

Idaho Uses Plane to Plant Trout in Sawtooth Region

Preparations Complete for Launching 200,000 Fish Into Waters of Rugged Stanley Basin Country

BOISE, July 8.—The Idaho fish and game department completed plans today for planting approximately 200,000 three-pound and eastern brook trout by airplane in the rugged Stanley Basin country.

Burton Perrine, fish culturist for the department, announced the plantings will begin July 10 and will require about two days—depending on weather and flying conditions.

A plane owned by Lionel Dean of Twin Falls and piloted by Lamoine Stevens, also of Twin Falls, will be used on the project—as it was in 1939 when the game department made its first airplane plantings in the Sawtooth mountain area.

The plantings made in the Sawtooth region in 1939, although very small, have proved to be very satisfactory, Perrine said.

Streamlined fish "The loss of fish planted by this method in the experiment effected a 200 per cent increase in the fish—perfectly streamlined and light in weight—each three to four inches in length and weighing only one to one and a half pounds.

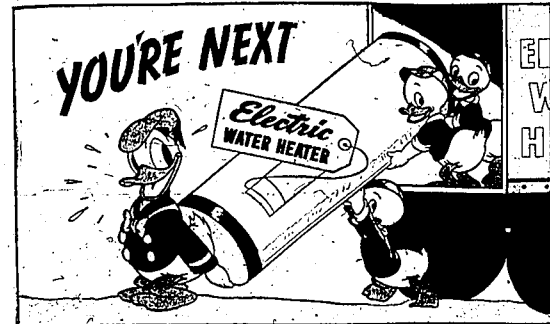

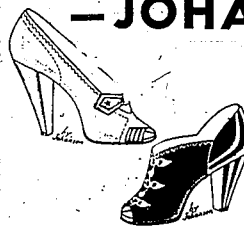
