

Hailey to tackle voter-approved pot measures

City officials to meet Monday to discuss laws

Unagine if Amsteidam suddenly popped up in the foothills north of the Magic Valley. Picture the problems that city of personal freedoms might encounter trying to mesh its liberal marjuana laws with a state and federal legal sys-

tem dead set against It. That's close to the chaos: Halley votures triggered when they narrowly adopted three initiatives, aimed of the liberalizing restrictions on marijuans. And the Halley City Council will begin navigating those shouls at a sneeting on Nov. 28. "The Halley City Council is faced with a number of challenges," wrote

Halley City Attorney Ned Williamson noted particular consequences of the initiatives most likely to trigger problems.

All three linitiatives raise serious questions, he said.

The three measures that passed were to legalize medical marijuana, make enforcement of marijuana laws the lowest police priority, and legalize inclustrial hemp. But voters turned down the irritiative that would have

legalized marijuans use and required

legalized marijuana use and required the city to regulare sales.

The first and possibly most contentious inditute, the Holley Medical Marijuana Act, would create an ordinate legalizing use and possession of 35 gmans for medicinal purposes. But the courts have held that state and federal laws, which criminalize marijuana, tump local ordinances, which attempt to decriminalize it.



But charges will be filled soon, authorities said Tuesday. On about 12-80 oil Lealey Morgan, of Rupert, clied after his white 1994 Ford Escort collided with a truck owned by PSI Waste Systems Inc. at the intersection of 700 North and 200 East in Mindoka County, said Mindoka County, said Mindoka County Chief Deputy Vie-Waston-Morgan was pronounced dead at the Silver of the County of the Cou

watson. Morgan wat mounced dead at the scene.
Police sald Morgan had the right-of-way. The driver of the truck, James Periotto, 22, drove through a stop sign. He later told police that he couldn't stop due to the later told police that he couldn't stop due to live the later told police control of later told police contr

ment. Alcohol, drugs or foul play are not suspected. Morgan, who did not wear a seat belt, was on his way back to work after a lunch break, police sald. He lived less than a mile from the intersection.

ZIMBABWE Ian Smith, Rhodesia's last white premier, dies

last white premier, dies
HARARE — Ian Smith,
Rhodesias last white prime
minister whose attempts to
resist black rule dragged the

civil war, died Tuesday at age
88.
Smith, who recently suffered a stroke, died at a clinic
near Capo Town, South
Africa, where he spent his
final years with his family,
said longtime friend Sam
Whaley, who was a senator in
the former Rhodesia.
Smith unilaterally declared

the former Rhodesia.
Smith unliaterally declared
independence from Britatin
on Nov. 11, 1965. He then
served as the prime minister
of Rhodesia from 1965 to
1979 during white minester,
rule. The country failed to
gain international recognition, and the United Nation
Imposed economic sanc-

tions. He finally bowed to international pressure, and Robert Mugabe's Zanu-PF party won elections in 1980.

ITALY Archaeologists unveil grotto linked to Romulus

ROME — Archaeologists on Tuesday unveiled an underground grotto believed

underground grotto believed to have been revered by ancient Romans as the place where a wolf nursed the city's legendary founder Romalus. Decorated with seashells and colored marble, the vaulted sanctuary is buried 52 feet inside the Palatine hill, the palatial center of power in imperial Rome, of the archaeologists sald at a news conference. conference

conference.

In the past two years, experts have been probleg the space with endoscopes and laser scanners, fearing that the fragile grotto, already partially cade-in, would not survive a full-scale dig said Glorgio-Croch an engineer, who worked on the signer.

The archaeologists are convinced that they have found the place of worship

where Romans believed a she-wolf suckled Romulus and Remus.

Ancient texts say the grotto known as the "Lupercale"— from "luph," Latin for she-wolf—was near the palace of Augustus, Rome's first emperor.

Washington Street North.
Clow said the idea is to implement the projects all at once
and wants them under way by
the end of 2010.
"What he tried to do is pull
together, in sort of one comprehensive view, a lot of ideas
that have been floating
around out there," said Curtis
Eaton, executive director of
the College of Southern Idaho
Foundation, who has been
involved in planning in the

past and owns property downtown. "I'm more opti-mistic today than I have been for years."

for years."

A community reinvestment program would require local banks to form a cooperative loan program to create special rates and assist investors in downtown. The idea is for them and business owners to share the risk—as well as any benefits—of working in downtown.

downtown.

To address infrastructure needs, Clow wants to form small sub-districts of the city, small sub-districts of the cley, such as the neighborhoods within South Park. He also wants state highways re-nouted around the townsite, building codes to be restructured and for parking to be reviewed, redesigned and more efficient. All ideas will improve the townsite, he said.

"Can you imagine what tis like to bring an old building up to code?" he asked. "It's an

unbellevable task."
His emphasis on Improving quality of life issues hit nearly all possible areas. He wants to build a nationally recognized memorial to honor residents memorial to honor residents or veterans; improve land-scaping at the townsite entrances; and develop new recreational facilities in the townsite, such as a recreation-al facility or even a man-made

townsite, such as a receasion and facility or even a man-made lake.

Not all of Clow's ideas were new. He pushed for lobbying the state Legislature for a local-option tax, which would allow Twin Falls to levy some taxes usually set by the state. He also wants to hear from retired city employees and revisited a proposal for a new government center, which was designed several years ago.

To streamline changes in the city, Clow wants any projects desired by the city or residents — such as restructuring

their own "advocates" so they are carried out with clear strategies.

The announcement by Clow, who was first elected to the City Council in 1993, marks the first time that an elected official has outlined such a broad and comprehensive plan to overhaul the city, some in attendance said. 

WASHINGTON — Despite a record number of recalls this year, potentially dangerous toys remain on store shelves days before the start of the busy holiday shopping season, consumer groups warmed Tuesday. Federal regulators, under fire for lax enforcement, urged shoppers to be vigilant.



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Cracking down on sanctuaries for illegal aliens

monus or post-rhaging.

"Part of leadership is lis-tening to the public's oppo-sition," he said sheepishly, finally acknowledging the three-quarters of New Yorkers who disapproved of

his plan.
But even as Spitzer retreats, the "Sanctuary City" movement—in which local jurisdictions declare they will not cooperate with the federal government to enforce Immigration laws — advances, even metastatore Fish. ermment to enforce immi-gration laws —advances, even metastasizes. Eight of the 10 largest cities in the United States have become 'sanctuaries,' including New York. Across the coun-try, hundreds of localities are part of the 'sanctuary movement,' formally or informally. Now San Francisco has taken an even more outra-geous step. According to Wednesdays' San Francisco Chronicle, the city council has voiced 10-1 to 'issue municipal Identification cards to dity residents

municipal identification cards to city residents— regardless of whether they are in the country legally Since the mayor, Gavin



Newsom, supports the measure, it's certain to be

measure, it's certain to be enacted.
Yet public opinion, notionwide, is strongly against such action.
In August, a Rasmussen poll found that by a 2-1 radio, the American people were even willing to cut off federal aid to 'sanctuary cities'. Indeed, since the failure of the open-borders immigration 'compromise' earlier this year, concern over illegal entry has reached critical political mass.

over niegal entry has reached critical political mass. What was once a vague worry about disorder and bilingualism has crystal-lized into a specific realiza-tion: Our homeland security and national sowerignty are threatened by unknown Intruders.

But the elites, of course, have been either clucless or actively hostile to this reassertion of our border integrity. This odd alliance of left-leaning mulliculturalists and right-leaning business lobbyists has done its best to lignore, even

business lobbylsts has done its best to Ignore, even scorn, legitimate popular apprehensions about unchecked inflow.

Happily, the Internet has changed the political power equation, enabling the grass roots to become grass fires. This columnist, for exam-This columnist, for exam-ple, first got wind of the San Francisco story from an activiste-mailer, pointing to a posting at Lucianne.com, which helpfully cited a fed-eral statute that's being violated: Section 274 of the immigration and Nationality Act of 1952, which forbids 'bringing in or harboring 'aliens and prescribes five years' imprisonment for each offense.

Lawyers might pettifog their way through differing interpretations of immigra-tion law, but it's obvious that San Francisco is deliberately seeking to flout fed-eral authority and national

The absence of color, once prized in French cooking, is now a relative rarily in a big dinner, especially the richly hued harvest feast that is Thanksgiving. But particularly on such a table, a bowl of mashed potatoes or a soothing gratin of celery root can be like brief moments calm amid the dinner's becautiful storm.

Potatoes and onions are most ubiqui-tous, hidden in stuffings, lacing soups or stocks, adding a key note to more than half the dishes at this holiday. Yet there's

Yet there's a particular charm to these kitchen workhorses—and to leeks and parsnips, celerine and the pale inner workings of celery hearts—that sometimes calls for a bit of showcasing. What better time than this to set them center-stage?

Take the delicate flavor of a parsnip, which has a subde minerality born from the earth in which it grows, and let it shine on Its own. Rosast a pan of the baby vegetables and serve them with a confertiof parsnip. Or rosast baby postaoes, then smash them for a luxurious, welvely side dish. A little butter and sea salt are all they need. You can team them with rosasted garlic and shallots, too, even all-the corne fraiche or horseradish. These are vegetables that either come from under the ground or grow low to it. Purces are a good fit for the holiday menu and a nice variation from the usual bowl of mashed vegetables. You can turn them into stunning soups, too, smooth and sophisticated yet incredibly easy (a bonus given the often frenzied final hours of cooking). Just purce cooked root vegetables with a healthy pour of milk or stock, adding cream if you want it richer, wafer to take it light. Jazz it up with spices or a dose of pepper, then sprinked with a confert of fresh herbs or a tangle of fried lecks.

Roasted or mashed, purneed or gratineed, the vegetables on the pale side of the Thanksgiving spectrum share an often subtle quality that's easily overlooked. So instead of relegating them to a side role, push them quiefly to the center of the table.

There, alongside the abundant colors of the harvest celebration, their pale fire might burn brighter than you would think.



Indian dish combines multiple coriander flavors

Single-family home construction hits lowest level in 16 years

Construction of single-family homes in October skidded to the lowest level in 16 years although the slide was cushioned somewhat by a rebound in apartment

building. Commerce The Commerce Department reported Tuesday that total housing construction rose by 3 percent in October to a season-lily adjusted annual rate of 1.229 million units. But all the strength occurred in a helpy rebound in apartment construction, which is extremely volatile.

The bigger single-family

sector actually fell by 7.3 percent to an annual rate of 884,000 units, the slowest pace since October 1991, when housing was going through another steep downturn. In another worri-

some sign, applications for building permits fell for a fifth straight month.

The current housing slump is expected to worsen further before starting to rebound in the middle of next year. The credit crunch that hit with force in August has caused financial institutions to tighten up on their lending standards, making it harder for prospective borrowers to get home loans.

loans.

In addition, some 2 million borrowers who took out subprime loans during the peak of the five-year housing boom are now seeing low introductory rates reset to much higher levels, adding \$250 to \$300 to the

typical monthly payment. The concern is that this will fuel a tdal wave of defaults over the next two years, dumping even more unsold homes onto the market.

On Wall Street, investors discounted the housing news to hunt for bargains, pushing stock prices higher following steep losses in rading on Monday.

They noted that applications for new building permits, considered a good barometer of future activity, fell 6.6 percent to an annual rate of

The association's monthly survey of builder sentiment remained at a record low in early November. Fed forecasts slower growth next year

Unemployment also expected to rise

WASHINGTON — The Federal Reserve reported Tuesday that It expects slower economic growth and a slight bump up in unemployment next year due to the housing slump and a credit crunch. The board also said, however, that it thinks inflation will remain moderate.

The fresh assessment of the country's future economic performance was issued by the Fed in the first of its quarrely reports to the nation.

On the growth side, the Fed said it believes that business growth will slow next year, with their gross domestic product (GDP) coming in between LB percent and 2.5 percent. That would be weaker than how the Fed expects the economy to perform this year and would mark a downgrade to a previous projection released in the summer.

The credit crunch has both made it more costly and more difficult for people and companies to borrow money. The worst carnuge has taken place in the market for "subprime" home loans — those made to people with sporty credit histories. Credit problems started there and have spread to more creditworthy borrowers including those that are looking for home loans of more than \$417,000, so-called jumbo loans.

The overriding worry is that these housing and credit problems will make people less inclined to spend, putting a damper on economic growth.





In today's deal, West had the chance to persuade declarer that all was well, when in fact there was trouble brewing.

West led the heart queen against three no-trump, and South took stock. If diamonds behaved, eight tricks were immediately available, with spades as the most likely suit to provide the ninth. Under normal circumstances, so long us the spade honors were split between East and West, two finesses would net the game. But as dummy lacked the entries for a second finesse, East would need to hold either both spade honors, or honor doubleton. So declarer resigned himself to running the diamond tricks, then hoping that something nice would happen for him in the spade suit. As you can see, that was going to be the case.

After winning the second heart lead declarer haved the diamond.

After winning the second heart lead, declarer played the diamond ace, all following. But when the diamond queen was led, something strange happened — West dropped the jack. This put a different slant on the forthcoming spade play, for now the diamond 10 would provide the entry for a second spade finesse. So, the diamond queen was confidently overtaken with dummy's king — and East showed out.

South was marked with three diamonds on the bidding, and as the jack would be finessed against on the third oe messea against on the third round, dropping it on the queen in the hope that declarer would go wrong could not hurt. It certainly worked, for now declarer went off in a laydown game.
