# RAILMAN URGES UTAH'S ALUMINITE

### Union Pacific Official Assails Government Neglect of Resources

WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP)—Failure of the government agency to take advantage of possibilities for increased aluminum production through use of Utah aluminate was assailed by J. L. Haugh, vice president of the Union Pacific company, in a press statement today.

Haugh had testified earlier before the senate subcommittee on public lands, urging the government to develop western resources for national defense.

Red tape in Washington has prevented construction of aluminum plants in the west, he said.

Every effort should be made to get industries going in the west where they will bear the brunt of raw materials, he concluded.

# WILLKIE URGES DEFENSE ACTION

### Swift Move Advocated to Catch Hitler Off Guard

SAN FRANCISCO, July 25 (AP)—Wendell Willkie called for a positive defense against the Axis machine in an address prepared for a mass meeting here tonight.

Advocating an aggressive campaign of aid to Germany's enemies, the Republican presidential nominee declared that "we must read our lesson in the fate of other free people who found themselves unprepared to meet and stop the onslaught of Hitler."

"Hitler has challenged our freedom," said Willkie. "In defending it, we cannot wait in the corner for him to strike us. We must, on the contrary, strike our antagonist."

"The defense of freedom must be a positive thing. We must not be afraid to act, and we must be prepared to act swiftly and suddenly."

"We must not be afraid to give our president the necessary emergency powers which will enable him to act swiftly and suddenly."

"We must realize that these swift moves of our president are essential to our survival."

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He is suffering there, and for the chance given Britain and the United States, meanwhile, to strengthen themselves.

"For our aid to Britain—which the isolationists did not want us to deliver—has been the deciding factor in all this."

"Hitler's enormous gamble of invading Russia never would have happened if Britain and America had not been made strong by positive defense."

"Pointing out that a positive defense involved great sacrifice, Willkie called also for aid to China, to direct the efforts of Japan—and for doubling and redoubling American aid to Britain."

He emphatically contended that additional naval and air bases should be acquired to protect the supply lanes of the north Atlantic, and that ship and plane courses of the south Atlantic should be guaranteed to prevent German moves through Spain and Portugal.

"Totalitarianism will thus be sur-

rounded, blocked on all sides, and the Naaf flood, having reached its full, will begin to recede," he declared.

"History proves that such forces survive only in expansion."

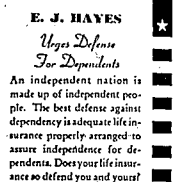
### Delayed Reports Tell of Destruction of Six Ships By Nazis

NEW YORK, July 24 (AP)—The destruction of six British and Dutch ships totaling \$12,234 tons, including the famous Holland-American liner Prinsendam, 16,282 tons, during the German conquest of Greece was disclosed today in delayed reports from the Mediterranean.

Actual British and Allied losses have been kept secret by censorship but one report said that close to 300,000 tons of shipping were destroyed by Axis planes operating in Argos bay.

The Prinsendam, well-known in the New York-Holland run before the war, was sunk with a loss of three lives two hours after leaving Pirana, British warships rescued 207 persons.

This reference was to a statement made yesterday by Gen. George C. 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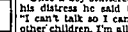

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### BRITAIN-BOUND PLANE CRASHES

#### Lockheed-Hudson Bomber Plunges Occupants to Fiery Death

MT. GLENN, July 24 (AP)—A roaring twin-engine Lockheed-Hudson bomber plane, bearing three British and apparently en route to Britain's fighting forces, plunged its occupants to fiery death today in a sunny Ohio cornfield.

Two bodies, buried beyond recognition, were recovered and a "bullet-buckle and wrist band bearing the name of R. F. Trush" were found in the wreckage.

State Highway Patrolman W. B. Corrier and he counted five bodies in the wreckage but as tractors attempted to drag the plane from a six foot hole made by the impact only two bodies were found.

The plane bore the markings "R. A. F. A-14-2602" on the wing and Corrier said the bomber's log indicated it was en route to Canada.

James E. Harrington, manager of the nearby Mansfield airport, said approximately 25 planes bearing similar "R. A. F." markings had passed northward over this north-central section of the state in the past few days.

Robert Van Sickle, a farmer near the crash scene, said he first saw the plane about 1,500 feet above the ground "weaving in the air" and emitting a whistling sound. Suddenly it banked to the left, dropped out of sight and exploded as it crashed, he reported. He could see flames shooting about 100 feet high.

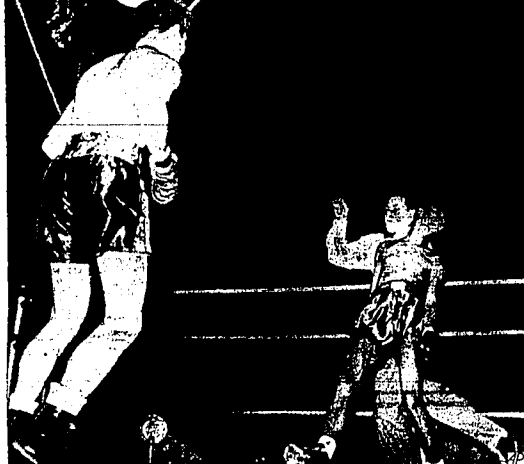
