Idaho University President Asks for Increased Appropriation

BOISE, Feb. 5 (AP)—Harrison C. Dale, president of Idaho state university, today requested an appropriation of \$1,450,484 as compared to the 1939-40 appropriation of \$1,225,125.

In answer to a question from Senator W. Scott Hall, of Clatskanie, Ore., who said the university was down the list last two years, Dale answered: "We are not going, all right, but we took a beating the last biennium."

According to the budget, the university's 1940-41 increase in personnel services of \$106,540, increase in services other than personnel of \$13,570 and increase in equipment of \$45,217.

Gov. Chase A. Clark approved all increases except those for personnel services, which include salaries.

The board of regents wants the employment of 10 additional persons on the staff, including three county agents, and salary increases for 55 persons, which accounted for the large part of the increase.

Dale explained the budget was cut by the legislature and the university's tuition fee of \$4 against each student last year to help pay expenses.

Answering questions from members of the committee, he said the university had a turnover of 200 professors, instructors and other staff members, and during the past biennium, had chances to secure other employment at higher wages.

He pointed out further that many of the departments are short of equipment to operate, had no money for the past biennium which led to purchase new equipment.

He said the school's minimum which was given only \$20,724 for capital outlay during the two years.

Salaries of the staff range from \$273 to \$600 a year.

Members of the committee on the budget, but was not made public.

BRITAIN FIGHTS FOR PRESTIGE

Need of 'Face' Big Factor in Continuing War in Africa

Another slogan which Ethiopia seems only eager to show today is that a smaller war five years ago might have won the world into peace.

Half way down the east coast of Africa, 1,500 miles south of Suez, below the Red sea, British and Italian armies are fighting for four countries that are five times the size of Italy.

Miscellaneous astonished military men on trial in Ethiopia in seven months in 1935-36. Today fast moving warplanes cause a new era to change fronts in tactics.

Today, westward and southward, British fighters force Italy's Eritrea and adjoining Ethiopia. Italian troops are retreating.

"There is nothing in this and why should armies struggle for African mountains, deserts and jungles when the real world was agreed to be along the Mediterranean and the English channel?"

There are many reasons for this minor war, but most interesting is the question of "face" or prestige. It is intolerable to be humiliated publicly.

It was a message to Britain not to Italy and all over the world, both British and the axis powers. Britain's position is nearly one-fourth of the world's land area.

Military reasons for this war may be less important than others, but probably they are greater.

To the north, Suez is the gateway which Britain controls the ship-lane to the east. This highway traveled route goes south through the Red sea and into the narrow Gulf of Aden to Mandeb, 20 miles wide. Modern axis can shoot across from Africa into Arabia there. Whoever owns that part of Africa, controls it into another Gibraltar.

The Arabians side and also needs friendly orders opposite to give her ships free passage. If Italy controlled the straits she could block the ship-lane just as Britain can at Suez and that would be an Italian challenge to British power.

SHOTGUN DEATH RECALLS CURSE

Young British Nobleman Late in Ill-Starred Titled Family

LONDON, Feb. 5 (AP)—A legendary story of a titled family's "curse" dating back to the Twelfth century came to life again when a 20-year-old young man was killed by a shotgun bullet.

The body of the young nobleman, the son and heir of the Fifth Earl of Durham, was found yesterday at a dump over a fountain on the front lawn of the country estate near Wetherby, Northumberland.

A coroner gave a verdict that the young man died of a "well-justified" sound which of "unsound mind."

The original story of the "curse" was a double-barreled shotgun which was found near the body. The youth was killed as he fired at a fox in the hunt. He recently had been recruited for military service.

The original story of the "curse" was the story of a family which frequently the family suffered tragedy from the Twelfth century to modern times.

The legend says that one of the earliest Lambtons was a woman so huge that it could wind round the family castle. The price of this victory was a pledge that he should kill the next living creature he met. He saw his father next and did not kill him. For this, the Lords Lambton forbade the name "doomed" to the boy.

Gerwasse Lambton, the 25-year-old son of the present Earl, died in 1937 from a Red sea liner, in 1937.

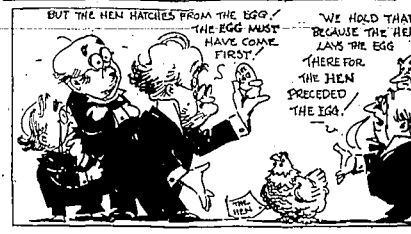

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PURPOSES TOLD OF GRAZING ACT

Rotarians Hear-Grazier Discuss Operation of 1934 Law

Objectives and operation of the Taylor grazing act were delineated by District Grazier J. A. Keith, Shoshone, during yesterday's luncheon meeting of the Twin Falls Rotary club.

Introduced by John Breckenridge, program chairman, the speaker, who was formerly stationed at Durley until he assumed duties as grazer of the newly-created Wood River district No. 5, pointed out that purpose of the grazing act of 1934 is to preserve the range and stabilize the livestock industry.

Distribute Funds
Of funds raised by the tax of 5 cents per animal month on cattle and 2 cents per animal month on sheep, 20 per cent goes to the federal government, 20 per cent for conservation and wildlife activities and 50 per cent to the state.

"Duties of the grazer are to patrol the range to see that the overgrazed, construction of routes for stock to travel to and from grazing land and to carry out other requirements of the act," he explained.

Applications for grazing permits first go to the district board, and it is required that applicants own or control enough land to feed their own stock four months of the year. The permit is issued for the land involved and is not affected by change in ownership of stock, he pointed out.

Shows Benefits
Replying to the criticism that the act curtails the livestock industry, he said that it actually benefits the industry by preserving the range which is essential to its continuation. A decrease which has occurred in sheep grazing operations is more than offset by an increase in cattle on the ranges, according to Grazier Keith, who added that periodic examinations show that for the first time in many years there is a gain in the number of sheep on the ranges.

TIRANA LARGEST ALBANIAN CITY

Turbulent History Recalled As Greek Troops Continue Drive

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—The Albanian capital, Tirana, toward which Greek troops are reported to be steadily advancing, is an excellent example of how air transportation has remade geography and military tactics, notes one bulletin from the National Geographic Society.

"It was because of its remote location—20 miles inland from the port of Durazzo—that Tirana was chosen as capital of the nation in 1920, when Albania's independence was reasserted during the post-war confusion and rivalries.

"In the last two decades of its life, Tirana, selected in turbulent days, has passed through a number of crises and has seen many changes in political and social conditions. At first the capital of a government run by a regency council and parliament (a would-be kingdom without a king), Tirana in 1923 was turned into a republican headquarters, only to be again transformed into a seat of royal power in 1928, when the former President Zogu became King Zog I.

From "Tirana," following the Italian invasion of Albania in the spring of 1939, King Zog, his queen, and newborn infant fled to Greece.

"Tirana is the largest city in Albania, with a population of some 25,000 people, although it has no railroad (the country's only attempted line, from Durazzo to Tirana, was passed through a number of normally good air service) linking it with important Albanian centers, as well as with Brindisi and Rome in Italy, Thessalonike in Greece, and Sofia in Bulgaria.

"Good motor roads (reaching pre-war mountain bride paths) also connect the capital with the port at Durazzo, as well as with inland towns, including Elbasan. This latter settlement—about 20 miles away—is reported on the Greek army's itinerary in its drive toward the capital.

"Through Elbasan, south of Tirana, ran the famous old Roman Via Egnatia, the road to Thessalonike, which cut a swath of early civilization through this then almost unknown and untraveled land.

Lying in a fertile, mountain-fringed basin, pleasantly dotted with orange and olive groves, Tirana is a city of old contrasts. In one section it is like a modern European center, with electric lights, cafes, movies, hotels, public buildings and fashionable shops. In another, it is an oriental town of narrow, cobble-streets, lined with Turkish bazars, and thronged—in penance—with brocade men of the mountains, peasants, shepherds and street vendors; with women in shaplees; Moslem robes and men in black-branded trousers whose designs originated 500 years ago.

Along Tirana's modern, tree-lined streets—named for Mussolini, for the "Prince of Piedmont," for Vittorio Emanuele III, and Galeazzo Ciano—may be seen high-powered motor cars, of, say, some Italian official, passing a slow, buffalo-drawn native wooden cart. At one corner may be found a glass-front show case, exhibiting "stills" of a foreign, imported movie, while at the next is a three-wheeled motor—its wheels and wires climbing over its walls to assert its up-to-dateness. The majority of Tirana's citizens are Moslems.

"With all its change and modernization, Tirana has retained most of its public parks and 'pate' gardens, which normally give the city a cozy, fresh look. In the newer city, with their bright-colored villas and flower gardens, are located the foreign legations, including the British and American consulate buildings. Since 1929, the United States has had no representative at Tirana.

"Even the older parts of the city, however, are not ancient, since Tirana dates only from the 17th century. It was founded by a Turkish general from a near-by village, who named it Tivleran, in commemoration of a victorious Persian campaign. Even that name was derived from the present "Tirana."

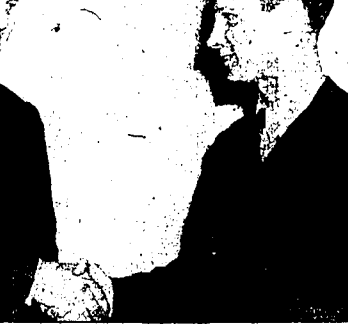

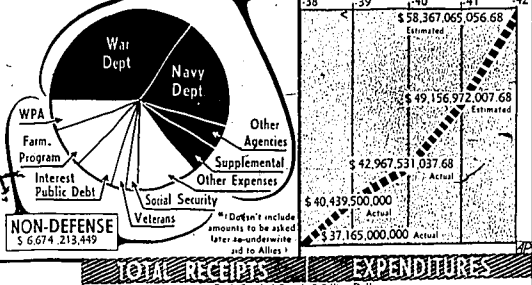
