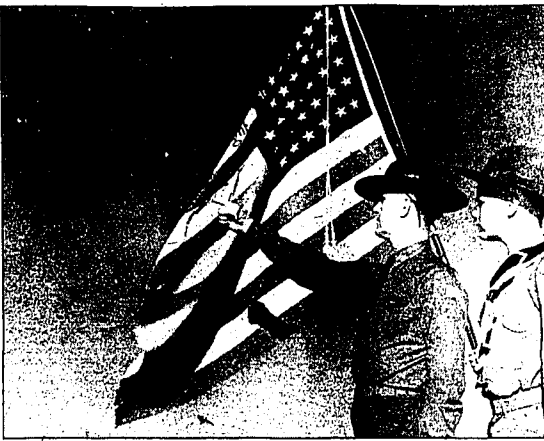

In discussing yesterday's bill to permit junior colleges to enter into cooperative agreements with state normal schools to maintain training schools and mechanics. It passed 20-18.

Sponsored by Senator Majority Leader Rainey, the bill would officially allow Boise Junior college to accept national youth administration training school students and mechanics.

# BRITAIN'S FLEET HUNTS FOR ENEMY

Mediterranean Cruise Sights No Hostile Dive Bomber or Warship

ABOUT A BATTLESHIP WITH THE BRITISH MEDITERRANEAN FLEET, Feb. 6 (AP)—Britain's war fleet, which is on a cruise in the Mediterranean, has sighted a single hostile dive bomber or warship.

Battleships, cruisers, destroyers and aircraft carriers in battle formation have searched about 100 miles off the Italian coast since the Italian mine-infested "bomb alley" has been spotted. An Italian bomber has appeared to duplicate the attack of Jan. 10 when six planes dived on the British fleet.

British authorities said that reported aerial attacks on the German dive-bomber bases in Sicily, and the destruction of dozens of German dive-bombers in the Mediterranean, have seriously interfered with any aspirations the German airman may have had to attack the British fleet.

But, Marshall Rodolph Orzan's headquarters in Libya are badly in need of reinforcements. It is generally believed that Hitler would combine the French and Italian fleets with his dive-bomber squadrons to try to strike a major blow at the British in the Mediterranean.

There are reports that the Italian navy has been ordered to dispatch both German and Italian troops to Tripoli to be concentrated.

Dr. Frank J. McAttee, program chairman, presented the program. Division manager of the power company, who in turn introduced A. G. Oberer, sales manager. Mr. Oberer presented films showing phases of the power industry and explained economic policies of the company.

Attending the meeting as a guest was Orland Mayer, a member of the Power company staff and other visitors were Clarence Madson, Kwanon club member, and Mrs. Kirby, Salt Lake City member. Mr. Oberer pointed out that the power company at the Park hotel has an emergency which may arise, such as providing adequate power to such points as the airport at Boise.

He compared kilowatt hours per capita in the United States with those of other nations, indicating that this country ranks the highest in the world in use of power.

Activities of the power company in developing various holding companies, such as the Idaho Power, which said that private power companies exceed government owned ones, were also mentioned. He said that since the last war, the amount of power generated has increased greatly since the last war.

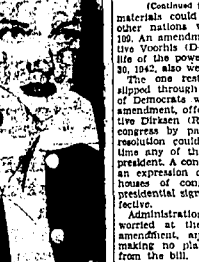

BONDS SUGGESTED TO TAKE UP DEBT

Idaho Governor Proposes Postponed Payment of Deficit

BOISE, Feb. 6.—In the hands of Attorney General H. H. Miller tonight was a proposal to transfer upwards of \$1,000,000 in state debt from registered warrants to bonds.

The idea which is still in the study stage is that if we can agree the bonds we want to raise that money right away, along with our other state expenses for the fiscal year.

State Treasurer Myrtle P. Enking, however, said payments by counties of ad valorem taxes for the last half of 1940, together with various excises, had cut down the amount of outstanding warrants to \$992,470.

New warrants will continue to be issued, until sufficient accumulations in the treasury to pay off all of them, Mrs. Enking explained.

Of the bonding limit of \$2,000,000, there is \$800,000 left up to the standing limit, leaving \$1,200,000 as margin.

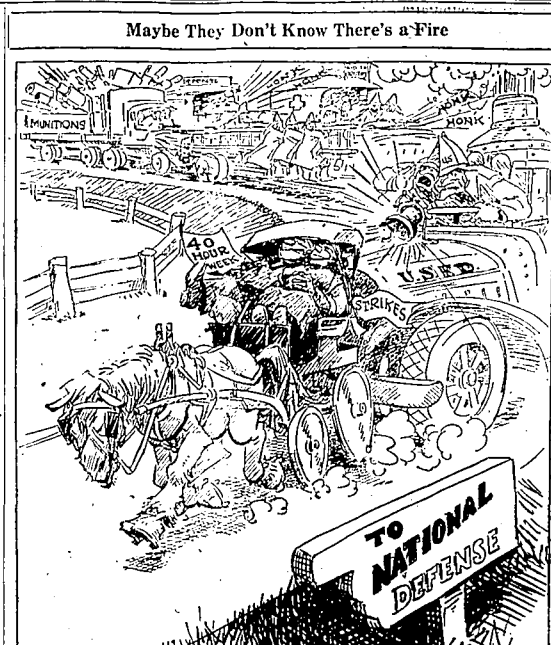

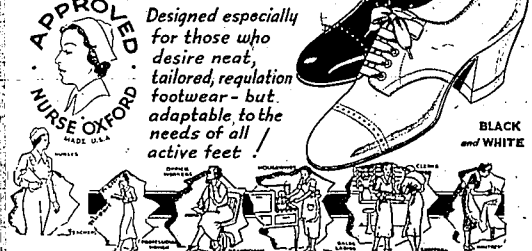
