

Murder Charged Youth Disclaims Purpose to Kill

Joe Sanders on Witness Stand at Shoshone Declares Quartet Sought to Teach Father Lesson

SHOSHONE, Jan. 30.—Joe Sanders, 20-year-old farm laborer, on trial in district court here today for the murder of his father, Charles Sanders, last June, testified in his own behalf, occupying the witness stand the entire afternoon session.

Joe Sanders said he was helped to tie his father's hands and feet with the rope and leave him the night of June 21 in a desert dry wash in the southeast corner of Lincoln county, some five miles from the nearest habitation. He declared, though his father had been suggested by Phoebe's husband, Charles Phillips, 22, and had had relief on Phillips' promise to release the bound man within a day of his death, Sanders' body was discovered June 29 in the desert where he had been bound and left.

"FANNY BY GASLIGHT," by Michael Sudler; (Appleton-Century, \$2.50).

Although its chief character is a woman who was better than most, it is not a novel, but a collection of short stories. The fact that it is both humorous and serious. 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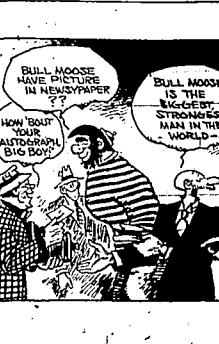

NEW YORK, Jan. 30 (AP)—Red Burman's two-year chase for a crack at Joe Louis' heavyweight championship ends in Madison Square Garden Friday night.

The Baltimore batter, rated among the first five heavyweights in the world for the past year, gets his chance with the Bomber in a fight scheduled for 15 rounds, but which will be over in five if he can't make him lay his hands on the idea.

His record, Burman ranks as the most workmanlike warrior to take a shot at Joe in a couple of years. To promoter Mike Jacobs and Louis' own stable family are taking Burman so seriously they've almost lined up a title fight for the ex-convict Joe Donato in Philadelphia next month. Abe Simon in Detroit is offering Arthur Gokey in Los Angeles in April.

Thirteen defense men will be in the line to defend in Louis' record-breaking run as head man of hitman and his second try to the post in this fight. The month-long campaign promoter Jacobs lined up for Joe this winter and spring. He signed Al McCoy for a 12-round middleweight, in five rounds in Boston last month.

As usual, the lure of Joe's punching dynamite promise to make this a financial success. Jacobs expects more than 15,000 customers and hopes to cost a gross sale of \$200,000.

Burman has been in hard training for more than 10 weeks, and plans to meet Joe with a solid hope to take the job and an overhead ring to the body. He borrowed the former from Jack Dempsey, who has been an opponent for several years, and the fighter from Max Schmeling, who flustered him with the same punch.

Louis, in five rounds, provided he can keep his chin out of the way and continue to punch while Red may play around long enough to speak a little piece, say seven rounds or so. But the chances are he'll get careless, offer Joe a target and school will end for him. This corner picks Louis to do it inside of five rounds.

Against the champion, Burman brings one thing which has made the Bomber look decidedly less than when he came in the ring. "There is an unusual style, something which always has baffled Joe until he has time to figure him out and figure it out."

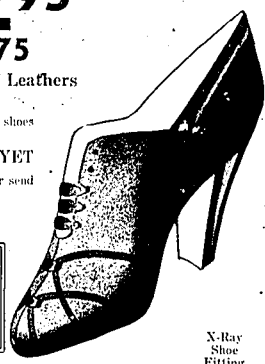
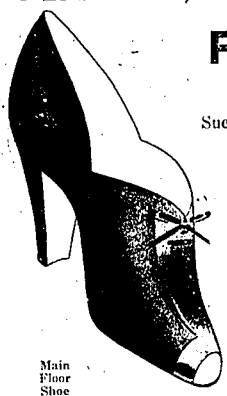
