(By The Associated Press) BOISE, Jan. 4.—The pomp and fanfare that surrounds inauguration of a governor in Idaho today is a ceremony that will be swum in by Chief Justice Alfred Budge, who automatically advances to that post Monday.

New Government Agency To Handle Aid for Britain

Call for Placing Nation on Wartime Production Basis Expected in President's Message

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—While President Roosevelt worked today on the message he will deliver in person before a joint session of congress Monday, reports circulated in legislative quarters that a huge new government corporation might be created to handle the projected loan-lend program of aid to Britain.

Mr. Roosevelt will have completed only a rough outline of his message which some officials believe will call for placing the nation on a virtual wartime production basis.

It is expected to deal also with such domestic questions as increased social security benefits, reduced spending for relief, and labor matters.

A White House secretary announced that the message on the "lend-lease" program will be delivered at 12 noon (MST) Monday, and that the message will be transmitted on Wednesday.

Senate Conference Designates Harrison for President Pro Tempore

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—Senators Allen Barkley of Kentucky and Pat Harrison of Mississippi who battled over the Democratic leadership in 1937, both were selected for high Senate positions today.

Harrison's nomination was rejected in majority by a party conference which also designated Harrison for president pro tempore.

With the indicated backing of President Roosevelt, Barkley won the majority leadership over Harrison by a one-vote margin after the death of Senator Charles McNary, former Democratic leader, in the summer of 1937.

Harrison's nomination is largely an honorary one. But he will probably be elected to the Senate by President-elect Henry A. Wallace in April. He will be entitled to a lower number on his autobiographic license and he will have a preferred position of all-time members.

The Democratic caucus also elected Senator Hill (D-Ind.) as whip, succeeding Senator Milton (D-Ill.) who was formerly his chief lieutenant. Hill has given an old horse whip as a symbol of effort to whip the party back into action.

On the Republican side, a party meeting selected Senator McNary as minority leader and Senator Arthur (Vermont) as assistant leader.

McNary was elected to the Senate in 1934 and served as majority leader until his death in 1937.

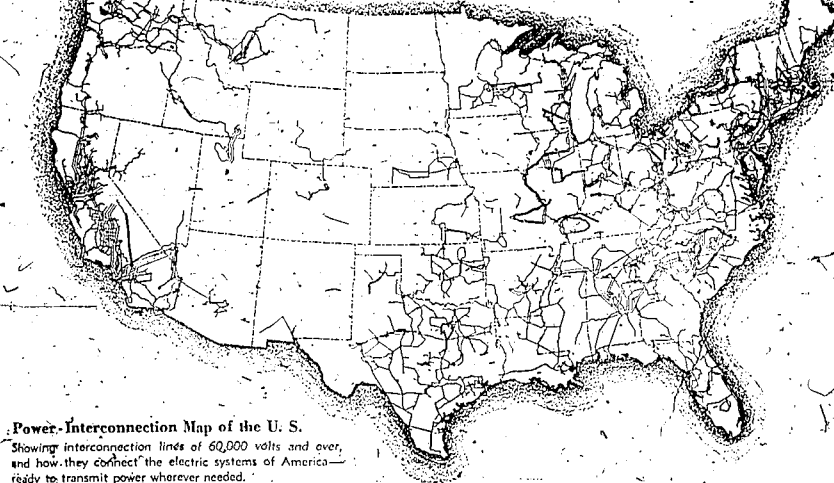
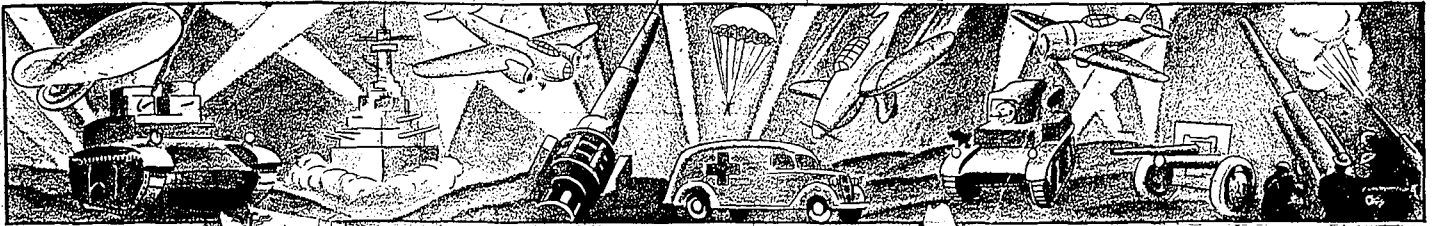

## Denver, Pueblo Hope to Qualify By January 15

### Failure of Colorado Baseball Groups To Meet Requirements Indicated At Circuit's Headquarters

POCATELLO, Jan. 4 (AP)—When directors of the Pioneer league meet February 8 at Ogden to adopt the 1941 schedule and conduct other business, it is doubtful that Denver and Pueblo will have qualified for admittance to the league according to Jack Halliwell of Pocatello, league president.

Representatives of the Colorado towns have appeared to Halliwell to give them more time, the deadline for qualification having passed January 1 but the promoters report they hope to complete certain necessary steps in the next 10 days. Neither of the applicants has made a major league cleanup though Pueblo is discussing with the St. Louis Browns, and Denver in communication with the Detroit Tigers.

Halliwell said today that unless the Coloradans have met every requirement by January 15 it will not be possible to include them in the 1941 setup, as a schedule maker is to be hired and his tentative schedules must be submitted before the Ogden meeting.

Should Wait Until 1942

It would probably be better, Halliwell has said, for Denver and Pueblo to wait a year during which the Pioneer league will pass through its third season, and have reached maturity will be the more firmly established. Instead of the high single blade, Kaub's skates rest the sole of the

skater's shoe pivoting upon a rigid frame holding two blades which are interconnected for racing, figure or pleasure skating.

Comparative tests made by figure skaters show that the two-bladed skates reduced to a minimum, speed-increased and turns made easier through an air-flow feature or automatic guiding, Kaub said.

"There are two curves on each blade so arranged that the skater negotiates turns liberally by leaning or turning his body, and direction is not impeded by weak or turning ankles as in the case with one-blade skates."

"Curvature of the blades is varied to provide racing, figure or pleasure skating."

Builders find the danger of falls virtually eliminated, Kaub said, because the skates "cannot skid or trip the skater. This is because the blades are set at an angle of constant grip and a low center of gravity keeps both blades always on the ice."

The skater uses the same motion as on the one-blade skates and ice and heel stops are made in the conventional manner.
