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SPEAKERS SCAN FARM PROBLEMS

Grange Sponsored Institute Discusses Livestock, War's Impact

FILER, Feb. 11.—Informative discussions of livestock and farm problems, the world agricultural outlook and poultry raising came before audiences attending today's Grange Institute sponsored by the Twin Falls County Grange and University of Idaho extension service.

A talk by Van H. Loughey, extension dairyman, on dairy herd feeding and management, brought extensive discussion from the audience during the opening afternoon session. He was preceded in the morning by Dr. Albert Peterson, poultry specialist, and E. F. Hineshart, extension livestock specialist.

Mr. Loughey discussed utilization of by-products, such as beet pulp, beet molasses, bran straw and cull potatoes as being the best feed often cause suspicion. Wheat bran is a good supplement to other feeds in protein, cell beans or peas," he said, adding that farmers have failed to take the value of a good feed mixture. He recommended an 80 percent mature phosphate lime, 10 percent sodium chloride, 5 percent calcium phosphate, 5 percent calcium sulfate and 1 percent calcium iodine.

Blue grass makes a good pasture but is high in yield during the hot summer months. He said that alfalfa hay is the best feed of any of the days, and the younger cut the higher the protein.

Mr. Youngstrom, speaking upon "Impact of War on the Agricultural Situation," said, "Defense programs affect every line. Agriculture will affect business and agriculture. Take advantage of the situation and try to get the things that occurred after World War No. 1."

Expenditure for defense will definitely influence business activity with one half billion dollars pouring into the United States during the war and that the war continues another year, he said.

"Costs of labor and machinery to the farmer are bound to increase," he said. "Cattle and sheep men are doing well as are producers of all livestock and dairy products, but the export outlets for hogs are poor."

There should be no surpluses if the government had an export outlet, but the great majority do not have incomes commensurate with their needs. The department of agriculture has taken steps to remedy this situation by the food surplus plan, with the surplus buying surplus commodities, according to the speaker.

"The main powers in our country are exporting wheat, pork, beans, apples, cotton and tobacco," Mr. Youngstrom concluded.

Hear of Poultry

Poultry specialist Moore spoke at 10 a. m. on "The Care of Baby Chickens" and the discussion of poultry problems. He said that a joint meeting of men and women. Of egg quality he said that in one state there are 44,000,000 hens, but there has been a loss due to poor egg quality of 40,000,000 a year, while in Idaho, having 2,000,000 hens, the loss is estimated at 400,000,000.

A few years ago the yearly consumption per person in the United States was 186 compared to the present consumption of 292 eggs per person. Egg production has been stepped up in the past 20 years from 41 eggs per hen to an average of 129 eggs annually per hen. Idaho has made the greatest increase during the past five years of any state in the union.

Idaho in Key Role

Mr. Hineshart pointed out that "Idaho stands alone in the western states as a surplus producer of meat area. This surplus goes to pork-deficient areas in California, Oregon, Washington, Nevada and Utah," he said.

He also indicated that cattle and sheep are produced in large numbers, and part of the summer shipments—all of the lamb and part of the cattle—must go to the summer.

"West coast population has reached the stage that 76 per cent of the Idaho cattle now produced can be consumed on the west coast. This requires orderly marketing, as summer and fall demands are supplied by fat cattle from the summer range and fall pastures, January and February needs by the two or three-year old steers from feed lots and March and April demands by the yearling steers and feed lots. The weaner calves fed out are ready for market in May and June or perhaps later."

"Alfalfa hay furnishes the protein and the barley, wheat and corn the carbohydrates to furnish a nutritionally balanced ration."

"Pigs require a large proportion of grain and a protein supplement. Grain milk or buttermilk is best. If not available, tankage, meat meal or fish meal is the next best protein and meat substitute."

"The market for meat may be restricted in some sections, and this
