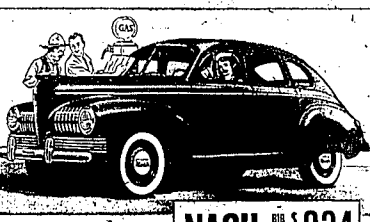

Power Short of War. Senator Wheeler's reference to the bill granting war-time powers to the president is one that is in many respects justified.

Must be Opposed. The bill is generated by the knowledge that no "emergency" powers granted the president in the last eight years have been repealed.

Power to be Granted. The bill is essentially war powers. They provide the legislative authorization by which the president is enabled to maintain close relations with the shipping companies.

Advancement of the national defense program is certain to raise problems concerning the close relationship between the government and industry.

Preservation of democratic ideals at home is quite as important as alert defense of those same ideals against foreign aggression.

Under the terms of the amended Federal income tax law, several million Americans will start next March making fiscal payments to Uncle Sam.

Further fiscal increases and expansions in any direction, this fact is plain. Millions of people will become directly aware of the effects of governmental administration.

When taxes do not apply to certain groups, those groups naturally are slow to protest.

Hitler's Levies on Belgium Total 9,500,000,000 Francs

NEW YORK, Jan. 15 (AP)—Hitler has levied on Belgium an aggregate of 9,500,000,000 francs, or approximately \$2,000,000,000, according to word brought back to New York by well-informed travelers.

It appears that Belgium is being assessed at the rate of about one and a quarter billion francs—\$300,000,000—for the support of German troops quartered there.

It is not clear whether the levies are being assessed on a per capita basis or on the basis of industrial production.

Fish and Game Commission Asks Increase in Budget

Fiscus Announces Expanded Program For Coming Year

BOISE, Jan. 15 (AP)—Members of the Idaho Fish and Game commission will ask legislative approval of an increase of approximately \$97,000 in the department's 1931 budget.

Walter Fiscus of Pocatello, commission chairman, announced the increase would be for the following reasons: In which it was decided a gain in license sales and in general revenue would make such action feasible.

The budget for the department is set on a one-yearly basis. The game department is planning a great number of improvements and modernization and facilities for increasing the wildlife population of Idaho, Fiscus said.

Among the proposed improvements are modernization of fish hatcheries, installation of cold storage plants, purchase of additional pick-up trucks for conservation of deer and enlarging open-taking stations.

The fish and game committees of the house and senate were proposed bills to overrule fishing and hunting laws, recommended by the commission would require approval by 70 old chapters in the code.

Other changes being sought are to allow hunters of Idaho and Utah to shoot migratory birds on portions of Bear Lake marshes where the state line is located and allow hunters of Idaho and Oregon to hunt on islands in the Snake river where the state line is located.

Permits licensed in either state would be allowed to hunt in the immediate territory without fear of arrest.

Another would permit conservation officers to travel more than the 500 miles per month as now permitted while on patrol duty.
