

Germans Declare Kiev's Fall Near; Reds Score at Sea

Moscow and Leningrad Threatened By Reported Nazi Advance; Russians Suggest Reverses

(By The Associated Press) The Soviet command reported early today that German troops were being cut down in great numbers in violent fighting in the northwest, west and southwest, but for the first time avoid mention of any breakthrough in the battle lines.

The Nazis previously had claimed much progress in drives toward Kiev along the southwestern front; Moscow at the center and Leningrad to the north.

Russian Fight Desperately Moscow's early morning communique, which followed official reports of a victory down in the battle lines, was for 24 hours no substantial change in the Red positions, declared that Russian forces in some areas were counter-attacking repeatedly.

Operations at Sea The general invasion given was of a desperate, bitter Russian "in the west"—and all the Russian terminology was under-standable—the destruction of 100 Nazi tanks, along with a number of other vehicles, was claimed by the Soviet command.

On the southern front, capture of many cannon, machine-guns and automobiles was reported, along with a "capture for a German unit of 3,000 men."

As to the northwest theater no detail was given. In operations at sea, however, the Russians reported an unqualified success. They declared that two German destroyers, 15 loaded troop transporters and a landing force were sunk and that 13 other transports and an additional number of landing craft were sunk.

Authorized German spokesman said today that the fall of Kiev, the capital of the Ukraine, could be expected in about two weeks. Leningrad was caught in a sort of neck cracker maneuver; the German operations in the Baltic states were pushing on toward Moscow itself.

Kiev, it was declared, was heavily bombed and the rail system ceased to function. The city was surrounded by German forces and the latter were attacking from the north, east and south. The city was being pushed on toward Moscow itself.

Henderson Calls on People to Brace Selves for Dark Picture of Sacrifice, Goods Shortage, War on Inflation

(By The Associated Press) ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., July 14.—The American public was warned today by federal price administrator Leon Henderson to brace itself for a tomorrow for industrial distinction and through sacrifice.

"It is a dark picture I paint," Henderson told 1,200 attending the New York Housewives Manufacturing association convention as he predicted that shortly the recent boom in sales of automobiles, refrigerators, air conditioners, electric stoves, furniture and other household goods.

"I wish I could tell you that we had no war on inflation, that everything is going to be all right. I can't promise you any such thing. All I can tell you is that only by curbing luxury and tears can the dislocations be held to a minimum."

He said that the government was not to be crowding the market with new goods, but manufacturers will be unable to get enough raw materials to satisfy demand.

"This is a dark picture I paint. It is a picture of sacrifice made idle by lack of raw materials to turn out goods. In the meantime, the lack of materials to work with, of single industry towns, blighted by epidemic crop failures, and the dislocation of goods which we want to use or live in."

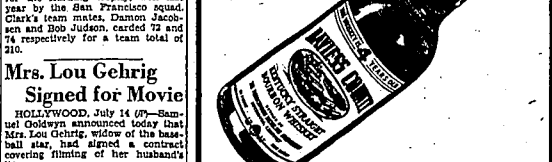

"The city is in sound financial condition, with all city general funds maintaining an adequate cash balance, with no registered warrants outstanding. All bond coupons presented have been paid, and the bond retired bonds amounting to \$35,000. The examination of the minutes of previous meetings indicates that council is in close touch with all matters pertaining to the city and that expenditures are being made within amounts appropriated." The report reads:

O. K. Reparis, two-monthly reports were approved by the council last night's session. Fire Chief L. Z. Zeke Bartlett, reviewing the month of June, pointed out that the fire department and three complaints were investigated. The first were one gas fire, one dwelling fire, one garage fire and one car fire, which were "put out" readily without damage.

Dr. E. R. Price, city meat and dairy inspector, inspected 415 pounds of fresh beef, 1147 pounds of sheep, condemning four carcasses and accepting three for distribution. Paris confinement totaled 217.
