathroom liaisons. Hogan said airport officials had been checking the Web sites and found the activity had forppet off since Cruig's arrest.

Idaho's Attorney General brings three cases to U.S. Supreme Court

BOISE — For the first time in recent history, the idaho attorney general's office is asking the U.S. Supreme Court to hear three idaho cases in one year, officials said.

cases in one year, officials said.

That means a heavy work-load and extra expense for the office, even if the high court declines to hear the cases.

"It's a real long shot," attor-ney general spokesman Bob Cooper told The Associated Press. "There were 8,521 filings in 2005, and only 87 cases were argued. That gives you an idea of the chances."

But the stakes are high for each of the three cases. Two determines the fates of death row immates Mark Lankford and Maxwell Hoffman, and the third, involving prison immate. Krispen Estrada, determines whether the state can make psychosexual evaluations mandatory before convicted sex offenders are sentenced.

The Supreme Court has already considered the Lankford and Estrada peti-

tions, Cooper said, but hasn't released its decisions on whether it will hear the cases. When it reconvenes Monday, it will issue the list of cases that have been accepted for review by at least four of the nine justices.

If lawyers "haven't heard anything positive by this Monday, the chances of these things being accepted becomes infinitesimal," said James Macdonald, a professor

things being accepted becomes infinitesimal," said farness Macdonald, a professor at the University of Idalto's College of Law.

On average, the Supreme Court receives roughly 7,000 petitions each year, and only a few are granted full review, he said. Of those, most are handled through written briefs, of the said of those, most are handled through written briefs. On average, fewer than 100 cases a year are ever presented in oral arguments.

"The attorney general's office knows the stakes here. It's almost a matter of statistics that it's unlikely given alterion," Macdonald said. "Given the time and the budgetary constraints, the attorney general's office must feel that the issues are attractive enough."

One of Idaho's petitions concerns a 9th Circuit ruling ordering Lankford be released or retried. Lankford and his brother, Bryan Lankford, were convicted of murdering a Texas couple who had been camping in the northern Idaho wilderness in 1983. Bryan Lankford avoided the death penalty by testifying against his brother, while Mark Lankford was sent to death row.

The 9th Circuit found that Idaho law forbid Bryan Lankford's uncorroborated testimony against his brother, which meant that Mark

The attorney generals office maintains that Mark Lankford would have been convicted of murder with or without his brother's testimony, so the appellate ruling should be overturned. murder of Denise Williams, a police drug informant in an investigation of one of Hoffman's associates. The Estrada case asks the high court to decide if defendants can invoke their 5th Amendment right against Self-incrimination during the sentencing phase of a trial. Estrada was convicted of choking, battering and raping his estranged wife in front of their five children in 2001 and ragading police in a seven-hour standoff in Twin Falls. Estrada was sentenced to life in prison, eligible for parole after 25 years.



Woman trapped for eight days has severe injuries

Husband says red tape delayed search

SEATILE — A woman who spent eight days trapped in a wrecked vehicle has severe injuries, but her brain function is normal and she can brystician said Friday.

Tanya Rider, 33, was found dive but dehydrated at the botton of a steep ravine in suburban Maple Valley on Thursday, more than a week after she failed to return home from work. After beling cut out of her SUV by rescuers, she was taken to Seattle's Harborview Medical Center, where she was in critical condition.

Dr. Lisa McIntyre said during a hospital news conference Friday that while filder was doing better, she's "not ut of the woods yet." McIntyre said Rider's kidneys failed because of toxins from a muscle injury in the crash and dehydration. She was sedated with intravenous fluids.

Rider broke her collar bone and dislocated her shoulder in the accident and has pressure sores from the days of

being held by the sea belt, probably upside down, the doctor said. Her caregivers were not yet sure the extent of a leg injury but McInnye said they were hopeful it would not have to be amputated. She said Rider was probably alive because she was young and healthy and was wearing as east belt.

Judge William Downes of Casper this week ordered the DOE to provide an expert to Help him review safety documents concerning the Advanced Test Reactor in Idaho. After the Judge reviews them, he will determine whether to turn them over to the groups that requested them. nced

Reactor is one of three reac-tors at the 890-square-mile complex headquartered in klaho Falis. Built in 1967, the reactor bombards materials with neutrons to speed the effects of radiation and reveal weaknesses that might develop in materials

over time.

The Energy Department last year launched a 10-year, 5200 million program o extend the life of the 250-megawat reactor to 2040. The decision followed a proposal to consolidate U.S. production of plutonium-238 for NASA and national security agencies.

Mark Sullivan, a Jackson

lawyer, represents the groups Keep Yellowstone Nuclear Free and the Environmental Defense Institute in seeking reactor safety records.

same groups together The same groups together with other plaintiffs also sued the DOE in federal court in Idaho last year opposing the federal plans to extend the life of the reactor. The groups claim the federal government failed to do required environmental

do required environmental analysis.

The DOE has released some documents to the groups in response to their records request and lawsuit in Wyoming. But the DOE has refused to release safety assessments of the reactor

assessments of the reactor on security grounds. "The easiest way to deter-mine how to damage a reac-tor is to look at the safety envelope and accident analysis for the reactor, and then to determine the best then to determine the best way to bypass or defeat the engineered safeguards that can cause a small accident, and to make that small acci-dent bigger," federal lawyers have stated in court papers. "In other words, the (report), due to its safety analysis, contains everything a terror-ist needs."



Six die from brain-eating amoeba in warm lake waters

PHOENIX — It seemed like PHOENIX—It seemed like a headache, nothing more a headache, nothing more but when painkillers and a trip to the emergency room didn't fix Aaron Evans, the 14-year-old asked his dad if he was going to die.

"No, no," David Evans remembers saying.

"We didn't know. And here! am: I come home and I'm burying him," the grieving father said.

FOWL-erh-eye), a week earlier while swimming in the balmy shallows of Lake Hawasu near his home on the state's western border.

Such attacks are extremely rare, but they are usually fant and six boys and young men have died this year in three states. Aaron Evans' death Sept. 17 was the most recent. Some health officials have put their communities on high their communities on high alert, telling people to stay away from warm, standing ple to stay

away from warm, standing water.
"This is definitely some-thing we need to track," sald Michael Beach, a specialist in recreational waterborne illnesses for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
"This is a heat-loving amoeba. As water temperatures go up, it does better," Beach said.

"In future decades, as temperatures rise, wed expect to see more cases."





cent increase that had been expected. Inflation-adjusted spending was also up 0.6 percent, the best showing for this measure in 10 months.
"So far, the housing and credit problems have not dented the consumer's armor," said Joel Naroff, chief economist at Naroff Economic Advisors. "This was a good report as household spending stayed up while inflation came down."
An inflation gauge tied to consumer purchases showed prices excluding food and energy rose by just 1.8 percent in August, compared to

a year ago. That was the slowest year over-year price increase since February 2004. It marked the third straight month that core inflation has been inside the Fed's comfort zone of 1 per-

Fed's comfort zone of 1 percent to 2 percent increases.

The Fed last week cut a key interest rate by a bolder-than-expected half point in an effort to ward off a recession, a reversal from the stance they took at their previous meeting in August when they had continued to insist that inflation, not economic weakness, remained the

economy's biggest threat. While many economists believe the Fed will cut rates

believe the Fed will cut rates again in October, some analysts said that reduction may be a smaller quarter-point move because the spending report had shown unexpected strength.

The 0.6 percent gain incomes, slightly lower than had been expected. Analysts blamed that weakness on the fact that employers cut 4,000 jobs last month, the first monthly job loss in four years.



Myanmar troops fire in air, beat protesters and seal off monasteries to reassert control

YANGON, Myanmar (AP)
— Soldiers and police took control of the streets Friday, firing warning shots and tear gas to scatter the few prodemocracy protesters who ventured out as Myanmar's military junta sealed off Buddhist monasteries and cut public internet access.

On the third day of a harsh government crackdown, the streets were empty of the assess gatherings that had peacefully challenged the regime daily for nearly two weeks, leaving only small groups of activists to be chased around by security forces.

"Bloodbath again." Aungon

"Bloodbath again!" a Yangon resident yelled while watching soldiers break up one march by shooting into air, firing tear gas and beating people with clubs.

Thousands of monks had provided the backbone of the protests, but they were besleged in their monasteries, penned in by locked gates and barbed wire surrounding the compounds in the two biggest cities, Yangon and Mandalay, Troops stood guard outside and blocked nearby roads to keep the clergymen isolated. Many Yangon residents seemed pessimistic over the crackdown, fearing it fatally

All of the dead were helping build the four-lane suspension bridge, which was to link Vinh Long Province with Can Tho, the largest city in the Mekong Delta. Many of them, including Dung's family, came from the village of My

Hon, where the collapsed bridge section slammed to the ground Wednesday morning.

Dungs three soms and her husband — her entire family — were working on the bridge when it collapsed. Her husband is in the hospital, drifting in and out of consciousness.

Her third son, 23, survived

but fractured his skull.

Her 17-year-old son was killed instantly, Dung said, and her 19-year-old died in the hospital.


