In proclaiming the week, Mayor Koehler declared: "I hereby call upon you to contribute your scrap aluminum in the National Defense program."

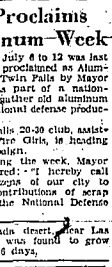

JURY SOUGHT IN MURDER ACTION

Trial Opens for Accused Jerome Handyman; Call 30 More Men

JEROME, June 30—With one 27-man jury panel exhausted during the opening day of the trial of James J. Roberts in the murder-charged Jerome handyman and fruit peddler, 30 more prospective jurors were called to appear Tuesday morning when proceedings closed this afternoon in district court here.

Rehearing is charged with shooting Stanley Henry Ciano, Jerome, last April 19 during an altercation in the street between the two.

With Richard H. Seely, prosecuting attorney, representing the state, assisted by Robert M. Kerr, assistant attorney general from Boise, and James and James, law partners; appearing for the defendant, the long process of empanelling a jury opened this morning. A number of jurors were excused when they indicated that irrigation and other duties found the afternoon court hearing, while several were also eliminated by questioning of attorneys.

The state exercised 20 peremptory challenges and the defense a like number, and three jurors were excused for cause.

When proceedings closed this afternoon there were still 11 potential jurors in the jury box.

Giving a possible hint of the defense planned were questions placed by the state's attorney, Robert M. Kerr, who asked the jurors if they were opposed to use of a deadly weapon in self defense.

Only a scattering of persons appeared in the courtroom for the trial, but the number of interested spectators is expected to increase after the preliminary hearing is held.

Robert M. Kerr, prosecuting attorney, has been held in the jail since he was arrested on the early afternoon of April 19 while walking toward the home of the victim, Stanley Henry Ciano, who was shot in the street between the homes of the men. The shooting, according to authorities, is claimed to have grown out of a quarrel between the two men over a name which Robertson used during calling Ciano's wife. After Ciano had spoken to Robertson about the matter, he is charged with stepping to his nearby tent-like home and returning with a revolver with which he shot Ciano, who died soon after in a hospital.

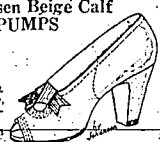
