

# Senate Votes to Sustain et al of Liquor Penalty

## Idaho Falls Conditions Denounced in Debate Preceding Endorsement of Governor's Stand

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, Feb. 13.—A mid-afternoon parliamentary maneuver, denunciation of asserted liquor law violations at Idaho Falls and party line battling the Idaho senate today sustained Governor Clark's veto of a bill backers today would "put teeth" in liquor law enforcement.

Attempts of opponents to over-ride Clark's action, as was done 46-15 in the house yesterday, occupied the day. Repeatedly Republican party leaders appealed to Democrats to treat the matter as a "moral" rather than "political" issue.

A two-thirds vote was necessary to pass the bill over the governor's veto, but failed by simple majority, gaining only 21 yeas compared to 22 nays.

The roll call, which came after three previous roll calls on various points affecting the bill, showed only one Democrat, Senator Graham of Madison county, voting for passage.

Specifically the bill, sponsored by Reps. Judge (R-Ada), Sullivan (R-Ada), Hooty (R-Caribou), Newman (D-Nes Perce) and Meeker (D-Boundary), would have required the "revocation" of liquor licenses to revoke the license of any retailer who violated the law.

Final vote came late in the afternoon, after the senate had joined in its support of Governor Clark's message asking for taxation to replace the present ad valorem levy.

The senate calendar for reconsideration tomorrow would lay proposed senate joint resolutions to amend the liquor law.

The house passed the bill and killed two of the latter being Rep. Peck's D-Bannock measure to create a police commission.

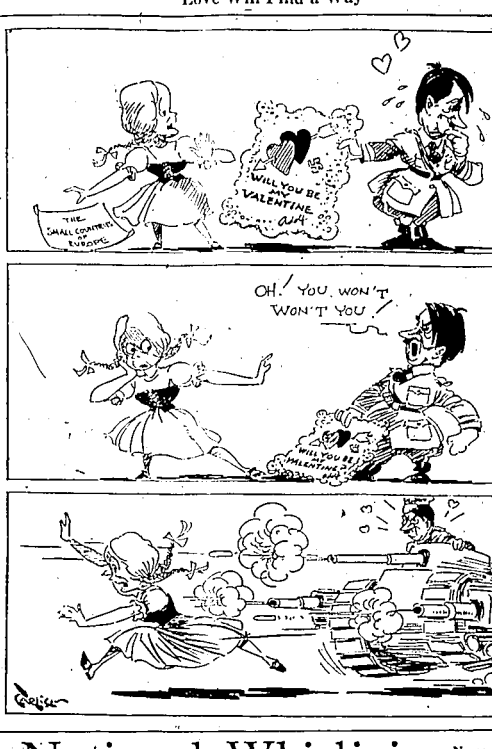

### Collegians Point To Varied Careers

CALDWELL, Feb. 13—While 48 occupations in the College of Idaho catalogue, 129 of them may be considered in planning to become teachers, a plenary through the cards shown. It was attended by 20 students, including 21, on February 13. Fifteen are planning on careers in education.

## Union Pacific Starts Action for 10-Cent Reduction on Potatoes

SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 13 (AP)—Responding to the request of Governor Chase A. Clark of Idaho and potato growers and shippers, the Union Pacific railroad today initiated an action seeking approval of an emergency reduction of ten cents per hundred pounds in freight rates on Idaho potato shipments to all western markets.

This voluntary action by the Union Pacific followed a meeting Wednesday in Boise, called by Governor Clark, at which a five-member house of representatives committee, the Idaho public utility commission, and growers and shippers suggested emergency freight rate reductions of approximately 25 per cent as one of the means of marketing an estimated 115,000 tons of Idaho potatoes held in Idaho storage cells.

Willingsworth of the Union Pacific to try to obtain legislative approval of the emergency freight rate reductions, applicable until about May 15, and to obtain a certificate from the Public Utilities Commission of Idaho, general freight traffic manager, who attended the Boise meeting.

Wilcox explained at least 10 to 15 days would be required to get the Interstate Commerce Commission to make effective the proposed emergency freight rate reductions, and that the Interstate Commerce Commission would have to reduce the percentage reduction of 10 cents per hundred pounds to 15 to 25 per cent.
