

Confessions Enter Trial at Shoshone In Torture Death

Murder-Charged Girl, Two Brothers Hear Officers Relate Incriminating Statements

SHOSHONE, Jan. 28 - Without display of emotion, an 18-year-old girl, Mrs. Flossie Phillips, and her brothers, Jod Sanders, 20 and George Sanders, 16, in trial in district court here for murder of their father, Chester Sanders, 49, heard the reading of their purported confessions that they had hauled their father in the rear of a coupe from Burley to a "dry wash" in an eastern Lincoln county desert area, trussed him with a clothes line rope and left him there to die. That was the night of last June 21.

Eight days later Sander's body was found, lying crosswise in the wash, the head under a speargun, 27 feet away from where Sanders had been left, officers testified today.

The confessions, which District Judge D. H. Stupphen admitted over objection by the appointed defense attorney, Paul Haddock of Shoshone, implicated in the murder, the girl's husband, Chester Phillips, now under treatment at the state hospital at Blackfoot.

In these confessions and quoted statements, the young people said they had left their father in the desert in order to "get even" for long continued mistreatment of their father at the home.

The mother, Mrs. Gladys Sanders of Burget, said that the murder charges against her children were from time to time as if for reassurance, the older brother called into space and the younger boy cupped his chin in his hands.

In the court room was crowded and many stood in corridors outside when prosecuting attorney C. C. Mann called his first witness shortly before noon after selection of the jury was completed. The trial opened Monday.

LONDON, Jan. 28 (AP) - Economic war waged by the United States and Britain through the impingement of economic warfare "control at source" strategy would "speed the end of the war by increasing the efficiency of the blockade 40 per cent," a British economic expert declared today.

Cooperation between the two powers, he said, would "bring Sweden, Yugoslavia, the Japanese blockade runners from the seas, throttle the vital Italian air line from North America to Rome and leave the Axis in a chaotic state of economic confusion."

Britain Counts On Economic Warfare

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General Marshall Sees Britain As Victor Over Germany If America Helps

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28 (AP) - In clipped monosyllables, General George C. Marshall today expressed the opinion that Britain could win Germany with the American aid contemplated under the lend-lease bill, while Secretary Morgenthau declared that, unless the bill is passed, the British must stop fighting.

The views of the army's chief of staff, expressed to reporters after he had testified at a secret session of the house foreign affairs committee, recalled the testimony given last week by Col. Charles A. Lindbergh. Lindbergh said that even with the full military assistance of the United States Britain could not hope successfully to invade the continent of Europe without Germany collapsing internally.

Morgenthau told the senate foreign relations committee that British orders for 2,000 fighting planes were being held in abeyance because the British lacked enough dollar exchange. He also said that in order to pay for the war material already ordered, British citizens had arranged to sell "every bit" of property they own in the United States within 12 months.

When Senator Clark (D-Mo.) asked whether this included Lord and Lady Astor, he answered: "If Lord and Lady Astor own estate in New York, their assets will be on the auction block along with all the others."

Reporters congregated around Mr. Marshall after the session of the house hearing. In response to one query, he said all signs indicated that Hitler would make an all-out attempt to invade England this spring and that his opening move would be a surprise aerial onslaught.

"Do you believe that Great Britain with the aid of the United States could whip Germany?" Marshall was asked.

"Yes," he said. "Do you think she could defeat Germany with all aid except munitions?"

"I think so. That certainly is our opinion."

"Then a reporter asked the specific question whether the general believed that Britain would win out eventually with American aid, he emphasized that the present situation was "critical."

"I think it's one of the most critical periods in the history of the world," he said.

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French Camel Corps Strikes at Fascists

Third Fighting Front Develops Bringing More Bad News for Mussolini

CAIRO, Egypt, Jan. 28 (AP) - A "Free French" camel corps operating from Chad—the northern area of equatorial Africa—has begun an offensive against the Italians in southwest Libya, thus opening a third fighting front in an African struggle menacing the whole of the Fascist empire.

This new blow against the Italians was dramatically announced by radio tonight by General George S. Patton.

The corps was assembled along the Libyan frontier early this month, he said, and crept slowly across the desert by night, hiding by day, until at last they met and drove out the Italian garrison in the important oasis of Fezzan. The regional capital, Marzouk, was declared to have been raised in a fierce, sudden assault which took the Italian defenders wholly by surprise.

The town is 300 miles from the French base in Chad, and lies some 700 miles to the southeast of Benghazi, where only today British imperial forces were reported being rapidly reinforced for a general attack.

The third front active during today is 3,000 miles away to the southwest in the Italian-occupied zone of Ethiopia.

There, advancing British forces were said here to be closing in on the town of Addis Ababa, the capital of Italian Ethiopia.

The Greek high command reported two Italian planes were shot down.

One person was killed and ten wounded in a Salonic military hospital as a result of the attack, the ministry of home security reported.

British air force announced several direct hits in a bombing raid Monday on military buildings and barracks in the Italian city of Fiumicino in central Albania while Greek troops fought the counter-attack.

"Considerable damage was caused at Fiumicino, the ministry said, and the target was enveloped in smoke which the air force was supposed to be dispersing."
