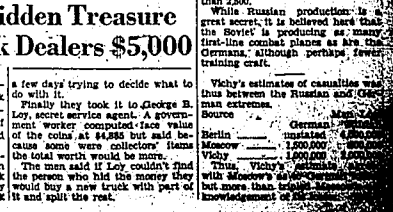

UNIONISTS ASKS U. S. SEIZURE OF SHIPYARDS

C. I. O. Executive Calls for Government Operation of Strike-Bound New Jersey Plant With Defense Jobs

(By The Associated Press)

PEARSON, N. J., Aug. 8.—KERN RYAN, president of a C. I. O. union, asked the federal government tonight to take over the strike-bound yards of the Federal Shipbuilding and Drydock company "and operate them in the interests of national defense."

RYAN, C. I. O. executive, issued a statement from headquarters of local 16, industrial union of the Marine and Shipbuilding Workers of America.

"We believe the government should step in without another hour's delay. With the union's collective bargaining rights fully protected, the government could pick the line which will instantly become a matching back to pick up where they left off at the most advanced in the national defense program."

Sixteen thousand workers have been idle by the strike, which became effective at 11 p. m. (EST) Wednesday and has since then prevented production of naval and merchant ship construction at a rate of shipyard.

The company filed defense orders totaling \$40,000,000.

The statement also stated that it was "imperative for the government to act at once. The strikers are just as patriotic as the rest of the American people, but these ships built by them are going to be used to carry the power to carry on a war against the union and its membership."

Draft Shipyard Headed

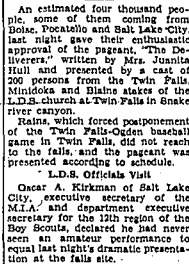

MOUNTING HIGHWAY DEATHS

If motor traffic were comparatively new, there might be some extenuation for mounting death tolls on the highways. But since traffic has been constant growth through a third of a century, the American people are self-indulgent for its carelessness.

Unless this trend is checked and reversed, 1941 will chalk up an all-time high of 40,000 lives needlessly lost. This is in contrast to last year's total of 34,500. The increase in fatalities in excess of 1000 population shows an increase of 16 per cent. This is a tribute to police regulation, to school patrols, and to safety campaigns by civic organizations.

Death in rural areas in the half-year increased 22 per cent, whereas in towns under 10,000 the rate was half that. Cities with populations in excess of 100,000 population show an increase of 16 per cent. This is a tribute to police regulation, to school patrols, and to safety campaigns by civic organizations.

PROOF OF BIRTH

In view of the disclosure that about 60,000 persons born in the United States are without documentary proof of citizenship, the federal government's proposal to require citizens to produce such proof is a sensible one. Nearly all Americans of middle age or past are without birth records.

The census bureau's suggestion is that certificates be issued on the basis of prescribed evidence, such as hospital records, family Bibles, and insurance policies. Such records, especially where they are in duplicate, are ready proof of citizenship while one-half of the native-born Americans have none.

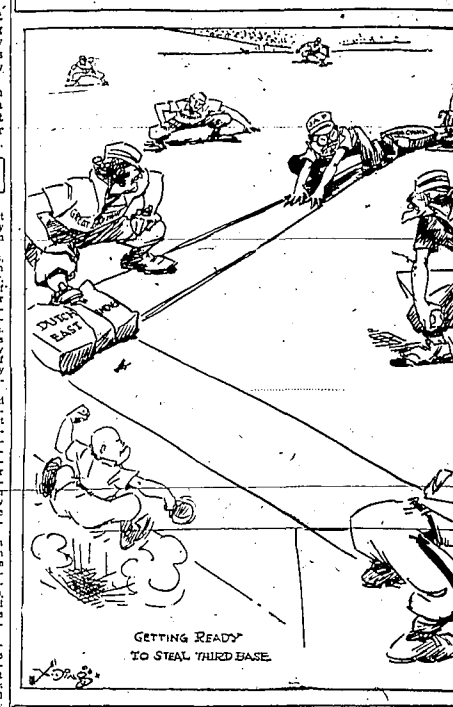

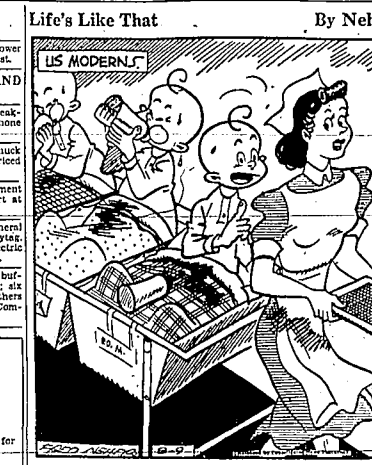

NEW TIME TABLE SET FOR REICH

German High Command Revamps Plans When Blitzkrieg Fails

BERN, Switzerland, Aug. 8 (AP)—Information reaching Bern from foreign quarters in Berlin indicated today that the German high command was forced to revamp its Russian campaign in a long-term basis. It is when it became evident that blitzkrieg plans would fail.

This information was that Germany originally had planned to occupy the Ukraine and take Leningrad. The German high command then seized Moscow and reach Astrakhan, on the Caspian sea 1,700 miles east of Berlin, the end of the line.

The new time table calls for capture of Leningrad and Moscow and an advance to the Caucasus by the end of September. The military source said, "If the Russian army is still in existence the Germans would pursue it toward the Ural mountains and then settle down on a definite line."

Defense Line
According to the reported plan, the defensive line would extend from Lake Ladoga to the Volga river and from Leningrad and Moscow, continuing on the west bank of the Volga to Astrakhan. The Rumanian and Hungarian armies would be ordered to help the Germans hold the line.

The information came this point on the strategy for this plan: "In October Turkey would be asked for a campaign against British forces in the Middle East. Japan would attack Russia in the Lake Baikal region on eastern Siberia. The United States intervened actively on the Soviet side."

During the winter the Luftwaffe would concentrate on the invasion of Russian industrial centers between Moscow and the Urals. A stock of 100,000 fur coats to clothe German troops during the winter already has been ordered. Two months before the outbreak of the Russian war the German army had 2,000,000 fur coats which were obtained in Africa, the Balkans, Turkey, Iran, Sweden, Norway and Germany are now being combed to supply another 8,000,000.

Alternative Plans
If the Russian and Middle East campaign succeed the German offensive might develop in either two ways. German troops might try to reach Chinese Turkestan and with Japanese troops driving west to pass through Afghanistan toward India while the Japanese launched an offensive from Indo-China on Burma and then on India.

If the Russians collapsed or when the Germans succeeded in establishing a strong defensive line, many would make a peace offer to Britain and the United States. Should peace be rejected and the Near East offensive fail, Germany might attempt an invasion of Britain.

The military sources reported that the slow advance of the German army had caused "visible disappointment" among the German population, who were more interested in the prospect of rapid occupation of the Ukraine than in capture of Stalingrad or Leningrad.

The company, which employs some 300 men, has been negotiating for four months with the AFL. Trailer workers on wages, bargaining rights and a union shop contract.

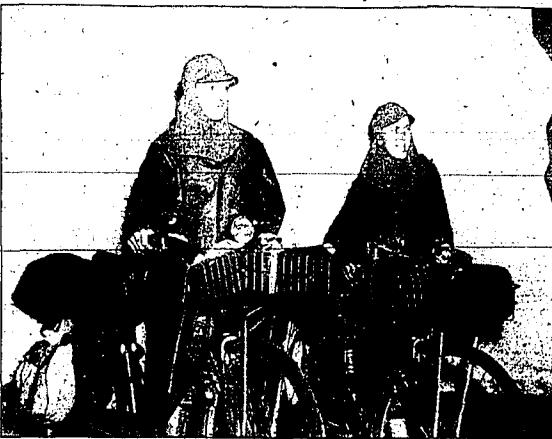
Court Sets Price On Camas Refuge

TRAVEL BY BIKE TO SEE COUNTRY

So Advise Two Youthful Travelers While in Twin Falls

"The American people are really fine when you get to know them"—this from a young man, who, with his wife, has become familiar with nearly every foot of roadway and lost of people between Twin Falls and Evanston, Ill.

He is Phil Johnson, 29, who, with Mrs. Johnson, known as Mildie, passed through Twin Falls yesterday during a 3,000-mile bicycle jaunt from Evanston to Seattle, Wash., where they plan to make their home.

Quite by coincidence, their stay in Twin Falls was a little longer than most stops, because two miles east of Kimberly, Mildie drove off the road and into a barbed wire fence, avoiding being struck by a truck. She received a sprained right arm and a scratched chin and nose, which require medical attention at Kimberly, and they stopped off in Twin Falls for a brief rest.

Both brown as berries, they told a Twin Falls News reporter that they left Evanston last June 7 and rode to reach Seattle by Sept. 1. So much do they like the northwest, that their present plans are to make their home on the Pacific coast. They have averaged about 100 miles per day, with 60 miles as the average in hilly country. Carrying 25 pounds of clothing and other equipment on each of their English made bicycles, they have found they have spent more nights at American youth hostels, camping in the open and only occasionally in hotels or tourist camps when weather became too forbidding.

The travelers have "taken it easy" throughout their journey and have stopped frequently about the way, spending a week in the Black Hills country and two weeks in Yellowstone park.

"Traveling this way, we certainly meet the people and see the country," young Johnson observed, "and we've reached the conclusion that the American people are a pretty fine lot."

They pulled out of Twin Falls last evening toward Boise, and indicated they would travel until midnight. Well equipped with slickers, they showed little concern about the rain.
