

IDAHO SENATE ASKS FEDERAL AID FOR CROP

Barlow Stirs Lengthy Discussion of Production Control Preceding Vote On Appeal for Diversion

BOISE, Jan. 16.—A memorial to the federal agricultural marketing administration asking a potato diversion program for Idaho passed the Idaho senate unanimously today, but with a lengthy debate discussion on crop control was stirred by Senator C. Barlow (R-Cassia).

Barlow declared his approval of the diversion program for government B. responsible for the loss of potatoes and should complete the program.

He asserted new deal crop control had limited plantings of sugar beets, rice, corn, wheat and tobacco, but forced farmers growing those commodities to plant other crops, among them potatoes.

Senator Thomas (R-Pringle) and Senator Barlow were permitted to discuss their views on so many spots "will be grown."

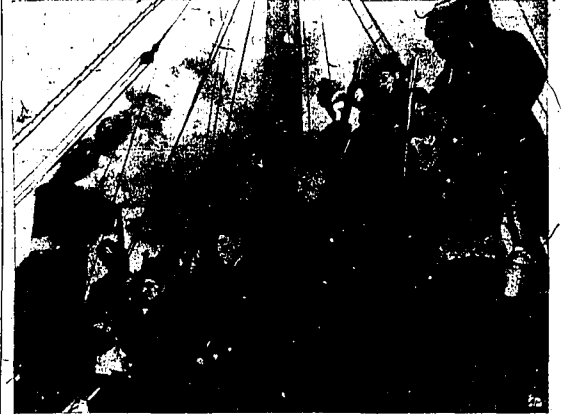
He said Idaho received "about an 80 per cent" of the federal quota for 1941, and added that if farmers were allowed to plant all the beets they wished, many potatoes would be planted.

"And sugar beets are a crop of potatoes and produce a surplus," Senator J. E. Williams (R-Blaine) declared "the potato industry in Idaho is sunk unless something is done."

Senator E. A. Owen (D-Bonneville), explained Maine, No. 1 potato producing state, had been given a diversion program for its potatoes and said there should be an Idaho potato diversion program for a potato crop.

Senator Derr (R-Bonner), chairman of the senate agriculture committee, reported on the memorial, also reported to Barlow by declaring the control program was voluntary.

The Balkan rumors resulted from several developments, Hungary announced suspension of all railroad traffic, except international trains, leading diplomatic sources to speculate that such action was necessary to permit Germany to complete its projected movement of 300,000 Nazi troops and mechanical equipment into Rumania this month.

Stimson Urges Action for Army Plans Aid Shelters

Secretary of War Says British Navy Protects America From Aerial Invasion

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—Secretary of War Stimson asserted today that if Britain should succumb to the Nazis, America would be in danger of invasion from the air, and urged Congress not to limit President Roosevelt's transfer of American warships to nations having the right of way.

He made these statements as, with great earnestness, he testified before the House foreign affairs committee in a city portion of the pending bill authorizing the president to lend, lease or transfer American-made fighting equipment to England.

Steps Taken to Safeguard the Population of British Cities from Air Raids were announced today while Secretary of War Stimson was telling a House committee there would be very real danger of an aerial invasion but for the British fleet.

Under Secretary James P. Patterson said the war department and defense commission were preparing informative pamphlet on methods of civil defense.

Already an experimental air raid shelter, some 200 feet long and 10 feet high, had been built by the army engineers and was to be tested by actual bombing in the near future, Patterson said.

Today's civilian protection measures ranged from the use of incendiary-proof clothing, including formation of a Negro parachute unit in the army's military school at Fort Benning, Ga.
