

Senate Tacks Pay Hike on Extension Of Army Service

Bill to Prolong Training of Draftees, National Guardsmen by 18 Months, Passes, 45 to 30

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—The senate tonight approved legislation prolonging the active service of draftees, militiamen, reservists and army enlisted men by 18 months with a pay raise of ten dollars a month for all men after they have completed one year in the army.

The bill, hotly disputed for more than a week, went through by a vote of 45 to 30, and now goes to the house where its fate is uncertain. Many house members are reported to favor a less drastic extension of service than the 18 months provided in the senate bill.

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HENDERSON MADS PRICES CONTROL

Administrator Would Exempt Wages from Proposed Legislation

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 (AP)—A promise that price control legislation would be exempted from controls and without rigid ceilings was given to Congress today by Leon Henderson of the office of price control who is in line for appointment as chief of the program.

Under questioning by Rep. Williams (D-Mo.), Henderson told the house banking committee that if the exemption as administration, he would see a staff that would not try to "limit" or "control" but would "take the best out of inflationary situations" and that would be under a "flexible" program and industry could "go forward with the greatest ease."

BRITAIN, REICH CLASH IN IRAN

Germany Threatens Break If Persia Decides to Expell Nazis

NEW YORK, Aug. 7 (AP)—Representatives of both the NBC and CBS in Ankara, Turkey, reported tonight that Germany has threatened to sever diplomatic relations with Iran "unless" it the 2,000 German nationals in that country are expelled, a course which Britain has recommended.

The CBS representative, Farmington Foster, said in a broadcast that some German businessmen already were sending their wives and children out of Iran.

Martin Agranov, NBC representative, said reliable diplomatic sources in Ankara informed him that the British minister in Iran, in conjunction with the Russian government, had informed Iran that Britain must insist on the expulsion of Germans. Authoritative sources in London said they had no confirmation of a German note to Iran and declined to comment on the report that Britain was insisting on expulsion of the Germans.

CATTLE STEALING PENALTY OKED

House Completes Congress Action on Bill Now Up to President

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 (AP)—The house completed congressional action today on compromise legislation to provide penalties for persons convicted of transporting stolen cattle in interstate commerce.

The senate approved the legislation yesterday and it now goes to the president, who twice vetoed somewhat similar proposals.

House proponents argued that inclusion of poultry, sheep, hogs and horses in the legislation would put them in almost the same form as the legislation the president disapproved, and the house reacted to his amendments adding them.

Under the legislation a fine of up to \$5,000 or imprisonment up to five years could be imposed on any person convicted of interstate transportation of stolen cattle, defined to include hogs, steers, oxen, cows, heifers or calves, or the carcasses of such animals.

DAIRY PRODUCTS' ALICE STRESSED

Speaker at Caldwell Meeting 'Discusses Food-for-Defense Program'

CALDWELL, Aug. 7 (AP)—Several thousand southwestern Idahoans today heard Dr. A. G. Black of Washington, D. C., governor of the farm credit administration, describe agriculture as "the backbone of our great defensive drive."

Dr. Black spoke at the 16th anniversary picnic of the Dairy-men's Co-operative Creamery of Boise Valley. Sharing the platform with him were Governor and Mrs. Clark; Miss Gov. Charles C. Grossett of Nampa; Emmett Brown of Spokane, Wash., general agent of the farm credit administration; and other dairy men.

Bill Peters of Meridian was named chairman of the day. The 4-H club district stock show held in conjunction with the picnic, closed at 10 o'clock and the picnic was placed second.

In the principal address of the day, Dr. Black stressed the dairy farmer would "play a vital part in making our food-for-defense program achieve its goal."

"Essential to our national defense program is the production of milk, and today and in the future, it is a substantial increase in production, especially of milk for the military and navy, that we must have. In the drive to build our national defense, the milk and dairy products industry is as vital as munitions."

Black declared the country "is going to need to produce more dairy products than ever before in its history to supply our own needs at home and to take care of the demand that Europe will continue to make upon our supplies."

The national trend in production of dairy products in this country has been upward. But in the present emergency, the government has demanded that production be stepped up even more. The dairy industry cannot meet this demand without increasing its production.

Describing the Boise valley co-operative as "one of the finest co-operatives in the mountain states," the speaker said: "There are only about half a dozen such co-operatives in the United States that are manufacturing a larger volume of butter than the others."

"Such patronage support is outstanding and is the key to your co-operative success. Almost \$100 million dollars of your own money has been invested in your organization. This is one of the most successful financial organizations in the mountain states of the west that the Idaho dairymen are already moving in the right direction in expanding your production and increasing their production under the most favorable circumstances."

Dr. Black said that he will win the war for the nation's health, he continued, "and by the same token we will win the war for peace. Throughout the length and breadth of the land people are mobilizing every resource for winning our national defense and in aiding ourselves by supporting the program in their local efforts."

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STAND AT RIVER BLOCKS GERMANS

Nazi Advance on Moscow
Hinges on Clearing
Dnieper Bend

The latest chapter in Hitler's amazing story of Russian victories destroyed falls to furnish convincing evidence of smashing German victories but it may explain why the main Nazi attack has shifted southward toward the Ukraine. It is not yet clear whether the Russians still hold the great bend of the Dnieper — the Orsha-Smolensk-Mogilev triangle. If they do the Germans' chances of pressing on toward Moscow are not bright. It may have been tough going there that led the Germans to make a tactical change in their plans and strike southward below Kiev at Red armies holding the Black sea flank. The German radio has broadcast a report that Kiev is already encircled. Intimations from Berlin that Hitler has some to the Ukraine front, southwest of Kiev, bear out his declaration that a turning movement via Bykova Terkov to sweep the region between the Dnieper and the Dniester to the Black sea is in progress. It also serves to throw light on the Nazis' failure to widen their boasted gains in the Smolensk area.

The most recent Hitler bulletin told of German advances on a wide front on both sides of the Orsha-Smolensk road. If that refers to the

railroad, however, it implies that the Russians still hold the south bank of the Dnieper from Smolensk to Orsha and the east bank from Orsha to Mogilev. The railroad is north of the river between Orsha and Mogilev. The Orsha-Smolensk-Mogilev river basin has been the main obstacle to the German advance on Moscow. It sharply limited the strategic value of the Nazi breakthrough from Vitebsk to Smolensk and further east along the Moscow railroad. Red forces holding the great river bend were on the flank of the Nazis' most advanced salient.

If it has not been cleared, a successful major attack on Moscow seems impossible. If the Hitler bulletin means Red forces in the bend have been routed or destroyed, a strategy to Moscow 100 miles wide has been opened through the Stalin line between Vitebsk and Mogilev. If that were so the Germans would hardly forego such an opportunity of dealing new and punishing blows in the vital center.
