In both instances the initiative to discipline was with the armed forces. Through commanding officers in both cases the army reacted automatically to its tradition that soldiers must so conduct themselves as not to incur the dispicasure of civilians, and certainly that they shall never seem to be using the power of the army in support of, or opposition to, pending legislation.

The tradition failers when great numbers of civilians are hastily drawn into the army, but the army commands faith in it never wavers. On the whole, it is a good thing. See what militarists have done to the people of Germany, Russia, Italy, Japan.






