Greeks Prepare to Hurl 500,000 Against German Invasion; British Seize Ethiopian Fortress

Britain's campaign to defend the Greeks from probable German attack and to harden Yugoslavia in her reluctance to become a way for Nazi conquest was reported strengthened yesterday by the arrival in Greece of American-built warplanes.

RAF Bombs Fall On U-Boat Bases

British Announce Effective Attacks on Kiel and Wilhelmshaven

LONDON, March 19 (AP)—Kiel and Wilhelmshaven—German submarine bases—were subjected to violent and effective overnight bombardments, the British air ministry news service announced tonight because they play such vital roles in the life-or-death battle of the Atlantic.

The attack was mostly unfavorable, with haze and clouds, but the news service announced: "By skillful navigation and persistence, in the face of fierce barrages over both towns, our aircraft were able to drop great loads of high explosives and incendiary bombs on docks, ship-building yards and industrial centers of these two ports."

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JOHNSTON AND DUNN 'AMAZED'

'Unauthenticated Confession of No Benefit,' Attorney Declares

Duncan Johnston, former Twin Falls mayor twice convicted and sentenced to the institution for the crime of George L. Olson, Salt Lake City jewelry salesman, declared in the county jail here yesterday he was "amazed" by the report of an unnamed "confession" of the murder mailed to Governor Clark of Idaho from Klamath Falls, Ore.

His attorney, Bill Dunn, and I are amazed at the whole thing," Johnston said. "I don't know what this statement is."

"Unauthenticated as it is, the so-called confession of no benefit wholly refutes Johnston's confession," the prosecutor of Johnston "at both trials, Edward Babcock, former county attorney, said in a statement which is a witness at both trials, pointed out what he termed discrepancies in Johnston's confession. He said the confession indicated the killer had used Olson's gun whereas evidence was that Johnston was the owner of the weapon. He said there was no indication in the confession that Johnston was in the car in which Olson's body was found. He said that Johnston's jewelry store was not accounted for, whereas the purported confession stated that Johnston had pitched one key over a bridge near the hospital here.

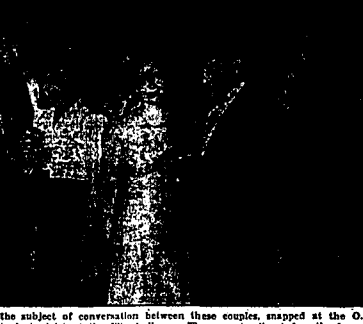

1/4 teaspoon salt
1 egg
1/2 cup milk

Get the butter by creaming. Then add sugar, unbeaten eggs, milk, vanilla extract, and the dry ingredients which have been sifted together. Top-of-the-Range Dinner Planned for Emergency

A buffet lunch on your kitchen range. It can happen, especially when you must interrupt your special baking job to get a meal. All will go smoothly, however, if you make the meal one that can be cooked entirely on top of the range, leaving the oven free for baking. Here's a menu for just such an emergency. MODERN RANGES SAVE VITAMINS

We have been pretty thoroughly convinced that vegetables are a necessary and important part of the diet. But sometimes it's a struggle to get-just-to eat his share of the spinach, and all too often Dad asserts that he's perfectly satisfied with meat, potatoes, gravy and bread.

The food value of vegetables may be completely lost if they are cooked in a way which destroys vitamins. Causes strong vegetables to become bitter, mild ones unpalatable; strong vegetables darken and green ones lose their color with too long cooking. Cooking in a large amount of water means that precious vitamins are poured away when this excess water is drained off.

To preserve food value, flavor, and appearance, vegetables should be cooked in the shortest possible time and in the smallest amount of water. The surface units of the modern electric ranges have been designed to fit that purpose. Five flexible speeds on each surface unit insure top-of-the-line cooking at controlled heat; from very low heat for cooking "au gratin" or cheese, to the heat needed for frying. Intermediate heats provide for different cooking requirements and for using them in a variety of ways.

For most vegetables, clean and cut the vegetables in pieces for serving. Place in saucepan with 1 cup water. Add salt and cover lightly. Turn switch to "high" or "low" heat. Turn switch to "off" or "low" for balance of time. If you want to keep them like this retain their fresh color and flavor; no food value is lost, because there is no liquid to pour away when it's an economical method of cooking, too. Actually, only a very little extra water is needed to be turned off 10 to 15 minutes before cooking is completed.

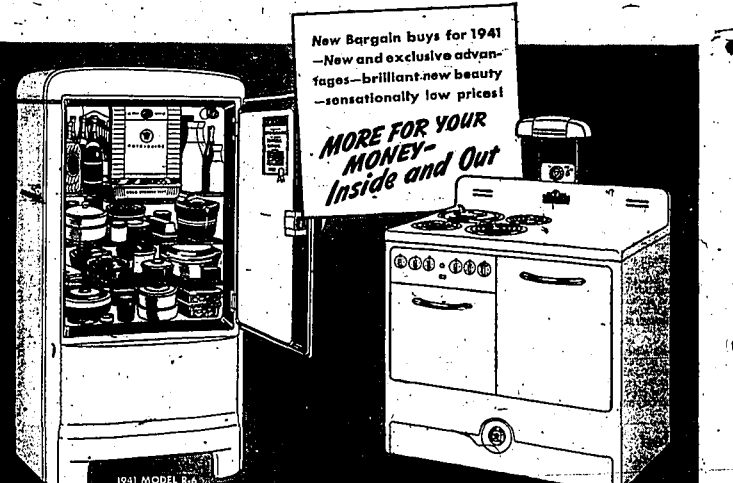

MANY MEATS FIT ECONOMY BUDGET

Winter goes under the deadline, taxes are due, the war-bill has that off-season look—but why go further? Every homemaker knows there are clamps on her budget.

A secret of keeping economy meals nutritionally sound is to put them on, you do all other meals—what meat is the center? Many cuts of meat fit an economy budget. While low in price they are still high in food value, and a boost to the palatability of the meal.

Most economical cuts of meat may not be the most familiar. In fact, because they are less-known and therefore less-demanded, they are more economically priced. A thrifty homemaker takes advantage of this lack of supply and demand and makes the least-demanded cuts into delicious meals for her family.

Short Ribs
Short ribs of beef are an example of delicious economy. Where's the man that doesn't consider short ribs a treat—just watch the orders in a restaurant when short ribs are on the menu. Why not have them at home? Short ribs are cut from ends of ribs and are best when braised.

To braise, brown the meat in a little fat, add a small amount of water, cover and cook until tender.

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Lamb Shank
Lamb shanks make another dish which furnishes definite proof that economy cuts of meat can be as tempting as the more popular cuts.

Stuffed Lamb Shanks
Brown lamb shanks in hot fat, add several cups water; season with salt and pepper. Cover the shanks, simmer until tender, about one and a half hours. Take the meat from the broth and when cool enough to handle, remove the bones. Cook one-fourth pound of barley in the lamb broth. You may have to add a little more water if the broth has cooled down considerably.

Stuff the boned shanks with cooked barley and thicken the remaining lamb broth. Add the stuffed shanks, cover and heat thoroughly.

Explore the Meat Market
There are many other attractive dishes made from the less-demanded cuts of meat. It is important to become acquainted with these cuts and to make them a familiar part of the menu. You can do this by exploring the meat market; studying charts which show the cuts of beef, veal, pork, or lamb, and by making a conscious effort to try those cuts which are often overlooked. Go exploring for valuable discoveries.

LEFTOVER HINT
This leftover hint is pleasing to the budget. Bake four potatoes in halves, remove and mash the pulp. Mix any leftover vegetable, meat, gravy or sauce with the potatoes, add seasonings, an egg, a little cream and some chopped barley. Re-fill the potato cases and cover with thin slices of cheese. Bake 15 minutes in a moderate oven.

SANDWICH FILLER
Chopped dried apricots, with equal portions of chopped roasted peanuts and white cream or cottage cheese, make a wholesome, appealing filling for white or chicken bread sandwiches. Put some in the winter lunches that go to school or office.

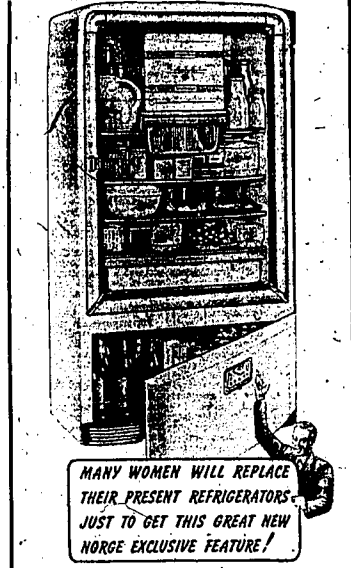

MODERN RANGES SAVE VITAMINS

We have been pretty thoroughly convinced that vegetables are a necessary and important part of diet. But sometimes it is a struggle to get Junior to eat his carrots, and the spinach, and all too often Dad asserts that he's perfectly satisfied with his potatoes, gravy and beef.

Perhaps just changing the method of preparing and serving them is all that is needed to attract the family's interest in vegetables.

The food value of vegetables may be easily depleted and flavor and appearance spoiled by the method of cooking. Over-cooking, steaming, blanching, causing strong vegetables to become bitter, mild ones insipid; steaming vegetables in water, which causes loss of their color with too long cooking. Cooking in a large amount of water means that precious nutrients are poured away when this excess water is drained off.

Five Speeds To preserve food value, flavor, and appearance, vegetables should be cooked in the smallest amount of water. The surface units of the modern electric ranges have been designed to fit that purpose. Five flexible speeds on each surface unit allow you to cook your vegetables on controlled heat, from very low heat to searing, broiling, or even on the high we need for frying; intermediate heats provide for different cooking requirements and for utensils of various sizes.

For most vegetables, drain and cut the vegetable in slices for serving. Place in saucpan with 1/2 cup water. Add salt and cover lightly. Turn switch to "High" and cook 15 minutes. Vegetables steam freely. Turn switch to "off".

For a modern electric range, the cooking time. Vegetables cooked like this retain their fresh color and their natural value in food because there's no liquid to pour away, and it's an economical method of cooking. As your range cooks on a low current is consumed; it can be turned off in 10 or 15 minutes before cooking is completed.

If carrots have been too popular in your home, they are a permanent place in the family kitchen if they're served like this:

Roast Carrots. Wash, trim and cut into uniform, medium size. Scrub and wash thoroughly. Cut into uniform pieces. Boil in 2 1/2 cup water. Season with salt, cover, turn switch to high until the water is boiling. Turn switch to "High" and cook 15 minutes, depending on the quantity you're cooking. Turn off current and allow to stand in saucepan 5 minutes. Roll carrots in melted butter, then in crumbled cornflakes. Place in a modern electric range. Turn switch just enough to brown the crumbs slightly.

There's a pleasant contrast in textures between the soft, cooked carrots and the crisp crumbs. Turn the switch to "off" and allow to stand until you serve them. Give the carrots a touch of relish by inserting a sprig of parsley in the center of each. For variety, roll the carrots in finely chopped milk leaves instead of crumbs, or serve (without browning) with roast lamb.

This Dinner Can Wait -- If Guests Are Late

"Never wait longer than half an hour for any dinner guest," says one prominent social authority. But, oh, what havoc can be wrought on a perfect meal in even that brief time! The vegetables cool and wilt; the meat dries out; and as for the hostess, absent herself to see to it that the tardy guest does arrive, the hostess must absent herself to see to it and reheat the food before she can serve.

If you're a very smart hostess, you will frankly admit that sometimes it's better to have an early dinner that can take waiting brilliantly in the air. Particularly then, are you fortunate if you have in your kitchen one of the special warming ovens that are a part of the modern electric range. You see, these new warming ovens have a serving drawer (irradiation that holds the temperature of food, keeping it hot enough for serving until the fear of burning is past, ready to serve, moreover, the hot main dish and vegetable as shown in the photograph) can be taken out from this electrically heated warming compartment to the dinner or buffet table.

HOW TO SERVE IDAHO POTATOES

The Idaho potato—lastly in any form—is found all the best when mashed or baked, and here are recommended methods for these types of preparation—

To secure maximum food value of Idaho Russet potatoes, scrub, place in extremely hot water, cover with a little water and salt; cover tightly, and steam gently until potatoes are tender. Drain, and dry gently over low heat. Peel, put through a ricer, and mix with warm milk, whip until light and fluffy.

Peel Idaho Russets; peel uniformly sized Idaho Russet and cut in half or quarter lengthwise. Place in heavy cooking utensil, add small amount of cold water and cover tightly. Bring rapidly to a boil, reduce heat, and simmer until tender when pierced with a fork. Never overcook. Remove lid, drain, dry gently over low heat. Wash. Add butter and hot milk; whip until light and fluffy.

First step in preparing baked Idaho Russet is to scrub uniformly sized Idaho Russet potatoes thoroughly dry. If a cold, tender skin, rather than a crisp, crumbly tender skin, that makes work with them, place the potatoes in a broiled oven, bring the oven temperature up to 450 degrees, and bake until the potatoes are tender when poked (about an hour and 20 minutes from the time the potatoes are placed in the oven).

Exhaustive comparative tests prove that the Idaho Russet baked potato, started in a cold oven, baked 20 minutes in a 450 degree oven, and a shade better flavored. Lamb shanks make another dish which furnishes definite proof that economy cuts of meat can be as tempting as the more popular cuts. I think you'd like them braised and stuffed with bean salad.

Stuffed Lamb Shanks—Brown lamb shanks in hot fat; add several cups water, season with salt and pepper. Cover the shanks; let simmer until tender, about one and a half hours. Take the meat from the broth and when cool enough to handle, remove the bones. Cook one-fourth pound of barley in the lamb broth. You may have to add a little more water if the broth has cooled down considerably.

Stuff the boned shanks with cooked barley and thickened, remaining lamb broth. Add the stuffed shanks, cover and heat thoroughly.

Explore the Meat Market—There are many other attractive dishes made from the less-demanded cuts of meat. It is important to become acquainted with these cuts and to make them a familiar part of the menu. You can do this by exploring the meat market, studying charts which show the cuts of beef, veal, pork, or lamb, and by making a conscientious effort to try those cuts which are different. Go exploring for valuable discoveries.

LEFTOVER HINT—This leftover hint is pleasing to the budget. Bake four potato cakes in halves, remove and mash the pulp. Mix any leftover vegetable, meat, gravy or sauce with the potatoes, add seasonings, an egg, a little cream and some cheddar parsley. Refill the potato cakes and cover with thin slices of cheese. Bake 15 minutes in a moderate oven.

SANDWICH FILLER—Chopped dried apricots, with equal portions of chopped peanuts and white cream or cottage cheese, make a wholesome, appealing filling for white or chicken bread sandwiches. Put some in the winter lunches that go to school or office.

Pork Chops Country Style are an old-fashioned dish, and as tempting, if not more so, as any other favorite can be.

Pork Chops Country Style (Serves 4)
5 lamb pork chops
3 tablespoons fat
1 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon salt
1 small onion (minced)
1/2 cup rich milk

Dredge chops with flour, season with salt and pepper, turn electric switch to high, and brown well in hot fat in a heavy skillet or electric fryer. Add minced onion when chops are turned. Add milk, cover, and turn electric switch to low, or simmer, for about one hour.

Housekeeping Hints
A little vinegar put into many of the washing aluminum pans helps keep them bright. Two tablespoons of vinegar for each quart of water is enough.

Sprinkle grated cheese over the top of escalloped chicken or chicken pot pie during the last 15 minutes of the baking period.

Add a speck of sugar to the water when cooking corn, peas or carrots. The vegetables will have a little better flavor.

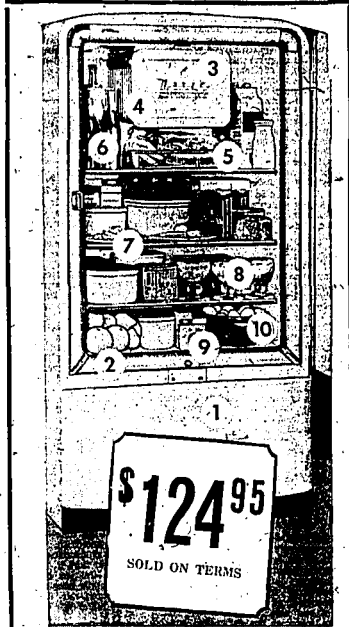

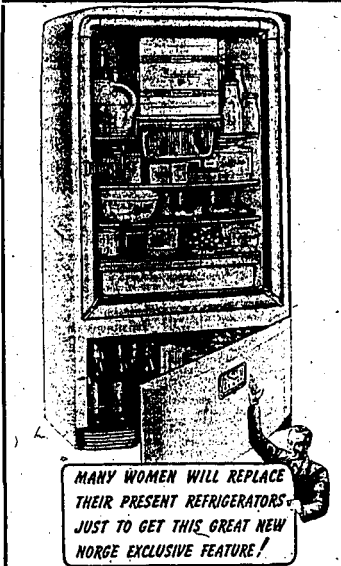

HEMISPHERE LINE WILL BE ELASTIC

WASHINGTON—What are the boundaries of the western hemisphere?

Proposals in Congress to restrict the use of American soldiers, sailors and marines to that area made its geographical definition a timely problem for those concerned with the formulation of national and foreign policy.

It appears that representatives never have been in agreement on hemisphere limits and appear to be near a solution today.

The administration was understood to favor a "common sense" definition. Defense of the hemisphere, it was said, would mean defense efforts even beyond those which the makers of school textbooks consider a part of the hemisphere.

For example, the question whether Iceland of the Azores islands are within the hemisphere might be simple to a geographer but in question of national defense they might become of highest importance.

Geographers at odds

Geographers always have disagreed over the dividing line in the Atlantic where Iceland is concerned. That pole has included the Azores in the western hemisphere.

Because the question has assumed such national importance, the Azores and geographical societies ally away from it. Samuel W. Boggs, state department geographer, does not discuss it. His official position bars him from talking on such a highly controversial subject. But his opinion undoubtedly will carry weight when an official definition is called for.

Last spring Boggs, in answer to a request from Rep. Edith Neenan Rogers, Republican, Massachusetts, wrote that the "western hemisphere" was an "indefinite term." But, he added, it is commonly understood to include continents and islands of North America and South America and the West Indies.

Baseline not rigid

The baseline which the 180th degree longitude is, does not stretch to the east to keep New Zealand in the eastern hemisphere. It swings eastward again to avoid chopping off a piece of Siberia and runs between big and tiny islands—the dividing point between Asia and the United States in Alaska.

The Pacific dividing line leaves Guam and Wake islands out of the hemisphere but brings in the Philippines and Samoa area to receive defense improvements under new legislation.

The noted explorer Vilhjalmur Stefansson recently visited the dividing line which would include all Iceland with Greenland. Iceland is only 120 miles east of Norway but 650 miles west of the nearest European mainland in Norway. Otherwise, Stefansson would run the line down halfway between the main coastline of the Americas and the main coastline of Europe and Africa.

Knowing that nothing like it would ever happen to him, the ordinary man can still remain happy and chuckle when a newsworthy picture on the screen of "old Winston" showing him as a gangplank, as the party's younger men pant breathlessly behind. Or laugh when he hears some news item which the papers would neither let him see nor show—showing him as a young man in a blue coat and white shirt.

Star Role in Great Drama

- Combine the meat, salt, pepper, onion and mustard. Shape into thick cakes, and wrap each cake with a strip of bacon. Fasten with toothpicks. Broil in broiler. Cut slices of Bermuda onion about 1/2-inch thick. Soak in cold water for about 20 minutes. Drain, brush with melted butter, and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Place on broiler pan. Place broiler rack in the oven, so that the food is about 3 inches from the broiling unit. Broil for about 15 minutes, turning the food once. When the meat patties are well browned and the onion is crisp, place stuffed potatoes on the rack, and return to broiler just long enough to melt and brown the cheese.

- Grilled Stuffed Potatoes**
- Cut baked potatoes lengthwise, and scoop out the potato.
 - Mash, and add a little hot milk, salt, pepper and butter. Beat thoroughly, and pile lightly on potato shells.
 - Top with grated cheese. Broil just long enough to melt the cheese.
 - For perfectly delicious variety, sprinkle broiled cakes of ground beef with melted butter, and crumbled Roquefort cheese, and return to broiler just long enough to melt the cheese.

NIGHT SCHOOLING HELPS AUSTRALIA

MELBOURNE—Down the cellars of a city grows a volunteer teacher is giving lesson on two or three nights to the most eager group of students he has ever taught.

He is one of 647 honorary instructors and his pupils are some of the most brilliant in Australia. He is taking part in what has been described as "the biggest experiment in democratic education ever undertaken in Australia."

This is the scheme by which R.A.A. recruits well-known scientists for training receive an unimpaired course in algebra, arithmetic, geometry, mechanics, and physics to bring them up to the standard required for initial air force training.

Through the course, wastage of men who otherwise would be unable to get through their training because of educational lag, has been reduced, time required for training slightly reduced, and the field of recruiting widened.

Each teaching unit is honorary, with a budget allowance from the A.A.P. for incidental expenditure of \$300 a month. Total expenditure since the scheme began in Victoria in June, following an earlier start in New South Wales is \$750. Estimated value of the service for the first six months is \$100,000.

In Victoria the state branches of the Institute of Engineers and the Mathematical Association, with the excellent teachers, Union and the Incorporated Association of Registered Teachers of Victoria, offered to start a training scheme. Later they were joined by the Catholic Educational Office, Communist Postmaster's Association, Melbourne Swimming Club, and many private helpers.

Push of Offers

On June 10, 15 days after it began, the rush of offers of assistance had grown to such proportions that two motor cars were needed to carry them.

Now the scheme extends to 147 centers, of which 34 are in Melbourne, approximately 800 students have been passed through and called up for service, and a pool has been formed of 170 officers who have finished the course and are waiting to be called up. In addition to the 647 teachers, a staff of 228 has provided clerical assistance. Several teaching began. Most instructors were advised to work three nights a week for two hours a night, from 7:30 to 9:30 p. m.

Passing the course is not just a formality. There are five different examinations involving 600 papers, before a man is accredited with a pass.

NEWEST COLOR PLEASES BOYS

No one is ever too young for good taste in apparel, and boys are no exception. 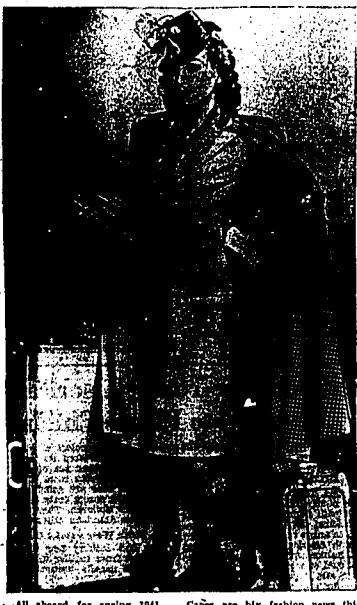

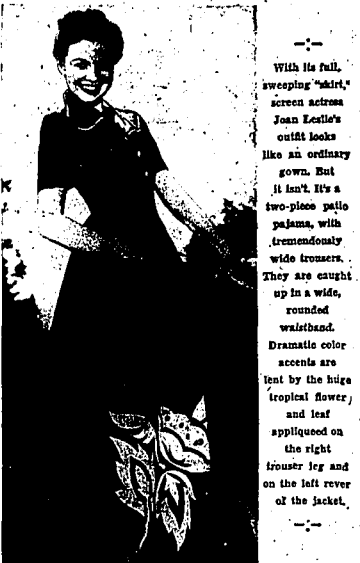

CORRECT SHOES GIVE COMFORT

NEW YORK—The most expensive pair of shoes in a man's wardrobe, is the "cheap" pair he bought to be economical, and then hid in a dark corner because they weren't right for his feet; were shod together and irritate his soles or weren't fitted properly because they look a "meh!" attitude, and didn't permit the salesman to take the necessary time for really accurate fitting.

It is not necessary to spend a lot of money for shoes; but it is important to know they're comfortable well made to give a season's full wear — or more — retaining their shapeless; that they're flexible and will therefore be comfortable; that they're made of seasoned leathers which won't "bite" or "sting"; and that they're fitted to the foot-type of the wearer, even if "the style in the window" isn't the right one for him!

Many styles
There's so much variety in men's shoe styles this spring, that the shoe wardrobe must be selected with the idea in mind — what kind of clothing is each pair of shoes to be worn; what kind of activities must they provide their stylishness and comfort for?

In town shoes, there is the wing tip model, new this season in two finishes of leather—one dull, one highly polished; there's the straight tip shoe, plain or perforated, and there's the refined blucher moccasin which is being accepted more and more as a city type.

In country shoes, there is the cream colored buckskin shoe, usually light, or combined with tan or black calf; the perforated novelty moccasin usually combining two rather light shades of tan calf; the rugged moccasin, with well worn construction and gum rubber sole and heel; the reverse calf shoe in perfectly plain, or novelty wing tip variations; and lastly the actual play shoe.

Newest note in suits, which might have come into their own, is the definite trend to flary skirts, even to the more tailored. 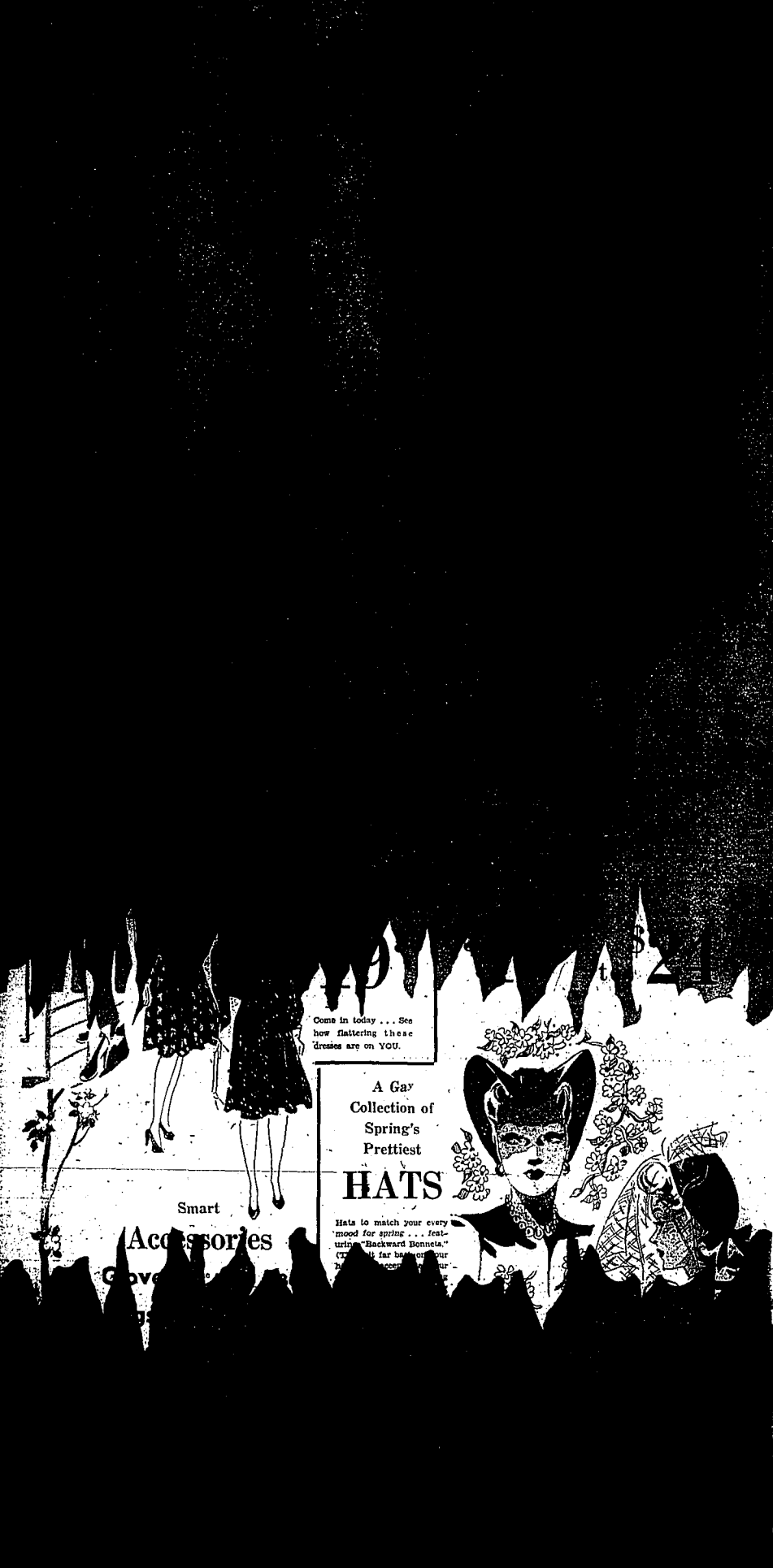
