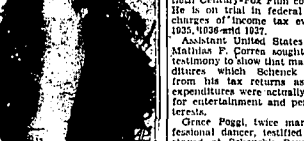

WATER OUTLOOK ON SNAKE RIVER

Prospects Indicate Supply Similar to That of Last Year

Snake River drainage watermaster
According to the latest snow surveys made the first of March, water depths and snow content at Beecher, River, Grassy Lake, Teton Pass and Island Park reservoirs are about the same or slightly less than a year ago.

On the Jackson Lake watershed and Hoback river the snow was somewhat heavier than a year ago, although substantially below normal. The soil underneath the snow is reported as wet. The snow at low elevations in the Snake valley and foothills has already melted to some extent. The flow of the streams at the present time, however, is less than a year ago, indicating that the ground-water levels in the mountains which supply the winter flow, are below normal as a result of last year's deficient run-off.

The reservoirs, Jackson Lake, American Falls, Lake Walcott, Henry's Lake and Grassy Lake, contain a total quantity of water of about 200,000 acre-feet less than a year ago. As of March 1 the prospect was for a water supply about like that of 1940. Taking the water supply whole the snow supply was slightly greater than a year ago. The water supply to make up for the 200,000 acre-feet shortage in storage. The loss however may be somewhat affected by precipitation received during the next three months when there is a 50 per cent chance of precipitation normally occurs. In the past, mild winter and early spring have usually been followed by dry summers. The precipitation which is predicted has been generally below normal for the past month and if this trend continues until the spring months the available water supply during the irrigation season will be less than a year ago.

American Falls reservoir has a possible chance of filling during the first half of April if the canyon does not start diverting water before that time. If American Falls reservoir fills so that the American Falls water field over in Jackson Lake last becomes available for Jackson Lake rights it is likely that the bottom half of Jackson Lake will fill and perhaps some water may accumulate for the top rights. There is no likelihood of the top rights at Jackson Lake being filled in full.

FINLAND REVIEWS YEAR AFTER WAR

Acute Problems Still Confront Nation That Preserved Independence

NEW YORK, March 12.—The Russo-Finnish war was concluded a year ago today, March 12. After 105 days of bitter fighting, Finland, with 650,000 people, and 50 to 1, Finland saved a peace treaty which ended the Soviet attack.

Ten per cent of her total land area, including 625,000 acres of forest and 650,000 acres or 10 per cent of her entire arable land. Four hundred thirty-three industrial establishments with an output of 10 per cent of Finland's entire industry.

One hundred power plants representing 20 per cent of Finland's power development.

Sixty per cent of Finland's railway network.

In the war 22,000 Finns lost their lives; 44,000 were wounded, of which 10,000 are permanently disabled. Five hundred thousand were made homeless, including 450,000 refugees from enemy territory who left their homes so as to live within the new Finnish borders.

There were 39,000 farms in enemy territory and 22,000 in Finland. These farms yielded the following commodities:

Wheat, 12 per cent; rye, 10; per cent; corn, 8 per cent; oats, 8; per cent; potatoes, 11 per cent.

Great numbers of cattle, pigs and sheep were lost, or slaughtered because of the lack of imported fodder.

Most Cherished Possession
The dove was heavy, but the Finns preserved their most cherished possession—their independence.

Today, Finland faces acute problems. The first is food, the second finance. The 1940 harvest was far below the annual average yield. Nor-

mal Finland imports 20 per cent of its food supply. All foodstuffs are rationed. For example, it was reduced in April to 6 1/2 ounces a week. It ounces a week of butter and margarine together, about 1 pound 10 ounces a month; coffee, 3 pound every two months.

Further reduction in all rationed commodities for the purpose of food are obtained and an additional 10 per cent of the minimum diet as set up by the United States department of agriculture and its many items are below the department's standard of an emergency diet level.

During the Russo-Finnish war, Finland borrowed \$30,000,000 from the United States. This credit is now exhausted and an additional loan will doubtless be necessary if Finland is to survive. Great Britain has recognized Finland's free and independent status by opening the block-

ade to permit Finnish merchant marine freights to travel from the Baltic to open ports of Petsamo on the United States.

Despite a lack of funds and material, evidence of recovery are seen everywhere in Finland, and the government, dramatically, has volunteered labor, has raised thousands of new farms for the evacuees. Plans for new power plants and factories, post facilities, roads and railroads have been developed and require only financing to be carried to completion. Vocational training classes have been started for the disabled and a special, but inadequate pension system has been introduced for war veterans.

Aided by the help that far received, the Finns are going forward, working with increased energy to rebuild their war-torn land and to develop the future of her Finland.

NUMBER OF IDAHO FARMS INCREASES

Census Records Agricultural Trends, Land Values Decline

WASHINGTON, March 12 (AP)—The number of farms in Idaho increased 4.8 per cent to 43,653 in the decade ending April 1, 1940, but value of all farm real estate declined 24,973 in 1930 to \$330,194,331 in 1940.

These figures were released in the census bureau preliminary report on Idaho agriculture, taken from the 1940 census. Average acreage per farm increased from 224.3 in 1930 to 235.8 in 1940, but average value of the Idaho farm decreased in the same period by almost \$2,000 and average value per acre decreased from \$44.04 to \$32.84.

Cattle, hogs and pigs on Idaho farms showed an increase, chickens remained almost the same, and all other farm animals decreased in number.

All farm crops except wheat and corn increased in both area and bushels harvested, although the total amount of farm land in use for crops decreased.

Acreage of plowable pasture doubled in the decade, and an increase of 100,000 acres was recorded in cropland idle or fallow.

The increase in number of farms was only slightly higher than the increase in the number of farms operated by owners. An increase of 600 in the number of farms operated by tenants was offset by decreases totaling almost as much in the number operated by managers, operators or part owners.

Total acreage of Idaho farms increased from 9,546,908 acres to 10,297,745 acres during the decade, the report shows.

The Literary Guidepost

By JOHN SELBY
"Finland Forever" by Hudson Strode (Harcourt, Brace, \$3.50). Hudson Strode is one of the most remarkable writers of our time. At least four novels have been published which were written by students while still in his college days. His writing at the University of Alabama. His way with talent, his choice of words, his style, his sense of rhythm is offering a prize of \$1,000 to be competed for by this same class. Yet so far as I know Mr. Strode himself has never done a novel. His three travel books, including "Finland Forever," which he published last year. And in addition an anthology of English lyrics. But no long fiction. "Finland Forever" is rather a remarkable book because it actually does what it sets out to do, and that is to explain how Finland is the size of California, with a population about equal to Missouri, and how she has lived through 20 years of the Russian domination, and even then to be strong enough to resist the Russian domination. It is an exasperatingly long book, but every one who reads it will find it well worth the time. Mr. Strode and his wife, wife, visited Finland last year, and it is every body of importance in Finland and most of the remainder of the population. They traveled the length of the land—it being mostly level. They saw Laps and Sibelius, Mannheimer and factory laborers, all of them just a few months before the disaster fell upon the land. Some of their interviews were abortive, notably the Sibelius interview. Yet even then it is the author's interest in a picture that is so helpful.

Failure to Make Will One Way To Make Survivors Trouble

MINNAPOLIS, March 12—One out of three middle class American households that he needs to make a will, but can't get around to doing it. One out of five actually has made a will, and one out of six feels his estate doesn't amount to enough to warrant making a will. An inquiry to \$5,000 of his ordinary policyholders made by Northwestern National Life Insurance company also revealed that a necessity for other trip cases more people to make wills than any other type of life insurance, with 75 per cent of those without wills reported more than \$10,000 each in property

rather than life insurance—more than half of these knew they needed to make wills but were still putting it off. Of those who had made wills, the average estate amounted to \$16,633 in life insurance and \$10,470 worth of other property, the study shows. Contrary to general impression, a change in physical health was found to be one of the minor influences causing less than three per cent of wills to be made. Making a will is not necessarily advisable, simply because one owns some property, the report points out, but on the other hand the existence of a will would in many cases avoid unfortunate and costly tangles; it is always best to consult a reputable attorney both as to whether a will needs to be made, and for assistance in making the actual will. "Household" wills are a fertile source of trouble and unhappiness; owners of estates of between \$1,000 and \$10,000 in value are the worst offenders in this respect. A number of picturesque reasons were given by individual respondents to the inquiry, in explaining why they had not made wills. Among the most interesting were such as these: "Want to make all trouble possible for wife"; "Waiting for children to develop business ability"; "Family lot all in the Australian stock"; "Just didn't like it"; "This 'shillies' client had \$12,000 of insurance and \$40,000 worth of other property; and intended to let them fight over my things." 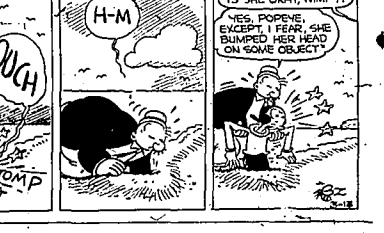

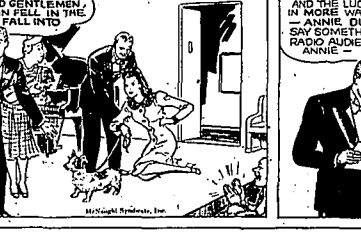

Called for Settlement
The state board of control decided to take action under the provisions of the situation, and Grider, in referring the problem back to the district, called for a speedy settlement.

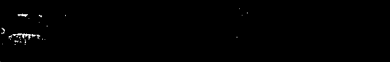

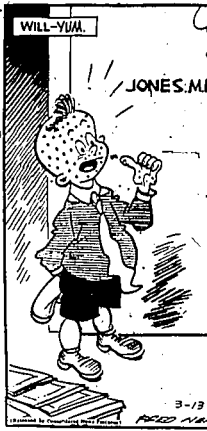
