INSTALLMENT BUYING PUT UNDER CURB

Roosevelt's Order Invokes World War Statute to Restrict Partial Payments for Heavy Goods

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—The new war-reading statute that brought the effects of the defense close home to the ordinary man, President Roosevelt today set up a system of control over the huge installment credit business carried on through the nation's banks, stores and personal finance companies.

Under an executive order directing the federal reserve board to use a "war-time statute" to impose criminal penalties to curb installment credit used for the purchase of consumer durables.

Although not affecting the man who can afford to pay cash, the credit man is restricted to a maximum loan business involving \$10,000,000 of credit. Some types of credit are exempted, however.

The president said the regulation was intended to discourage consumers from buying many things. The aim is to conserve the materials that go into automobiles and machine tools, for instance, and also to curb inflationary tendencies.

The form of the controls was left vague, temporarily, but the president specifically authorized measures as requiring down-payments in cases where they are not normally required.

Today's order does not apply to cash transactions. The board can control the use of credit, but not the use of cash.

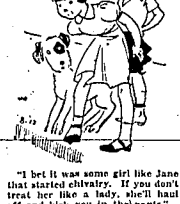

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PRESIDENTIAL VACATIONS

When President Lincoln wanted to escape the heat of downtown Washington, during the summer of 1862, he fled to the Soldiers' Home, a government retreat on the outskirts of the capital.

President Cleveland spent some of his summers at suburban estates within the District of Columbia. The Soldiers' Home and these suburban estates are no longer remote.

President Roosevelt had a vacation within a few miles of the White House, much less within the borders of the District of Columbia.

Two presidents spent summers in New Jersey on the east shore. Woodrow Wilson spent a summer at Shadow Lawn, an estate at Long Branch.

President Roosevelt loves the sea, and to sea he has gone aboard the U. S. S. Potomac, requesting newspapers and radio not to reveal the ship's whereabouts.

Mr. Roosevelt has often said that it is essential for him—and for other government officials—to get out of Washington, where there is a sort of self-generating atmosphere often in danger of suffocating the atmosphere of the rest of the United States.

WEAR COTTON AND LIKE IT

Exhortations of a national emergency call for a cessation in the consumer use of silk, a material which is being produced in Japan, and soon silk will be worn no more.

The wool will be a hard one, for the ladies of the land have grown inordinately fond of the material, and in practically every form imaginable—sweaters, lingerie, dresses, and mention a few. Nor have they permitted humanitarian emotions to interfere with their fastidiousness.

Warfare today differs vastly from that of the past. The arm of today is almost entirely mechanized and depends heavily upon

on coordination of the air arm for swift and efficient action. They were intensely jealous of what they considered encroachment from other arms of the service. They became friendly in a day of maneuver now gone to limbo.

In short, they heaved to a line they had studied in the years gone by. They could not learn their collected information and study new techniques, since they were to be replaced for them in the new army of the United States.

WOMEN THAN TAXES

SOME CAUSES AND CURES OF JUVENILE DELINQUENCY

In addition to the several causes of juvenile delinquency recently commented on in these columns, another and more serious example is now under consideration. Two boys, aged 12 and 13, were arrested in Ogdon the other day for the cold-blooded murder of an aged California storekeeper near Hayward, just south of Oakland.
