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## Bush agrees to talk about Iraq timetable

WASHINGTON — President Bush and Iraq's prime minister have agreed to set a "general time horizon" for bringing more U.S. troops home from the war, a dramatic shift from the administration's ironclad unwillingness to talk about any deadline or timetable.

The announcement Friday put Bush in the position of offering to talk with Iraq leaders about a politically charged issue that he adamantly has refused to discuss with the Democratic-led Congress at home. It also could complicate the presidential campaign arguments of Republican John McCain and Democrat Barack Obama who have staked out starkly opposite stands about the unpopular war.

What's changed? The sharp reduction in violence in Iraq — to the lowest level in four years — has made the country's leaders increasingly confident and more assertive about its sovereignty, giving rise to demands for a specific plan for American forces to leave.

Iraq has leverage because the White House is struggling to salvage

## Judge restores protection for wolves

BILLINGS, Mont. — A federal judge has restored protections for gray wolves in the Northern Rockies, derailing plans by three states to hold public wolf hunts this fall.

U.S. District Judge Donald Molloy granted a preliminary injunction late Friday restoring the protections for the wolves in Idaho, Montana and Wyoming. Molloy will eventually decide whether the injunction should be permanent.

The region has an estimated 2,000 gray wolves. They were removed from the endangered species list in March, following a decade-long restoration effort.

Environmentalists sued to overturn the decision, arguing wolf numbers would plummet if hunting were allowed. They sought the injunction in the hopes of stopping the hunts and allowing the wolf population to continue expanding.

## Casting call held in Twin Falls for reality show

Donning short shorts, a tight T-shirt, long blond hair and four-inch gold heels, local waitress Shay Tusow, 23, said she has what it takes to be America's Next Top Model.

"I have a passion for fashion," said Tusow. "I wouldn't be here if I thought I didn't have a chance."

Tusow measures 5-foot-11 barefoot at 125 pounds and towered over her competition Friday in Twin Falls during an open casting call for the reality television show.

"I have legs for days," Tusow said, citing her best physical attribute. But she wasn't gloating. Producers asked her to say what she likes best about her body.

They also asked contenders questions like: "what would you do to win, why should you win, what do you think about the competition, and what's the craziest thing you've done."

The young women didn't downplay each other during their individual interviews. But they did highlight their most

attractive qualities. "I always like to be in the spotlight," said Adaya Pollard, 18.

Pollard works at local clothing retailer The Buckle and she said she likes her smile, learns quickly and is honest. "I love clothes," she said adding, "I'm tall and skinny."

The show's makers want honest extroverts. Casting materials show: "The producers are looking for a dynamic group of individuals who are articulate, interesting and exhibit enthusiasm for the series as well as a willingness to share their most private thoughts in an open forum of strangers."

Friday's Twin Falls contenders said they'd be comfortable appearing on the reality television show, which will showcase up to 14 women living in one house from October through December.

Privacy won't be an option. "You will be observed at all times by the producers as well as the general public watching on television and possibly the internet," according to casting materials.

## Idaho gas tax revenue down as prices climb

IDAHO FALLS — Idaho motorists cutting back on trips to save money on gas means less money that the state Transportation Department collects from the 25-cent-per-gallon fuel tax.

"We've definitely noticed a difference, but we can't quantify it yet," Mel Coulter, a spokesman for the department, told the Post Register.

The state already faces a projected \$240 million annual shortfall in transportation infrastructure funding.

Attempts failed in the last legislative session to raise the state's gas tax and increase vehicle registration fees to pay for repairing roads.

"I used to go to town to have something to do, and now I don't," said Mac Taylor of how gas that costs \$4 a gallon has caused him to make fewer trips to Idaho Falls.

Hundreds of dead penguins wash ashore on Brazil's beaches

**RIO DE JANEIRO** — Hundreds of baby penguins swept from the icy shores of Antarctica and Patagonia are washing up dead on Rio de Janeiro's tropical beaches, rescuers and penguin experts said Friday.

More than 400 penguins, most of them young, have been found dead on the beaches of Rio de Janeiro state over the past two months, according to Eduardo Pimenta, superintendent for the state coastal protection and environment agency in the resort city of Cabo Frio.

While it is common here to find some penguins — both adult and alive — swept by strong ocean currents from the Strait of Magellan, Pimenta said there have been more this year than at any time in recent memory.

Experts are divided over the possible causes. Thiago Muniz, a veterinarian at the Niteroi Zoo, said he believed overfishing has forced the penguins to swim further from shore to find fish to eat "and that leaves them more vulnerable to getting caught up in the strong ocean currents."

One of the state's biggest zoos, already has already received about 100 penguins for treatment this year and many are drenched in petroleum, Muniz said.

U.S. general says Iraq crackdown focuses on weapons smuggling

**CAMP VICTORY** — With al-Qaida falling away, U.S. forces in Iraq are turning their attention to another front: the Iranian border. They aim to crack down on weapon smuggling from Iran by tightening the frontier with Iraq's neighbor to the east, a U.S. commander told The Associated Press on Friday.

The effort is aimed at smugglers who supply Shiite extremist groups with rockets, missiles, mortars and assembled explosive devices that

have killed many U.S. troops. "We're going to start squeezing this network pretty hard," said Maj. Gen. Michael Oates, who leads a contingent of 19,000 U.S. troops in regions south of the capital as commander of the Army's 10th Mountain Division. U.S. troops will establish small outposts in the vicinity of two or three official border crossings and seek to build relations with local tribes whose cooperation is critical, the general said. One such outpost already is set up.

For much of the year, U.S. and Iraqi forces were focused mainly on al-Qaida and other insurgent forces that threatened to plunge the country into all-out civil war. Shiite extremist groups inside Iraq

took advantage of that narrow focus to develop a network of weapons supply routes from Iran, he said.

"Now that al-Qaida is hurt very badly, we're able to shift our emphasis and take a look at this other threat — and this is a significant threat that these Iranian-based extremist groups are attempting" to carry out, he said, not only by killing American troops but also seeking to topple the Iraqi government.

NYC gang used torture to rob rival drug dealers

**NEW YORK** — They bound their victims with duct tape, beat them and held guns to their heads. When that didn't work, the bandits applied pliers to their genitals and pressed hot irons to the soles of their feet. Sometimes they held victims' heads under water in a bathtub.

Prosecutors say the torture was inflicted by a Brazilian New York gang that impersonated police officers and preyed on rival drug dealers along the East Coast, stealing their money and cocaine. The crime spree netted more than 1,650 pounds of cocaine worth \$20 million and \$4 million in cash. At least 100 people were injured.

The gang "was breathing life into the drug business in the danger it posed to our communities," said U.S. Attorney Benton Campbell when he charged Franklin Acosta de Vargas and others earlier this year.

There were fall hunts scheduled that would call for perhaps as many as 500 wolves to be killed. We're delighted those wolves will be saved," said attorney Doug Honnold with Earthjustice, who had argued the case before Molloy on behalf of 12 environmental groups.

In his ruling, Molloy said the federal government had not met its standard for wolf recovery, including interbreeding of wolves between the three states to ensure healthy genetics.

"Genetic exchange has not taken place," Molloy wrote in

the 40-page decision. Molloy said hunting and state laws allowing the killing of wolves for livestock attacks would likely "eliminate any chance for genetic exchange to occur."

The federal biologist who led the wolf restoration program, Ed Bangs, defended the decision to delist wolves as "a very biologically sound package."

"The hunting of wolves clearly wouldn't endanger threatened wolf populations," Bangs said Friday. "We felt the science was rock solid and that the delisting was warranted."

negotiations for a long-term agreement covering U.S. military operations there. The White House said its goal is to conclude that deal by the end of this month.

Bush and Iraqi Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki talked about the stalled negotiations during a secure, video conference on Thursday, agreeing "on a common way forward to conclude these negotiations as soon as possible," a White House statement said.

The two leaders agreed that improvements in security should allow for the negotiations "to include a general time horizon for meeting aspirational goals, such as the resumption of Iraqi security control in their cities and provinces and the further reduction of U.S. combat forces from Iraq," the White House said.

Bush repeatedly has vetoed legislation approved by Congress setting deadlines for American troop cutbacks.

Friday's White House statement was intentionally vague and did not specify what kind of timelines were envisioned. That allows Iraqi officials, who are facing elections in the fall, to argue they are not beholden to Washington or willing to tolerate a permanent military presence in Iraq. For Bush, it points the way toward a legal framework for keeping American troops in Iraq after a U.N. mandate expires on Dec. 31.

"The agreement will look at goal dates for transition of responsibilities and missions," said Gordon Johndroe, spokesman for Bush's National Security Council. "The focus is on the Iraq assumption of mission, not on what troop levels will be."

As for the campaign to elect a new commander in chief, McCain firmly opposes

es any withdrawal timetable while Obama pledges to pull out combat troops within 16 months. By talking about a "time horizon," Bush appeared at odds with McCain and could make his own GOP administration a tougher target for Obama's anti-war barbs.

McCain issued a statement saying, "Progress between the United States and Iraq on the time horizon for American troop presence is further evidence that the surge has succeeded. ... If we had followed Sen. Obama's policy, Iraq would have descended into chaos, American casualties would be far higher, and the region would be destabilized."

However, Ben Rose, a senior adviser to Obama, said, "It's another indication that the administration is moving toward ... Sen. Obama's position on negotiating the removal of our forces as part of our ongoing discussions with the Iraqi government."

House Speaker Nancy Pelosi said Bush wasn't going far enough. "After rejecting 18 months of attempts by the Democratic majority in Congress to adopt redeployment timetables, the president now proposes a vague general time horizon that falls far short of a commitment to ending our involvement in Iraq," she said.

Democratic Rep. William Delahunt of Massachusetts, who has led House hearings on the planned agreement with Iraq, said the "time horizon" cited by the White House was "very vague and nebulous." He also said the agreement taking shape seemed "far less grandiose than what was initially articulated."

Iraq has proposed requiring U.S. forces to fully withdraw five years after the Iraqis take the lead on security nationwide — though that condition could take years to meet.

Highland Ave. East in Twin Falls on April 27.

Prosecutors assert that Stanley and Wahl attacked and robbed Trogla, and held him in his house against his will.

During a hearing for Stanley Friday in 5th District Court in Twin Falls, Trogla said he thinks Wahl beat him up because he called Wahl a "rape-o." Trogla told the court he had heard Wahl raped his friend's girlfriend.

No rape charges have been

issued against Wahl in Idaho, according to court records.

Trogla said he was beat up with bare fists, brass knuckles and another metal object for at least 10 minutes, which he said, felt like forever.

"I was bleeding so bad I couldn't see no more. I was seeing sparkles," he told the court Friday.

Wahl and Stanley are charged with burglary, aggravated battery and first-degree kidnapping.

They're facing hard time: Life in prison is the maxi-

mum possible punishment for the kidnapping charge.

Prosecutors said Trogla is permanently disabled from an ear injury he suffered during the attack.

Stanley's lawyer on Friday said he hadn't received evidence in the case, but Stanley wanted to proceed immediately with the hearing.

Judge Roger Harris passed the case onto another judge because he had once represented Trogla in an unrelated matter.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loebbs wouldn't specifically comment Friday on the level of violence involved in this case, and added that the court record speaks for itself.

"We don't see many kidnappings in Twin Falls County, but we do see them from time to time," Loebbs said. "Each is different. Some are more violent, some less."

about five miles from his home.

He's also driving his wife's more fuel-efficient car rather than his pickup.

Other Idaho residents appear to be making similar changes in their driving habits at a time when Gov. CL "Butch" Otter is trying to persuade residents to support increased taxes or fees to pay for road repairs.

"It's to a point where all the taxpayers out there have to make a decision," said Tom Cole, the Transportation Department's District 6 engineer. He said the longer repairs go undone, the more expensive they become, with

asphalt prices increasing due to the high cost of petroleum.

He said the cost has doubled in one year, going from \$450 a ton last year to more than \$700 a ton now.

Transportation Department chief Pam Lowe, in the latest draft of the agency's Statewide Transportation Improvement Program, said maintaining roads will be the top priority with the money that is available.

"As funding shrinks, ITD will focus state and federal funding resources to ensure the operation and preservation of our transportation system and will only consider expansion as funding is available," she wrote.

# Crane collapses at Houston refinery, killing four workers

HOUSTON — One of the nation's largest mobile cranes collapsed at a Houston oil refinery Friday, killing four workers and injuring seven others in the latest of several fatal accidents that have raised concerns about the safety of construction cranes.

The 30-story-tall crane, capable of lifting 1 million pounds, fell over at a LyondellBasell refinery in southeast Houston about 2 p.m., said Jim Roecker, the company's vice president for refining.

The massive, deep red crane lay on top of a smaller, bright yellow crane on the grounds of the refinery. Ambulances and fire trucks were lined up outside.

The casualties were in the area of the crane, but officials still aren't certain whether they were on the crane or

under it, Roecker said. Three of the injured were treated and released at the scene, said Houston Fire Department Assistant Chief Omero Longoria. Two severely injured workers were taken by helicopter to Memorial Hermann-Texas Medical Center hospital and the other two injured workers were taken to a hospital by ambulance.

The crane belonged to Deep South Crane & Rigging. Roecker described it as one of the nation's largest mobile cranes, at 300 feet tall with a 400-foot boom. Construction cranes run taller, but they're not mobile.

The crane had not been scheduled to do any work until next week, but Roecker said its engine was idling after it hit the ground.

"This is a traumatic experience for all of us. We have to focus on the safety and health of our employees," Roecker said.

# McCain and Obama hedge on costly new presidential helicopter

WASHINGTON — John McCain and Barack Obama vow to reform the nation's defense procurement if elected president, yet each is unwilling to take a firm stand against the skyrocketing cost of a plum White House perk: the new Marine One helicopter.

Originally carrying a hefty price tag at \$6.1 billion, the fleet of 28 helicopters being built to fly the next president is now projected to cost \$11.2 billion.

At \$400 million apiece, the helicopters far exceed a prime example McCain uses on the campaign trail to rail against congressional pork-barrel spending, a \$230 million "bridge to nowhere" in Alaska. The British have bought the same base

mödel helicopter for \$57 million each.

In separate interviews with The Associated Press, the Republican and Democratic presidential candidates pledged to look at the program but stopped short of saying whether it should be canceled. Any review after the next president takes office in January would butt up against the first deliveries of the heli-

copters, slated for 2010.

McCain labeled the contract growth a "scandal" before asking to revise his assessment. "In a more polite way," He said the program is part of "an out-of-control procurement system that has to be fixed."

Obama said, "I haven't taken a close look at it, but, in principle, it is a lot of money, even in Washington."

Asked whether the president needed such a large and expensive fleet of helicopters for his most common trip, a 10-minute flight to and from Andrews Air Force Base, Obama said: "Here's what I know: that we should be spending a lot more money trying to figure out how to get our energy policy right than we should be on helicopters for the president. I have not exam-

ined in detail this proposal, and since you brought it up, I'll take a close look at it." Congress and the Pentagon are already reviewing the program to determine how to cope with the contract growth. In an audit, the Government Accountability Office has also raised concerns about the helicopter's weight and its new rotor system.

# McCain TV ad hits Obama on Iraq

WASHINGTON — Republican John McCain launched a new television ad Friday that accuses presidential rival Barack Obama of switching positions on Iraq "to help himself become president" just as the Democratic candidate prepared to make a high profile trip to Baghdad.

McCain's sharply worded criticism was not limited to the ad. He said Friday that Obama would be facing a far less secure Iraq "if we had done what he wanted to do."

The 30-second ad, running on national cable and in 11 battleground states, is the harshest hit aimed at Obama so far by McCain.

"Barack Obama never held a single Senate hearing on Afghanistan," the ad's announcer says. "He hasn't been to Iraq in years. He voted against funding our troops. Positions that helped him win his nomination. Now Obama is changing to help himself become president."

The ad suggests that Obama was playing politics ahead of the country's interests. "John McCain has always supported our troops and the surge that's working," McCain. "Country first," the ad states.

McCain could have let the Republican National Committee air the commercial, as it did with another critical portrayal of Obama. But McCain aides say Iraq and national security are issues that McCain is eager to debate with Obama and say it is reason to put distance between himself and the criticism.

The ad is airing as Obama prepares to make a high-profile foreign trip designed to ease voter concerns about his national security credentials. It also airs as Obama's commitment to withdrawing combat troops within 16 months of becoming president has come under question.

Obama has said he remains steadfast in his goal to end the war. But while he had earlier said he would "immediately" begin to remove troops, he now says he would immediately give his commanders a mission to end the war.

McCain has been a staunch proponent of a military escalation that has increased security in Iraq. Obama opposed that surge in troops.

"He will land in a very different Baghdad than the one he would have landed in... if we had done what he wanted to do," McCain said at a Detroit fundraising lunch Friday. "He wants to set a date for withdrawal. He said the surge couldn't work. He said it couldn't work. He said it wasn't working and to this day he has yet to acknowledge that the surge was working."

McCain also called on Obama to thank Gen. David Petraeus for the military success during the last year and a half.

The ad's reference to Obama not holding hearings on Afghanistan refers to Obama's status as chairman of the Senate's subcommittee on European Affairs. The subcommittee's jurisdiction includes "all matters, policies and problems concerning the continent of Europe, including the European member states, of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization," NATO forces are fighting in Afghanistan.



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# U.S. claims an assist with alleged drug-smuggling submarine

MEXICO CITY — U.S. Homeland Security Secretary Michael Chertoff said Friday that U.S. intelligence helped Mexico capture a cocaine-laden smuggling submarine this week.

As the Mexican navy finished hauling the 33-foot vessel to shore, Chertoff disclosed that the U.S. government had shared information with Mexican authorities before Wednesday's successful operation.

"We shared information with the Mexican navy, but the Mexican navy acted alone in actually executing the seizures: their marines, their helicopters, their naval vessels," Chertoff told reporters here after meetings with Mexican officials on security issues.

He did not specify what type

of information U.S. officials had passed along before Mexican commandos seized the vessel and its four-member Colombian crew.

While the homemade vessels are being used increasingly by Colombian drug suppliers as a way to evade radar detection, it was the first time one was captured off the coast of Mexico.

Mexican military officials said after getting the seized vessel to shore Friday that it contained about six tons of cocaine.

Mexican commandos, lowered by rope from a helicopter, captured the submersible craft and arrested its crew in the Pacific Ocean 125 miles from the southern state of Oaxaca.

The military had said it moved after receiving intelligence from domestic and international agencies but did not elaborate.

Chertoff's remarks were the first confirmation of a U.S. role in the operation, which he called an example of cooperation between the two nations in crime-fighting. He said the subs represent a growing threat in the effort by drug gangs to smuggle cocaine to the United States.

The four men arrested claimed that they are fishermen and were forced into making the journey by captors who threatened them and family members with death.

The suspects said they set sail from the Colombian port city of Buenaventura a week earlier without knowing what the payload was or where the submarine was heading.

U.S. anti-drug officials said about 40 of the homemade vessels have been spotted since 2007, but few have been seized because their crews often sink them to avoid capture.

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# Farmers Market would be perfect fit for downtown

It seems like a perfect move for the 17-year-old market, which has been doing business in a field across North College Road from the College of Southern Idaho campus. Antennites — and sometimes, shade — are in short supply at its present site. Downtown could offer several better venues that could attract other vendors. Perhaps the Saturday event could even be paired with the downtown summer free concert series.

For downtown, hosting the Farmers Market would draw exactly the kind of traffic that retailers have been seeking for years. We hope the merchants and the

city can reach an arrangement. **CHEERS:** To the Idaho State Department of Agriculture, for issuing a report on the state's dairy ammonia monitoring program that doesn't accurately summarize its performance.

The program applies to dairy farms that emit more than 100 tons of ammonia each year. ISDA and the Department of Environmental Quality share the work — the former handling enforcement actions and technical training, the latter adding ammonia issues into its regular inspections.

As part of the 2006 agreement defining the process, ISDA provides an annual report to DEQ with such items as the number of dairies inspected, violations discovered, corrective actions taken and other activities.



The information for the report was compiled by computer, effective until the employee in charge of wrapping up and operating the program quit. So the narrative was slapped together at the last minute by an ISDA administrator.

It shouldn't have been issued at all; ISDA should have asked for more time. The report details weaknesses of the current inspection system. Inspections across the state are not

uniform, and different inspectors give differing credit for some practices.

The flawed product simply gives ammunition to dairy critics, who don't think the ISDA or DEQ is tough enough on confined-animal feeding operations.

In fact, both agencies deserve credit for implementing the first program of its kind in the nation. It's important for DEQ — and the taxpayers — to know how it's really working.

**CHEERS:** To Twin Falls County, which is planning a series of projects over the next two years to patch up, repair and otherwise return the Courthouse to mint condition in time for the building's centennial in 2011.

Contractors have already touched up the architectural designs on the roof. During the past month, they've worked to restore the north-west and southeast entrances to the building. Besides painting, the next two years could see improvements to windows, woodwork and the parking lot.

Begin in 1907, the Courthouse is an architectural jewel that reflects the character of the times and the folks who pioneered the Twin Falls Trust. The first light fixtures are still in place, and most of the staircases and wood accents are the original solid oak.

Exact techniques used to build the facility, including the hand-plastering, have been lost to time, according to Michael Miller, who's maintained it for the past 27 years.

Good for the county commissioners for making an investment to spruce up the great gray lady.

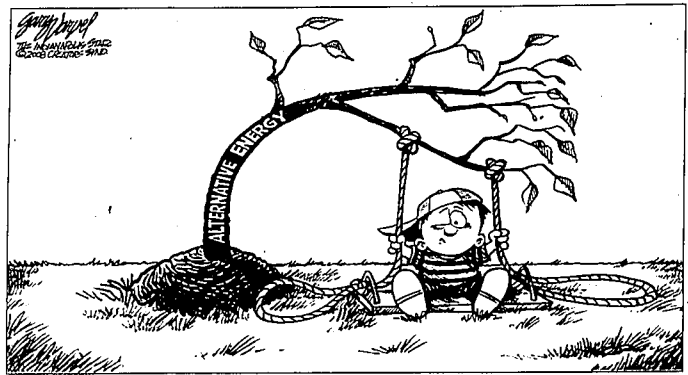
### Theodore Roosevelt had the right idea about immigration

In 1919, he wrote the following letter to the president of the American Defense Society:

But this is predicated upon the man's becoming in very fact an American, and nothing but an American... there can be no divided allegiance here. We have room for but one flag, the American flag, and this excludes the red flag, which symbolizes all wars against liberty and civilization, just as much as it excludes any foreign flag of a nation to which we are hostile... We have room for but one language here, and that is the English language... and we have room for but one sole loyalty and that is a loyalty to the American people."

In 1919, he also wrote a letter to the Kansas City Star stating "English should be the only language taught or used in the public schools."

## A Texas billionaire's windy big idea

The Pickens plan isn't the boon for energy independence that it purports to be.

Dallas billionaire investor and oilman-turned-wind-candidate Boone Pickens recently unveiled an audacious plan that he hopes will prod policymakers into a more realistic discussion of energy issues.

It calls for, among other things, spending \$1 trillion to build wind farms from the Texas Panhandle to the Canadian border that he says would meet 20 percent of the nation's electricity needs.

With the generation from those turbine fields, we could shift natural gas that's used for generating electricity to powering cars and trucks. That would reduce our oil imports by 38 percent, Pickens claims.

The plan is riddled with potential pitfalls, but fed by a \$50 million media campaign, that may not matter. At a time when presidential candidates and lawmakers eschew meaningful discussion of our mounting energy problems, Pickens' plan is stirring it up.

His Web site, www.pickensplan.com, has generated "phenomenal" traffic and already inspired at least one supporter-led meeting at an Applebee's in Georgia that attracted dozens of people, said spokesman Jay Tosser.

"My point is, I haven't seen a plan in 40-plus years that's going to solve the problem I'm talking about,"

Pickens told me.

The proposal is typical Pickens, who's known for bold predictions and grandiose promises. His plan for a billion-dollar water pipeline from the Texas Panhandle early in the decade still doesn't have any takers.

With prices soaring and America importing 70 percent of its oil, something has to be done, he argued. "Oil now is going to look cheap in a few years," he said. "We need to get ahead of the situation ourselves." It's hard to grasp, though, how parts of the plan would be implemented. Assuming all the rights to millions of acres could be acquired and the wind farms built, there's still the problem of wind itself. It doesn't always blow.

A recent study by Cambridge Energy Research Associates found that wind power is least available between June and September, the peak months for electricity consumption.

When the turbines are becalmed, we'll need other power plants — primarily gas-fired ones, which can be started more quickly than other types of generation — to meet demand.

What's more, someone has to pay for building transmission lines to carry the power from the prairies.

Guess who? In Texas, the cost of new transmission lines is born by consumers, not the generators. Pickens argued that wind technology will improve as more farms are built, and as commodity prices rise, it will become a cost-effective power source.

"As it moves in, the natural gas will move out," he said. "The price of natural gas will still be better for vehicles and still be cheaper than foreign oil."

Pickens has championed natural gas vehicles since he converted his Cadillac and drove around Dallas in the early 1990s, but it's unlikely average drivers would do the same. Tens of thousands of service stations would have to spend millions to install new pumps and storage facilities.

Why don't we just switch to plug-in hybrids, which automakers say they already have in development? We already have the infrastructure we need in our well sockets.

Then the natural gas generation already in place could still be used and we'd decrease our foreign oil dependency at the same time. Wind could still be used to augment generation as it becomes more viable.

Pickens is quick to acknowledge that his plan isn't the only solution.

"If there's a better one, get it out there and let's talk about it," he said.

His plan follows his own businesses.

His Mesa Power is pouring about \$12 billion into what would be the world's largest wind farm near Pampa, Texas. He's on the board of the country's biggest provider of natural gas for vehicles, and his hedge fund company, BP Capital, with some \$4 billion under management, has bet heavily on natural gas producers.

Depending on your view, that either makes his plan self-serving or shows he's willing to put his money where his mouth is.

I don't begrudge Pickens his profits.

He's a successful businessman, and if he gets richer from solving America's energy problems, so be it.

He wanted to get the country talking, and in that, he's succeeded. His plan favors alternative fuels that would be better for the environment and lessen our dependency on foreign oil.

As such, it's a good starting point for discussion and broadening the public understanding of the problems — even if it doesn't work.

# Ledger's compelling Joker thrills, saddens fans at new film's debut

NEW YORK — As Chris Pinegan watched Heath Ledger's stunning portrayal of the Joker on Friday in "The Dark Knight," he couldn't help but think of another actor who wasn't on the screen: James Dean, who also died prematurely and tragically, near his 33rd birthday.

"Heath Ledger is going to have the same impact on our culture as James Dean did," said Pinegan, one of many fans across the country who were both awed and saddened by Ledger's performance. "He went out with a hell of a bang," said Pinegan's son, Eric, 18, who wore a T-shirt emblazoned with Ledger's leering Joker face in cracked white makeup and those red lips frozen in a sickening smile. "He stole the show. It was everything I expected and more."

at the AMC Lincoln Square multiplex on Friday morning, and lines lengthened all day. Many fans were back after tiring and falling — like the Finigans — to get into packed midnight performances.

Media By Numbers, a tracking firm, said the Warner Bros. film, directed by Christopher Nolan, set a box office record for a midnight debut, bringing

in \$18.5 million Friday from midnight screenings in 3,040 theaters — many of them open 24 hours. "He was unbelievable," said Michael Lotzon, a 23-year-old asset manager in Manhattan. "I had no idea he'd be 'That Good.'" His and his colleague, Michael Holmgren, played hooky from work to see the film. They didn't get in trouble, though — "your boss came, too."

"I was the ringleader," confessed John Pileggi, a big comic book and action-film fan. "It was intense, overwhelming," he said of Ledger's performance. "It's sad to say that it was the role of his life, because his life is over. He was so young. I have a son about his age, so I kept thinking about it."

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# A 540-calorie Big Mac? Chains post calorie info on menus in New York City

NEW YORK — Customers at big fast-food chains in New York City are finally facing the facts about their meal choices. And for some, the truth may be hard to swallow — like a 1,130-calorie Big Mac, medium fries and a medium soda.

After months of resistance, the city's chain restaurants have begun obeying a first-of-its-kind rule requiring them to post calorie counts right on the menu.

McDonald's and Burger King were among the chains that unveiled new menu boards Friday at scores of locations throughout the city, taking calorie information that had long been available on Web sites and transferring and putting it front-and-center above the cash register.

The new rules are part of an anti-obesity campaign that has also included a recent citywide ban on artificial trans fats in restaurant food. The regulation was first passed in 2006 but was redrafted after a court battle

struck down the original version.

The calorie posting rule took effect in May, but legal action delayed enforcement until now. Starting today, chains big enough to fall under the rule will face

penalties of up to \$2,000 per store for not disclosing calorie information in a prominent spot on their menus, preferably next to the price.

On Friday, the numbers at some restaurants could be hard to read, and many places only offered calorie counts for a few top-selling items. A few chains still appeared to be ignoring the rule, perhaps holding out hope that a court would block the plan, the first of its kind in any U.S. city. An industry lawsuit is pending.

Cathy Nonas, director of the health department's physical activity and nutrition program, said some delayed posting the data because they were afraid customers might change their eating habits.

"We want to help people make an informed decision at the time of purchasing," she said. "Obviously, we have an epidemic of obesity across the nation, and New York City is no different."

Other chains, including Starbucks, Dunkin' Donuts and Wendy's have been phasing in calorie information.

store by store. For several months — surprising some patrons — who never realized that a single jelly doughnut has 270 calories, or that a grande mint mocha chip frappuccino with whipped cream packs a bigger calorie punch than a double cheeseburger.

Dietary guidelines for adults recommend about 2,000 calories a day, depending on age, gender and activity.

Still, some customers grabbing burgers, fries and shakes this week seemed not to notice the new columns of calorie counts.

Audrey and Kevin Carroll, visiting from Toronto, didn't see that the box of treats they grabbed for the kids at a restaurant on the way out of town contained a whopping 850 calories per burrito.

"That's why they call it fast food," said their traveling companion, Cynthia Kaufman, of New York's Long Island. "It's New York. If it's loud, and noisy, and you're in a hurry, and the kids are crying, who is going to stop and read the calories?"

# Tomato scare ending; fears linger for many people

WASHINGTON — The tomato scare may be over, but it has taken a toll on the industry: an estimated \$100 million and left millions of people with a new wariness about the safety of everyday foods.

An Associated Press-Ipsos poll finds that nearly half of consumers have changed their eating and buying habits in the past six months because they're afraid they could get sick by eating contaminated food.

They also overwhelmingly support setting up a better system to trace products in an outbreak back to the source, the poll found.

The people who feel that way include the growers.

Virginia's East Coast Tomato, one of the largest tomato growers in the country, has been hammered by slumping demand and falling prices, although Virginia tomatoes were cleared early on, said sales manager Baista Madonia III. He said he's frustrated by the government's inability to find the root cause of the outbreak, despite a nearly two-month long investigation.

The salmonella outbreak has sickened more than 1,200 people in 42 states since the first case was reported in June. "I guarantee in that time

frame, more than 1,000 people were injured slipping on a banana peel," said Madonia.

Although federal officials lifted the tomato warning Thursday, the cause of the outbreak remains unknown. Hot peppers are under suspicion, and tomatoes have not been cleared everywhere.

While the poll found that three in four people remain confident about the overall safety of food, 46 percent said they were worried they might get sick from eating contaminated products. The same percentage said that because of safety warnings, they have avoided items they normally would have purchased.

Christy Taylor, a first-grade teacher from Sacramento, Calif., said she has all but given up on supermarket produce and is buying most of her fresh fruits and vegetables from one of the local farmers' market instead.

"I see the same farmers every single week," said Taylor, 30, the mother of 2-year-old twin girls. "You meet the people and you see where the (produce) is coming from."

Her twins love tomatoes, she said, and chop on them as if they were apples. But until the mystery of the tainted food is solved, "I feel a little bit more comfortable, a little more safe, doing the local farmers' market," she said. Eighty-six percent in the

poll said produce should be labeled so it can be tracked through layers of processors, packers and shippers, all the way back to the farm. The lack of such a system frustrated disease detectives working on

the salmonella outbreak. However, the industry is divided over mandatory tracing technology, and Congress is running out of time to act on any major food safety changes before the election.

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# Nelson Mandela celebrates his 90th birthday with family

and danced in preparation for Mandela's lunch with 500 dignitaries Saturday.

He still found time to settle down to read a pile of newspapers, to keep up with local and international affairs.

Sounding vigorous, Mandela told a small group of reporters he was fortunate to have reached 90, crediting his "behavior" for his longevity.

But the man who has become a symbol of peace remains troubled by the demoralizing poverty still faced by so many of his countrymen.

"If you are poor, you are not likely to live long," he said.

His message was simple — the wealthy must do more. "There are many people in South Africa who are rich and who can share those riches with those not so fortunate, who have not been able to conquer poverty," Mandela said during the 10-minute interview, his first such exchange with journalists in years.

"He was asked if he wished he could have had more time with his family during a life spent fighting apartheid and then leading South Africa as its first black president.

"I am sure for many people that is their wish," Mandela said. "I also have that wish that I spent more

time (with my family). But I don't regret it."

His third wife, Graça Machel, who married 10 years ago on his birthday, said in a TV interview that he was a lonely man despite his busy schedule as a leader when she met him a few years after she divorced Winnie Madikizela-Mandela in 1996.

She told Al Jazeera television she helped him reconnect with his family. "If I could say in a very modest way, that's what I was able to give him back," Machel, a noted campaigner for children's rights, said in the interview broadcast Friday. "I'm happy that in his sunset years I was able to be there for him. And he is there for me."

Mandela was imprisoned for nearly three decades for his

fight against apartheid. He was released in 1990 to lead negotiations that ended decades of racist white rule, then was elected president in South Africa's first democratic elections in 1994.

He completed his term in 1999 and did not run again, but has continued to take a leading role in the fight against poverty, illiteracy and AIDS in Africa.

Tukwini Mandela, 33, one of Mandela's granddaughters, said Friday was "a special day because we are planning a huge party on Saturday and we are hoping he is going to enjoy it."

"We have invited his oldest friends who have meant something to him and have made a difference in his life," she said.

# Pope apologizes for Australian clergy sex abuse

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Pope Benedict XVI says he is deeply sorry for the pain and suffering caused to victims of clergy sex abuse.

The pope addressed a Mass Saturday attended by Australia's Roman Catholic bishops and seminarians, and said he wanted to acknowledge the "shame that we have all felt as result of the sexual abuse of minors by some clergy and religious" in Australia.

He said the deeds of clergy responsible for abuse were a grave betrayal of trust that had caused great pain, had damaged the Roman Catholic church, and deserved unreserved condemnation.

Support groups for victims of church abuse in Australia, whose numbers are not known but who activists say are in the thousands, have demanded the pope make a full and open apology for clergy abuse and do more to prevent future abuse.

Earlier Friday, the pope held a 40-minute exchange with Australian Jewish,

Muslim, Hindu and Buddhist leaders in Sydney.

The meeting was one element of a busy Friday schedule for the 61-year-old pontiff at World Youth Day, which organizers say has attracted more than 200,000 young Catholics to Australia's largest city. Two days into his four-day official program, the pope looked fit and energetic.

He told representatives of Islam and other faiths at the meeting that they must unite to combat religion's role in "sinister and indiscriminate" violence.

Without mentioning terrorism directly, the pontiff said there were those who were using religion "as a cause of division rather than a force for unity."

"In a world threatened by sinister and indiscriminate forms of violence, the unified voice of religious people urges nations and communities to resolve conflicts through peaceful means and with full regard for human dignity," Benedict told the leaders.

modeled after an existing program in Castleford. Without the support of the state agencies, he said, the alternative would be to place all \$500,000 in a trust fund for projects developed by the IIEE; teachers and others.

## Fairfield Pioneer Picnic marks 95th year today

"I'm hoping we can keep this going for at least five more years," Kandler said.

need to find a substitute parking area.

# Teenagers were screaming as bus overturned in Utah

PANGUITCH, Utah (AP) — The driver of a tour bus that crashed near Bryce Canyon National Park was cited for drifting out of his lane of traffic, the Utah Highway Patrol said Friday.

The bus went off the highway, flipped over and landed upside down in a creek bed Thursday. The driver and 54 passengers managed to get out before the bus went up in flames. None was seriously injured.

"We landed with our wheels pointed to the sky," Jared Litroff, 15, of Woodcliff Lake, N.J., told The Salt Lake Tribune. Brooke Garber, 16, of Miami, said the "slow-motion" rollover was terrifying. "Everyone just started kicking out windows," Garber said.

The tour bus was carrying 47 teenagers and seven adult

staffers on a six-week tour of the American West, said Jeff Gass, director of Rein Teen Tours of Wayne, N.J.

Gass said the teenagers — from Connecticut, Florida, New Jersey, New York, Philadelphia and other places on the East Coast — were to travel Friday to a hotel in Flagstaff, Ariz., aboard another bus.

"It's amazing — we were very lucky from a terribly unfortunate incident that everybody walked away with minor cuts and bruises. The trip remains intact, and we're working as well as we can to get back to normalcy," Gass told The Associated Press on Friday.

"Girls were screaming and crying," Derek Barocas, 16, of Long Island, N.Y., told The Salt Lake Tribune. "Others cried they were bleeding and that the bus was on fire."

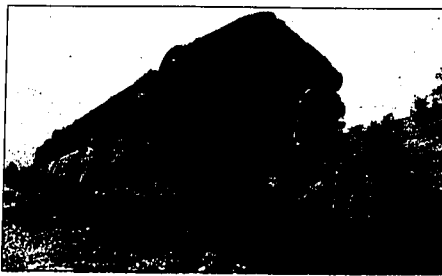
The occupants made it out of the bus and onto a hill just in time to watch flames fully engulf the bus, he said.

"You could just hear (the) pop, pop, pop" of exploding tires, said Joseph Larkin, 16, of Boca Raton, Fla.

The bus was operated by Arrow Stage Lines of Nebraska. Arrow was the owner of another tour bus that crashed near Mexican Hat, Utah, in January, killing nine Phoenix-area skiers returning from a trip to Telluride, Colo.

The company referred questions to a Lincoln, Neb., lawyer who was unavailable on Friday.

Utah Highway Patrol spokesman Cameron Roden said Arrow's driver was cited for drifting out of his lane before plunging into the dry creek bed. The driver's name wasn't immediately available.

## Choi to the world: K.J. atop British Open

### Norman, Duval near the top

**SOUTHPORT, England** — Tiger Woods on crutches was supposed to be a chance for someone else to seize the spotlight at the British Open. Greg Norman wasn't the guy anyone had in mind.

Nelher was David Duval. Indeed, Royal Birkdale proved to be fertile ground for fairy tales on Friday.

K.J. Choi rolled in a 25-foot birdie on the final hole for a 3-under 67 in more gloom

and wind along the Irish Sea, giving him his first lead in a major championship. It will be the second straight year he plays in the final group at the British Open going into the weekend.

But the biggest surprises were right behind him, starting with a pair of British Open champions who once were No. 1 in the world.

Norman barely touched a club in the month leading up to his 28th appearance in golf's oldest championship. The 53-year-old married ten-

nis great Chris Evert three weeks ago, and a trip to England counts as the tall end of his honeymoon.

He wound up renewing his love affair with links golf, delivering great escapes over his final three holes for an even-par 70 that put his name atop the leaderboard for most of the afternoon until Choi birdied the final two holes.

Choi was at 1-under 139, one shot ahead of Norman.

"My expectations were almost nil coming in, to tell you the truth," Norman said. "My expectations are still realistically low, and I have to

be that way. I can't sit here and say, 'OK, it's great. I'm playing well and I'm doing it.' I am playing well. I am doing it. But I still haven't been there for a long time."

His last victory was 10 years ago in Australia at the Greg Norman Holden International. He hasn't been this close to the lead at the halfway point of a major since he was leading the '96 Masters.

Duval knows that feeling. His last victory was the Dunlop Phoenix in Japan at the end of 2001, the year he

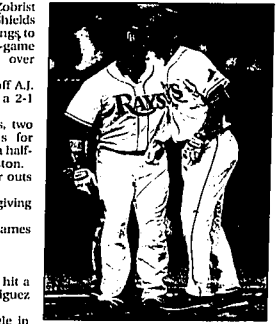

# Doping busts weight on rider's minds

NIMES, France (AP) — Mark Cavendish wants to talk about his latest stage victory — not doping. British cyclist David Millar pleads with fans: "Please, don't give up on us." This may not be easy. This, after all, is the Tour de France. Cavendish, a British sprint specialist on Team Columbia, captured the 13th stage Friday — the fourth stage he has won and second in a row. He prevailed over a 113-mile course on a hot and wind-swept day along the Mediterranean while Cadel Evans of Australia kept the yellow jersey. The drug use that is battering cycling's image yet again is starting to weigh on the riders' minds. But for Italy's Riccardo Ricco, who tested positive for the blood booster EPO, the consequences could be far more than psychological. French authorities filed preliminary charges against him Friday. He could face two years in prison if convicted on

After his release from police custody, Ricco made no clear statement. Instead, he defiantly said he wasn't surprised by the team's failure to finish in the lim. Ricco's teammate Leonardo Piepoli, who won the 10th stage, was also fired for "violation of the team's ethical code." A Saunier Duval spokesman declined to elaborate. # Duval finds happiness, may have found his game as well

SOUTHPORT, England (AP) — David Duval strolled up the final fairway on a cloudy day in dark sunglasses, waving to the cheering fans, back in a familiar place at the British Open.

OK, so it was only Friday. And most of the grandstand seats were empty. And this is Royal Birkdale, not Lytham.

But, for a guy who lost his way all those years — even while finding himself away from the golf course — it was like a homecoming.

"C'mon, David!" someone screamed.

This goes out to all those who wondered, "Hey, what-ever happened to David Duval?" Well, he's back — at least for a day — and in the unlikelyst of places, the leadership of golf's oldest major.

For a while, Duval made it feel like 2001 all over again by shooting a 1-under 69 that left him just three strokes behind leader K.J. Choi.

Not that Duval is ready to reminisce. He'll leave that to 53-year-old Greg Norman, just one shot off the lead and an equally compelling figure.

"Stepping back in time?" Duval repeated a reporter's question. "No, I'm looking to the future."

Good move. That has to be an improvement on what he's gone through the past six or seven years, though any discussion of Duval's descent comes with a very important caveat: He's never been more content.

Duval's teenage stepsons, Danno and Nick, were out on the course with the guy who treats them like his own. Wife Susie was back home in Colorado, caring for the rest of their expansive family; another child from her first marriage, plus the two young children she's had with David since they tied the knot.

It's sort of like the Duval

Bunch, except the husband came to the table alone, yearning for the comfort and validation of a family to call his own.

"I'm 100 percent happy," he said in the slowly dwindling light of a lengthy summer day. "I'm where I want to be and I'm doing what I want to do. The difficulty now lies in actually leaving and going and playing. You know, I've become a very good country club golfer. I enjoy carts and 2½-hour rounds and then going back home. It is some-

times quite hard getting on the road."

But don't mistake homesickness for a lack of resolve. Duval intends to get back where he was once: the world's No. 1 player, standing on the 18th green at Lytham with the claret jug in his grasp, champion of the 2001 British Open.

No one could have known, but that moment was his peak: his career was about to go over a cliff. In 2002, Duval slipped to 80th in the PGA rankings and his earnings

dipped by a staggering 70 percent. Over the next three years, he played in 49 official Tour events and made the cut in only eight. His paychecks for 2005 totaled all of \$7,630.

After showing signs of breaking out of his slump, Duval appeared to take a major step backward this year. He came into Birkdale having played in 11 events and surviving exactly one cut.

Now, make it two.

Duval will be playing on the weekend at the British Open. He'll be in the fifth group from the end, in the mix for a major title, something that would have sounded ludicrous to suggest just two days ago.

Well, ludicrous to everyone but Duval.

"I've been expecting to play quite well for some time," he said. "There's nothing that's made it click this week. What's made it click is what's been going on for the last year and a half and the work I've been putting in and the time I've been using to practice."

To someone who would listen, Duval kept insisting it was all coming together, the swing, the mental approach, everything he needed to get back to the top.

But it've been needed some results to justify his confidence. That was the one thing sorely lacking.

So maybe this is the start of what his coach, Puggy Blackmon, said is "going to be one of the greatest come-backs in history." Or maybe it's just another tantalizing glimpse of what might have been.

But make no mistake: Duval won't be fulfilled as just another guy on the Tour, someone who makes cuts and a comfortable living. He was to get back to where he was.

won his only major at Royal Lytham & St. Annes. What followed was a mysterious slump that included a half-dozen coaches, precious few rounds under par and an aloof player who found happiness in marriage and children.

For those waiting for another collapse, Duval never showed a hint of it.

He chipped in for birdie at No. 11, kept damage to only a bogey when he found a pot bunker off the tee on the 13th, and bounced back with another birdie on the par-3 14th.

"I've been working toward greatness, not just getting back to making cuts and managing to play halfway decent," said Duval, who had made only one cut in 11 starts this year before arriving at Royal Birkdale. "I've been trying to take his long route and the hard route and try to get back to greatness."

"That story is yet to be told as to whether I can get back to that point or not," he said. "But that's what I strive for."

This wonderful story unfolding at Birkdale still has a long way to go.

It starts with Choi, a 37-year-old from South Korea who didn't think much of golf until a high school teacher handed him an instructional book by Jack Nicklaus. A seven-time winner on the PGA Tour — the most of any Asian player — he overcame a bogey on the first hole to play flawlessly in a steady 20 mph wind and occasional squirts of rain.

"I think today was probably my best round I've ever played at the British Open," said Choi, who trailed Sergio Garcia by two shots going into the third round at Carnoustie last year before finishing in a tie for eighth. "Everything worked the way I wanted it to."

The last finish belonged to Camilo Villegas of Colombia, whose lone victory came last year in Japan.

A marketing dream, Villegas is known as "Spider-Man" for spraying his body

horizontally to read putts at surface level. He made everything over the final five holes — 11 birdies — for a tournament-best 65 that left him two shots behind.

"Let me tell you, when you get on the first tee, you never think about a score," said Villegas, who got into the British Open as an alternate when Kenny Perry decided not to come. "You just think about every single shot because you don't know how bad it can get, when the weather is going to get like it was yesterday morning. So you're just trying to grind every single shot. And that's what I did."

Villegas was at 141. Duval and a half-dozen others were at 2-over 142, which is where more fairy tales in the making reside.

Others at 142 included former U.S. Open champion Jim Furyk, Robert Alenby, Graeme McDowell and Alexander Noren.

Sergio Garcia, the pre-tournament favorite, has some work to do: He was moving into contention until hitting sideways on the 11th hole on his way to a double bogey, and he had to settle for a 73 that put him six shots behind.

Ernie Els was lucky to still be playing. He missed a 5-foot putt on the 17th to make bogey, and he finished it off with a 20-foot par putt from the fringe on the 18th.

Norman's most dramatic slide went even for birdie. With his feet planted on the edge of a pot bunker on the 16th, he leaned down and scooped out a shot to 6 feet to save his par. Then came a 12-foot putt on the 17th to make bogey, and he finished it off with a 20-foot par putt from the fringe on the 18th.

At a packed press conference, Norman was asked if he anticipated being in this position when he arrived at Royal Birkdale.

"Nope," he said, flashing those pearly whites. "I'm not going to say anymore."

# At Oaks Christian High, name players abound

## Sons of Joe Montana, Wayne Gretzky and Will Smith highlight team's roster

WESTLAKE VILLAGE, Calif. — It isn't every high school football team whose quarterback is the son of a Hall of Famer. What sets Oaks Christian apart is that, starting this fall, it will have two.

Nick Montana, meet Trevor Gretzky.

Nick, the son of NFL great Joe Montana, is transferring to the school in Westlake Village for his junior year and could eventually have competition for the quarterback spot from Trevor, a sophomore who is the son of hockey's Wayne Gretzky.

To say that Nick and Trevor are the sons of Hall of Famers is a little like saying that Trey Smith, a sophomore receiver on the Oaks team, is the son of an actor.

That's true as far as it goes. They are the son of Will Smith, one of the highest-grossing movie stars of his generation. When the elder Montana and Gretzky were playing, each was considered the dominant player of his era in his sport, and among the greatest ever.

All this is likely to make

Oaks Christian football games a leading stop on the paparazzi circuit.

It's Celebrity High," said Steve Clarkson, who provides private training for quarterbacks.

This is a L.A., where children of celebrities are hardly a rarity. Not long ago, Crespi Carmelite High School in Encino had an outfielder by the name of Nicolai Bonds, son of all-time home run king Barry Bonds. "He's identical to his dad," Clarkson said. "If you saw him play, you'd swear it's Joe."

Montana, quarterback last season for De La Salle's junior

varsity team, attended his first Oaks practice last week and left little doubt that he has the talent to be a major college recruit, with a strong arm and good mobility.

"It was good," Montana said of his first practice session. "I was getting used to the

offense, but I liked what I saw." He said his family decided to move to Southern California because his father has business interests in the area. It helped that Oaks Christian is the alma mater of Jimmy Clausen, a sophomore at Notre Dame who was considered the No. 1 high school quarterback in the U.S. in 2006.

As for the pressure of following a father who quarterbacked the San Francisco 49ers to four Super Bowl victories, Montana said, "I don't let it bother me that much."

Said Joe Montana: "He just needed an opportunity to be in an offense like this. It will be a test for him. He's excited."

Nick's teammates will include Smith, whose father is the star of "Hancock," and Gretzky, who can add stories about how many times his father has been asked for autographs at restaurants from starry-eyed hockey fans.

Offensive coordinator Mark Bates insists that coaching the sons of celebrities isn't going to be any different from working with other players.

"I'm not coaching the dads," he said. "I'm coaching the kids, and they're good kids. I think it's a bigger deal for people who aren't at the school. After a day or two, they're regular kids."

Except to the paparazzi.

# Ragan's sophomore success shouldn't be a surprise to anyone

## Developers hit the Jackpot Triad granted rezone approvals for Spanish Bit Resort and Casino

ELKO — After months of legal wrangling and delays, the developer of the proposed Spanish Bit Resort and Casino in Jackpot got the zone change it wanted.

The developer, Triad Resorts LLC, owns 113 acres south of the developed portion of Jackpot off U.S. 93. It was zoned up from Commercial 2 to

Commercial 3, which will accommodate a larger development exceeding 50 feet or four stories.

Moreover, the planning commission approved zone changes for neighboring properties, which, according to Triad principal Jerry Ward, his company has options on.

The first property, a 52-acre parcel owned by the East Pac Four Corporation, was rezoned from Open Space to Commercial 3.

Ward said Triad is looking at putting a 600-room hotel on this property. The other, currently owned by Humboldt West Inc., was rezoned from Commercial 2 to Residential 2.

Ward said Triad is looking at putting in 317 apartments, a grocery store and office space on the property.

Triad last requested the zone changes in September, but was put on hold after the owner of Barton's Club 93 raised concerns procedures were

violated in the past zone changes for the Spanish Bit property.

Club 93 later filed a lawsuit in Elko District Court, which District Judge Andrew Puccinelli recently dismissed. (See related story on page A3)

In a staff report, Elko County said the proposed resort and casino would increase employment opportunities in Jackpot, increase the local and

## Investigators find abuse in government contract program

WASHINGTON — Companies collected millions of dollars in government contracts by claiming to have main offices in poor neighborhoods that were actually empty duplexes, part-time offices and other ineligible locations, congressional investigators charge.

Billions more remain at risk because the Small Business Administration doesn't usually check paperwork, rarely conducts audits and is slow to kick out firms that are no longer eligible for the \$8 billion in special contract set-asides for small businesses, the Government Accountability Office said.

A pair of GAO reports, obtained Wednesday by The Associated Press, examined SBAs' historically Underutilized Business Zone, or HUBZone, program, which was created in 1997 to help thousands of small firms in distressed areas.

To be eligible, companies fill out applications affirming that their principal office — where the greatest number of employees work — is in a designated HUBZone and that at least 35 percent of the firm's full-time employees live in that area.

The GAO's review of 125 applications submitted in September 2007 found the SBA asked for supporting evidence of a firm's eligibility claims only one-third of the time; the agency conducted a site visit only once to verify whether an office actually existed.

In all, the SBA conducted audits on 5 percent of the total 13,000 HUBZone firms from 2004-2007; when it did conduct an audit, more than half of the firms on average were deemed ineligible.

In the Washington, D.C., area, the GAO found 10 out of 17 certified HUBZone firms it investigated failed to maintain minimum employee requirements or falsely claimed principal locations in places such as a dentist's office. Those firms, providing

## Consumers make changes

### But will they last?

NEW YORK — Adrienne Radtke plans to keep riding her bike to work even if gas prices drop. Steve Pizzini got rid of his Cadillac Escalade in favor of a 16-year-old Acura and doesn't expect to have another gas-guzzler.

"I had a paradigm shift," said Pizzini, a financial analyst. "I spent the money on a nice car. But to me, it's not worth it. I don't think I will go that route again."

Every economic downturn changes shoppers in some way. But this time, experts say the new behavior — fueled by higher gas and food prices, tightening credit and a slumping housing market — are the most dramatic and widespread that they have seen since the mid-1970s.

So retailers, marketers and investors are all trying to figure out which habits shoppers will keep and which will they drop when the economy reverts. Will the people who switched to store-brand ice cream go back to Breyers or Edy's? Will shoppers return to department stores or keep looking for labels at T.J. Maxx?

"We are looking at stuff that reminds me of the 1970s," said Patricia Edwards of investment manager Wentworth Hauser and Vlodich. "Americans have seen a huge amount of their balance sheet evaporate. The effects will be more lingering."

Wendy Liebmann, presi-

dent of WSL Strategic Retail, says people's new spending patterns are forcing companies to change the kinds of products they sell and tweak their marketing to appeal to cost-conscious shoppers. She points to the last big recession of the early 1990s that helped trigger a fundamental shift in retailing as affluent shoppers started buying at discounters as well as upscale stores.

Radtke, 31, who holds down two jobs — at a veterinarian's office and at a flower shop — recently picked up shoe glue to fix the soles of her worn sneakers. She's buying store-label soups and crackers and

bought a bike for her roommate after not having ridden one for five years.

"We weren't big spenders, but now we are watching our money more," said Radtke, of Mantowoc, Wis., whose husband works in construction. "Even if I fell into a pile of money, I still wouldn't be spending a lot."

According to a survey released Thursday by market research company Nielsen Co., which tracks consumer habits, about two-thirds, or 63 percent, of consumers are cutting spending due to rising gas prices, up 16 percentage points from a year ago.

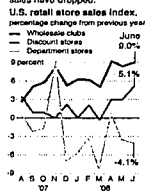
According to the study, which queried nearly 50,000 consumers by e-mail during the first week of June, 78 percent of them are combining shopping trips and 52 percent are eating out less often. Consumers are also cutting more coupons, doing more of their shopping at supercenters and buying less expensive brands, the survey found.

A rebounding economy may let some consumers revert to their old ways — like people who switched to smaller cars when times were

### Former critic Adelstein to support Sirius, XM merger

WASHINGTON — During his tenure at the Federal Communications Commission, Jonathan Adelstein has been a fierce critic of government policies that allow big media companies to get bigger.

So it came as a surprise when the Democratic commissioner put forth a proposal that would allow the nation's only two satellite radio companies to merge.

Adelstein, the potential

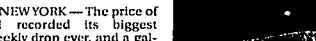

Oil falls again: Is bubble bursting?

NEW YORK — The price of oil recorded its biggest weekly drop ever, and a gallon of gas finally pulled back from its record high.

Experts won't go that far just yet. It's too early to say we've seen the worst of it," said Tom Kloza, publisher and chief oil analyst of the Oil Price Information Service in Wall, N.J.

Still, with oil recording yet another drop on Friday, some industry experts who just days ago thought there was more juice left in oil's meteoric run are reconsidering.

The average price of a gallon of regular gas fell about a penny for the day to \$4.105, according to auto club AAA.

Some analysts said a nationwide average of \$4 or even lower could be in the offing — almost unthinkable in a summer when there has seemed to be no relief at the pump — although they cautioned that there is no guarantee prices will stay low.

"We're going to see some relief from that relentless march higher," Kloza said. Gas may be getting just a bit cheaper, but major changes in how Americans live and drive are already in motion.

Car buyers have been fleeing to more fuel-efficient models. U.S. sales of pickups and sport utility vehicles are down nearly 18 percent this year through June, while sales of small cars are up more than 10 percent.

While slashing production of more-profitable trucks and SUVs, automakers have been scrambling to build their most fuel-efficient models faster.

Toyota Motor Corp., which hasn't been able to keep up with demand for its 46-mile-per-gallon Prius hybrid, said last week it will start producing the Prius in the U.S. and suspend truck and SUV production to meet consumer demand.

Idaho residents sue Tyson over antibiotics found in chicken

BOISE — Two Idaho residents have asked a federal judge to certify a class-action lawsuit against Tyson Foods, alleging the poultry powerhouse falsely advertised its chicken as antibiotic-free despite the use of antibiotics.

chicken feed — ionophores, which are widely considered to be an antibiotic, though they are not used to treat illnesses in humans — and reversed its decision after Tyson had spent money on advertising and packaging. Tyson was later allowed to say its products are "raised without antibiotics that impact antibiotic resistance in humans."

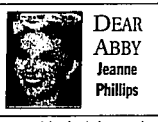
In the lawsuit, Richard and Jane Johnson of Welter contend that Tyson Foods ran a deceptive marketing scheme when it labeled its chicken as being antibiotic-free despite injecting the eggs with antibiotics just days before they hatched.

Last year, the U.S. Department of Agriculture said Tyson, based in Springdale, Ark., could label its foods as "raised without antibiotics." The USDA later said it had overlooked an ingredient used in the

But last month, the USDA announced that Tyson Foods Inc. also routinely gave chickens an antibiotic that can be used in humans — gentamicin, which is used in humans to cure cases of the plague. Tyson responded that its label was still correct, because the gentamicin was given as an infection while the chick was still in the egg, not after it hatched. The USDA ordered the company to stop using the labels.

## The temple's art and architecture

From the ground up, the Twin Falls temple of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints was designed to elevate the mind and inspire the spirit.

The site itself, according to the architects, is higher than the surrounding land, which creates a rising sensation among those who near the structure, and the clean lines of the exterior draw the eye upward to the gold-plated statue of the Angel Moroni.

"There's a simple elegance and clarity to the site," said Kyle Taft, principal with MHTN Architects in Salt Lake City, the firm that designed the temple. "The spire is certainly an inspiring part of the temple, and again, elevates one's thoughts."

On the grounds, native Idaho materials are used, including the rock that forms flowerbeds, but the temple itself is made of mostly imported materials. The granite floors, for example, are from India, and the unique wood on the first floor is from Africa. The temple exterior is poured concrete, with bits of quartz aggregate that sparkle in the sun.

The exterior lighting is placed so that the night lighting is focused on the temple rather than washing out the sky so close to the observatory at the College of Southern Idaho, Taft said.

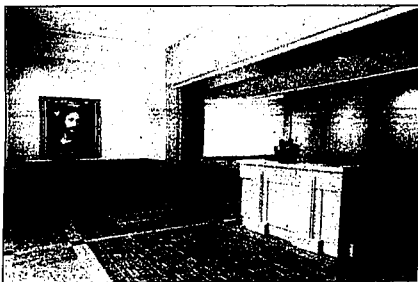
LDS temples throughout the world vary — designed to accommodate both the area and the specific functions the temple will serve. Taft noted that many temples are a single story, but so many rooms were required within the Twin Falls temple that it was built as two stories.

"This temple had many iterations, there were many studies and designs... it was important to get the proportions correct," he said. "It was important to make the temple as efficient as possible, so that was a challenge."

Inside, the theme of elevation continues with design elements — like the thin vertical insets in the endowment room's woodwork — and with color. The lower floors are a darker wood, Taft said, and the interior becomes lighter as people pass upstairs and through the central rooms to the Celestial Room.

"The brightness increases as you go through," Taft said. He noted that the endowment room clerestory windows were originally intended to filter natural light, but architectural requirements for passage of electrical and mechanical systems necessitated that artificial light be used behind that stained glass.

Other details to notice as you pass through the temple: There are no evident attachments on the woodwork, and the structure was designed with restrained embellish-

ment. "When you do a building with the finest quality woodwork, you do not want to see nail holes in it," Taft said, noting that much of the woodwork is either glued, attached with a Velcro-like material, or connected using blind attachments. "Even inside, within the temple, the lines, the millwork, have simple patterns. ... Even though things are simple, they are elegant."

**Faith and nature**

Throughout the temple, artwork is displayed on the walls — and in one case, it is the wall.

Though prints from many religious artists and originals from many Idaho painters are featured, the two artists that most visitors will notice first or remember longest are Minerva Teichert and Leon Parson.

Parson created the mural that covers three walls of the ordinance

Parson, a professor of art at Brigham Young University-Idaho, began researching the work in May 2006, and proposed it in January 2007. After five rounds of committee reviews, his design was approved by the church president and he began painting in May of that year, finishing in January 2008.

"I tried to incorporate as much of the major geographic images that are contained in the 'Twin Falls Temple District' so that from 'east to west' everyone felt represented and included," Parson wrote in an e-mail to the Times-News. "They are also appropriate because, as we believe, they were created by God

the Father through His Son Jesus Christ. In addition to that they are very beautiful and created for our enjoyment here on earth; including sabbath."

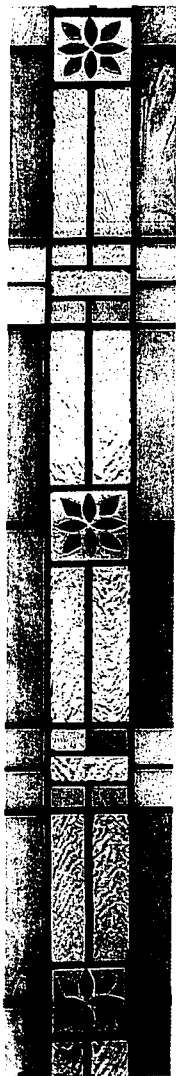
Teichert, who died in 1976, created some of the best-known Mormon artwork. Many prints of her work hang in the Twin Falls temple, along with one original that was completed under her maiden name and hung in the Burley Stake Center until the church realized it was an original Teichert. It now hangs in the temple's central passage, not far from the baptistery.

Teichert's granddaughter, a curator at Brigham Young University Museum of Art, said she believes the Twin Falls temple painting — which she has not seen — was done between 1915 and 1917, after Teichert began attending art school in New York City but before her marriage.

"My personal belief is that she really started getting her true religious convictions in New York," said Marian Wardle. It was after New York that Teichert began painting religious scenes with fervor.

One of Teichert's most famous paintings is "Rescue of the Lost Lamb," which, like the painting in the Twin Falls temple, depicts Jesus carrying a lamb while other lambs follow him. In this painting, Jesus carries a black lamb, while white

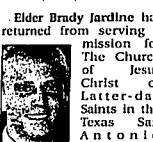

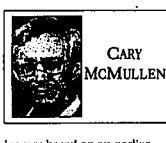

'Gabriel's Revelation' unlikely to shake the faithful

The New Testament records that when Jesus decides to go to Jerusalem at that fateful last Passover, he warns his followers what awaits him: death, and then three days later, his resurrection.



long-established matters of faith, no historical discovery is likely to shake the convictions of the faithful. I'm sure Professor Knobl is a fine scholar, but if he thinks "Gabriel's Revelation" will have a major impact on the way Christians read Jesus' words, he has spent too much time in the library.

Christians have always believed this warning was the result of divine inspiration or foreknowledge. But a new archaeological discovery raises a question: Was it instead borrowed from an expectation already floating in the air of the hills of first-century Judea? The discovery is described in a fascinating article in Sunday's New York Times. It is a stone on which is written in ink an apocalyptic text, containing prophecies or revelations purported to be from the angel Gabriel. Scholars have called it a Dead Sea scroll written on a stone rather than parchment and dubbed it "Gabriel's Revelation."

"Some Christians will find it shocking — a challenge to the uniqueness of their theology — while others will be comforted by the idea of being a traditional part of Judaism," Daniel Boyarin, professor of Judaic culture at the University of California at Berkeley, told the Times. The stone tablet, which is considered authentic, was purchased about 10 years ago by David Jesselshon, an antiquities dealer. Only last year when a paper was written about it by Israeli scholar John Sautend did it draw attention.

According to the Times, the stone dates within a few decades before the birth of Jesus. Some key words and lines are barely or partly illegible, so the meaning is sure to be disputed for years to come. But one scholar, Israel Knobl, professor of Bible studies at Hebrew University in Jerusalem, has concluded that the stone refers to a Jewish rebel leader named Simon, who was killed by the army of King Herod.

lowers based on an earlier messiah story." Well, maybe. There is not a more contentious subject than Jewish messianic expectations in the late first century B.C. The reason, because much of the literature of the period is symbolic and therefore notoriously difficult to interpret. For example, does the messianic figure in such-and-such a text refer to a specific leader, or to a messiah yet to appear?

Once during the annual conference of the Society of Biblical Literature, the biggest and most prestigious American organization of scholars devoted to studying the Bible, I attended a panel discussion about apocalyptic literature. A good bit of time was consumed debating whether the phrase "son of man" — which Jesus seems to refer to himself — was considered a code for the messiah or not. There were references to the Book of Ezekiel, to its usage in the Bar Kokhba rebellion of 132 A.D., etc. You get the idea. Knobl is correct that some Christian scholars will feel threatened by his interpretation of "Gabriel's Revelation." They will be anxious to protect the unique role that Jesus claims for himself in the New Testament, the long-awaited messiah, only a messiah who fulfilled his role through divinely ordained death and resurrection.

But fears of a revolution in Christian doctrine are greatly exaggerated. First, if anything, the discovery could bring Jewish thinking about suffering, death and resurrection of the messiah closer to traditional Christian views. And during my days poring over biblical scholarship, I learned a couple of things. One is that historical records and reconstructions are rarely, if ever, definitive. There is almost never a smoking gun that proves or disproves a theory. Second, when it comes to

# McCain hasn't ignited the passions of evangelicals

SIoux CENTER, Iowa — Stirring her morning coffee, lifelong Republican Grace Drögg voiced her doubts — and those of many evangelical voters — about what she isn't hearing from John McCain in this year's presidential election.

"I look for something about his faith," she said. "It's very important, it's what our nation was founded on."

Her pal Joan Irens nodded; she, too, wants McCain to talk about his religious beliefs. "I wish he would so we would know how he stands on his religious views and where his faith lies," she said.

In this part of the country — halfway between Sioux City, Iowa, and Sioux Falls, S.D. — separating religion from politics is folly. Religious conservatives here were energized by President Bush's public declaration of faith and handed him a landslide in 2004. With growing sway in the state, they recently captured a prominent party leadership post.

"When they get on fire, it's Katie bar the door," said Rock Rapids businessman George Scheffler, who worries that McCain isn't generating that excitement.

"It's just kind of a tepid response," he said. "McCain really hasn't convinced them he has the same fervor about the appointment of judges, about the right to life."

In the ongoing AP-Yahoo News Poll, only 19 percent of white evangelical Christians say they are excited by this election, compared with 20 percent of Americans overall. A third of these evangelicals said they were interested in the election, but half said they were frustrated by it.

Nevertheless, they support McCain over Obama by 62 percent to 18 percent. Although the AP-Yahoo News Poll is of all adults, not the smaller, more energized group of likely voters, McCain figures big behind Bush's showing among white evangelical Christian voters in the 2004 election, when exit polls indicated 78 percent supported him.

In some parts of Iowa, overall turnout in 2004 was 20 percentage points higher than 2000, virtually all of it an energized Bush vote.

A prosperous hamlet of 6,200, Sioux Center is home to 17 churches, 13 of them with the word "Reformed" in their name, a sign of a strong evangelical presence. In 2004, 16,000 people in the county voted, 14,000 of them for Bush.

Carl Zylstra is president of Dorot College in Sioux Center, a small private school that bills itself as "what quality Christian higher education is all about." Also the host of a weekly radio talk show about politics and events, he said Zylstra, "They might not agree with all his policies, but they trusted him that when the chips were down, he would do the right thing. McCain is not a man who inches, he's the same passion."

Dave Mulder, a retired teacher from Northwestern College in nearby Orange

City, another private Christian college, also knows something about local politics and spent a stint in the state Legislature.

"I think people here genuinely believe that George Bush and his Christian faith was very sincere," said Mulder. "People have said that when they talked to him, he took time to let them know how much that Christian belief meant to McCain. I just don't think there's that same enthusiasm."

McCain has trouble to do among religious conservatives, says Don Kase, a Republican activist in nearby Plymouth County.

"He needs to work quite a bit harder than he has to get those folks," said Kase. "I'm one of them. He needs to give them something that motivates them to get to the polls."

Religious conservatives are an important constituency in this swing state that voted for Bush by 12,000 votes in 2004 and is now a force in state Republican politics. Republicans recently ousted Steve Roberts, a 20-year member of the Republican National Committee, and replaced him with Steve Scheffler, head of the Iowa Christian Alliance.

The other RNC seat went to Kim Leelan, head of the Iowa Right to Life Committee, and both campaigned on forcing the party to showcase its hard-line opposition to abortion and replaced McCain with Steve Scheffler, head of the Iowa Christian Alliance.

"It's not where it should be, but there's potential there," said Scheffler. "I've encouraged the McCain campaign. I've told them several times that I would be more than willing to put together a small group of people the campaign needs to have a dialogue with."

The balancing act McCain must walk nationally is firming up his conservative base while reaching out to independents. Scheffler warned the equation is different in Iowa, and throughout the Midwest.

"To succeed in Iowa, it's because you have a big turnout of self-identified evangelicals," said Scheffler. "I don't see that scenario changing."

Randy Feenstra, another Plymouth County activist, doesn't see these voters turning to Democrat Barack Obama, but he worries that they "just won't vote."

Top Republicans acknowledge the problem and vow to ease concerns. On a recent visit to Iowa, Republican National Chairman Mike Duncan delivered a pep talk about McCain. "For a public figure, he's a very private person," Duncan said, but he promised the campaign would offer a clearer view of McCain as a person "as we move through this fall."

But some religious conservatives wonder if McCain even has the potential to stir their passion. "Some said he was the safe alternative," Zylstra, the college president, said. "He just doesn't ignite the fire."

Sharing regular morning coffee here with Drögg and Rens, Jake Kieft, who backed Bush with enthusiasm, shrugged his shoulders over the campaign. "I'm hanging on the fence. I really am," Kieft said.

# Maker of Mormon missionary calendar excommunicated

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The creator of a calendar that featured shirtless Mormon missionaries was excommunicated Sunday after a disciplinary meeting with local church leaders in Las Vegas. Chad Hardy said he bears no ill will toward the council of elders from The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

"I felt like I spoke my truth, the 31-year-old entertainment entrepreneur said. "Bottom-line, they still felt the calendar is inappropriate and not the image that the church wants to have."

"Men on a Mission," which has sold nearly 10,000 copies at \$14.99 each, included pictures of 12 returned missionaries wearing black slacks, but not their trademark white shirts, in modest poses. The men were photographed in traditional missionary garb and share their religious beliefs in biographical sketches.

Some of the 12 models have also been called to disciplinary meetings, but none were punished.

"I have no ill feelings toward any of these people," Hardy said of the church council. "They did what they believed was right and I really do feel it was the best decision for both of us."

Frank E. Savie, the senior leader over a group of Mormon congregations in the Las Vegas area, con-

The 2008 calendar was not to tear down the church or its 13 million members.

"The project is about stepping outside the stereotypes and stepping outside of the image," Hardy said. "Not everybody fits the image and I let them know we're not trying to portray an image for the entire church."

An excommunicated person is removed from official church rolls, but is still welcome at church services. Excommunicated members are prohibited from receiving the sacrament and can't perform church callings, such as teaching or preaching during meetings. They also cannot enter church temples.

# Pope says world's resources being squandered

SYDNEY, Australia — The world's natural resources are being squandered in the pursuit of "insatiable consumption," Pope Benedict XVI said Thursday in a speech urging followers to care more for the environment and reconnect with the principle of peace.

Benedict, speaking to more than 200,000 pilgrims gathered for the Roman Catholic church's youth festival, expanded on a theme that has led him to be dubbed "the green pope." The crowd, massed on a disputed wharf in Australia's largest city, regularly erupted in cheers that gave the event

the feel of a sporting event.

"Some of you come from island nations, whose very existence is threatened by rising water levels; others from nations suffering the effects of devastating drought," the pope said, referring to global warming.

He noted that during his more than 20-hour flight from Rome to Sydney he had a bird's eye view of a vast swath of the world that inspired awe and introspection.

insatiable consumption," he said.

Types of "poison" are afflicting the world's social environment, he said, such as substance abuse, along with the exaltation of violence and sexual degradation, for which he blamed television and the Internet.

Fuson said setting — like that created by his nature mural — is important, but spiritual experience is separate.

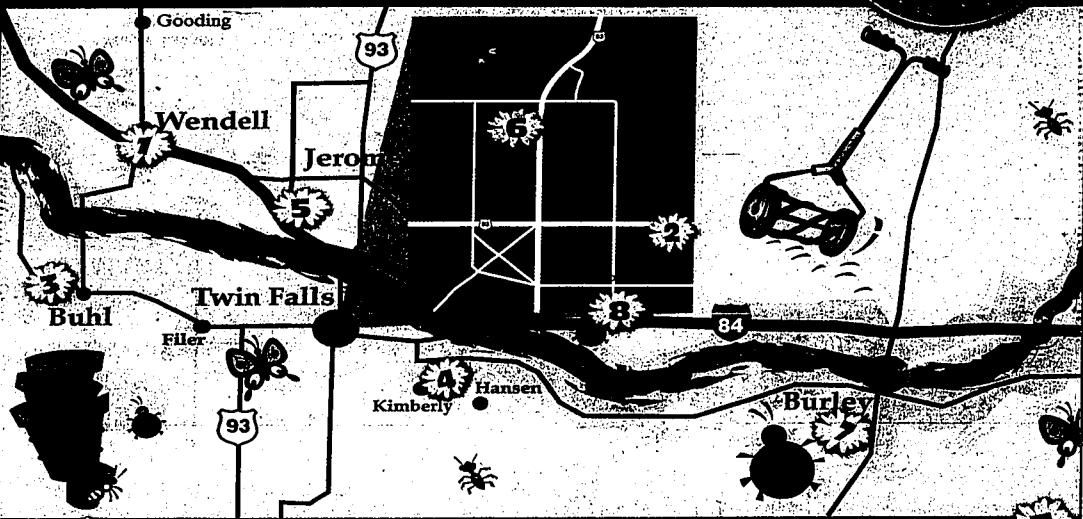

"I like to say real-time is the only time real estate is a relationship business, but REALTORS® are mobile agents and require timely and easy access to information and communications even when they aren't in the office," said REALTORS' Liaison Scott, liaison to NAR's Business Technology and Information Systems Forum. "Clients want that access and timeliness as well, confirming that real-time technology and information support the client-agent relationship."

"Consumers have embraced the timeliness and convenience of the Internet, and when it comes to real estate, they want access to a variety of real estate information at anytime of the day," said panelist Mark Lesswing, NAR chief technology officer and senior vice president. "Real-time is about improving the flow of information between MLSs, REALTORS® and consumers, with the end goal being increased customer service."

Panelist Errol Samuecon, president of REALTOR.com, believes that within the next decade more people will access the Internet through mobile devices than through personal computers, making broader wireless access and handhelds with increased

capabilities the wave of the future.

According to Samuecon, 11 percent of the general population has a Smartphone; however, that number is nearly three times higher among real estate professionals, and it's not just young professionals taking advantage of the technology.

"In fact, six in 10 real estate professionals who use Smartphones have been in the business for longer than five years," said Samuecon. "In the future, I see an explosion in the

sophistication of handheld devices and online video technology. This will make it easier for REALTORS® to stay in touch with their clients and for consumers to access listing information."

NAR's Center for REALTORS' Technology is also working to improve the flow and exchange of real estate listing information. CRV and other industry groups are active members of the Real Estate Standards Organization,

which governs the standards development, promotion, and maintenance activities of the Real Estate Transaction Standard.

RETS, an industry effort initiated by NAR and maintained by RESO, is an open data standard for exchanging real estate transaction information between authorized parties. RESO currently supports a RETS listing standard and a syndication standard, while two share a common XML-based data

layout, they are different. "The RETS listing standard allows brokerage companies and MLSs to easily and securely transmit, access, and share property listing information on the Internet."

"Partnering with MLSs on the adoption of real estate standards improves the exchange of information and other collaborative efforts, lowers costs and improves security," said Lesswing. "RETS allows real estate professionals to manage their listings in a number of systems and syndicate those listings, saving time, energy and money. In the past, brokers who belonged to multiple MLSs needed different programs to access each MLS."

In November 2007, a NAR committee recommended that all REALTORS®-affiliated MLSs adopt RETS by June 2009. According to NAR's 2007 MLS Technology Survey, an estimated 63 percent of all MLSs have already voluntarily adopted the technology.

A RESO working group recently approved a draft standardized data format for distributing real estate listing information. The syndication standard simplifies the process of sending real estate listings to multiple advertising Web sites such as Yahoo! or Google by not having to deal with different data formats.

"Standardizing data formats makes it easier for REALTORS® to feed their clients' property listings to multiple Web sites, which helps increase visibility for their clients' homes. Previously, if a REALTOR® wanted a home to appear on multiple sites, they would have to manually enter the listing on each site - if the price or other information had changed, each Web site needed to be updated individually,"

said Lesswing. "The syndication standard streamlines that process, so REALTORS® can feed and update a listing on multiple Web sites all at once."

Another key issue in 2008 is increased MLS data-sharing agreements, which allow brokers to share their property listings information with other participants and display listings from those participants on their own Web sites. "MLS data-sharing agreements benefit brokers and agents working in communities with multiple MLSs, as it eliminates the need for them to join and pay fees for more than one MLS, or enter the same information multiple times," said Lesswing.

According to NAR's survey of MLSs, one-third currently have no data-sharing agreements, and more than one-half of MLSs that currently do not have data-sharing agreements have considered forming one.

NAR's CRF was established to provide technology leadership, guidelines and assistance for its members. CRF makes available informed industry insight, research and open-source applications through its mission of implementation, advocacy and innovation.

Most of the field made five diamonds without too much trouble on the friendly spade lead, which allowed declarer to get three ruffs in dummy.

From the bidding, Spaporta reasoned that East's rebid was likely to be based on a 5-3-2-3 shape with extra values. He therefore found an elegant route to 11 tricks.
