### BILL GIVES F. D. R. CONTROL IN WAR

#### Lease-Lend Measure Would Grant Power Over British Policies

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25 (AP)—Among the vast powers which the lease-lend bill would confer upon the president, one in particular has been the subject of much thought and discussion. It is the power to determine which things shall be delivered to the allies and which shall be reserved for our own defenses. At the very least, it places in the president's hands no measure of power which has not been brought to bear upon the British, if at any time Mr. Roosevelt thinks their war policies should be changed.

Some opponents of the bill are worrying over this aspect of the act for more than over the other powers conferred by the measure, such as the authority over industry inherent in the placing of billions of dollars worth of orders.

Kennedy Disappointed  
The testimony of Joseph P. Kennedy, the retiring ambassador to the United Kingdom, is one of the causes of the opponents of the lease-lend bill whom they had expected. For some reason they had been led to believe that he, after representing the British in London, would formulate against the Roosevelt foreign policy.

It is highly developed that Kennedy is very much in favor of aid to England. The opponents of the bill had thought otherwise. He let them back on their heels with a blunt statement that it was futile to suppose that President Roosevelt would give away the American navy. That had been one of their chief fears.

True, he didn't like the bill as it stood. He wanted the period of its effectiveness limited—something the administration leaders had already agreed to.

His position was pretty much like that of Wendell L. Willkie—if a few limitations are added the bill will be all right.

Invasion Out of Question  
The foes of the measure, however, took Col. Charles A. Lindbergh to their hearts. He said that America, protected by her oceans, need fear no danger if she arms to a reasonable extent and insists on her independence. Germany might be able to invade but not hold it. America, and an invasion of the northern continent was out of the question.

He did, however, raise an argument that was new to the already extensive record of the Lindbergh-England can't defeat Germany—menace with the armed assistance of the United States. He said, unless Germany collapses internally, turning the problem around, a German invasion of England was possible but far from probable.

He reasoned that the United States, instead of lending or giving away the planes and other war equipment it needs for its own defense, should through its influence lead a move for peace at once.

All who for one reason or another oppose the bill found some facet of Lindbergh's argument in agreement with their own points of view. The general verdict of the foes of the measure was that he was an excellent witness.

#### Farmers' Income Shows Increase

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25 (AP)—The agriculture department estimated today that farmers received a total cash income, including government benefit payments, of \$9,094,000,000 in 1940. This was an increase of \$76,000,000 over 1939.

Income from crops totalled \$2,504,000,000 in 1940—a 6 per cent increase over 1939. Income from livestock and livestock products totalled \$6,590,000,000—a 10 per cent increase over 1939.

Government payments, totalled \$166,000,000 compared with \$407,000,000 in 1939.

### Rupert Gets First Vocational School

RUPERT, Jan. 25.—Rupert will get the first of 14 farm vocational schools in Idaho, to be established under the N.Y.A.—State sponsor of agriculture education. Stanley Richardson, supervisor of the building owned by the school district has a suitable place for operations and tools and machinery are to be in place within two weeks.

The school district will furnish the building, equipment will be furnished by the federal government under the N.Y.A. and the state board of vocational agriculture will employ the instructor.

These schools come only where Smith-Hughes work is taught, and is for out-of-school boys from seven to twenty-four years.

Boys from Minidoka and Cassia counties are eligible to attend, without charge for instruction.

Only auto mechanics will be taught at the opening of the school. Welding, wood work and other trades will be added.

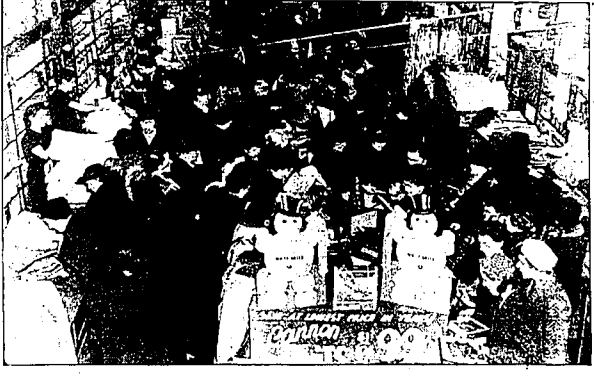

## Idaho Triumphs On Free Throw By Ray Turner

### Fouled on First Try, U. of I. Forward Connects With Second Toss for 39-38 Victory

MOSCOW, Idaho, Jan. 25 (AP)—The University of Idaho rallied in the second half of a northern division, Pacific coast conference basketball battle tonight to score its second successive victory, over the University of Oregon, 39 to 38.

Idaho was last night, 41 to 30, favored Oregon, 25 to 23.

Ray Turner, fouled at the free throw line with one chance gone and 20 seconds left to play, fumbled the point that gave Idaho the game.

Idaho had rallied from a 23-25 halftime deficit to tie a scoreless battle with the Oregonians. The score was tied four times in the second half, finally at 38-38 after Oregon's Paul Jackson sent his team one point ahead with a long basket and Ron Harris fouled in the center for Idaho from the charity line.

Turner, who missed every free throw that he had opportunity to make, fouled in the act of shooting and gave his first try for the victory point into the basket. The second, and slapping the stumps, was audible in the hush that held the crowd.

Idaho had taken charge of the game's start, fought off two excellent efforts by the Oregonians at 7-11 and 9-11, and moved away late in the first half to a 19-13 lead, based on four points in the game.

Harris connected with a one-hand shot as the second period opened, sending the count at 25-21 and neither team could get more than a three-point advantage from there to the final six.

After Turner's game-winning tally the Idaho team had one opportunity to salvage, that coming when George Anderson intercepted a pass and fired at the hoop from midcourt. The gun fired just as the ball reached the basket. It circled the rim and fell away.

Olds, Hilltop, who set the pace in Idaho's 41-30 win over Oregon last night, again led the scorers with 12 points. Vic Townsend and Jackson scored for Oregon.

Although the Twin Falls baseball club is still waiting for a definite word from the Twin Falls office in regard to a tieup regarding a franchise with the Eastern team, a number of a sudden shift in negotiations and an agreement with a major league club was seen in development during the past few days.

Contacted following the sale of the Cowboys to local men, most of the big time organizations expressed interest in Twin Falls as a future baseball town spot, but reported that arrangements for the 1931 season had been completed.

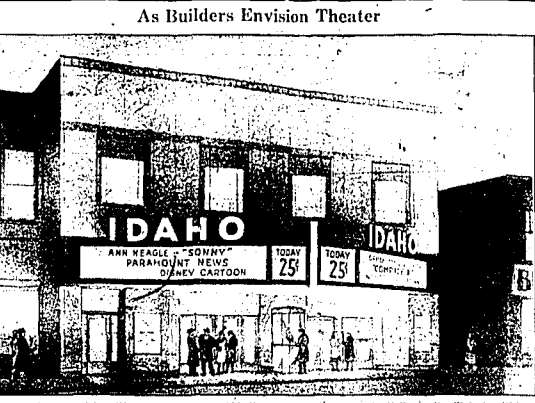
