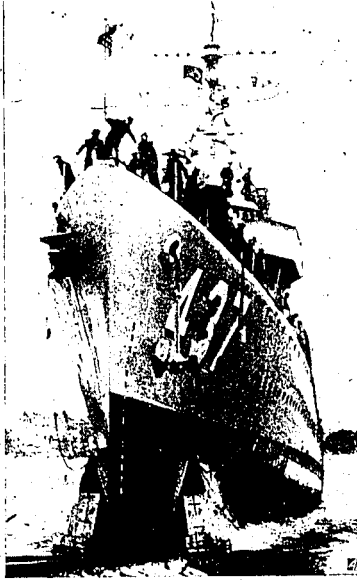

41ST DIVISION'S LEADER UNUSUAL

Commanding Officer Lives in Tent, Leads Marches on Foot

PORT LEWIS, Wash., Feb. 15 (AP)—Unusual in the word for Major General George W. White, 41st division, round-faced, graying commanding officer of the 41st division.

Here's why:
Tried sooner live in a tent with his men than move into a \$20,000 frame-heated house.

He started military life as a plain book private.
He has announced that when his division trains up to the 25-mile-a-day marches, he will lead the distance with them on foot.

He is a former newspaperman turned soldier. Writing as an aide-lieut, he's authored five books and sold articles and short stories to most of the nation's large magazines. His writing income has topped \$30,000 a year.

He has instituted the "happy family" concept in his division, eliminating confinement of men in military canteens and getting the most out of them through a "democratic philosophy."
He's the author of a military manual and enlisted men in his division refer to him as "a soldier's general."

Strikes Democracy
General White, an affable, quick-moving man of 59, has one military "golden rule":
"The first duty of an officer is to look after his men. If you manage their enthusiasm, discipline will take care of itself and you'll get better training results. Democracy is as important to military life as it is in civil."

The general's philosophy explains why:
"I'll continue to live in a tent with my division. It may be a bit inconvenient but it will keep me in close touch with my men."
He paced up a brick house with steam heat, to live in a boarded tent heated by a small coal stove.

General White spends his days in the field supervising training of the 41st division which is made up of national guardsmen from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming.
Born at Long Branch, Ill., General White's military career began at 15 when he enlisted as a private in field artillery at Fort Douglas, Utah. He served in the ranks six years, rising from private to first sergeant, before he got his first commission in 1907.

Twice Decorated
When the Mexican border dispute came up, he was a captain of cavalry serving at Calles, Calif. In 1917 he was promoted to major and went overseas with the 41st division. Of his 18 months in Europe, General White served several months as an adjutant general on the staff of General John J. Pershing who was promoted successively to lieutenant colonel and colonel. He was twice decorated for his services.

A graduate of the command and general staff school at Fort Leavenworth and the army war college, he was promoted to brigadier general in 1923 and, six years later, received the double stars of a major general as commander of the 1st id.

General White drifted into newspaper work while he was in Utah. He was a reporter on the Salt Lake Tribune at 18 and became associate editor of the Portland Oregonian when he was 31.

With his flair for phrases and his wit, the author-general has made his "general's assemblies" news items.

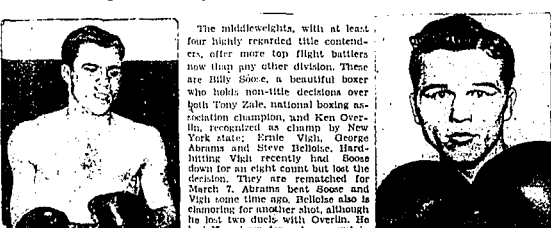

Magnetic 'Knee' Blocks Radio Transmission Across Atlantic

By HOWARD W. BLANKENHORN
Special Press Service Editor
PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 15.—By the use of a magnetic "knee" between North American and European continents for poor radio transmission was announced here today by H. E. Hobbie, RCA, chairman of a symposium on magnetism held by the American Radio Relay League.

The "knee" is a technical term for a special type of radio transmitter and then had to overcome all radio signals, so that nothing can be forced through.

By explanation of what happens, Hobbie said that in the turbulent state of the atmosphere, and especially particular particles from the sun, upset the ionized layers, which normally lie at levels that do not change rapidly.

In the second phase, three ionized layers seem to stretch out into a wall of ionized air so vast that nothing gets through.

The reason why this happens, over the north Atlantic is the close proximity of the magnetic north pole to Canada.
