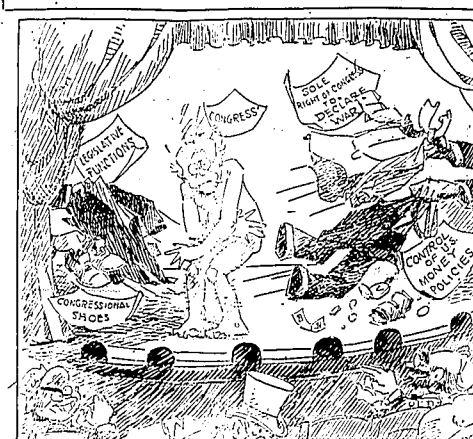

FUNDS ASKED FOR AID OF FARMERS

Agriculture Department Bids for \$890,824,037 Appropriation

WASHINGTON, March 4 (AP)—Saying that the farmer needs help to hold his own with industry as the costs rise, the agriculture appropriations committee asked congress yesterday to appropriate \$890,824,037 for agriculture department programs in the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Representative Cannon (D-Mo.) in charge of the measure, opened debate with the statement that since the European war the wages of labor had increased along with the price of "everything used on the farm."

"The disparity between agriculture and non-agriculture prices is actually increasing," he said. "The most indispensable part of the equipment of any army is rationing. The most indispensable part of any war is maintenance of the base of the lines. In this bill we have made ample provision for both."

The total of cash in the bill showed a reduction of \$146,124,855 from current year's appropriation. This was because President Roosevelt well proposed that only one-fourth of the usual \$122,000,000 for primary payments be appropriated directly and that the rest be approved as a contract authorization.

The total funds available to the department under the bill, including automatic appropriations and Reconstruction Finance Corporation loans, will be \$1,420,777,557, compared with \$1,471,021,557.

Included were the usual \$500,000,000 fund for soil conservation benefit payments to farmers, \$100,000,000 of soil reclamation automatically earmarked for disposal of surplus commodities, and about \$48,000,000 for sugar payments.

Discussion of hearings on the bill disclosed that Secretary of Agriculture Wickard and his associates repeatedly told the committee that government must continue to make large appropriations to bolster farm production in a new program that is devised, and contended such a step was all the more necessary because war abroad had vitiated many of the foreign markets.

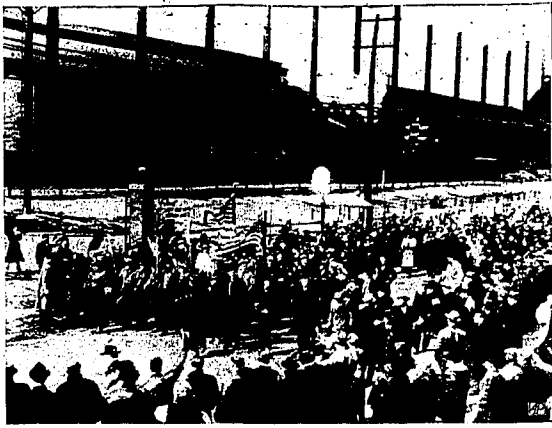

COURT HITS FIGHT ON STYLE PIRACY

Labor Board's Power Curbed in San Antonio Publishers' Case

WASHINGTON, March 4 (AP)—The people who copy type from the printer for women for a fight against "style pirates" in the sewing machine industry have won a court victory.

The court unanimously found that the Millinery Center Guild, Inc., a group of dress and hat makers, and the Fashion Originators' Guild of America, Inc., an organization of dress and hat designers and manufacturers, violated the anti-trust law in steps they took to prevent piracy of their creations.

Guild members refused to deal with retailers who sold the products of any manufacturer who copied their designs. They signed an agreement to cooperative agreement.

The court found that the guilds had "unlawful combinations" and upheld a federal trade commission order against them.

The court also put its foot down on an effort of the labor board to order the Express Publishing company to cease and desist from "in any manner interfering with the efforts of the San Antonio Newspaper Guild (CIO) to bargain collectively with it."
