STORY OF THE STARS: In 1923, Dr. Clyde Fisher of the scientific staff of the American Museum of Natural History in New York heard that the Carl Zeiss optical works in Germany had perfected an instrument which could project on a dome all of the stars visible to the naked eye.

Dr. Fisher had to watch and wait, however, while Chicago, Los Angeles, and Philadelphia erected planetariums. It was not until five years before the New York Museum was able to open its planetarium, built with \$650,000 borrowed from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation and a gift of \$150,000 from the late John D. Rockefeller.

No mathematical astronomer, preferring to be known as a teacher, Dr. Fisher's attitude toward astronomical specialties is this: "You can't make people interested in the stars if you can't make them any more interested than in physics or mathematics."

Now Dr. Fisher is retiring as curator to devote more time to lecturing and lecturing. The planetarium goes on. Even the dullest imagination cannot fail to be stimulated at sight of its varied celestial splendors.
