

County Property Values Increase \$419,470 in Year

Auditor's Abstract Totalling \$21,069,265 Shows Marked Gains in Merchandise Stocks, Improvements

Valuation of assessed real and personal property in Twin Falls county has increased by \$419,470 from \$20,649,795 last year to \$21,069,265 this year, an abstract compiled at the county auditor's office disclosed.

A major increase was shown in valuation of merchandise stocks, up \$148,206 from \$1,047,741 to \$1,195,947. Improvements on real property also accounted in large part for the "total increase." Improvements—residence property—were up \$100,840 from \$2,003,385 to \$2,104,225. Improvements on farm property were up \$10,250 from \$1,025,415 to \$1,035,665. Improvements on business property were up \$70,365 from \$1,319,255 to \$1,389,620.

In a subsequent phase of the local housing authority's plan, clearance and low-rent housing project, additional dwelling units are to be constructed on property north and east of the Washington square.

Approval was subject to several conditions, all of which, Dale V. Washington, executive director of the authority, said, have been met.

One of these conditions was the vacating of the site of the alley in the block now known as 4th and 5th streets. The deed vacating the alley was signed and placed on record yesterday.

Jerome Pioneer Tells 'Wild, Woolly' Tales

Judge Stanton, Idaho Resident for 71 Years, Tells of Early Cowboy and Mining Life

THE best of Indian tom-toms and the hurly-burly of the mining camps, like the snows of yesterday, have been blown away by the winds of time, but this pageant of the past sprung to life yesterday in the office of Judge Clark T. Stanton at Jerome as he unfolded the story of his life for a representative of the Twin Falls News.

Now 83 years old and active as municipal judge for the city of Jerome, Judge Stanton, who has lived in Idaho for 71 years, will speak before Sunday's annual picnic and reunion of the Twin Falls County Old Settlers association at Filer. The story of his colorful career, as told yesterday, shows a man who has seen the rise and fall of the mining camps, the cowboy life, and the early days of settlement.

SOVIET OUTLOOK CHEERS BRITAIN

London's Military Observers See Chance for Stemming Nazi Blitzkrieg

London's military observers, recently openly pessimistic about Russia's chance of stemming the Nazi blitzkrieg, now have a marked change in tone as signs of the titanic struggle drive lower and lower.

They now detect symptoms of "exhaustion" in Hitler's hard-driven armies. Foreboding as these, still in the attack while new drives are prepared.

The London advisers did not specify the basis of that military judgment. It is found in the more detailed information as to the situation on the three main fighting fronts in Russia than either the United States or Moscow has made public. It is an important development. And it parallels to some extent to the optimistic view in informed Washington circles.

A British military mission has been in Moscow long enough to have established its own contacts through British observers at the front. Accurate information as to developments there, untainted by propaganda drumming, is essential to the policy making. It is for that reason that London's rejection of the Russian claim that the blitzkrieg is about to fall is especially significant. London ought to know the facts.

Nor can there be any doubt that the massive German forces driven so great a distance in the space of time against Russia must be approaching the state of exhaustion and disorganization which such operations often incur. Rear, replacement, regrouping and rest, especially in the early stages of the campaign, periods cannot be avoided by an attacking army. They followed every advance by either side in the world war.

No matter how efficient Nazi staff work or preparation has been, ultimate loss of impetus is unavoidable when the initial impact fails to achieve decisive strategy. It takes time and intensive preparation to regain even a semblance of the initial striking power. Months, even years, intervened between the great offensive efforts by Germany during the world war. There are limits to human endurance and armies are composed of men, even Nazi blitzkrieg armies.

To support the indicated British view that the German blitzkrieg may have virtually spent its force in 40 days of terrific fighting, a number of recent, current and possibly a better indication of previously reported successes.

Growers Urged Wheat Crop Early

Wheat growers of Twin Falls county who have federal crop insurance on their 1931 crop should notify the county AAA committee whenever they believe they have suffered a crop loss. Kenon Groves, member of the county committee in charge of crop insurance, said that.

Farmers who have less than three-quarters of a normal yield are entitled to indemnity if they notified their wheat crop loss last fall or spring. He pointed out that the AAA committee, and each claim will be investigated by an adjuster appointed by the AAA committee.

If growers who receive indemnities which they may obtain credit and indemnity covering the extent of their insured loss and may obtain a wheat loan on it or each it in winter. They believe the market price of wheat is most advantageous to them. Grow insurance premiums are collected in wheat or cash equivalent to the market price when the insurance is taken out and indemnities are paid on the same basis.

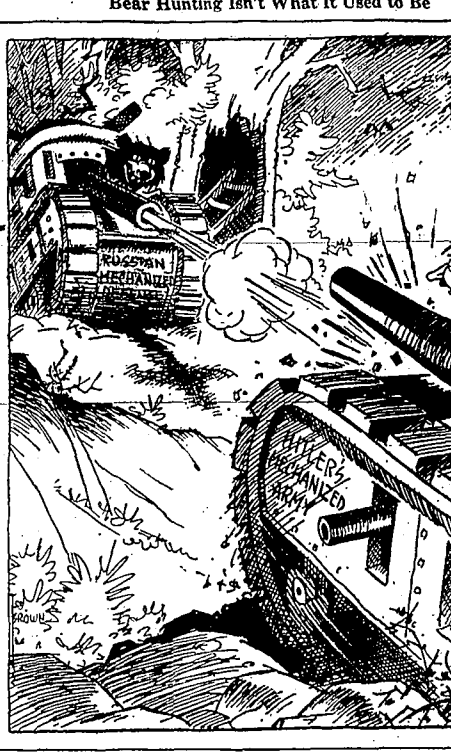

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Editors on Record Against U. S. Participation in War

NEW YORK, Aug. 1 (AP)—Editors and Publisher, newspaper trainees, said last night a poll of 1,818 daily newspapers listed in the 1941 International Year Book showed that the 811 replying were opposed to immediate United States participation in the war by a vote of more than two to one.

By a similar vote, the magazine said, the editors declared the best interest of the United States will be served by avoiding conflict. Yes, 312; No, 316; Unanswered, 35.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 (AP)—Sales of independent retailers in Idaho advanced 8 per cent in June, 1941, over June, 1940, the bureau of the census reported today.

The report was based on figures obtained from 388 retailers, including almost every type of business except department stores.

Increases were reported for all of the city-size groups. Twenty-five stores in Boise showed a gain of 10 per cent and Poeclet store increased 18 per cent.

For the year to date, Boise led all other cities with a gain of 16 per cent for the first six months of 1941.

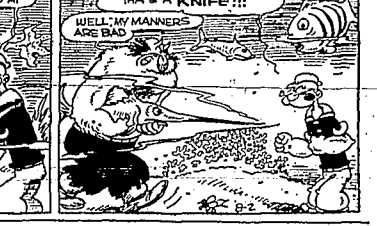

By Thomas Bourke (New York: Knopf, 1941; \$5.00).

Neither of the two South American biographies being published by Thomas Bourke is a new one, and one of them, "Gomes: Tyrant of the Andes," already has had considerable circulation. The other is Mr. Bourke's excellent biography of Simon Bolivar called "Man of Glory," which so far as the record indicates had gone through only one edition up to the time of its current reprinting.

Simon Bolivar was of course the man who, at the end of his career, was high on the list of those who liberated from Spain not one, but five continents of South America. These were Colombia, Venezuela, Peru, Ecuador and Bolivia.

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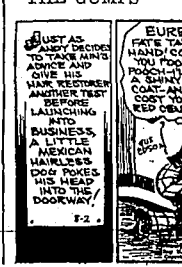
