# Care Urged for Social Security Return Filings

With July 31 as the deadline for filing social security tax returns, employers in the Twin Falls area were cautioned last night against errors which have caused trouble on the social security board's Twin Falls field office.

"First of all, employers should make certain that they have listed correctly the social security account number and name of each employee," declared Wayne Tucker, manager of the social security board's Twin Falls field office.

"Employers will save the time and expense of later checking back on their payroll records to correct any errors. The most common error is that an employer's account number will be missing from the employer's report, or the number will be slightly incorrect, or the employee's name will be spelled wrongly."

In other cases, we must ask the employer to check back on his records to determine the correct filing amount. Sometimes the employer has failed to get the correct name or amount of money from the employee and must take time to check with him. That means a loss of time and consequently is expensive for the employer."

But only does such incorrect reporting endanger the future insurance benefits of employees or their families, but it also endangers the employer. It is creating a bad name in the social security board's records, bookkeeping system, and more where the accounts of more than 53 million American workers are being maintained.
