U.S.: Gas to peak at \$4.15 a gallon and stay high

WASHINGTON — If it's a shock to pay \$60, or even \$100, to fill up your gas tank, you better get used to it.

Prices around \$4 a gallon are likely to be here for quite a while.

The Energy Department said Wednesday it expects gasoline prices to peak in August at about \$4.15 on average — a dime more than today.

But wait: There won't be much relief. The government estimates that prices at the pump could stay near that level the rest of this year — and next.

Oh, and the government tends to err on the optimistic side.

Gay Caruso, head of the federal Energy Information Administration, delivered the sober news Wednesday at a congressional hearing on energy prices and the future of oil.

Even as he spoke, oil prices jumped again, edging for a time above \$138 a barrel and putting yet more upward pressure on gasoline prices.

By the end of the day the market seemed ready to set new records above \$140 a barrel.

A drop in gasoline inventories, concerns about hurricanes that could disrupt Gulf of Mexico supplies, and most important the high oil prices all have contributed to a belief that the upward spiral of gasoline costs will continue at least for a few months, according to Caruso as well as private energy experts.

Motorists are paying \$4.05 a gallon on average nationwide, and considerably more in some parts of the country, according to a survey of gas stations by

AAA and the Oil Price Information Service. That's an increase of nearly \$1 a gallon since January.

And little relief is in sight. Prices are likely to remain close to or above \$4 for the rest of the year and average \$3.92 a gallon through 2009, the Energy Department agency forecasts.

Crude oil prices are expected to average \$126 a barrel in 2009, or \$4 a barrel higher than this year, as oil supplies and demand will remain tight, Caruso told the House Select Committee on Energy Independence and Global Warming.

"The consensus view," said Rep. Edward Markey, D-Mass., the committee's chairman, "is that oil above

Alleged radio remark irks Democrats

Bell says accusations are baseless, harmful

A local family-owned radio network has lost advertising since Monday when a morning show personality on its AM station was charged by state Democrats with racially

slurring Barack Obama. Zeb Bell, 60, a conservative talk show host who has leased air time on Rupert-based KBAR AM for eight years, denies he made any racial remarks targeted at the presumptive Democratic nominee. But he admits his

guest and friend Frosty Woodruff did. Thomas Garcia, a Obama supporter, circulated an e-mail alleging that Bell called Obama the "black Negroid Barack Hussein Obama" on his Monday morning show. More than a dozen irate

Magic Valley residents, who had read the e-mail but had not heard the show, complained to Bell, he said. Three long-time advertisers have threatened to cancel their spots unless the station

Sheriff: Inmate tried to mail meth from jail

Some Twin Falls County inmates try to get dope into jail, but one prisoner allegedly tried to send it out in a letter, according to court documents filed this week in Twin Falls County.

Sheriff Wayne Tousley said he hasn't seen this type of situation in 27 years at the Twin Falls County Jail.

"That's one of the first cases I've heard of, of someone trying to ship dope out of the jail," Tousley said. But he added, "there could be a piece of mail that got by us."

Inmate Robert Z. Rackham, 24, has been in jail since May 14 when he was brought in on two warrants for probation violations stemming from DUI charges, said Lori Nebeker, spokeswoman for the sheriff's department.

Rackham was subsequently charged Monday with felony possession of a controlled substance, methamphetamine or amphetamine, in connection to the alleged letter.

Deputies assert Rackham

tried to send drugs to a house in Twin Falls where his dad lives at 601 Quincey Street. The allegation unfolded after deputies came across a letter, lacking a recipient's name, bound for the Quincey Street address, records show.

Outgoing mail needs to have a recipient's name on it, so deputies opened the letter, which contained a powder that tested positive for meth. Deputies proceeded to search the cell block where Rackham was staying and found some more material that tested positive for meth, which was inside a vent on the ceiling, records show.

Rackham told deputies he wanted a lawyer when they tried to interview him. Deputies assert Rackham previously sent mail to his dad, Blain Rackham, from the jail, according to records filed Monday in court.

Blain Rackham confirmed Wednesday that his son is in jail, but he said he didn't know about the alleged mailing. "We haven't gotten any letters from

Projects, cost for T.F. road plan reduced

The big push to unclog traffic in Twin Falls is about to hit more roadblocks.

Citing funding concerns, city officials have directed consultants to cut the number of projects in an updated transportation plan. The revised plan, which is still in the works, will cut costs by millions while maintaining but not improving congestion.

The 20 capital improvement projects will be cut in about half. Nearly 70 projected traffic lights will dip to 11, and the total cost reduced from more than \$100 million to about \$33 million. The original idea to relieve traffic congestion in some parts while maintaining it elsewhere was substituted with simply maintaining current levels on all

roads but Blue Lakes Boulevard North, where a small stretch will grow worse.

"It's not something we believed we could accomplish within the terms of the transportation plan's 20 years," said Twin Falls City Engineer Jackie Fields. "To improve has a price tag we believed was excessive."

Convinced the projects outlined several months ago would be too costly, city staff asked Mike Pepper of KMP Consultants to

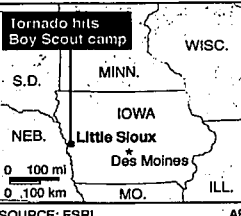

4 dead, 40 hurt as tornado hits Boy Scout camp

DES MOINES, Iowa — A tornado struck a western Iowa Boy Scout camp Wednesday, killing at least four people and injuring 40, an Iowa Homeland Security spokeswoman said.

A search and rescue team has been deployed to the camp near Little Sioux, Iowa. Homeland Security spokeswoman Julie Tack said. She said the camp was covered with debris and downed trees after the tornado hit about 7 p.m.

Some victims might be trapped under debris, Tack said.

"We are still receiving information and we're processing it as we receive it," she said.

There were 93 campers and 25 staff members at the camp, Tack said. The campers were between 13 and 18 years old and were attending a leadership training camp.

Plane crash survivors shared food, huddled together for warmth

SANTIAGO — A plane carrying 10 people that disappeared four days ago in Chile's frigid southern forests was found Wednesday with

nine survivors who stayed alive by huddling for warmth, sharing food and sheltering in the plane's wreckage. The only family was 65-year-old pilot Nelson Bahamondes, who survivors said apparently died from internal bleeding two days after the Cessna Caravan crashed while flying the Chilean passengers on a domestic flight to a village in

AYSEN REGION

Deputy Interior Minister Felipe Harboe said Bahamondes maneuvered the plane to lessen the impact of the crash in the heavily forested area. Survivors called him a hero. The cause of the accident was not immediately known. The plane, which disappeared Saturday after taking off the Chilean city of Puerto

Montt en route to La Junta, came to rest suspended in the area's thick trees, but close enough to the ground that the survivors could enter the wreckage, officials said.

ITALY

'Unicorn' deer found in Italian nature preserve

ROME — A deer with a single horn in the center of its head — much like the fabled, mythical unicorn — has been spotted in a nature preserve in Italy, park officials said Wednesday.

"This is fantasy becoming reality," Gilberto Tozzi, director of the Center of Natural Sciences in Prato, told The Associated Press.

The 1-year-old roe deer — nicknamed "Unicorn" — was born in captivity in the research center's park in the Tuscan town of Prato, near Florence, Tozzi said.

It is believed to have been born with a genetic flaw; his twin has two horns.

Calling it the first time he has seen such a case, Tozzi said such anomalies among deer may have inspired the myth of the unicorn.

"This shows that even in past times, there could have been animals with this anomaly," he said by telephone.

Single-horned deer are rare but not unheard of — but even more unusual is the central positioning of the horn, experts said.

\$100 a barrel is going to be with us for some time."

The Energy Department's statistical agency projects a price of prices declining to \$96 a barrel in 2010 but then increasing to \$107 by 2015. Markey said he doubted those numbers and noted that EIA projections in the past have been overly optimistic when it

comes to energy prices.

Predicting future oil, and gasoline prices is highly uncertain with the volatile global oil markets, Caruso acknowledged.

The agency bases its gasoline projections on assumptions of future oil prices, expectations of demand and economic trends. It has revised its figures upward several times since last fall — not having anticipated the huge surge in global oil costs.

"They usually dramatically underestimate the cost," said Ell Hopson of the Union of Concerned Scientists, which has examined annual EIA price projections going back to 2003. Each year the average price predictions were understated by 36 to 80 cents a gallon, said Hopson.

A panel of energy experts, meanwhile, told the House last week that they should expect any quick fixes to the country's energy problems.

They said one answer is more conservation and a shift to alternative fuels — transitions that would take time. Caruso told the lawmakers that new auto fuel economy requirements and the increased use of ethanol and other alternative fuels are expected to produce "a substantial reduction" in oil use and oil imports over the next decades.

There's "no short-term fix, no panacea," said Karen

Harbert, executive vice president of Institute for 21st Century Energy, a group affiliated with the U.S. Chamber of Commerce.

Amy Meyers Jaffe, an expert on energy markets at Rice University, said there is a growing scarcity of energy commodities, relative to demand, that has pushed oil prices higher.

Democratic presidential hopeful Sen. Barack Obama on CNBC called for a second

economic stimulus tax rebate to "put hundreds of dollars into the pockets of families to offset some these rising (energy) costs during this summer and into the fall."

His Republican rival, Sen. John McCain, renewed his call for suspending the 18.4-cent-a-gallon federal gasoline tax to help people cope. Obama has called that a gimmick, and most economists have rejected it as a solution.

Road and Oxley both said they had not directly heard the statement.

Bell said he is accustomed to facing accusations that he advocates racist views, in par-

icular because of his tough rhetoric on illegal immigration. But this is the first time he's been openly accused of using a racial slur, he said.

The negative publicity revealed to Bell the existence of an online campaign against him that pre-dates this incident.

A Web site, with a domain name registered to Rudy Castro of Heyburn, appears as a vehicle for counter-attacks against Bell. The Web page contains statements attributed to Bell, personal and aggressive comments about him and a photo of a person wearing Ka Klux Klan garb at a 1994 rally in Jerome, which the Web site says, "we believe" is Bell.

Castro has previously been outspoken against the Republican Party in letters to editor of the *Times-News*. Halderson said he does not know what history the men share.

Castro did not return phone calls to his home and work Wednesday.

Since throngs of e-mails and phone calls attacking Bell started this week, the station owner told him he has been losing sponsors, Bell said. Bell said he believes the Web site is the second prong of an attempt to sabotage him by the same liberals.

"It's not a race issue," Bell said. "The liberals feel they got their toes stepped on. It has nothing to do with his color. I don't like the man."

Oxley said whether Bell is preaching racism or hatred, it's the wrong message.

"We think those advertisers should know that he has made this clearly racist statement, and should think about pulling their advertisement," Oxley said. "It sounds to me like the best way to deal with these folks is to ignore them, I don't think that people like this who spew this sort of hatred get much audience aside from people who are also filled with hate."

The changes eliminate original plans for improving congestion on some roads. Pepper said public comment has been limited so that he and his colleagues had to heed the city's suggestions.

Road improvement funding comes from the state and federal government, as well as developers who are asked to contribute. But the city's annual budget of \$750,000 for road improvement falls short for the original projects, Fields said. Although city officials expect federal funding for widening Washington Street North, such funding is rare.

With the revisions, that entire stretch from Pole Line Road to Addison Avenue would become "approaching unstable flow."

"Blue Lakes is our anomaly," said Fields. "If we can get it steady, we're doing pretty good."

To meet the plan's provisions, all capital projects must meet three general requirements: connectivity, design and congestion. Two advisory committees have weighed in, and two open houses have been held.

A combined \$10.6 million to widen Hanksin Road from Falls Avenue to Kimberly Road was reduced to a smaller scale at a cost of \$2.3 million. The widening of Eastland Drive from Candleridge Drive to Orchard Drive was also reduced from \$17 million to \$11 million.

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# U.S. life expectancy tops 78 as top diseases decline

ATLANTA (AP) — For the first time, U.S. life expectancy has surpassed 78 years, the government reported Wednesday, although the United States continues to lag behind about 30 other countries in estimated life span.

The increase is due mainly to falling mortality rates in almost all the leading causes of death, federal health officials said. The average life

expectancy for babies born in 2006 was about four months greater than for children born in 2005.

Japan has the longest life expectancy — 83 years for children born in 2006, according to World Health Organization data. Switzerland and Australia were also near the top of the list.

The international compar-

isons are not that appealing, but we may be in the process of catching up," said Samuel Preston, a University of Pennsylvania demographer. He is co-chairman of a National Research Council panel looking at why America's life expectancy is lower than other nations.

The new U.S. data, released Wednesday, come from the National Center for Health

Statistics. It's a preliminary report of 2006 numbers, based on data from more than 85 percent of the death certificates collected that year.

Life expectancy is the period a child born in 2006 is expected to live, assuming mortality trends stay constant.

The 2006 increase is due mainly to falling mortality rates for nine of the 15 leading

causes of death, including heart disease, cancer, accidents and diabetes.

The overall death rate fell from 799 per 100,000 in 2005 to about 776 the following year.

Health statisticians noted declines of more than 6 percent in stroke and chronic lower respiratory disease (including bronchitis and emphysema), and a drop of

more than 5 percent in heart disease and diabetes deaths. Indeed, the drop in diabetes deaths was steep enough to allow Alzheimer's disease — which held about steady — to pass diabetes to become the nation's sixth leading cause of death.

The U.S. infant mortality rate dropped more than 2 percent, to 6.7 infant deaths per 1,000 births, from 6.9.

# Slaying of two girls stuns small town in Oklahoma

WELEETKA, Okla. (AP) — Maybe they stumbled onto a crime in progress. Perhaps they were ambushed by "drunks and dopeheads," or maybe it was some kind of thrill killing.

The slayings of two girls — ages 11 and 13 — who were shot along a rural back road have baffled investigators and struck fear into townspeople, who are now afraid to let their children out of their sight.

"Still no motive, and I hate to say that," Ben Rosser, an agent with the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation, said Wednesday. "This could be some kind of random thrill killing. It could be an attempted abduction. It could be somebody that for whatever reason had a personal motive, maybe mistaken identity or possibly they did interrupt something down near the bridge. We just don't know."

Taylor Paschal-Placker, 13, and Skyia Whitaker, 11, were killed Sunday afternoon near a bridge. Both had been shot in the head and chest.

The brutality has rattled this working-class community of 1,000, situated 70 miles south of Tulsa.

Weleetka has long been the type of place folks moved to to escape many of the evils of the world. But townspeople said methamphetamine use — a particular scourge in small-town Oklahoma and elsewhere in the nation's heartland — has gotten bad around here, and crime is up. "You think you're safe anywhere, but you're not. All the thugs is moving out here, too," said Skyia's grandfather, Jimmie Farrow. "It's a whole new ballgame."

Investigators said two guns were used in the killings, which suggest there were two gunmen. But beyond that, locals have been left to guess who did it and why.

"I could walk down Main Street in Weleetka and maybe pass the individual and I wouldn't know it right now," Rosser said. He added: "This should just hit to the very core of America. I just think two little girls can't go walking down a country lane road in this day and age. It's pretty sad."

Authorities are examining the tracks, shell casings, bullets and shoeprints for any possible leads. They said they suspect a local person was involved because the killings occurred in such an isolated area. Rosser said that nothing is being ruled out but that there is no indication family or friends were involved.

"Full autopsy results have not been released, but investigators said it appears the girls were not molested. They noted the youngsters were clothed and the bodies were found only about a half-hour after the girls began walking."

Sheriff Jack Choate, admitted: "We don't know what the threat is, but if it were me, I wouldn't let my kids out walking unless there were other people around, you know, that you know."

Children are heeding the warning. "I'm scared to go out of my house right now," said 14-year-old Tyler Couch, who knew the victims.

Taylor's family moved here to get her away from the violence in Oklahoma City, according to her uncle, Joe Mosher. Skyia's moved from Baxter Springs, Kan., outside of Joplin, Mo., for a taste of the simple life, Farrow said.

Both families thought they found what they were looking for along an isolated

country road, where the neighbors are hidden from one another by the thick woods, Farrow said.

Farrow and other neighbors said they have noticed a change in the backwoods. Time was, Farrow said, he could go hunting on his property, leave his gun propped up against the house, and nobody would touch it. In the past 10 years, he has been robbed three times, he said.

The dirt roads, which Skyia and Taylor walked dozens of times for sleepovers, have changed, too, according to Farrow.

"It just went downhill out in the country," he said. "These roads ain't nothing but drunks and dopeheads on the weekends. Sometimes, you have to drive around them, they're passed out in the middle of the road."

A neighbor, Ross Padgett, said drugs and the criminal element are worse than ever.

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# Calif. obscenity trial suspended over judge's Web site

PASADENA, Calif. — A federal judge overseeing a case exploring the extreme fringe of pornography suspended the obscenity trial after a newspaper reported he had posted sexually explicit photos and videos on his own Web site.

Judge Alex Kozinski, chief judge of the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, granted a joint prosecution and defense motion to suspend the trial after prosecutors said they needed time to look into the issue. The jury was ordered to return on Monday.

"I'm not going to say anything. The trial is ongoing," Kozinski told a reporter as he left.

The suspension came after jurors spent hours at the Pasadena offices of the 9th Circuit watching videos of

bestiality and extreme fetishes that are evidence in the trial of a Los Angeles businessman who sold them.

Kozinski indicated that the attorneys he would be willing to recuse himself but noted that the trial had already begun and jurors had already seen two of the graphic movies.

Earlier, as the jury was hearing opening statements in a downtown Los Angeles courtroom, the Los Angeles Times reported on its Web site that Kozinski had posted sexual material on his Web site and then blocked access after being interviewed about it Tuesday evening.

The images included a video of a "half-dressed man cavorting with a sexually aroused farm animal," the newspaper reported.

Kozinski told the Times that he thought the material on his Web site couldn't be seen by the public. He said he

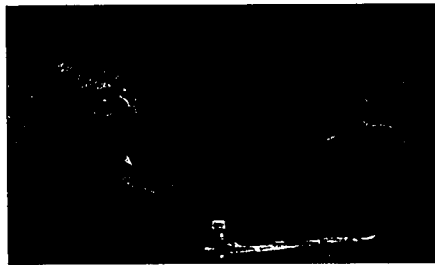
didn't believe the images were obscene.

"Is it prurient? I don't know what to tell you," he told the newspaper. "I think it's odd and interesting. It's part of life."

Kozinski, 57, was assigned to oversee the trial in U.S. District Court in Los Angeles under a program in which appellate judges occasionally handle criminal trials at the district court level.

Kozinski became the youngest federal appeals court judge in the nation when he was appointed at age 35 to the bench by former President Ronald Reagan in 1985. He is known as a strong defender of free speech and First Amendment rights.

Before the site was blocked, visitors to <http://alex.kozinski.com> saw a message: "Ain't nothin' here. 'All best be movin' on, compadre." Visitors who knew about a subdirectory

could see the sexually explicit materials, as well as some of Kozinski's legal writings and personal photos, the Times said.

Jurors in the obscenity case were being asked to decide whether or not the films businessman Ira Isaacs distributed are obscene under

federal law.

They must decide if the films appeal to a loathsomeness or degrading type of sexual intercourse and whether the sexual conduct is "patently offensive," judging by the community's standards.

Isaacs, 57, is charged with four counts, including

importation or transportation of obscene material for sale. He faces a maximum of 20 years in prison. Prosecutors also are seeking forfeiture of assets obtained through his video sales. Two of the original six counts in his indictment were dropped.

# Lawmakers say Capitol computers hacked by Chinese

WASHINGTON — Multiple congressional computers have been hacked by people working from inside China, lawmakers said Wednesday, suggesting the Chinese were seeking lists of dissidents.

Two congressmen, both longtime critics of Beijing's record on human rights, said the compromised computers contained information about political dissidents from around the world. One of the lawmakers said he'd been discouraged from disclosing the computer attacks by other U.S. officials.

Rep. Frank Wolf, R-Va., said four of his computers were compromised beginning in 2006. New Jersey Rep. Chris Smith, a senior Republican on the House Foreign Affairs Committee, said two of the computers at his global human rights subcommittee were attacked in December 2006 and March 2007.

Wolf said that following one of the attacks, a set of license plates belonging to Chinese officials went to the home of a dissident in Fairfax County, Va., outside Washington and photographed it.

During the same time period, the House International Relations Committee — now known as the House Foreign Affairs Committee — was targeted at least once by someone working inside China,

said committee spokeswoman Lynne Weil.

Wednesday's disclosures came as U.S. authorities continued to investigate whether Chinese officials secretly copied the contents of a government laptop computer during a visit to China by Commerce Secretary Carlos M. Gutierrez and used the information to try to hack into Commerce Department computers.

The Pentagon last month acknowledged at a closed House Intelligence committee meeting that its vast computer network is scanned or attacked by outsiders more than 300 million times each day.

Wolf said the FBI had told him that computers of other House members and at least one House committee had been accessed by sources working from inside China. The Virginia Republican suggested that Senate computers could have been attacked as well.

He said the hacking of computers in his Capitol Hill office began in August 2006, that he had known about it for a long time and that he had been discouraged from disclosing it by people in the U.S. government he refused to identify.

The problem has been talked about this issue," he said. "Every time I've started to do something I've been told 'You can't do this.' A lot of people have made it very, very difficult."

The FBI and the White House declined to comment. The Bush administration has been increasingly reluctant publicly to discuss or acknowledge cyber attacks, especially ones traced to China.

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In the Senate, the office of Sen. Dick Durbin, D-Ill., who chairs the Senate's subcom-

mittee on humanitarian issues, asked the sergeant at arms to investigate whether Senate computers have been compromised.

Wolf said the first computer hacked in his office belonged to the staffer who works on human rights cases and that others included the machines of Wolf's chief of staff and legislative director.

"They knew which ones to

get," said Dan Scandling, who currently is on leave of absence from his job as Wolf's chief of staff. "It was a very sophisticated operation," he said. "The FBI verified that it had been done."

Smith said the attacks on his office computers were "very much an orchestrated effort."

He said that after the first intrusion in December 2006,

"that was the last time" his office put the names of dissidents on its computers.

Smith said the intrusions were discovered when House technicians found a virus that seemed designed to take control of the computers. Technical experts who cleaned the computers reported that the attacks seemed to come from the People's Republic of China.

### Semanko opens Pandora's box for GOP

Followers of maverick Republican presidential candidate Ron Paul failed last month in their attempt to hijack the state GOP organization by winning control of party central committees in key counties. But they could sneak in the back door at the state Republican convention, which opens in Sandpoint this morning.

Norm Semanko, executive director of the Idaho Water Users Association, announced Monday he would challenge party Chairman Kirk Sullivan. The Paulites embrace Semanko.

By forging a coalition at the convention with former state Sen. Rod Beck, who has made it his life's mission to close Republican primary elections to independents and Democrats, and with fringe-right social conservatives like Bryan Fischer, they might just succeed in replacing Sullivan with a party boss beholden, in part, to Paul supporters.

Grown-ups in the party — Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter, Sen. Mike Crapo, Congressman Mike Simpson, Lt. Gov. Jim Risch, Attorney General Lawrence Wasden and most Republicans in the Legislature — support Sullivan because of his willingness to say no to harebrained ideas that drive voters away.

But all bets are off if Semanko is the chairman. Newcomers like Paul loyalist Ryan Davidson, who engineered three successful marijuana legalization initiatives in Haley last month, won't just have a place at the table. They'll help write the GOP platform.

Semanko's election would also guarantee bitter division of the party just in time for the general election in November. Party activists statewide will balk at working with Semanko if he's carrying Ron Paul's baggage.

There are echoes here of 1990, when fractious and rudderless Idaho Republicans got their clocks cleaned by the Democrats. It took another grown-up, former lieutenant governor and future governor Phil Batt, to set things right.

Simply put, the Idaho GOP doesn't need the trouble that electing Semanko would bring.

## Can Obama call himself a Christian?

Barack Obama's presidential campaign plans to strike at the heart of the Republican base by attempting to woo Evangelical Christians and Roman Catholics to his side.



The Christian Broadcasting Network's David Brody first broke the story on his blog "The Brody File." Obama's campaign for the conservative Christian vote, which has largely gone to the Republican presidential candidate in recent elections, has been dubbed the "Joshua Generation Project." Joshua, Moses' successor, led the Israelites into the Promised Land. It wasn't the group that fled Egypt in the Exodus, though. They died in the wilderness, lacking faith in God's promise. It was the next generation that Joshua led into Canaan. Apparently, if we have enough faith in Obama, he will lead us all into a new America, but if we vote for John McCain, we will demonstrate a lack of faith (in Obama) and die in the political badlands.

Obama is better at biblical language and imagery than any Democrat in modern times. He certainly beats Howard Dean, now the chairman of the Democratic National Committee, who once offered Job as his own favored New Testament book. This is cynical manipulation of the devout and it is no better when Democrats do it than when Republicans use religious language for partisan advantage.

Obama has declared himself a committed Christian. He can call himself anything he likes, but there are certain markers among the evangeli-



icals he is courting that one must believe in order to qualify for that label.

Some insight into Obama's "Christianity" comes from an interview he gave in 2004 to *Chicago Sun-Times* religion editor Cathleen Falsani for her book, "The God Factor: Inside the Spiritual Lives of Public People." "I'm rooted in the Christian tradition," said Obama. He then adds something most Christians will see as universalism: "I believe there are many paths to the same place, and that is a belief that there is a higher power, a belief that we are connected as a people."

Falsani correctly brings up John 1:6 in which Jesus says of himself, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." That sounds exclusive, but Obama says it depends on how this verse is heard. According to Falsani, Obama thinks that "all people of faith — Christians, Jews, Muslims, animists, everyone

— know the same God." (Her words.)

Evangelicals and serious Catholics might ask if this is so, why did Jesus waste His time coming to Earth, suffering pain, rejection and crucifixion? If there are many ways to God, it might have sent down a spiritual version of table manners and avoided the rest.

Here's Obama telling Falsani: "The difficult thing about any religion, including Christianity, is that at some level there is a call to evangelize and proselytize. There's the belief, certainly in some quarters, that if people haven't embraced Jesus Christ as their personal savior, they're going to hell." Falsani adds, "Obama doesn't believe he, or anyone else, will go to hell. But he's not sure he'll be going to heaven, either." Again, that is contrary to what Evangelicals and most Catholics believe.

Here's Obama again: "I don't presume to have knowledge of what happens after I die. When I tuck in my daughters at night and I feel

like I've been a good father to them, and I see that I am transferring values that I got from my mother and that they're kind people and that they're honest people, and they're curious people, that's a little piece of heaven."

Any first-year seminary student could deconstruct such "works salvation" and wishful thinking. Obama either hasn't read the Bible, or if he has, doesn't believe it or if he embraces such thin theological wisps.

Obama can call himself anything he likes, but there is a clear requirement for one to qualify as a Christian and Obama doesn't meet that requirement. One cannot deny central tenets of the Christian faith, including the deity and uniqueness of Christ as the sole mediator between God and man and be a Christian. Such people do have a label applied to them in Scripture. They are called "false prophets."

## Bush sheds crocodile tears over Iraq

In a recent interview with the *Times of London*, President Bush revived a regret that he had expressed before, that he sometimes during the Iraq war resorted to gung-ho language which, he believes, left an impression that he relished the war. That impression, Bush has suggested, was false.

His "bring 'em on" and "dead or alive" bravura, Bush told the paper, "impressed me" and he believes, left an impression that he relished the war. That impression, Bush has suggested, was false.

Well, yes, rather. And the more the details behind the war are filled in, and the more we learn about the way it was waged, the less peaceable the president appears, and not just as a matter of his gunslinger rhetoric.

The completed report by the Senate Intelligence Committee on the lead-up to our invasion of Iraq, recently released, concludes that to sell the war, the president, Vice President Dick Cheney and others in the administration made exaggerated claims against Saddam Hussein that were not supported by credible intelligence.

That was crucially so of the administration's repeated charges that Hussein was in



working cohorts with al Qaeda and that Iraq not only had reconstituted its nuclear weapons program but had reconstituted it to such a degree it posed an imminent danger to the United States.

This was the second half of a study on intelligence failures that the committee's Republicans, then still a Senate majority, suppressed before the 2004 election. That suppression left the public to believe, during Bush' re-election campaign, that in starting the war he had acted soundly on unground intelligence.

If not Bush personally at first, certainly major players in his security team had come to office in 2000 itching for an excuse for "regime change" in Iraq. They had been ranked since the successful conclusion of the Gulf war that the first President Bush had not pressed on then to unhorse Hussein. After 9/11, Bush signed on fully with the war party within his circle, and the White House's enthusiasm for the

war becomes additionally evident the more we learn about the extremes it has gone to in the war's conduct.

The U.S. military attorney for a Canadian held at Guantanamo said recently that a Pentagon manual shown to him by military prosecutors encouraged interrogators to destroy notes about their methods so as to "minimize certain legal issues."

And we now know that in 2002 the FBI warned the Defense Department — futilely, alas — that its harsh interrogation methods would enrage Muslims and undermine the opportunities for intelligence cooperation.

Bush's has been from its

start an administration headless of any voices from within its ranks, and worse than contemptuous of any from without, that counseled caution about rushing into Iraq or prudence overall in the conduct ordered, or indulged, under the cover of a war on terrorism.

When President Bush regrets the extremes in his war rhetoric, he really regrets only that he sometimes spoke aloud in terms that accurately reflected what he was thinking and how he was acting.

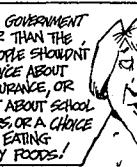

There is a blight on all Idaho roads. We have observed that even recently constructed portions of I-84 are already deeply rutted and rapidly deteriorating. There seems to be no shortage of roads that need attention just a short distance from here to address the issue.

A 2005 Boise State University study shows that Magic Valley dairy industry was responsible for generating over \$74 million in tax revenue to the state and local governments on an annual basis. Over \$15 million of that was in property taxes payments, fuel taxes

and registration fees. In addition the dairy industry directly and indirectly employs over 16,200 people in the Magic Valley, all of them paying taxes, including property taxes (by rent or ownership), registration fees and fuel taxes.

Almost 40 percent of the dairies in Magic Valley milk fewer than 500 cows, small businesses struggling to compete in a very competitive market.

If you single out dairy producers for higher taxes, you'll surely succeed in driving all small dairymen out of business. Is that the goal? Research has shown that taxes paid by agricultural entities far exceed the services they receive.

The article suggest that because gross sales for the

dairy industry exceeded \$1 billion the industry should pick up the tab for road repair. You fail to recognize that the vast amount of the income generated in the industry is already reinvested into the local community. The money is spent locally by paying for feed, supplies, utilities, fuel, equipment, repairs, labor, etc., all expenses associated with milk production, expenses that have increased dramatically the last two years. Those dollars are paid to businesses and individuals that also pay taxes. An example would be the two new dairy manufacturing plants that are currently being constructed in Magic Valley; the cost of just construction of those plants will exceed \$130 million. Jobs

associated with construction of those plants, new jobs created because those plants as well as the plants themselves will again increase the tax revenue in the Magic Valley helping to add value to the our community.

Our staff has met with several of the Magic Valley highway districts. Those meetings, conducted by state legislators and the highway districts, have both concluded that most secondary roads were never constructed for heavy trucks. Everyone in those meetings agree that without the proper base, paved roads are more vulnerable to breaking up, enforcement of current road weight and speed limits is inadequate, and increased cost coupled with govern-

ment budget cuts make finding an equitable solution to all parties more difficult to achieve.

In conclusion, the Idaho Dairymen's Association hopes in the future that the editorial board would thoroughly examine all the facts before they attach their names to an article of this nature.

Bather than attack Corder for his tax votes, though, IACI's mailers painted Corder as being anti-veteran in a district that contains Mountain Home Air Force Base.

The fliers that voters received... said that Corder, a Vietnam combat veteran, had voted in committee against legislation permitting Idahoans to contribute to veteran services through their income tax returns. (The bill later passed both chambers with no dissenting votes.)

"Tim Corder said 'no' to veterans," the flier said.

Despite that, voters said yes to Corder, who gathered

62 percent of the primary votes.

"Today, some of Corder's fellow senators confess they are less likely to say yes to IACI," *Idaho Statesman* columnist Dan Papkey reports. One is Rexburg Republican Brent Hill, the chairman of the tax committee that revised the personal property tax bill ...

"Quite frankly, a lot of their (IACI's) issues have to do with taxes, and I think all of us are going to be a little more leery," Hill says. "I look at lobbyist's as resources to help us understand the issues. When a lobbyist group, particularly one that powerful, starts attacking my friends and puts up money for their defeat, I just don't have the same fuzzy feelings that I used to have about them."

... Instead of telling voters the reason why (IACI) set out to defeat Corder, it sought to torpedo him by pushing a hot-button issue, support for veterans. That was less than honest, and less than decent.

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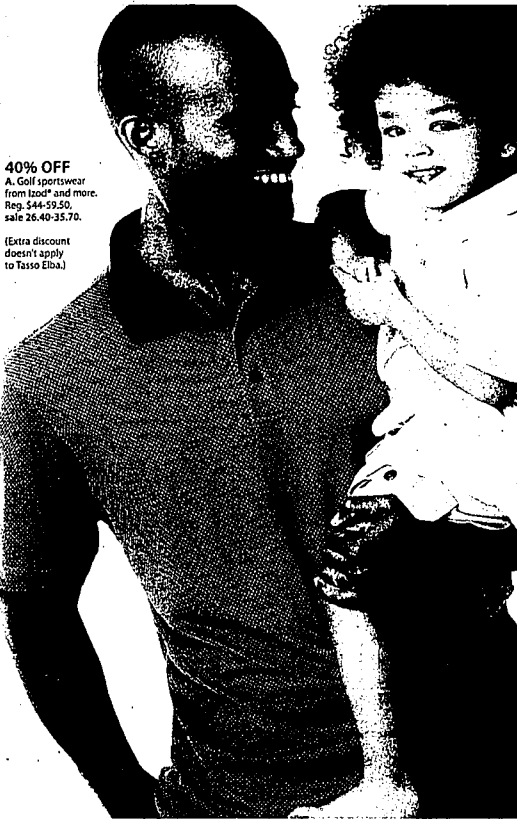
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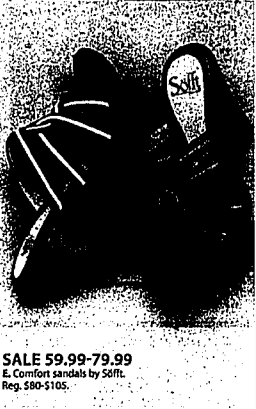
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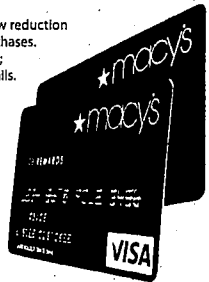

After a shabby, sluggish Game 3, featuring enough air balls and air-headed plays for seven games, the Boston Celtics and Los Angeles Lakers could use a few nips, tucks and lifts. Another good night's sleep or afternoon nap might help, too.

"It wasn't the prettiest game," said Celtics center Kevin Garnett, who

missed two dunks and seems to have left his shooting touch back in May.

For two franchises that have combined for 30 titles won by a Who's Who of Hall of Fame hoopers, it was indeed a night to forget.

But playing in front of a Jack, Donzel, Hef and the rest of their celebrity-laden crowd in Staples Center, where they're 9-0 in the postseason and perfect over the past two months, the Lakers, despite missing

Boston, for its many warts, which included a 35 percent shooting performance, still had a chance win.

As the teams practiced for Thursday night's Game 4, several players blamed the six-hour flight from Boston to Los Angeles for the sloppiness.

"I think most of the players out

there struggled physically," Lakers center Pau Gasol said. "You could tell the travel and Game 2 and 3 being so tight together, going across the country pretty much is an overseas trip. It was like going back to Spain. I think that was a factor."

Celtics coach Doc Rivers, too, noticed players may have been feeling the affects of jet lag and fighting fatigue.

"This was the first game that I had four or five different players during the game signal to pull them out," he said. "I had to blow a timeout, one that I didn't want to use late. I

thought it was a very tough turnaround and I think rest is very important."

One ray seems refreshed. Kobe Bryant stood as usual.

## Not this year's U.S. Open

SAN DIEGO — The "June Gloom" so typical of summer in San Diego gave way to sunshine on the eve of the U.S. Open, filling the blue sky with fighter jets from Miramar that until Wednesday could only be heard in the fog.

"I think you're going to see some excitement that we haven't seen in several years," Senior Open champion Brad Bryant said.

Such excitement comes in so many packages.

Tiger Woods, racing toward history with every major he plays, has not walked 18 holes of golf since he had surgery on his left knee two days after the Masters. There is so much speculation over his knee that three dozen cameras followed him to and from the range Wednesday to capture him in everything from wedges to a 5-wood out of the thick rough.

"I'm going to go," Woods said. "I plan on playing competitive. Come game

time on Thursday, I'll be ready."

But he will not have the spotlight to himself.

For the first time, the USGA purposefully rigged the draw to put the top three players in the same group — Woods and Phil Mickelson, with Adam Scott along for the ride while nursing a broken pinkie on his right hand.

Woods and Mickelson are the two most popular players in golf, especially in these parts. Mickelson grew up in San Diego and played high school matches at Torrey Woods won a Junior World Championship at 15 and has owned Torrey Pines as a pro, winning the Buick Invitational six times. His most recent victory was five months

ago by a record eight shots.

The U.S. Open has sold 42,500 tickets. One might guess 42,000 will be trying to watch Tiger and Phil.

"Not a chance in the world would I ever go out there and fight that gallery, not even for two holes," Jim Furyk said.

The last time Woods and Mickelson played together at Torrey Pines was in the final round of the 2003 Buick Invitational, when Woods was playing for the first time since surgery on his left knee — just like now — and he wound up winning by four shots.

"I just don't see how it's going to have a negative effect on him," Mickelson said.

NASCAR Equity firm takes over Petty team

CONCORD, N.C. (AP) — One of NASCAR's most storied race teams gave up majority control Wednesday when a private equity firm took over Petty Enterprises.
Although Richard Petty says he'll still have a large day-to-day role with the team, his firm has run since 1969. Boston Ventures now maintains control of the 60-year-old operation and the Richard Petty Driving Experience.

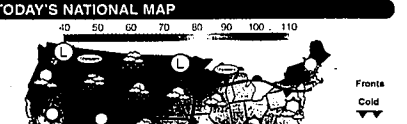

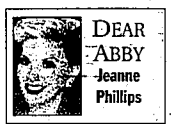

NASCAR chairman says former official didn't report claims

CONCORD, N.C. (AP) — NASCAR chairman Brian France told Wednesday that a former official complained to her supervisors about racial and sexual discrimination claims she alleged led to her eventual firing.
Maurelia Grant filed a \$225 million suit against NASCAR on Tuesday, alleging racial discrimination, sexual harassment and retaliatory termination. Grant, who is black, worked as a technical inspector for NASCAR's second-tier Nationwide Series.
France said Wednesday the detailed filing was the first NASCAR learned of her claims.
"The disappointing thing is she makes a lot of claims, none of them reported," said France. "The fact that it went on as she stated, for many months, but never bothered to tell anyone at management what was going on — which is what our policy says — is very disappointing."
"France said NASCAR will review Grant's claims, which included 23 specific incidents of alleged sexual harassment and 34 specific incidents of alleged racial and gender discrimination she says began when she was hired in January 2005 through her October 2007 firing.
NASCAR will not disclose what Grant was fired late in the 2007 season.

## Jerome County P&Z to consider requiring CAFO berms

Jerome County residents soon may not see the cows for the trees. County commissioners on Monday directed the Planning and Zoning Commission to consider requiring all new or expanding confined-animal feeding operations to build windbreaks or earth berms along residential boundaries. First suggested by members of the North

Side Soil and Water Conservation District, such structures would be one step in reducing the smells and sights associated with CAFOs, district representative Rocky Hagan said.

"These windbreaks will diffuse and dilute the air if done right, so that it would be a part of odor control," Hagan said Wednesday.

According to a draft ordinance drawn up by Planning and Zoning Administrator Art Brown and

County Prosecutor Mike Seib, the requirement would apply to CAFOs next to existing or approved subdivisions, as well as those bordered by residential use within 1,320 feet of the east side of the property. The structure would run 50 feet past the residential structures on both ends. Landowners would have three to seven years for windbreaks made of trees or other plants to grow enough to be effective.

The requirement could be waived

if the landowner proves it to be impractical and provides other mitigation to accomplish the same thing, an important part of the draft, Seib said.

"You're never going to be able to foresee every scenario that could ever arise," he said.

The step, Hagan said, is one that some dairies have already tried to do on their own. The district provides pamphlets and other resources aimed at educating

landowners about windbreaks, and Hagan said he thought the draft ordinance would be well-received.

"It enhances the looks of their facilities," he said. "You don't notice things as bad if you don't see them." Commission Chairman Charlie Howell said he's already received some comments from people skeptical of the idea, but that he thinks it could be one step in mitigating

## National meteorologist says recent chill was rare, cold expected to pass

As Magic Valley residents pulled out their recently shelved scarves and jackets this week, experts said warm weather wear won't be out for long.

Wednesday afternoon's high temperature reached about 59 degrees in Twin Falls and with 36-mile-per-hour wind gusts, the chill was extra harsh, said George Skari, meteorologist with National Weather Service in Boise.

Recent cold weather isn't normal, though, and it won't be here for long, Skari said. "Conditions will be improving, in the next day or two it will be a forgotten memory."

That will come as good news to residents planning to attend Jazz in the Canyon on Saturday afternoon in Twin Falls. Temperatures Saturday are expected to reach a sunny 82 degrees,

Skari said.

A warm-up should begin today with windy weather and temperatures reaching 68 degrees. Friday should be about 10 degrees warmer and Sunday could hit the 80s, Skari said.

Unusually cold temperatures this month are mingled with national weather patterns. There's been extreme heat over the east recently and flooding in the Midwest. "It's all connected," Skari said. "That's why we have what we have here."

The recent cold weather pattern occurs about once every 10 years in late May or early June, Skari said.

But one ranger with the U.S. Forest Service has a slightly different take on the weather.

"It's Idaho," said Brad Cooper, a Forest Service range tech for the Burley District. "We've seen snow on the Fourth of July before."

Even though that was more than 20 years ago, Cooper said he isn't surprised by the recent weather pattern. About an inch of snow dropped in the South Hills Tuesday night and Wednesday morning, though it had melted by Wednesday afternoon, he said.

Some higher elevations also had snow on the ground Wednesday that could melt today. About two inches of snow chilled Corner Ridge Wednesday morning and some was also present at Mount Harrison by Lake Cleveland, Cooper said.

The meetings are one of the first steps in a two-year environmental impact study run by the BLM and other affected lands agencies, said Rick Vander Voet, field supervisor with the BLM's Twin Falls District.

The process will examine the impact of building and operating the 200- to 250-foot towers on everything from bats to plants. The area in question contains about 20,000 acres of BLM land in the Twin Falls and Elko districts, 2,000 acres of Idaho state land and 8,700 acres of private land.

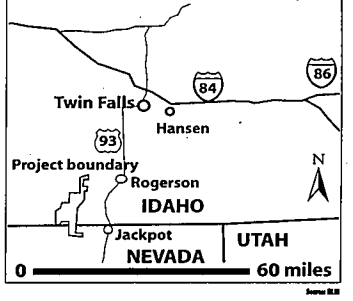
"Everyone recognized this place had great potential for

## Stealing copper to pay for crack

Drugs a factor in rash of scrap metal thefts

GOODING — When farmers hit the fields this spring some were surprised to find that their sprinkler systems didn't work. The problem wasn't due to lack of water but to the electrical wiring having been stripped out of the equipment.

With scrap metal prices skyrocketing and scrap copper selling for as much as \$3 per pound, thieves are able to turn a quick profit by selling stolen wiring to scrap metal recyclers.

Michael Silman with Silman and Butler Irrigation of Gooding said the company received calls about nine different pivots with wiring stolen, at a cost of over \$20,000 in damage, earlier this year.

"Right now, since the pivots are in use, the problem isn't happening," Silman said. "The thefts occur when the farmers are out of the field, in late fall, through the winter."

Silman said that since farmers usually don't know about the thefts until months later, tracking down the goods, or thief, becomes almost impossible.

The problem stems mainly from one source, said Twin Falls County Sheriff Wayne Tousley.

"The main crux is the drug issue,"

Tousley said. "One thing (law enforcement) could do better is let the scrap dealers know what thefts we have so they know what to look for."

Silman was just one of about two dozen Magic Valley residents who attended a town hall meeting on Wednesday at the Gooding County Planning and Zoning office hosted by House Minority Leader Wendy Jaquet, D-Ketchum and Rep. Donna Pence, D-Gooding.

## Buhl revitalization nearly complete

City businesses will help foot the bill for project

BUHL — Buhl's recent downtown revitalization project is on the brink of being finished and officials are getting estimates together to determine what businesses within the Local Improvement District will have to pay.

Of the \$3 million project, which began last spring, business property owners along the north and south tails of Broadway Avenue will be required to pay the

city about \$165,000.

The bulk of project funding was awarded to the city by the Idaho Department of Transportation.

During Monday's council meeting City Engineer Scott Bybee said officials are "very close" to completing the project and ironing out the final funding details.

Once Orofino-based Deboe Construction, which was awarded the contract for the project, is paid up, the city will move forward with involving about two dozen businesses along the construction route. Some business owners have voiced concerns that they weren't aware of the coming bill, which they will have up to 10 years to pay the city.

"There was a public hearing and meetings about it

but some have made comments about not knowing about it," said City Clerk Sharon Hayes. "Most of those have come about because of businesses being sold and changing hands during the course of the project."

The special taxing district was created so the city could pay for cosmetic touches to the project, like street lights and decorative signs that ITD doesn't pay for, Bybee said.

Tom Speck, owner of T & L Cedar Lawn Furniture, is one of the businesses within the district. He said businesses should be aware of their upcoming bill but recently, the city hasn't provided much information.

# Rupert officials may update animal laws

**RUPERT** — Attempts to revise the city's animal ordinances have left Rupert officials with the task of finding an acceptable balance between the town's agricultural roots and residential harmony, an effort that has turned into a beast in its own right.

"Maybe it's something we'll never achieve," City Superintendent Dennis Andrews said.

Residential complaints about animals are nothing new to Rupert. Public comment periods during council meetings have frequently turned into hearings for neighborhood disputes. The complaints, which run the gamut from cockfighting to noise to foul odors, even made up a large portion of comment at the city's first town hall meeting held in April.

Then, Mayor Paul Fries and the council have attempted to deal with complaints on an individual basis, using the city's existing nuisance and zoning ordinances to try to fine until a new ordinance could be written.

City Attorney Kelly Anthon said adding to the complexity are city and county codes and ordinances overlapping in language. Among the problems: Rupert's fowl-at-large ordinance was written in 1960, while a separate farm animal ordinance was updated in 1997, and city code doesn't forbid slaughter as long as it is not done for "meat processing," a term Anthon said lawyers would have a hard time defining.

Rupert resident Gerry Bott owns four acres of land, which is home to horses, sheep, goats and even a donkey. The said she has never had a complaint about her animals, but understands the city's need to deal with problems such as cockfighting.

"It's two different things," she said. Bott however represents the trouble the council has had in creating ordinances strict enough to deal with problem residences, but relaxed enough to allow for owners who properly maintain their animals and yards.

Anthon said he has researched other cities' ordinances for comparison and to give the council ideas about what direction to take.

In Twin Falls, residents are allowed to have 25 fowl if they have at least 5,000 square feet of real property.

In Idaho Falls, residents are allowed to have 10,000 square feet, at least 14,000 square feet, and at least a residential lot.

Twin Falls also uses a permit system, which not only requires approval by the city sanitation inspector, but requires a yearly fee.

Anthon said a reasonable goal for the new ordinance would be having guidelines in place before a permit is issued.

"If you provide regulations on the front side, you're going to really prevent the problems from occurring in the first place," Anthon said. "And if that happens that will reduce the need of neighbors having to call the police."

The council is expected to discuss Anthon's recommendations again at its next meeting on Tuesday.

# Council sets Ketchum city manager salary at \$153,104

**KETCHUM** — The Ketchum City Council unanimously agreed with the mayor's recommendation to hire Gary Marks as its new city administrator with an annual salary of \$153,104.

The salary matches in step and grade that of the last city administrator Ron LeBlanc, who left in December 2007 for a position in Durango, Colo., said the council's June 5 meeting.

"Gary was clearly the superior choice," said council member Curtis Kemp. "He gave us a great deal of confidence."

Mark said a strong financial background, experience with a resort city and a friendly, professional manner were the reasons he felt Marks was right for Ketchum. He'll start at the beginning of August.

The city's contract with Marks also included a housing stipend of \$1,300 per month for an amount of time not to exceed five years. The housing stipend is triggered if dissent of the council, as well as action.

On the action side, council members agreed to create a city employee program that would allow the city to sponsor down payment assistance for employees wanting to buy homes.

Council member Larry Helzel, an investment banker, said he was working on building a fund that would provide down payments for city employees.

The city and other agencies, perhaps a non-profit organization, perhaps a financial institution, would

pool funds for down payment assistance, Helzel said.

Upon sale of the property, the city would get its money back. The Blaine-Lincoln Housing Fund spearheaded by Eric Hochendoner with the Idaho Housing and Finance Agency is a similar operation.

Helzel said the program will take at least six months to set up, and that was why city officials opted to provide a housing stipend.

"We have a need for a city administrator right now," Helzel said. "We couldn't leave him hanging."

Although he voted to hire Marks, council member Ron Parsons voted against the resolution setting forth terms of the contract including the housing stipend.

It was the housing allowance that made him vote against council members Helzel and Kemp, who approved the contract.

Helzel said the housing direction is the way we should go, said Parsons. "At the here and now stage I wasn't comfortable with the length and the amount of the housing subsidy. I'd like to move more quickly into the shared equity."

Helzel said Marks will make at least one visit to Ketchum before moving his wife and five children in August. His contract with Whitefish provides for a 60-day notice.

Interim City Administrator Jim Jaquet said he would oversee city operations for the next month, especially the completion of the Fourth Street Heritage Corridor project between Leadville Avenue and Washington Avenue. The project is scheduled for completion by July 3.

tim while she slept at a friend's home in Burley. Ventura's cousin, Jorge Ventura, was convicted in November of sexual abuse of the same victim in an incident that occurred the same day as the incident that charged Ventura for charges against Roger Ventura.

The victim's mother reported the incidents to Cassia County Sheriff's investigators shortly afterward. Roger Ventura pled innocent to the charge against him in October 2007. His case was

scheduled to go to trial June 18.

Roger Ventura is scheduled to be sentenced by 5th District Judge Michael Crabtree on Aug. 5. According to Idaho statutes, lewd conduct with a minor of less than 16 years of age is punishable by life in prison.

Jorge Ventura was sentenced in February to a prison term of 30 months to 13 years.

some CAFO issues.

"It doesn't solve the problem, but it certainly helps," he said.

If approved, the county would be far from the first to implement such requirements. Ilagan and Howell both referenced Blaine County as one example, where Ilagan said berms are widely used to hide certain structures.

Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning Director Bill Crafton said his county requires "environmental buffers" that can consist of windbreaks or other items. One feedlot used distance as a buffer, locating itself about 2,500 feet away from the nearest road, he said.

"It depends on the location and what's around them," as to what's required,

Crafton said.

The idea of dispersing odors with windbreaks has been researched before. A fact sheet put out by the Missouri office of the USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service claims windbreaks can remove 35 to 55 percent of dusts carried in moving air, a "substantial reduction of offensive odors," according to the agency.

Two years is actually an "aggressive" schedule for an environmental study, Vander Voot said. Such studies take time due to the fieldwork and data collection required. A draft EIS is scheduled for release in January 2010 and a final version by October of that year.

Nothing much has changed with the project since RES announced in November it was pursuing a deal with Nevada Power, a Sierra Pacific Resources company, to jointly develop and operate the site, said

Scott Kringsen, a senior project developer with RES who will be present at the public meetings. He said his company is confident it will be able to work around any environmental issues that come up.

"We know there will be some challenges out there," Kringsen said. "There are on any project you build."

RES is still in talks with other utilities to purchase anything above the "200 megawatts" destined for Nevada Power's grid, he said — giving the latter enough to power 65,000 homes. The company and its local

spokesman, Twin Falls consultant Stephen Hargren, have previously emphasized other economic benefits to Twin Falls County, however. Hargren said the county could see ongoing 3 percent revenue from the project's gross income because of recently changed tax laws. And the company will employ 20 fulltime workers and about 200 workers during construction, estimated to cost nearly \$2 million per turbine.

Attendees included representatives with Idaho Power, Pacific Steel and Recycling in Twin Falls, several county sheriff's representatives and concerned farmers, ranchers and dairymen.

Copper wiring thefts cost Idaho Power about \$100,000 last year, said Safety and Security Consultant Jim Whitefield. While the company is concerned about the criminal activity it is also concerned about safety issues surrounding the practice, which involves wire being stolen off of service trucks, substations and grounding wires from poles.

Jaquet said new legislation going into effect this July may help track down people selling stolen scrap and

copper wiring.

Provisions of the law requiring scrap dealers keep a legible record describing scrap purchased, included the date and place of purchase, among other things. Another provision, however, may prove to create more problems than solutions, she said.

If the purchase of scrap metal from an individual is \$10 or less, the dealer is not required to include records of the seller's driver's license or other identifying number of the vehicle used in transport. To skirt around the law criminals may steal smaller amounts of scrap or copper wiring, though damage done to pivots and electrical equipment would still persist.

The provisions of House

Bill 526 will be reviewed this summer and concerns taken during the meeting will be expressed with other state law makers, she said.

In the meantime, Silman said it is going to take a multifaceted approach to solve the problem.

"How can farmers protect their equipment? That's the million-dollar question and I really don't know. When you're farming thousands of acres its hard to keep an eye on all your equipment," he said. "You have to report every theft and watch out for your neighbors. If you see something suspicious, report it."

But he said the blog post was not his reason for resigning.

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# Rainier survivors return home after deadly ordeal

SEATTLE — After a routine hike turned into a harrowing and deadly ordeal for a trio of friends, two chilled and frost-bitten hikers were airlifted from the slopes of Mount Rainier on Wednesday. The body of the third hiker was being carried down.

"These were folks who loved the mountain. They loved being up there," national park spokesman Kevin Bacher said.

The trio — a husband and wife and a male friend — had prepared for a day hike on a typically cold, wet Northwest Monday in early June, Bacher said. The three had spent many days hiking and climbing on Mount Rainier and knew the weather could turn dangerous quickly, he added.

Originally from Norman, Okla., living in the suburban Bellevue area, the three were Edward Bureauc, 31, who died of exposure Tuesday on the

mountain; his wife Mariana Bureauc, also 31, and their friend Daniel Viad, 34, park spokeswoman Monica Magari said.

"The two men were engineers, she said. "What nobody expected

was a storm of the intensity we received in the middle of June," Bacher said, acknowledging, however, "Anytime you're up on the upper mountain, the weather can change rapidly, at a moment's notice. You can get in trouble pretty

quickly up there."

A freak blizzard dumped two feet of snow and trapped the three near Camp Muir, a staging area for climbers about 10,000 feet up the 14,410-foot volcano. Winds of 70 mph created 5-foot

drifts, preventing an immediate rescue attempt after they were able to call for help at 3:50 a.m. Tuesday.

Bacher said the three apparently built a snow shelter at about 9,500 feet. After their call, Viad left the couple

and huddled through heavy snow to reach Camp Muir at 7:15 a.m. Tuesday and was able to direct rescuers to the other hikers near Anvil Rock, a large outcropping at the edge of the Muir snowfield.

It took until 8:15 a.m. to get the three to shelter at Camp Muir, but by then Edward Bureauc was unconscious and later died.

All three were experienced climbers and the two men had reached the top of Mount Rainier before Bacher said.

A helicopter from Fort Lewis flew the survivors off the mountain Wednesday morning and they were taken by ground transportation from Madigan Hospital at the Army base near Tacoma to Harborview Medical Center in Seattle, where they were treated for frostbite and released Wednesday afternoon.

"They're going to be OK," said Harborview spokeswoman Susan Gregg-Hanson. The hikers were well enough to walk out of the hospital.

## Economy hitting church food banks

BOISE (AP) — Food banks in southwest Idaho are running low on supplies to give to hungry people, officials say.

"There are times when the shelves are fairly bare," Ken Snodgrass, food director for Operation Love Center, told the *Idaho Statesman*.

The center is part of Central Assembly Christian Life Center, a network of churches in the region that supply thousands of meals to people who otherwise can't afford to eat.

The Idaho Foodbank supplies many churches with much of the food they give away. Roger Simon, president and CEO of the foodbank, said the food bank itself is facing problems because businesses are donating less.

Growers also are facing higher costs as well, reducing the amount of food they can donate, he said.

The Idaho Foodbank has tried to fill the gap. This year, Simon said it will pay \$900,000 to buy food, up from \$500,000 last year.

"It's an extremely serious problem," he said. Snodgrass agreed, saying rising prices in the food industry caused by increasing gas prices has led to food shortages at a time when more people are looking for help.

Meals on Wheels recently lost five drivers because the volunteers couldn't afford to pay for gas prices last month.

The organization serves 600 people in Ada and Elmore counties.

Dave Fotsch, a spokesman for the Central District Health, said the cost of a meal has topped \$6 for the first time.

He said the district will ask recipients for a donation of \$4 for the meals, up from \$3. But he said most people can only afford to donate \$1.

"Some extras like salads and dessert may have to fall by the wayside," Fotsch said. Robert Boisse, recently at St. Mary's Catholic Church food bank that got something to eat, said his seen food banks being more careful on how much food is given out.

He said milk is in short supply at some food banks. "I've said that more than I have to work harder to figure out how to make his food last."

"You have to be an active participant," Boisse said. Officials at St. Mary's said they've seen a 20 percent increase in food requests this year, compared with 2007.

Isabell Yale, St. Mary's food bank director, said there's been a change in the people coming to get food as well, going from the working poor to people who are now unemployed.

## Veterans press for info on '60s chemical tests

FERNDALE, Calif. — Jack Alderson was ordered never to talk about the secret weapons tests he helped conduct in the Pacific during the 1960s. He kept quiet for decades.

Sparse attendance at a 1993 reunion prompted Alderson, a retired Navy Reserve lieutenant commander, to speak out. He learned that more than half of the 500 or so crewmembers who took part in the tests were either dead or suffering from cancer, respiratory problems or other ailments.

Alderson wondered if his own skin cancer, allergies and chronic fatigue were linked to those tests, or were simply the result of aging.

"I was told by my bosses and the docs and so forth that if you follow these routines and you do this and you do this you're going to be safe and you're going to be happy and you're going to be OK," Alderson, 74, said recently. "We did exactly as told. And we're finding out now that we're sick."

Alderson and other witnesses are testifying Thursday before a House Veterans Affairs panel considering legislation that would require more Pentagon disclosure about the Cold War-era germ and chemical weapons testing and extend benefits to veterans who participated in them. A similar bill is scheduled for a vote in the Senate Veterans Affairs Committee later this month.

Lawmakers say the legislation is needed because the Pentagon has not acknowledged a link between the tests and health problems, which has made it difficult for veterans to get health coverage. Pentagon officials don't rule out a health link but say it's tough to prove.

"We cannot say that this exposure 40 years ago had

absolutely no health effect," said Dr. Michael Kilpatrick, the Pentagon's deputy director for force health protection and readiness. "I don't think any physician would risk saying that. Because how do you prove that that's the case?"

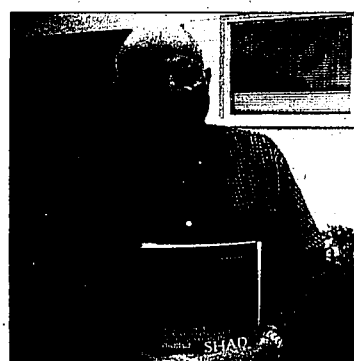
A similar debate took place around Agent Orange, the chemical defoliant used by U.S. forces in Vietnam that was linked to cancer and other ailments in those exposed to it. At Congress' insistence in the late 1980s, the government extended benefits to veterans and their children suffering from Agent Orange-related diseases.

The bill under consideration Thursday, by Reps. Mike Thompson, D-Calif., and Denny Rehberg, R-Mont., is patterned after the Agent Orange legislation.

In testimony prepared for the hearing, obtained in advance by The Associated Press, Bradley Mayes, of the Department of Veterans Affairs' director of compensation and pensions, calls the legislation unnecessary, "due to the lack of credible scientific and medical evidence that adequately demonstrates any statistically significant correlation" between the tests and participants' diseases.

Last year, the nonprofit Institute of Medicine, part of the National Academy of Sciences, found no specific health effects as a result of Project SHAD — Shipboard Hazard and Defense. Alderson, Thompson and others argue the report was shoddily done and left out key information.

"It started out being a secret project and turned into being a CYA type of thing, you know, cover your rear end. And an embarrassment," Thompson said of the tests and their aftermath. Action from Congress would be a relief to Alderson, who lives in a modest home in the coastal redwoods

about four hours north of San Francisco. His yard is decorated with statuettes of bears, birds and bunnies.

The mood darkens inside, where stacks of documents testify to his days in charge of a fleet of five light tugboats that were sprayed with biological agents and cleaned afterward with solvents, some of which now are considered carcinogenic.

During the tests, conducted amid Cold War concerns about Russia's weapons capabilities, the military tested germs such as bacteria that could cause tularemia and Q fever, serious diseases more commonly found in animals. Also used were nonlethal simulated agents, including E. coli, now known to pose health dangers. Test participants were

given experimental vaccines but weren't told of any risks, only that the shots were a protective measure, Alderson said.

Kilpatrick acknowledges that some participants weren't fully informed about the project but says they were part of it, but says safety precautions taken then were appropriate for the time.

Alderson said he has pressed the Pentagon for answers about the secret tests because he feels he owes that to the crews he commanded.

In 1995, Alderson got a copy of a letter that the Navy's medicine and surgery bureau sent to his then congressman, Frank Riggs, stating they had no records of Project SHAD. Six years later, after continued questioning from Riggs and Thompson, the Pentagon publicly acknowledged the existence of Project SHAD and its umbrella program Project 112, which involved distribution of nonlethal bacteria and occasionally real chemical or biological weapons.

The Defense Department now says 6,440 servicemembers took part in 50 tests under Project 112 between 1962 and 1973. Open-air tests were conducted above a half-dozen U.S. states, including Alaska, Hawaii, Maryland, Florida,

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# Friend says Newman has cancer

NEW HAVEN, Conn. — Paul Newman, the legendary actor and philanthropist, is battling cancer, his longtime neighbor and business partner said Wednesday.

Newman, 83, has recently appeared gaunt in photos, and dropped plans to direct a play in his Connecticut hometown.

Writer A.E. Hotchner, who partnered with Newman to start Newman's Own salad dressing company in the 1970s, told the actor told him about the disease about 18 months ago.

He did not specify what kind of cancer, but said Newman is in active treatment.

"I know that it's a form of cancer," Hotchner told The Associated Press. "It's a form of cancer and he's dealing with it."

Newman issued a statement late Tuesday that he's "doing nicely" but didn't specifically address questions about cancer. A call was placed to his spokesman Wednesday seeking comment.

The Oscar winner appeared to have lost weight when he was photographed during practice for the Indianapolis 500 auto race last month.

Martha Stewart, in an entry dated June 6, posted a link on her blog of herself with the actor, who looked thin, at a luncheon to benefit the Hole in the Wall Gang camps for critically ill children. (The Hole in the Wall Gang was led by Newman's affable outlaw character, Butch, in the 1969 film "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid.")

Newman won an Oscar for his leading role in 1986's "The Color of Money." His screen credits also include "Hud," "Cool Hand Luke," "The Verdict" and "Road to Perdition."

Hotchner said Newman had an operation a few years ago. "It was certainly somewhere in the area of the lung," he said.

"He's battling," Hotchner said. "It's doing all the right stuff. Paul is a fighter. It seems to be going through a good period right now."

Asked about his prognosis, Hotchner said, "Everybody is hopeful. That's all we know."

In 1982, Hotchner and Newman started a company to market Newman's original oil-and-vinegar dressing, Newman's Own, which began as a joke, grew into a multimillion-dollar business selling popcorn, salad dressing, spaghetti sauce and other foods.

All the company's profits are donated to charities. By 2007, the company had donated more than \$200 million, according to its Web site.

Last month, officials at Connecticut's Westport Country Playhouse cited unspecified health issues when they announced that Newman would not direct "Of Mice and Men" this fall.

Newman lives in Westport with his wife, Joanne Woodward.

Two friends said Tuesday that Newman appeared to be doing well.

# Clintonites start to warm to Obama

CHICAGO — They may not be falling in love, but they're falling in line.

Prominent supporters of Hillary Rodham Clinton are embracing Barack Obama, literally and figuratively, even though some remain bitter about her loss in a presidential primary process that they feel treated her unfairly.

In several key states this week, Obama is being joined on stages by top Democrats who, a few days ago, were warring to deny him the nomination.

"I know I'm late, but I am on the train," North Carolina Gov. Mike Easley said Monday in introducing "Obama in Raleigh." "It rather be a bum on the boxcar of the Obama train than at the front of the bus with John McCain," he said of Obama's Republican opponent.

A few in the crowd of 900 briefly booed Easley, whose endorsement of Clinton failed to stop Obama from an easy win in the May 6 primary, which all but doomed the former first lady's hopes.

Other former Clinton backers also are jumping on the Obama express, now that it has left the station. Introducing him at a St. Louis fund-raiser this week was state Rep. Rachel Streeter, who won Clinton's Missouri state director.

Later this week, two Democratic governors who helped deliver crucial Clinton wins in their states will appear with Obama. Ohio Gov. Ted Strickland will greet him in Columbus on Friday, and later that day the senator plans to join Pennsylvania Gov. Ed Rendell in Philadelphia.

The governors lent their considerable prestige and organizations to Clinton, helping her achieve primary victories so large that Democratic operatives now worry about Obama's chances in the two battleground states. Ohio was crucial to President Bush's narrow 2004 win over John Kerry. And Pennsylvania is seen as

almost a must-win state for Obama because Democrats have carried it in the last four presidential contests, although sometimes narrowly.

Most of the late-arriving Obama endorsers are swallowing their pride and beaming publicly at least, at the first-term Illinois senator who overcame the Clinton political machine.

Some, however, can barely speak the words without betraying their disappointment that Clinton will not become the party's first female nominee. Obama has a lot of work to do, they say.

"There is definitely a period of mourning that ardent Hillary Clinton supporters are going through," Rep. Debbie Wasserman Schultz, D-Fla., told reporters in a conference call Wednesday. "I think there is a fairly large group of women that are going to need to be won over. And that's

going to take some time." Wasserman Schultz said she believes most Democratic women eventually will back Obama because, unlike McCain, he supports abortion rights, a prompt end to the Iraq war and other issues important to them.

The conference call was organized by EMILY's List, a Washington group that backs female candidates who support abortion rights. Its president, Ellen R. Malcolm, acknowledged keen disappointment at Clinton's loss.

"Those of us who supported Hillary go through a process of dealing with our many emotions of disappointment and sadness and some anger," she said. "But we will focus on the goal, which is to change the direction of this country" by electing Obama.

She sharply criticized the news media, saying its coverage

of Clinton was often sexist.

list. Groups and individuals who urged her to drop out before the last primary was held were "disrespectful to Senator Clinton," she said. However, Malcolm said, "the election is not today. We've got five months" for voters to head and for Obama to appeal to Clinton's supporters.

"Few states are more important to him than Pennsylvania, where he lost badly to Clinton among working-class white Democrats. If McCain could manage a win there with its 21 electoral votes, it would force Obama to compensate by winning swing states or Republican-leaning states elsewhere.

At last week's Democratic State Committee in Camp Hill, Pa., some party officials switching their allegiance to Obama barely bothered to hide their reluctance and disappointment.

"At the end of the day, I'm a Democrat," said Gail McDermott of Mechanicsburg, a Clinton delegate to the national nominating convention in August.

"The most important thing is that we end George Bush's policies and the Iraq war," she said.

Angie Galloreto, a Clinton delegate from Pittsburgh, said she hopes Obama will pick Clinton as his running mate. But even if he does not, she said, "the people spoke" and Obama will be the nominee. "As Democrats we believe in fair fights and party unity."

# Johnson resigns from Obama's veep vetting team

WASHINGTON — A former CEO leading Barack Obama's search for a vice presidential candidate resigned abruptly Wednesday after questions about his home mortgage deals became a distraction for a candidate who argues he's not influenced by special interests.

Jim Johnson's resignation came a day after Obama defended Johnson and dismissed the Republican criticism of him.

"I am not vetting my VP search committee for their mortgages," Obama said Tuesday.

He accepted Johnson's resignation on Wednesday, leaving the search at least temporarily in the hands of two other prominent Democratic attorneys who also had been scouting candidates — former Deputy Attorney General Eric Holder and Caroline Kennedy.

"Jim did not want to distract in any way from the very important task of gathering information about my vice presidential nominee, so he has made a decision to step aside that I accept," Obama said. "We have a very good

selection process under way, and I am confident that it will produce a number of highly qualified candidates for me to choose from in the weeks ahead."

Johnson, the former chairman of mortgage lender Fannie Mae, came under fire from GOP candidate John McCain and the Republican Party after The Wall Street Journal reported last Saturday that Johnson got mortgages with help from the CEO of Countrywide Financial Corp.

McCain had accused Obama of hypocrisy for speaking out against Countrywide's role in the sub-

prime mortgage crisis. Obama's campaign declined to say whether he would replace Johnson, who also led the vice presidential search effort for Democratic nominee John Kerry in 2004 and Walter Mondale in 1984. Obama said he was grateful for Johnson's service.

Johnson's resignation may allow Obama to move ahead with the search process without the criticism surrounding him, but it also could make it appear that the campaign quickly caved under pressure.

The resignation touched off a series of accusations between the two campaigns about which candidate has more tainted advisers and better judgment about who to surround himself with.

Obama's campaign has had varying responses when con-

troversy has focused on those around him. Foreign policy adviser Samantha Power left within hours of calling Hillary Rodham Clinton a "monster." Obama was initially reluctant to disavow his pastor, Jeremiah Wright, after video of racially explosive sermons emerged. And he kept leading economic adviser Austan Goolsbee on board amid controversy surrounding his private comments on free trade.

At least five McCain staffers have left his campaign after a Democratic uproar over McCain's connections to lobbyists.

McCain responded by banning registered lobbyists serving his campaign but had defended two of his top advisers — Rick Davis and Charlie Black — who left their lobbying jobs to work for his presi-

dential bid. Johnson and Holder held meetings this week with lawmakers on Capitol Hill to seek their input on possible running mate candidates.

Obama said Tuesday that Johnson had a "discrete task" and was performing it well.

He suggested the Countrywide connection was not a problem since Johnson was an unpaid volunteer and hadn't been assigned to work in a future administration.

Kerry, a prominent Obama supporter, told reporters earlier Wednesday that Johnson had done an outstanding job of gathering information for him four years ago and keeping it private.

He declined to say whether he'd recommended that Obama keep Johnson amid the controversy.

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# Secret al-Qaida, Iraq files found on British commuter train

LONDON — Secret government documents on al-Qaida and Iraq were left on a commuter train, prompting a major police investigation into the latest in a series of embarrassing security breaches, British officials said Wednesday.

The documents belonged to a senior intelligence official in the Cabinet office and were found by a passenger on a London commuter train Tuesday. The envelope was then passed to the British Broadcasting Corp.

Seven pages stamped "UK Top Secret" included the latest government intelligence assessment on al-Qaida and Iraq's security forces, the BBC said.

The intelligence official was still working at the Cabinet office, pending a police investigation under Britain's Official Secrets Act prohibits the passing of sensitive information that could affect national security.

The security breach is the latest in a string of government data losses and comes as British pushes for an expansion of its national DNA database — already the largest per capita in the world — and works to finalize plans for an ID program.

On Wednesday, the clash erupted when U.S.-supported Afghan troops tried to establish a checkpoint near Sheikh Baba in the Mohmand tribal region, along the disputed knife-edge border between Afghanistan and Pakistan, according to local villagers and Pakistani military officials.

# Nepal's deposed king leaves palace forever

**KATMANDU, Nepal (AP)** — The crowd had been waiting for hours when the armored black Mercedes finally pulled out of the palace gates.

Suddenly three women jumped in the car's path, forcing it to halt as they egged the driver to turn around. "King, go back," they cried. "Don't leave the palace!" They were among the few who wanted to turn back time.

Nepal's deposed King Gyanendra left his palace for good Wednesday marking an end to the world's last Hindu monarchy, a reign that had stretched more than two centuries.

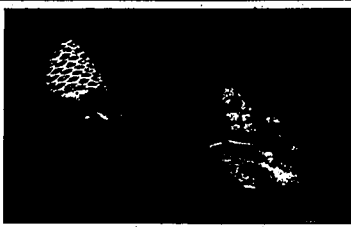
While Gyanendra's throne was formally abolished last month, the former king did not surrender his crown of peacock feathers, yak hair and jewels until Wednesday, leaving the palace to begin a new life as something akin to

an ordinary citizen — and the troubled country to pass another milestone in its new era as a young republic.

Little else will remain of a dynasty that united Nepal and reigned for 239 years: The palace — a pink concrete monstrosity — will be turned into a museum. But there's little likelihood it will celebrate a monarchy that Nepal's new government of former communist rebels fought to overthrow.

Gyanendra is moving to one of his former summer palaces on a forested hill on the outskirts of Katmandu. He will be protected by police but will otherwise live as any other Nepali — albeit an incredibly wealthy one.

His loyalists are few, however, and most of the hundreds of people who came to the palace gates for the final exit jeered him as he passed, chanting "Thief, leave the country."

## Woman raised in cellar reunites with her family

**ZEILLERN, Austria (AP)** — A woman born and raised in the cellar where her mother allegedly was kept captive as a sex slave for 24 years has emerged from an induced coma with two requests: to go on a boat ride and to see pop singer Robbie Williams in concert, doctors and a lawyer said Wednesday.

Kerstin Fritzl met with family members Sunday, shortly after doctors woke her from the induced coma she had been in for weeks, according to two doctors and Christoph Herbst, a family lawyer.

She had been admitted to a hospital on April 19 unconscious with a life-threatening condition and suffering from multiple organ failure — a case that brought to light the family's underground existence in the town of Amstetten, west of Vienna.

Josef Fritzl is accused of keeping his daughter Elisabeth hostage for 24 years, fathering her seven children, including Kerstin, 19. Three grew up underground, never seeing the light of day, while three were brought upstairs to be raised by Fritzl and his wife, who believed they had been abandoned. One died in infancy, authorities say.

Dr. Albert Reiter said Kerstin greeted him with a "hello" during a bedside visit the morning of June 1, the day doctors removed the tube they had inserted in her throat to help her breathe.

"I say to Kerstin, 'Hello, Kerstin.' And Kerstin tells me, 'Hello: a new life,'" Reiter told reporters at a news conference in a hotel in Zeillern, several miles from Amstetten.

Doctors said she is expected to make a full recovery.

"These moving moments were the preliminary end of a long ordeal," Reiter said. "My job is done and I'm happy it ended this way," he said later.

Reiter said doctors began reducing Kerstin's medication May 12. She opened her eyes three days later.

"We laughed at her and she laughed back at us," Reiter said.

In the weeks that followed, Kerstin's mother played a large role in her daughter's recovery, Reiter said.

"For all of us, Kerstin's surprising recovery is a great relief," said Berthold Kepplinger, director of the psychiatric clinic where the family is recovering. He said she would now undergo physical therapy.

Kepplinger said Kerstin, who can read and write, has expressed "many wishes," including a desire to go on a boat ride.

Reiter said Kerstin wants to see Williams in concert and was playing the British pop star's music loudly until 3 a.m. three days before her tube was removed.

He declined to answer questions about whether Kerstin had been sexually abused in captivity, noting that examinations conducted while she was in intensive care could neither confirm nor deny it.

Fritzl is accused of kidnapping and confining Elisabeth, now 42, to a basement hideaway for 24 years. Her plight was revealed during Kerstin's hospitalization when doctors appealed on TV for her mother to come forward, saying they needed information about Kerstin's medical history. Fritzl accompanied Elisabeth to the hospital on April 26.

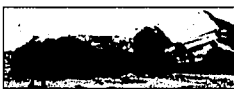

## Thrifty Car Sales opens in T.F., dealership says sales of fuel-efficient cars strong

Despite rising gas prices and declining auto sales, south-central Idaho's newest car dealership says business remains strong — you just have to sell the right type of car.

Thrifty Car Sales, which opened for business in Twin Falls on June 2, began operating at a time when most dealerships are seeing sales numbers fall.

However, Rick Long, general sales manager with Thrifty, said the new dealership has already sold 35 vehicles since it first opened.

He attributes the strong sales to Thrifty's sales model. "Most of our vehicles are fuel efficient compact cars that cost

about 50 percent less than a new car," Long said. "Right now, more than 90 percent of our inventory is made up of fuel efficient cars and the other 10 percent is trucks and vans."

Thrifty sells used rental vehicles — similar to other dealerships such as Hertz — that come with warranties.

More than \$125,000 was spent to remodel the existing structure that houses the Thrifty dealership located at 802 North College Road.

The business created six new jobs opportunities, including sales and administrative positions.

"We just thought that it would be a good fit in this area because we offer affordable cars with warranties," Long said. "And so far, it's been good business."

# Underwater border battle

Mexicans fear companies drilling in U.S. waters will suck Mexican crude

**U.S. GULF OF MEXICO** — Eight miles north of the maritime border with Mexico, in waters a mile and a half deep, Shell Oil Co. is constructing the most ambitious offshore oil platform ever attempted in the Gulf of Mexico.

As tall as the Eiffel Tower, the floating production facility will be anchored to the ocean floor by moorings spanning an area the size of downtown Houston. Slated to begin operating late next year, this leviathan known as Perdido (or Lost) will cost billions and be capable of pumping 100,000 barrels of crude a day.

But Perdido's most notable achievement might be to compel Mexico to loosen its 70-year government monopoly on the petroleum sector, thanks to a phenomenon Mexicans have dubbed the "drinking straw effect."

Mexicans fear that companies drilling in U.S. waters close to the border will suck Mexican crude into their wells. Actor Daniel Day-Lewis' fictional oilman in "There Will Be Blood" compared the concept to

siphoning a rival's milkshake.

"When they take petroleum from the American side, our petroleum is going to migrate," Francisco Labastida Ochoa, head of the Mexican Senate's Energy Committee, told the newspaper Milenio recently.

Oil isn't a simple commodity in Mexico. It's a symbol of national sovereignty. Rancor over foreigners profiting from its hydrocarbons

— namely America's Standard Oil — led Mexico to nationalize its industry in 1938. The state-owned oil company is Pemex. It's forbidden by law from participating with outsiders to exploit a drop of Mexican crude.

But for a growing chorus of Mexicans, sharing a milkshake is preferable to watching your neighbor drink it up. Mexico has no viable deep-water drilling program to match U.S. efforts near

High energy, food prices keep economy weak

**WASHINGTON** — The Fed's new snapshot of business conditions, released Wednesday in Washington, underscored two big sore spots for the country: listless economic activity coupled with high energy and food prices. "Those rising prices carry the risk of both spread-

ing inflation and putting another drag on overall economic growth.

Chafing under price hikes, "consumer spending slowed ... as incomes were pinched by rising energy and food prices," the Fed said. Manufacturing activity, meanwhile, was "generally soft" and the housing market remained stuck in a rut.

Businesses also were hit by

higher costs, especially for energy, metals, plastics, chemicals and food. Such reports were "widespread," the Fed said. To cope, manufacturers in several areas "noted some ability to pass along higher costs to customers," the Fed said. Retailers, however, reported "mixed results with respect to raising final goods prices," the Fed said.

Over the past week, Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke and his Fed colleagues have been sounding an ever-louder alarm against inflation.

On Wall Street, stocks tumbled as soaring oil prices fanned inflation concerns. Oil prices closed at \$136.38 a barrel. Gasoline prices reached

# Deadly Sudan jet fire survivor: 'It was panic'

KHARTOUM, Sudan (AP) — Abdel-Moneim Hassanein remembers the jetliner landing and then the chaos — the blast of an explosion, flames at the front of the plane, screams and the sounds of passengers uttering their last prayers.

The 75-year-old soon realized: the flight attendant at the back of the plane where he and his wife sat could not open the exit door.

"Many things were happening at once... people rushed toward the only open door at the front," he said. He hurried there, pushed his wife out the open exit and onto the emergency slide — past the flames — and then immediately followed her.

The couple and more than 170 others escaped the inferno on the Sudan Airways flight on Tuesday night that killed at least 30 people.

"I didn't keep my cool, we both would have been finished," Hassanein told The Associated Press on Wednesday by telephone from his home outside Khartoum.

The jet skidded off the runway at Khartoum International Airport and rammed into the lights used by pilots to navigate when landing in bad weather.

sparking a fire on the aircraft's right side, police spokesman Maj. Gen. Mohammed Abdel Majid Al-Tayeb said.

The blaze raged for hours, eventually splitting the plane in two, before firefighters put it out. Thirty people were killed, including one flight attendant; 178 escaped and six people remain unaccounted for, Sudan Airways said. Some survivors likely left

the airport without reporting to authorities or going through customs, officials said.

An investigation into the accident was under way Wednesday. The airport also reopened.

Airbus said it was sending in specialists to help with the inquiry. It said the plane involved in the accident was 18 years old and had been operated by Sudan Airways

since September. Investigators from France were also taking part because the plane was made by France-based Airbus.

The Airbus A310 is a twin-engine, widebody plane used by a number of carriers around the world, typically configured with about 220 seats. It is a shorter version of the popular A300.

Sudan has a poor aviation safety record and has many small airlines that service

Africa's largest country. Three years ago, the government said it planned to build a new airport outside of the city center by 2010. It remains in the planning phase.

In May, a plane crash in a remote area of southern Sudan killed 24 people, including key members of the southern Sudanese government. In 2003, a Sudan Airways going from Port Sudan to Khartoum crashed

soon after takeoff, killing all 115 people aboard.

Tuesday's flight touched down as thunderstorms pounded the city, but reports differed on the weather's role in the accident.

The head of Sudanese police, Mohamamad Najibi, said bad weather "caused the plane to crash land, split into two and catch fire."

But Youssef Ibrahim, the Khartoum airport director, disputed that bad weather was to blame, saying the plane "landed safely." He blamed the accident on technical problems, saying one of the engines blew up.

A sandstorm hit the area with 20 mph winds in the afternoon and there were thunderstorms and similar winds at the time of the accident around 9 p.m.

Due to inclement weather in Khartoum, the aircraft stopped at Port Sudan Airport along the Red Sea, refueling before heading to Khartoum. The flight originated in Amman, Jordan and stopped in Damascus, Syria.

Hassanein, who was returning from Damascus after a family vacation, said bad weather delayed the flight by three hours. Many children were onboard, returning from vacation.

## Ancient cave under church linked to early Christians in Jordan

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) — Archaeologists in Jordan have discovered a cave underneath one of the world's oldest churches and say it may have been an even more ancient site of Christian worship. But outside experts expressed caution about the claim.

Archaeologist Abdul-Qader al-Housan, head of the Ribah Center for Archaeological Studies, said this week that the cave was unearthed in the northern Jordanian city of Ribah, after three months of excavation at shows evidence of early Christian rituals.

The cave is under St. George's Church, which some believe was built in the year 230, though the date is widely

disputed. That would make it one of the oldest churches in the world, along with one unearthed in the Jordanian southern port of Aqaba in 1998 and another in Israel discovered in 2005.

Al-Housan said there was evidence that the underground cave was used as a church by 70 disciples of Jesus in the first century after Christ's death, which would make it the oldest Christian site of worship in the world.

He described a circular worship area with stone seats separated from a living area that had a long tunnel leading to a source of water. He said the early Christians hid there from persecution.

A mosaic inscription on the floor of the later church of St. George also refers to "the 70 beloved by God and the divine" who founded the worship there.

S. Thomas Parker, a historian at North Carolina State University who led the team that discovered the church in Aqaba, said that while he hadn't seen the Ribah site, any such claim should be taken with a degree of caution.

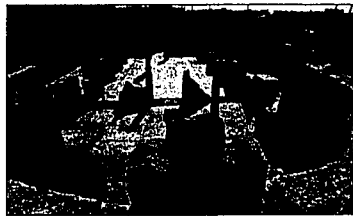
"An extraordinary claim like this requires extraordinary evidence," he said. "We need to see the artifacts and dating evidence to suggest such an occupation in the 1st century A.D."

Parker asked how archae-

ologists could be certain whether the "cave was actually a center of Christian worship."

The archaeologist also noted that mosaics are difficult to date unless there is a precise date in the text of the mosaic inscriptions themselves and typical mosaic inscriptions with Christian themes are from the 5th to 6th century.

"It's quite possible that there was a cave with earlier occupation which was later converted to Christian use. But to make the jump that this was actually used by Christians fleeing Jerusalem in the 1st century A.D. seems like a stretch to me," Parker said.

Australian archaeologist Kate da Costa of the University of Sydney, who works in northern Jordan

where the cave was found, also said the evidence needs to be confirmed by other archaeologists.

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## Getting out the vote

### Number of Latino voters source of excitement, challenge

There could be 40,000 potential Latino voters in Idaho this fall, and that excites Don Pena.

It's his mission to get Latinos registered and out to the polls. Pena, a Mini-Cassia native, is president of the board of the Idaho Hispanic Caucus Institute for Research & Education, which operates projects to educate the Latino community about the political system, voter registration and get people out to vote.

The base goal is to encourage 300 new Latinos to register this year, and he'd love it if they reached 1,000.

Within the last five to six years, they have seen the number of registered Idaho Latinos go from 10,000 to 20,000, and although they can't take credit for all of that growth, "a lot of it has been through our education efforts," Pena said of the institute. They did a lot of work out in the field registering voters and getting out the vote.

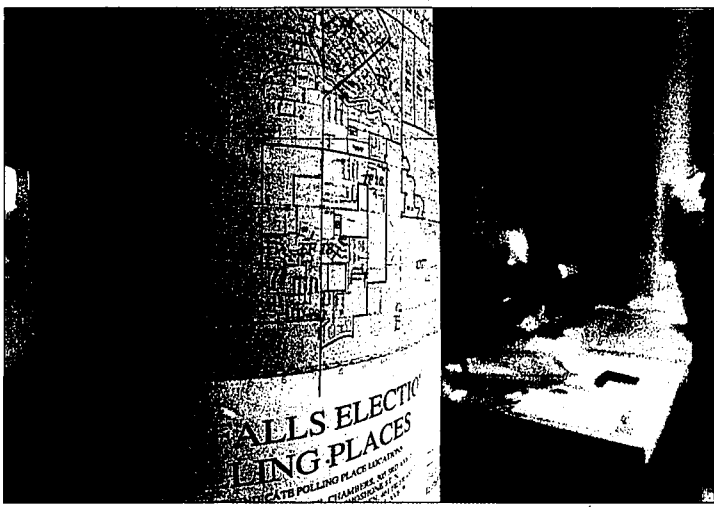
"The institute is a nonparti-

san arm of the Idaho Hispanic Caucus, which is more an advocacy and political arm. The institute is funded by grants, said institute project director Larry Olvera.

Throughout the state and year, the institute is planning voter education and registration events, as well as organizing volunteers, some who will man phone banks and even drive people to the polls. The institute also encourages absentee voting for Latinos who may be intimidated at voting sites.

"The institute will not direct them how to vote, only encourage them to do so, Pena emphasized. They also hope to get the message out to about 5,000 Latinos through Spanish-language radio and newspapers.

"So, we have an ambitious plan," Pena said.

Pena has noticed an excitement around this year's election. While part of that may be due to Barack Obama's visit to Idaho, another factor may be the topic of immigration.

"I think people are concerned about that (immigration) and it is one of those important issues to everyone," he said. The important thing is that people will be asking the candidates to make sure they would make level-headed decisions.

Pena also is seeing more Latino candidates in the state. There have been a slew of them running for school boards and city council seats and many have been success-

ful, which is where people are intimately impacted, he said.

Since 2000, there has been an upswing in the courting of the Idaho Latino vote, Pena said. "And it continues to this date."

Still, obstacles remain for Latino voters, such as language. Olvera said. But the institute is making voter information material available in Spanish.

There also is a lot of reeducating to do about politics, especially for Mexico-born people who often view government and politics there as less than positive, Olvera said.

Take his Mexico-born father.

"I looked at politics in a different way and it took a while for him to get out to the polls," he said.

After some education, now his parents never miss voting and his brother Robert is even running for office.

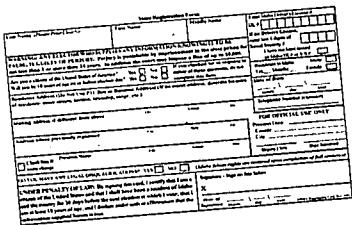
Olvera also is seeing the excitement build toward

November. The institute already has two pages filled with names of people who want rides to the polls.

"That is exciting for us," he said.

While they have had trouble finding volunteers in the past, "this year, we're looking pretty good."

"This is huge talk about how the Latino vote could change the face of this fall's election, which could be one of the largest in terms of voter turnout and what people consider as important," Olvera said. And be it, Obama or McCain, "you can see by their actions that the Latino vote is significant to them."



### Violence claims 10 in Baja California over weekend

**TIJUANA, Mexico** — Ten people were killed between Saturday and Monday, including two young women and a police officer, as this area suffered its worst bout of violence since an April shootout that killed 13 gunmen. Baja California authorities said.

Most of the seven held did not appear directly related to the Mexican government's offensive against organized crime, which has claimed more than 170 lives this year in Tijuana.

The two women's deaths were the exception. Their bodies were discovered Sunday morning on a hillside in eastern Tijuana. They had been shot execution-style

with large-caliber bullets, the kind typically used by drug cartel gunmen, according to the attorney general's office.

The women, both believed to be in their 20s, have not been identified and police did not have a motive in the case.

Authorities said the municipal police officer, Gustavo Salas Reyes, a 16-year veteran, was shot after an argument in a bar early Sunday morning. Two men died Saturday night in separate incidents, including one at a taco stand slain in a drive-by shooting, authorities said.

On Sunday, police discovered the bodies of three suspected car thieves on a Rosarito Beach hillside. Two people were killed Monday, but little information was available on those cases.

### Macabre messages multiply across Mexico

**MEXICO CITY** — In case decapitating their victims and dumping the heads in picnic coolers didn't make the point, the killers left a note: "This is a warning." It said, listing an alphabet soup of Mexican police agencies and the noms de guerre of several well-known drug figures. "You get what you deserve."

The message, scrawled on a poster in black ink, accompanied four severed human heads that Mexican authorities recently found on a highway in the northern state of Durango.

The same day, police in neighboring Chihuahua state came upon five swaddled bodies accompanied by a hand-lettered placard.

"This is what happens to stupid traitors who take sides with Chapo Guzman," said the message found in Ciudad Juarez, referring to Joaquin "Shorty" Guzman, the supposed leader of the main drug gang in adjacent Sinaloa state.

The killers closed with incongruous profanity: "Yours truly," they signed off, "La Linea."

Amid a wave of drug-related violence across Mexico, the dead these days are frequently accompanied by macabre calling cards known popularly as "narco-messages."

Part threat and part boast, the messages have multiplied as drug killings have reached record levels amid a government crackdown on organized crime, and deadly turf wars among traffickers.

Written by hand and often with grammatical errors, the notes are frequently publicized in Mexican news reports and on the Internet, allowing drug gangs to deliver their fearsome messages to enemies and society at large. The messages can even serve as a conversation between rivals.

Five days after police in Durango discovered the severed heads, they found another head, also with a message. It was an apparent answer to the earlier killings.

"We too can respond," the note said, according to Mexican media reports.

Analysts and law-enforcement officials view the messages as a version of wartime psychological operations,

rending medieval-style brutality a touch of 21st-century media savvy.

"I'm the boss of this turf," read a banner in Sinaloa bearing the name of Arturo Beltran, whose faction is battling Guzmán's. "And this is the beginning."

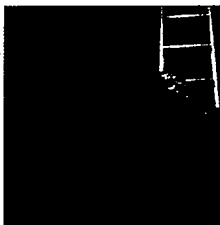
Grisly death has long been part of Mexico's illicit drug trade. But the frequency and brazenness of the narco-messages, including videotapes and photos of executions posted on YouTube, are a further sign that the violence has grown more savage.

"You didn't see that kind of stuff 13 years ago," said a senior U.S. counter-drug official. "It's more in-your-face."

Such was the case in Tijuana in April when rival factions of the Arellano Felix drug gang engaged in a gun battle that left 13 gunmen dead.

One of the bodies that turned up bore three words etched on the skin in marker: "Traidor, Enemigo, Objetivo," or "Traitor, Enemy, Target." The first letters of the three Spanish words spelled "Teo," the nickname of Teodoro Garcia Simental, leader of one of the warring factions.

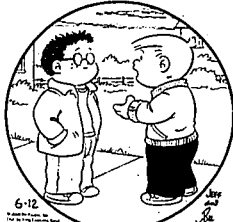

## Respect is a two-way street

It smarts to think of yourself as hopelessly uncool at the tender young age of 30, but as I was preparing to write this, I realized that telling Magic Valley's teen music lovers to "rock on" would be considered exactly that.

So instead of trying to prove my street cred, I'll write more simply and hope the message gets through.

To the teens who followed the rules at The Ranch, the all-ages music venue that closed last month: Thank you.

Your attendance and respect for the facility made it possible for a year's worth of concerts to happen there. It's not care what you look like or how loudly or incoherently you sing. You understand that making small concessions — like respecting the no-intoxicants regulations — allows you to achieve larger goals, like having a place to be your

punk, emo, screamo selves.

Please don't leave town or resort to less savory activities now that The Ranch has shut down. Stay here and help build support for a new venue. Heck, build it yourself with boards and nails if you have to.

Help the skeptics understand that peer pressure can work for good as well as ill. You can persuade at least some of the drinkers and druggers that their habits aren't welcome in a venue like The Ranch, and you can kick out those who don't respect the rules.

To the teens who didn't follow The Ranch's regulations: You're probably not reading this.



On the off-chance that it finds its way to you, though: Please, don't ruin a good thing for everyone else.

To anyone who sees brightly colored hair and faces full of metal and immediately thinks "delinquent": Most of the kids who went to The Ranch to listen to or play music and hang out weren't breaking the rules. Without drinking, taking drugs or committing acts of vandalism, they found a community that welcomed them and made them want to stay in Magic Valley.

That's not something to be taken lightly. If this community is to thrive, it must encourage not only entrepreneurs and PTA-at-tending families, but also a diversity of appearance, age, opinion and musical taste.

Magic Valley must say: "If you follow the rules, there's a place for you."

# Four decades in the band

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# A new style of jazz

## Festival shifts schedule under new leadership

Under the leadership of two Twin Falls Rotary clubs for the past decade, Jazz in the Canyon became one of the leading jazz events in the region and one of the city's biggest festivals.

This year, helmed by the Magic Valley Arts Council and Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce for the first time, it is slightly shifting in timing and focus. But like a group of skilled musicians jamming, the result is still expected to please.

"This is a legacy of the rotary clubs and we certainly hope we can continue the great tradition in our community," said Stacy Madsen, arts council executive director. "It's been a learning process. This is much larger than the Magic Valley Arts Council has done in the past."

The wine and jazz event at Kimberly Nurseries has traditionally been on Thursday night, with small venues hosting bands on Friday.

This year, the wine event moves to Friday, while a Father's Day brunch has been added on Sunday, shifting the festival's entire schedule forward a day.

The lineup of performers this year features jazz styles that haven't before echoed off the walls of the Snake-River Canyon in Centennial Waterfront Park, including the gypsy jazz of Seattle band Hot Club Sandwich.

"The name describes the style of music that we do," said band member Greg Ituby. "It's originally inspired by Django Reinhardt and the Stephane Grappelli Quintet of the Hot Club of France,

which was an acoustic jazz and swing group from 1930s Paris. We borrow from that musical tradition and incorporate our own original compositions as well as what's become known as gypsy jazz standards."

"The band includes two acoustic guitars, an arch-top guitar, violin, mandolin, upright bass and vocals, and Ituby said they're looking forward to playing in the "absolutely gorgeous" canyon and connecting to a new audience in Idaho. They will play

really fun for us that there's a jazz festival that we consider so close to home."

Fleming, with a smaller acoustic backing group, has performed in Magic Valley before, including a February concert at the King Fine Arts Center in Burley and a 2006 performance at the Eighth Street Center in Buhl.

Other performers include returning band Soul Survivors; Twin Falls favorite Ethan Tucker, playing with other area acts; Gene Loranger's in a Mellow Tone Quartet; and Jeff Baker Group featuring College of Southern Idaho jazz teacher Brent Jensen, also returning to the festival.

"I'll be enjoying it as a spectator as much as anything else," Jensen said.

He'll perform with the group at other regional venues, including Pandora's on Monday night, an Idaho Falls concert and the Gene Harris Jazz Festival in Boise. "Jazz in the Canyon becomes a reason to put other things together."

Jensen said he has heard some grumbling about the elimination of the club performances that used to be on Friday night, but

## Sports, grilling, golf: Books for dads

*Editor's note: This is the first of what we hope will be many TNT columns by longtime Twin Falls book-lover Judi Baxter. Most of her columns — which will appear about once a month — will focus on one or two books, going into depth about what she liked or didn't like. ### A tribute to writer Jack Lintelmann

*Editor's note: Jack Lintelmann was a noted figure in the Twin Falls writing scene for many years, with his work appearing in such publications as Smithsonian Magazine. He also published a book, "The Incomplete Bassett Howard Omelet."*

*Here is a brief tribute to Lintelmann, who died April 9 at age 77, by a friend and fellow member of the Twin Falls chapter of the Idaho Writers League. Also included is one of the final pieces of writing Lintelmann completed before his death. It appears exactly as he wrote it on March 25 for the April 5 meeting of the league.*

I never got to know Jack Lintelmann as well as I'd have liked. Being a sculptor, artist and writer, he was of necessity a private person, except when commenting on someone's work.

Jack was the thermometer for our critique session as he would always tell you if your piece was good. He'd also tell you when it wasn't. Many people will do that, but Jack would tell you why. And he was such a careful writer that his comments were universally taken to heart.

As a member of the Twin Falls chapter of the Idaho Writers League for a number of years and with many awards and publica-

tions to his credit, he was a respected friend and is greatly missed by all.

The soldier leaned back into the cushions of the open-air touring car and took in a spectacle of which he would never have dreamed. As he craned his head up and around, he was amazed with every new angle of view. The sheer canyon walls created by incredible buildings so tall they trapped the snowstorm cloud of paper tape and scraps of white debris that was channeled willfully onto the crowds below. The young, noncommissioned officer understood then, the full meaning of a tieker-type parade.

As the vehicle moved through the billboard of white, a triangular shaped Monolith appeared before them that reminded the soldier of the prow of his troopship, or a giant swedge of Swiss cheese ... or his mother's iron. more recognition of the conscientious objector-turned-warrior sitting by his side. The soldier, an ex-farmer from the Valley of the Three Forks of the Wolf, in the Cumberland Mountains, rode silently, clutching an oversized, symbolic "key to the city" in his callused hands.

When he pulled up Hill, the politician, occasionally glanced over to smile with pride at the uniform medals pinned on the fabric of his big, rawboned companion, particularly one that hung from the soldier's neck: the United States Medal of Honor. In future years, Mr. Hull, the statesman, would serve with distinction as a cabinet member, secretary of state for President Roosevelt.

The touring ear rolled along at the fixed speed of marching men, thousands whose rank and file reached from curb to curb, fore and after of the car, a small army itself, flowing in cadence; a river of men in flood stage coursing between the canyon walls conformed by banks of waving onlookers; the crowds saluting the American hero whose religious convictions were temporarily forsaken by his duty to country. The simple, humble, God-fearing sergeant who was overwhelmed by the enormity of it all.

## Southern Idaho screamo

Even as they stood together on the stage, they looked random. Guitarist Mikey Eveleth II sported a bald head and Jersey. Lead singer Pete Welch wore a plaid shirt and a bandanna, while Drake Hoogland wore black behind his drum set. Donovan Van Sant was almost nothing at all, having stripped down to his boxers to play the bass.

While they had different sartorial styles, the men who make up Twin Falls band Home Town Hero came together and rocked The Ranch on May 31 with their explosive sound and wild stage presence.

### One riff at a time

Home Town Hero started two years ago when Hoogland and Welch started playing together. Eveleth and Van Sant joined later, and they joined the local music scene with their raw pop-punk sound.

All four members of the band have different tastes in music. Hoogland digs screamo music, while Welch likes indie pop-punk. Eveleth prefers hardcore and Van Sant likes metal.

What comes out of this mishmash of musical preferences? On their Myspace page, they define themselves as alternative, pop-punk and screamo, a punk genre categorized by screaming vocals and fast hits. Their music is often compared to New York band Taking Back Sunday, a group they idolize.

Their musical aspirations and expe-

riences vary as much as their tastes. Eveleth started playing in fifth grade, while Welch didn't pick up a guitar until he was 17. Hoogland and Welch want to be career musicians, while bass is just a hobby for Van Sant.

### In three words: 'Energetic, unpredictable, awesome'

Their lively stage presence is as defining as their simple, catchy songs. In the beginning, Welch, who writes lyrics, didn't put any of the words to paper. If he couldn't remember the song the second time he sang it, it wasn't catchy enough to play again.

Their sound is now a little more refined and their lyrics well thought-out.

"One of our best songs is really personal," Welch said.

"(Expletive) You Matt Mullane!" — the song name is cleaned up here — is named after Welch's ex-girlfriend's old boyfriend.

Welch has never met Matt Mullaney — just heard about him on the phone. The acoustic song about heartbreak soon became one of their best-known, earning more than 2,700 hits on their Myspace page.

And as for the poor namesake of the song?

"I don't even know who Matt Mullaney is," Welch said.

### What the critics say

Russell Worstell, front man for Twin Falls ska band SKITISH ITZ, has seen Home Town Hero evolve over the past two years.

"I think it's a great hybrid emo/alternative band," he said.

# Teen musicians, music fans shut out of Twin Falls venue

**T**he teenagers sidestepped animal manure as they made their way across the grounds.

Kids sporting Metallica T-shirts, Mohawks and high-top sneakers seemed right at home on the rural ranch as muffled rock music seeped from a nearby barn.

It would be the last time the punk, emo and hardcore fans gathered at The Ranch, a Twin Falls music venue that catered to under-21 music fans. The venue, located on a family farm, closed down after a year of underground concerts, leaving young bands and their fans saying they have no place to enjoy their music.

Mikey Eveleth II, 20, started The Ranch a year ago in response to a lack of places for teenage rock musicians to play. Eveleth implemented a strict no-drugs, no-alcohol policy, charged \$5 admission, and hosted local and traveling bands. Each near-monthly show attracted between 100 and 200 fans, mostly through word-of-mouth.

But on May 31, The Ranch hosted its last show. Nine bands, ranging from hardcore Christian to pop punk, rocked the crowd of 100. The bands played in a starkly decorated barn, and fans danced and moshed on the sawdust floor, mere feet away from saddles and ropes hanging on the walls. Outside, kids teased a spitting llama and petted a friendly goat while taking smoke breaks and chatting.

Throughout the night, rumors circulated about The Ranch's demise — a rival bar had reported them to police for serving alcohol to minors, some said; others claimed Eveleth could no longer afford liability insurance — but

Eveleth said law enforcement was going to forcibly shut him down if he didn't do it himself.

Not true, said Capt. Don Newman of the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Department. While deputies can issue citations for individual violations, like juvenile drinking or rowdy partying, they cannot shut down an event on someone's private property, he said.

And, he added, the sheriff's department has no record of threatening to close The Ranch. "I don't know where the 'We will shut you down' came from," Newman said.

Although Newman couldn't comment on who would be responsible for any underage drinking at The Ranch, some responsibility lies with the property owners if they do nothing to discourage it.

"I would caution somebody that was having events like that, if they knew that there was juvenile alcohol consumption taking place (and nothing was done to stop it) ... there would be a potential liability," Newman said.

Although Eveleth and his friends enforced strict no-intoxicants rules, some kids still managed to sneak booze into the venue, Eveleth said. He decided to shut it down before he got shut down.

Even on the last night, a few teenagers tried to sneak swigs of alcohol in the parking lot. Eveleth and his friends ran around with walkie-talkies, trying to catch the offenders and promptly kicking them off the property when caught.

The bands also got into the enforcement, occasionally pausing their sets to admonish the drinkers to the cheers of behaving concert-goers.

The handful of delinquent partyers angered the majority of Ranchers who followed the rules.

"I guess not everyone knows

the concept of The Ranch," said Jimmy Elliott, 22.

Elliott was especially frustrated at The Ranch's closing because it left younger kids like his 17-year-old brother with little to do on weekends. Twin Falls city developers show more interest in "building banks and car dealerships" than positive activities for youth, he said.

"That's why you see so much teen pregnancy," Elliott said. Others claimed that boredom leads to youth delinquency.

"This ranch has single-handedly kept a lot of kids off the streets," 18-year-old Roger Useenbach said.

Mark Browne, a Twin Falls drug-and-alcohol counselor whose son Steve performed at The Ranch, said positive activities are a must for youth who want to stay out of trouble.

"Boredom is a real issue with young people," Browne said.

And now that The Ranch has closed?

"Really, the only thing left to do is drugs, stupid stuff and sex," Useenbach said.

Whether or not that's true — there's Skateland and the movie theater, for example — many of

the kids here desperately want a place to rock out where no one will judge them for their thick eyeliner, loud music and spiky hair.

The music fans aren't the only ones shut out of The Ranch. Teen musicians who are too young to play in bars and whose music is too rowdy for other venues are also out of luck.

The solution? Either wait for another venue to open or head out of town.

Keith Cummings' band, Amblett Died Trying, is recording an EP this summer in Meridian and is looking into relocating to Boise.

"At least we'll have a place to play," Cummings said.

The closing of The Ranch wasn't the deciding factor for the pop-screamo band. Cummings said that the Twin Falls under-

ground music scene has always struggled, and teenage bands have never had a steady place to play.

"It's been that way for the past three years," he said.

But that won't be the case for long, Eveleth said.

Ioshua Cummings, who helped man the door and patrol the parking lot for underage drinkers, said although The Ranch closed, music fans need not fret.

"All the money tonight is going to help fund a new building," said Cummings, 21.

That tenacity is what kept the bands alive in the first place, Keith Cummings said.

"We always find somewhere else," he said.

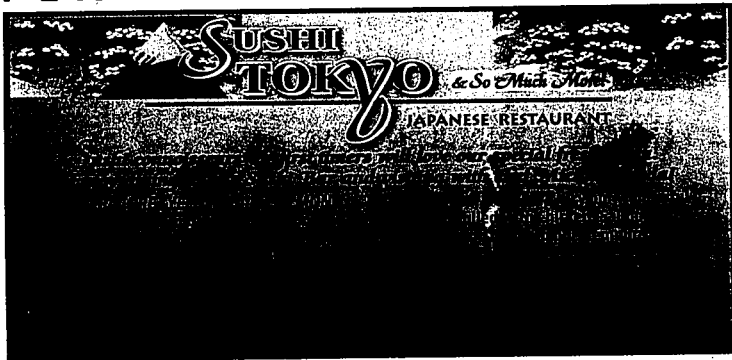
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# 'Zohan': A sink full of stereotypes

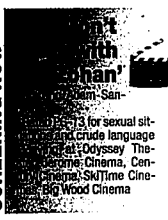
In "You Don't Mess with the Zohan," Adam Sandler manages to stereotype pretty much everyone in the Western Hemisphere.

It's not like he's heavily confronting political correctness by revealing in expressing the nastiest stereotypes; it's more like he hasn't heard of political correctness and is unfamiliar with the concept of stereotypes in the first place. His mind is stuck at the 61-year-old level.

Sandler plays the Zohan, a failed Israeli special-operations hero. This hero decides he has had enough of fighting and decides to immigrate to America and become a hairdresser at the famous Paul Mitchell boutique.

To be fair, there's some humor in the way Sandler and his put director, Dennis Dugan, envision the Zohan as a gymnist rather than a commando. And the charm continues for a bit: The Zohan gets

to America, tries to get a job at the Mitchell boutique and instead ends up in a neighborhood in Brooklyn that is a mini-Middle East of its own, with Palestinians on one side of the street and Jews on the other. He, of course, can find work only in a shop owned by a Palestinian woman (Immanuelle Chriqui, the best thing, by far in the picture).

The movie is gross, but not unfunny as it covers the Zohan's rise through hair culture, aided by his steamy heterosexuality.

his lack of inhibition and his stereotypical career aggressiveness, until the old ladies are lined up all the way to the Bronx for a few minutes of bliss in the Zohan's chair.

When he's not modeling his muscles, he's showing off his

showbiz connections with a batch of cameos from such luminaries as John McEnroe, George Takei and Bruce Vilanch.

But in the end, the movie feels as if it exists only to display the Sandler's biceps.

different and disconnected components that don't manage to unite to make a coherent whole. PG-13 for some intense sequences of sci-fi action and violence, and brief suggestive content.

"Made of Honor" — This redo of "My Best Friend's Wedding" stars expert romantic-comedy leads Patrick Dempsey and Michelle Monaghan in the story of two best friends who don't realize they're made for each other until she decides to marry someone else. PG-13 for sexual content and language.

"What Happens in Vegas" — The most annoying expression-turned-official-city-slogan is now a major motion picture starring Cameron Diaz and Ashton Kutcher. The pair play a pair of odd-couple New Yorkers whose initial hostility

blossoms into love after a judge (Dennis Miller) orders them to remain in a drunken, joke Las Vegas marriage for six months if they want to keep the \$3 million they made in the morning. PG-13 for some crude sexual content and language, including a drug reference.

"The Chronicles of Narnia: Prince Caspian" — The sequel to the hugely popular "The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe," the first of C.S. Lewis' seven-volume Narnia series to be filmed, "Prince Caspian" is both like its predecessor and different from it. Though it retains a kid-friendly PG rating, this film is noticeably darker in tone and features extensive, though bloodless, battle scenes. PG for epic battle action and violence.
