Most Idaho Draft Postponements Because of Need for Farm Work

BOISE, Aug. 20 (AP)—Between 70 and 90 per cent of all selective service deferments granted in Idaho agricultural counties have been made because men were needed for farm work.

La. Col. Norman B. Adkison, state selective service executive officer, said today these deferred men generally were sons of farmers. Transient workers, he explained, are not being deferred.

"Thirty per cent of Idaho resistance gear agriculture as their chief pursuit," Col. Adkison added. "We don't know just how many of these have been deferred, but in those mercantile counties where the percentage is much higher, more have actually been deferred than have been inducted into the army."

WHEAT HARVEST ENDS IN NORTH

Potato Prospect is Good as Digging Begins in Southeast Idaho

BOISE, Aug. 20 (AP)—Harvest of winter wheat was nearly completed last week in the northern part of Idaho, and was in full swing in other areas, it was reported today in the weekly cooperative crop and weather summary.

Rains delayed harvesting somewhat but spring grain crops were being gathered. Black infection reduced yields below anticipated levels. Oats and barley, however, generally were yielding well, and spring wheat yields were expected to turn out better than average.

Potato prospects were described as good. Most seed peas in the east had been cut. Unirrigated fields suffered considerable rain damage. A very good second cutting of alfalfa hay was produced, but considerable rain damage occurred, especially in the central district.

Seed crop prospects were said to be spotted, but generally good in the north.

er wheat is about half harvested in Cassia county; harvesting is getting under way in the higher areas. Most of the irrigated grains are cut and threshing is under way. Good yields are reported. Potatoes are making normal development, or better. No serious disease outbreaks have been reported. Beans are looking good, though early top is estimated to have reduced yield prospects about 15 per cent in Goodland county. White fly infestation in beets is decreasing, some fly damage is apparent in most sections. Second cutting alfalfa yields are good, harvest has been delayed by rains and considerable hay was damaged. Weather has been delayed by rains, but were freshened by showers. Pastures are good. The peach crop in Idaho is a good apple crop is being produced in Twin Falls county. Cattle are in good condition; there is a heavy demand for feeder stuff. There has been no serious farm labor shortage so far, though farmers have found it necessary to exchange

labor and to use power machinery more extensively than usual in order to get their farm work done. It is feared that the farm labor situation may be serious during planting, and best harvest unless the fall harvesting season is favorable and unless additional supplies of migratory labor become available.

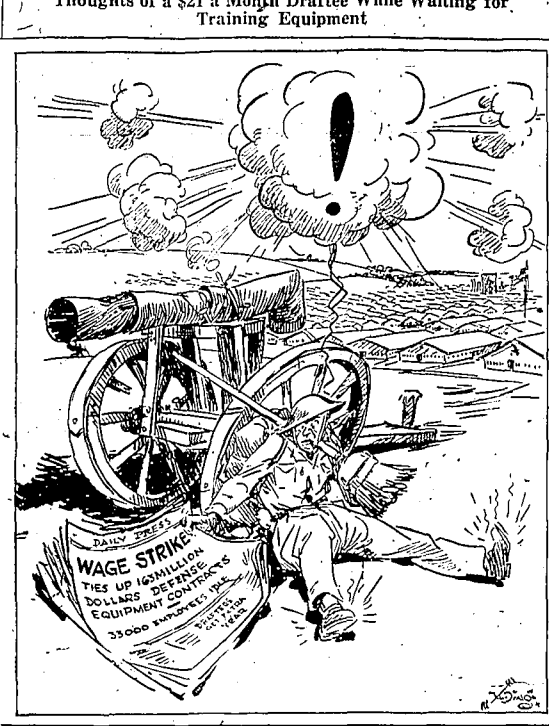

Limit on Canvasback Raised to 10 Per Day; Secretary of Interior Moves to Conserve Mourning Doves

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—A 60-day duck hunting season was proclaimed by Secretary of the Interior Ickes today, starting October 1 in the northern states, October 16 in intermediate states and November 2 in the southern states.

Utah, Idaho, Nevada and Oregon are in the intermediate zone, Montana and Wyoming in the northern zone.

In issuing regulations for hunting mourning doves, Ickes limited the 60-day season to the 10-day bag limit of that year's season.

Other major changes from last year included: The mourning dove season on Wilson's snipe, commonly known as Jacksnipe.

The 10-day limit on canvasback and ruddy ducks, formerly limited to 30 days.

Other bag and possession limits were the same as last year, including: Mallards and pintails (except canvasback) in the aggregate, 10; mallards, 10; woodcock, 4; mourning and whistling doves, 12.

As in recent years, hunters must be ready to show their licenses and tags at all times.

The season was closed on Wilson's snipe, scattered six days for a 30-day limit.
