Improvements to Institutions, Numerous Changes in Governmental Procedure Suggested in Report (By The Associated Press) BOISE, Jan. 3—In an exhaustive report to Governor Easton, the Idaho planning board today outlined a proposed six-year program of improvements to state institutions and recommended numerous changes in governmental procedure.

The 170-page document prepared in compliance with a May, 1932 resolution of the legislature, is being used as a guide for an orderly schedule of the state's public improvement program, which would be subject to constant adjustment to meet the uncertainties of future years.

Also suggested was creation of a constitutional board of education composed of three members, none of whom would be elective officials, and a committee of three members for rotating terms of several years. The board would be empowered to recommend revenue, production and safeguard sources of revenue for the state government and direct supervision of the state.

The report urged establishment of a land use planning commission to study the state's land use, and to recommend a general plan for the state's land use, including the location of public buildings, the location of public utilities, and the location of public parks.

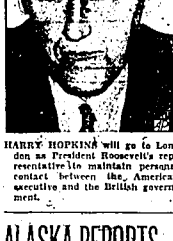

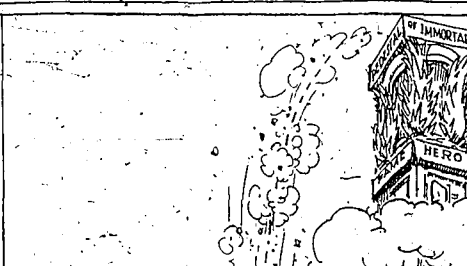

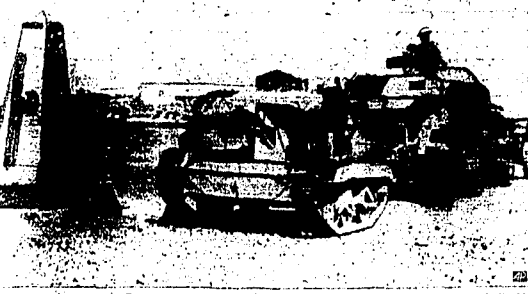
