# NAZIS SEE LUST FOR MARTINIQUE

## German Comment Stresses Importance of Petain Declaration

BERLIN, Aug. 13 (AP)—Marshall Petain's speech may be seized upon by certain American groups as an excuse to "sanctify" their policy of the French west Indian island of Martinique, authorized sources predicted.

The marshall's stand was described as important in the eyes of the German foreign office, because:

1. Powers outside the European continent "would desire to establish guardianships over France were refused."
2. Petain allied himself actively "with Europe and its effort to establish a new order."
3. The editorials in some quarters in the United States, "authorized" information, declared nothing short of hysterical sentimentalism. Why, those papers and the men behind them act as though France ought to have placed herself under United States protection.
4. They are a half breed. Petain expressed his understanding for European collaborationists. He used freely words for the United States. Liberty is not threatened in France although the country will be a liberty freed from the shortcomings of parliamentarism.
5. Petain also attacked capitalism and the moneybags. Can it be that those quarters which stand behind "the papers" took it as meant for them?

# INDUSTRY POINTS TO WEST STATES

## Idaho Senator Tells of Inquiry Into Mineral Resources

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13—Conclusive evidence that industrial expansion in the future should be located in the west is contained in the testimony which has been presented to the senate sub-committee investigating western mineral resources, according to Senator John Thomas of Idaho.

Senator Thomas is a member of the sub-committee, before which leading railway, mining and business executives, as well as experts of the departments of interior and agriculture, have appeared during the past few days.

"Many sound reasons have been presented to the committee for future industrial expansion should be in the west," Senator Thomas said. "Formed among them are the raw materials are in the west and there are tremendous power resources, either already developed or potential, for the processing of these materials."

"It was brought out before the committee that the mineral resources of the western country have been hardly scintillated. Unexplored deposits of low grade ores and mineral-rich rocks are known to exist. Development has been retarded due to lack of demand or processing and transportation facilities. The science is steadily discovering new and important uses for many of these materials as well as more feasible methods of handling and processing them."

"Also important in the industrial picture presented to the committee is power. Our greatest potential power development lies in the north-west. A vast amount of water power is available in Idaho, Washington and Oregon, and extensive steam development can be brought into action from the great Wyoming section of Utah coal beds."

Senator Thomas said that those appearing before the committee urged that defense plants now being established be located with a peace-time usefulness after the emergency is passed.

"Due to economic problems which develop when huge masses of our citizens are attracted to one locality," the senator said, "it is the opinion of many of those appearing before the sub-committee that there will be more efficiency and less waste and confusion if the defense industries are decentralized. This would mean expansion to the west, thereby avoiding a wide dislocation of our population."

"The committee has not completed its deliberations but I am sure the proposal that an appropriate and made available for a comprehensive survey of western power and mineral resources has been the subject of favorable comment."

Our president is also chief of the army and navy, and he has informed congress and the country that it is necessary to continue the draftees in the service.

LAND OF ABUNDANCE

Reflection of the suggestion made in some quarters during the drought of the thirties that the broad prairies of the West be returned to the Indian and the buffalo seems to have been a good idea. 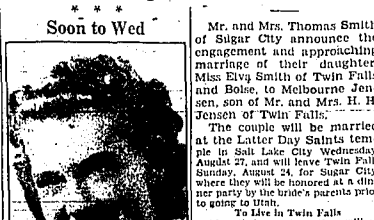

# BEE PROGRESS BEFORE SESSION

## Processors Gather in Twin Falls to View Experiments

Demonstrations of rapid strides in the bee industry were featured at the annual meeting of western processors in Twin Falls, during which the group visited a number of experiments and heard talks by leading scientists and industrialists.

The processors, Tuesday visited experiments at the J. B. Fellowship and the University of Idaho, as well as the Americanized Sugar company, and these showed that a new "improved U. S. No. 22" strain has without inferiorities which have leveled crops from the old style European seed.

In one regard, the leaf hopper has aided the United States in making it independent of European production, as aid from Europe, necessarily cut off by lack of cargo space and the war, has not been missed, according to Roy Cretzer, Oregon, chairman of the committee contributing about \$20,000 annually toward federal bee experimentation.

Also speaking were Dr. Fehske, Canada, senior plant pathologist, U.
