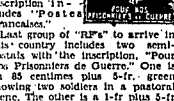

# ROOSEVELT TALKS ON AAA BIRTHDAY

### President, Wallace, Wickard Discuss War and Crop Control

WASHINGTON, March 8 (AP)—President Roosevelt, told farmers celebrating the eighth birthday anniversary of the AAA tonight that if democracy should be extinguished from the face of the world, neither their farm programs nor the democratic way of life could hope to survive.

"Then saying that democracy over large areas of the old world is threatened with extinction, the chief executive declared: "We cannot escape our collective responsibility for the world in which we may live in peace, freedom and security—the kind of world our farm program is designed to help create."

"I am confident," he added, "that the farmers of 1941 wish this kind of world to survive."

The president spoke from his White House study into radio microphones which carried his words to thousands of farmers gathered at rural district headquarters throughout the country to celebrate the day in 1933 that he summoned farm leaders to Washington to draft the nation's first agricultural adjustment legislation.

At his side were Vice President Henry A. Wallace, who is the secretary of agriculture at the time, and the present secretary, Claude A. Wickard.

Wallace lauds chief of the President, Wallace, describing Vice President Roosevelt as the "best friend" agriculture ever had in the White House.

"I know," he said, "that the president and vice president want agriculture to have equality with other groups. They have proved that many times. And let me assure President Roosevelt that the overwhelming majority of farmers are behind his efforts to lead democracy forward and can farmers have never goose-stepped and they never will."

## Former Guards Subject to Draft

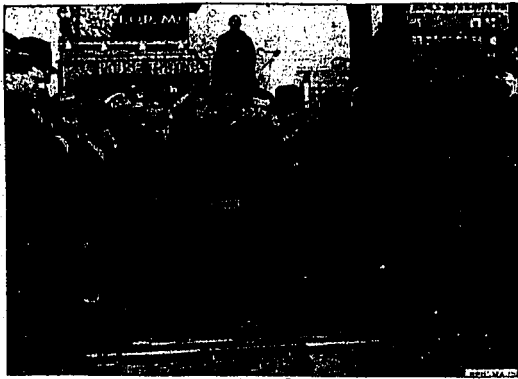

The growers also sought removal of the penalty clause affecting the beet price when sugar falls below \$25 a hundred pounds, he said.

## BRITISH SHIPPING LOSSES SERIOUS

### Discount of Hitler's Claims Still Leaves Crippling Casualties

Berlin reports of Nazi sea raiders are described by London as fantastic "exaggerations," but the British admit it is hard to know just how much damage is being done.

Widely fluctuating London official figures week by week on merchant tonnage losses leave no question of the damage.

The British in their "victory-at-sea" speech boasted of news of 213,000 tons of British shipping sent to the bottom within two days.

There has been no confirmation of this, nor any subsequent Berlin expansion of the claim. British tonnage loss figures for the period are heavier than those, but reflect no such sea blows by the Nazis as Hitler claims.

There seems no good reason to doubt the accuracy of the British of their own shipping losses. American aid for Britain policy is in the making in congress.

There was no serious challenge except Germany, the World War II ship loss figures during the war. As German-American relations become strained over "unprovoked" U-boat warfare, London spokesmen dwell on mounting British merchant tonnage losses.

There is now, however, London was often mum about naval casualties.

There are good military reasons for the British custom of ignoring many German claims of British warships.

The admiralty figures that if the Germans think a certain British ship has been eliminated when actually it has not, so much the better. It also assumes that some Nazi reports of that character represent in fact an attempt to amuck out information as to fleet dispositions.

## RECORD SIGHTED FOR INCOME TAX

### Federal Officials Expect Collections to Exceed Billion Dollars

WASHINGTON, March 8 (AP)—With the deadline for income tax returns a week away, officials confidently predicted today that March collections would zoom to a record total of \$1,000,000,000.

In March last year, collections were \$655,000,000. But this year, expectations have been lowered, tax cuts increased, while the tax burden has provided more taxable income than the country has seen in years.

Early returns, while far from complete, have indicated guesses of high collections. In the first few days of March, collections were 85 per cent ahead of the similar period last year. While the percentage for the month is expected to be considerably short of this figure, the indications was sufficiently optimistic to cause relief of the \$375,000,000 estimate for the month indicated by the budget.

About 15,000,000 Americans are expected to file the individual income tax returns, and about 2,500,000 corporations are expected to file corporate returns. About 100,000 of the corporations will be expected to file excess profits tax returns.

## Reserve Officers' Service Limited

WASHINGTON, March 8 (AP)—With the aim of giving field officers a better opportunity to see reserve officers, the war department announced today it would halve the length of training and reserve to a single year's active duty.

With some exceptions, an order directed that not more than 75 per cent of reserve officers on duty with corps area service continue and 50 per cent of reserve officers on active duty in each regiment, separate battalions, company or similar organizations may be granted extensions.

The effect, officials said, will be to give the opportunity to serve to thousands of reservists who otherwise might not have been mobilized during the army's expansion.

## University Trees Go to Sportsmen

### MOSCOW, Idaho, March 8.—Tree plantings by farmers and sportsmen for the winter feed and shelter has been an important new feature in the University of Idaho cooperative forest nursery.

The first tree-planting of this kind (400 young trees) was shipped this week to the Hamrick County Sportsmen's association. Co-operating farmers have agreed to plant the trees furnished by the sportsmen in culture and odd parcels of land.

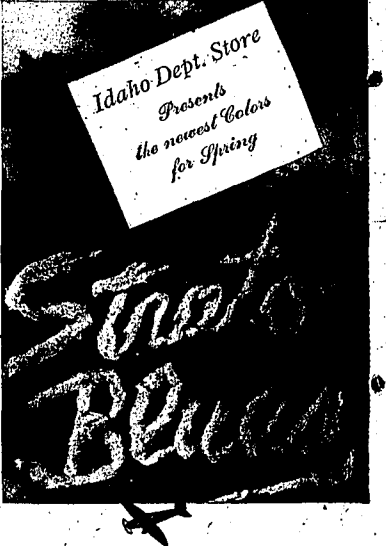

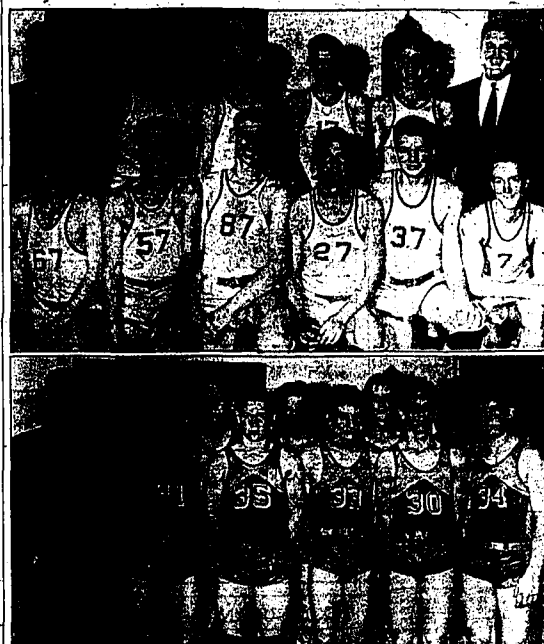

BOISE, March 8 (AP)—Idaho trout fishermen will dip their lines beginning May 25, the state fish and game commission announced today. Closing of the season will be Nov. 1, with the dates applying to all waters not covered by special regulations. Chairman Walter Flanagan said the commission would be determined in a few days. The commission meeting occurred today with all members present except Alton Howell of Idaho Falls. It will continue tomorrow. Last year trout fishing began May 1, with high water prevalent in many streams and catches small until later in the month. The commission, on the theory that trout are hooked and released die within a short time, abolished the length limit of six inches for trout and ruled every fish caught must be retained and counted as part of the bag limit. Possession limit was set at 15 pounds and one fish, or 25 fish, the same as the daily limit.
