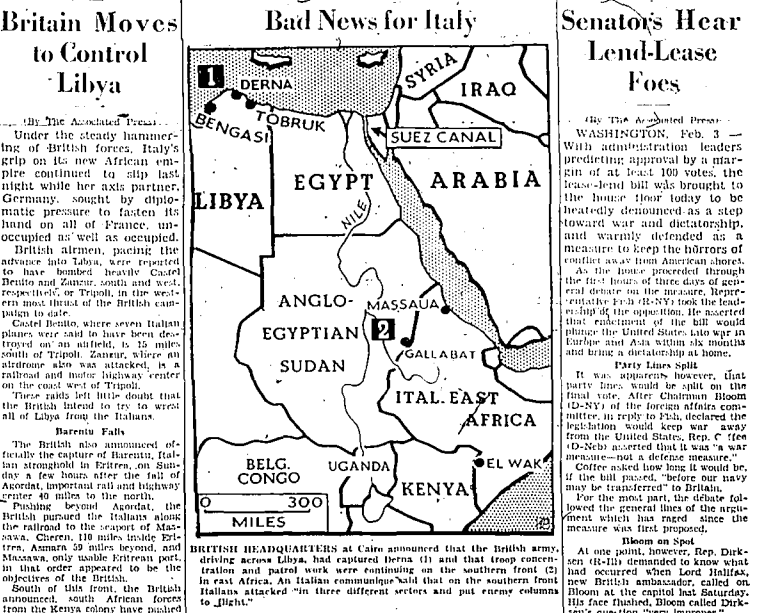

### COURT UPHOLDS WAGE-HOUR LAW

Labor Legislation Affirmed in Sweeping Decisions by Tribunal

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3 (AP)—A sweeping decision of the supreme court today upheld the constitutionality of the wage-hour law in its phases and went on to overrule a 1918 decision which had denied Congress the right to outlaw child labor.

The action raised speculation as to whether a controversial constitutional amendment, submitted in 1924, had ratified for by only 25 of the required 36 states, would become a dead issue. This amendment would empower Congress "to limit, regulate and prohibit the employment of persons under 18 years of age."

Officials at the children's bureau said they would continue to press for ratification of the amendment since three-fourths of all child labor is employed in extra industries, but the court's decision appeared to place an end to this effort.

The wage-hour law itself, passed in 1938 and known as the Fair Labor Standards act, prohibits the employment of children under 16 in mining and manufacturing and of children under 18 in hazardous occupations. Its chief purpose is to fix minimum wages and maximum working hours for all workers whose products enter interstate commerce.

Another provision of the law, requiring employers to keep records of their employees' wages and hours to prove compliance, also was specifically upheld.

The decision, by Justice Stone, was unanimous. The court became an eight-man tribunal temporarily because Justice Brandeis, who died last week, was succeeded by Chief Justice Charles E. Hughes.

Justice Murphy did not participate in two cases involving the P. W. Darby Lumber Company of Statesboro, Ga., and the Opp Cotton Mills, Inc. of Opp, Ala. The latter being joined by 10 other Statesboro mills and the Southern Cotton Manufacturing association.

The wage-hour law was "indirectly" in 1939 on charges of failing to pay the minimum wage and time-and-a-half overtime and to keep records. Federal Judge William H. Barrett at Augusta quashed the indictment and held the law unconstitutional on the ground that it regulated manufacture within the States and that manufacture was not interstate commerce.

"While manufacture is not, of itself, interstate commerce," the supreme court said, "the shipment of manufactured goods interstate is such commerce and the prohibition of such shipment by Congress is indubitably a regulation of the commerce."

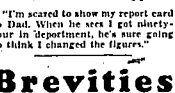

### Summons Comes For F. D. Kimball

SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 3.—Franklin D. Kimball, 86, prominent pioneer Utah and Idaho businessman and banker, died here yesterday after a short illness.

Kimball was a native of Salt Lake City and carried water to plaster during construction of the famed L.D.S. tabernacle here. 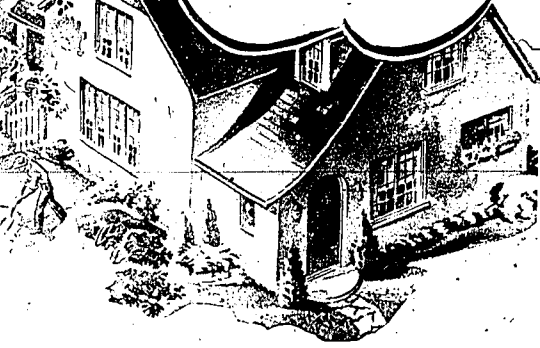

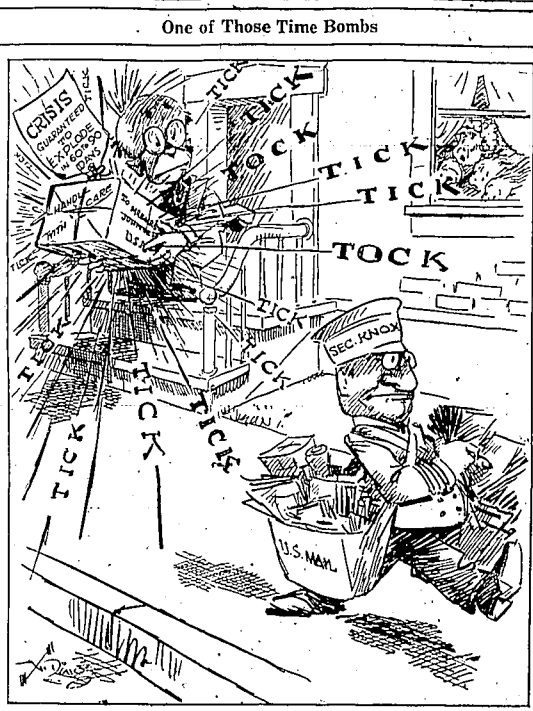

### The Literary Guidepost

SELEY BY JOHN

"AUNT ELBA," by E. G. Pinkham; (Innop: \$1.50).

I spotted E. G. Pinkham's "Aunt Elba" with a good deal of eagerness, and closed it with an equal amount of haste. The book is exactly the right length, but it was too pleasant an experience to be put aside willingly.

Mr. Pinkham was an editorial writer on the Kinnuna City Star when I was a very cub reporter here in Boise. He used to sit and twinkle at me in the periphery of the busy whirling editorial room, invariably undisturbed by the motion, actually making me believe that he was doing various ways. His copy had a Pinkhamish quality of its own; no other writer could do as deftly stuffed shirts than "Pink."

His "Aunt Elba" has all the author's similar qualities, and something more—a kind of mellowness that may represent the fruit of additional years' experience. The only recent book that seems to bear comparison with it is "Goodbye, My Clips," and this last is more sentimental than "Aunt Elba," and wholly lacking in background and workmanship.

"Aunt Elba" is the story of a New England girl, whose life history, as she was living in a world she had deliberately conjured up, a world of her own making, but which she must meet in the real world. Her name is Elba, and she is a certain Miss Boston to see a certain ship in the firm, and to ask whether her husband had left China 20 years ago. The ship had left China 20 years ago, and she had not been since. In the same way, she reminds other people and other events, using her deafness and loneliness as armor in the transaction.

She confided only in her great-nephew, one of the most delightful characters in fiction. And at the end, she explained her world and its meaning only to him. It is the perfect of its kind, and the book itself it is indescribable.

Some things about it can be described. Mr. Pinkham has dressed up from his own New England hooded a delightful picture of a girl, kept her story at least two memorable characters, and has dressed up the story in an slightly involved prose that more than anything else embodies the quality of the story. It is on a ground. This is more than anyone has a right to expect in 104 pages.

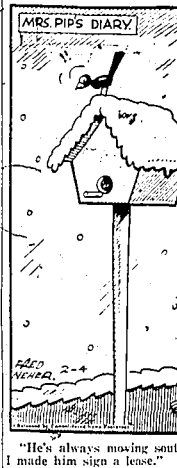

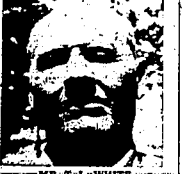
