

F. D. R. STUDIES NEW PLAN TO HALT STRIKES

Vinson Declares Labor Disputes Cut Deeply Into Defense Production; Knox Sees No Reason for Alarm

(By The Associated Press) A plan for a federal board to mediate labor disputes was presented to President Roosevelt yesterday with the backing of administrators in labor and defense production officials.

In congress, meantime, differing views were heard as to the effect of strikes on defense production, and elsewhere there were these developments: Relations between 60,000 soft coal miners and principal mine owners for a new operating contract reached an apparent impasse.

Prospects for settlement of a transportation strike in New York City brightened with resumption of negotiations between union and company representatives. The strike involving two bus lines employing 5,500, was called by the CIO Thursday.

Day-long conferences failed to produce an agreement but Mayor F. H. LaGuardia said negotiations continue today. Secretary of Labor Perkins, William S. Knudsen, director of defense production, and Sidney Hillman, labor society director, took the plan for a federal mediation board to the White House.

# GOVERNOR'S VETO KILLS FOUR BILLS

## Crops Director, Brand Inspector, Tenant Eviction Get Axe

BOISE, March 13 (AP)—Governor Clark today vetoed four bills approved by the 1941 Idaho legislature, including one which would have set up the office of fresh fruit and vegetables director, and another which called for creation of a tenant committee to survey the state's educational needs.

A third measure disapproved by the governor would have created the office of state brand inspector and another vetoed bill provided landlords might take immediate possession of property upon filing a complaint against a tenant, through a writ of possession issued by a judge or justice.

Tenant Eviction Governor Clark vetoed in the latter measure.

"This bill permits a landlord to dispossess a tenant almost indefinitely upon filing a complaint against the tenant in an action in unlawful detainer. Although the plaintiff would be required to file a bond before ousting the tenant, the bond would be poor comfort for the wife and children, who could be turned out into the cold of winter, in spite of unemployment, sickness, or even death in the family."

"The landlord is already permitted to obtain judgment for three times the amount of damages sustained by the landlord, in addition to his rent."

"I am not entirely unimpressed of the problems of the landlord, but he has the facilities to know the tenant's financial status before he rents to him. If he makes a bad bargain, he should not be permitted to oust helpless women and children at any season of the year."

# Activity Set for Navy Substations

Part-time naval recruiting substations at Burley and Oshoda will be open for applicants next week, according to C. A. Edmonson, officer in charge of the Twin Falls station.

# IDAHO CONTINUES CROPS PUBLICITY

## Advertising Commission Under New Head to Draft Two-Year Program

BOISE, March 13 (AP)—Promotion of Idaho potatoes and onions in market centers of the nation will be carried on by the Idaho advertising commission during 1941-42 in much the same manner as in the past, Chairman James C. Newport said today.

Newport, state agriculture commissioner, said the commission would meet April 4, either in Postville or Boise, to draw up plans for the biennium.

"We may change our procedure somewhat," the commissioner added. "The emphasis has been on newspaper and other means of advertising and we may modify that policy."

Win Cline, head of Cline Advertising Service in Boise, has been counselor to the commission, which has employed two and sometimes three fieldmen for dealer promotion work in the larger market centers.

Three bills that would have affected the commission materially died in the legislature.

One would have abolished it entirely, another would have provided for a new commission set-up having to do only with potatoes and the third would have increased the present assessment of one-half cent per hundredweight to one cent.

The commission was authorized by the 1937 legislature but its constitutionality was questioned and the question was before the courts until late in 1938.

IDAHO NEW LAWS LIST INCREASES

Governor's Action on Proposed Legislation Summarized

HOUSE: March 13 (4)—Included in bills enacted by the 1934 legislature and signed by Governor Clark are the following:
Transferring the powers and duties of the tax commissioner to the state auditor.
Abolishing the compensation insurance commission of the state in manner and kind providing for a manager.
Providing a general ledger system for the state.
Abolishing the liquor commission and providing for a single superintendent.
Abolishing the department of public health and creating the department of public health and charitable institutions.
Providing for the election of one state representative for each 12,500 persons instead of for each 10,000 as formerly.
Providing that income of residents of the state derived from sources outside the state need not be included in income tax returns.
Senate:
Increasing the governor's salary from \$5,000 to \$7,500 annually in 1935.
Increasing fees for examination of ditches or canals by department of reclamation.
Setting factors for offsetting their license tax against income tax and another forbidding gasoline and oil dealers from offsetting the toll bridge levy against income tax.
Establishing a modern bookkeeping system in the state auditor's office.
Four bills establishing June 30 rather than Dec. 31 as the end of the fiscal year for counties with federal practice.
Permission to include federal income taxes paid on the federal income tax returns from the Idaho state probate court to procure bills for all accounts in the state.
Provision for placing names of presidential and vice presidential candidates on the ballot and for voting all four presidential electors in one square.
Attainment by the board of examiners at six-month intervals of the various departments' appropriations.
Creation of state tuberculosis hospital at Gooding (look at special section for pre-proposal agreement between Idaho and Utah on Bear Lake fishing.
Authorization of \$25,000 for legislators' food and lodging expense.
And \$500 for similar expenses of the lieutenant governor during the 90-day session.
Vetted Bills:
Bills vetoed by the governor include:
Setting up the office of fresh fruit and vegetable director and financing it by a levy of 50 cents per car of produce shipped.
Breathing the office of state brand inspector in the department of law enforcement.
Requiring the commissioner of law enforcement to revoke the license of any beer retailer convicted of selling hard liquor.
Making the bureau of insurance, now under the finance department, a separate department under a commissioner.
The "anti-loan shank" bill limiting interest charges by small loan companies to 3 per cent per month.
Establishing a state mining securities board.
Senate:
Requiring certain mining concerns to post surety bonds guaranteeing water of laborers.
Increasing the salary of the governor from \$5,000 to \$7,500 annually, effective in 1934 (Passed over veto).
Allowing school districts to raise their bonds held by the state before maturity, in order to take advantage of lower interest rates.
Providing for an educational survey.
