UNDER NAZI BLOW

Special Test Near for

Red Forces

The threatened evacuation of the Ukraine plus triumph in a gloomy light through the outlook is not certain. The certainty continues to cloud the ultimate outcome of the attempt to crush Russia before snow remains the most significant feature of Russia's greatest military campaign. The Russian giant is still grimly fighting. A few more days of the bloody struggle probably will decide whether the Russian will be punished as the loss of the old czarist capital and key Soviet industries, along with Kiev in the south. These prospective blows would be staggering, but they would be important chiefly as means to the end of restoring the Russian to the ranks of a modern army which have managed to fight and have fared well in the defense of their repeated claims of annihilation. No fair battle might could control, possibly that the first two months of the battle of Ukraine has shown the German fighting with a sight of decisive victory, if not actually within reach of it. Much of the fighting in the Ukraine and West Russia have been overrun, even though, as Moscow asserts, they contain now only scorched fields, wrecked cities and ruined factories. Crushing, perhaps mortal, blows have been dealt to Red armies.

These recent blows without regard to the latest Nazi claim that five million Russian troops have been killed, wounded and captured, thus far, this figure, parenthetically, is almost exactly twice the number of men under arms of the Russians at the start of the fighting by most authoritative military estimates. Draft Area Office Gets Data on Special Group in Army

Information which may assist national conscientious objectors in the course which they will pursue in the selective service program was received last night by Walter Murgawie, chairman of the Twin Falls area No. 1 draft board.

Received from alternate selective service headquarters, this communication points out that "it is felt that fewer men would ask for I-V classification than for regular conscientious objectors who work in camps if they were familiar with the work they would be required to do in I-A-O classification.

Non-Combat
In this classification, they will engage in various forms of skilled effort for which they are found best equipped, but will not be required to come in actual contact with arms. In the selective service program, these are the fields of training. These are the medical department, quartermaster corps, chemical warfare service (excluding personnel in decontamination camps only); signal corps with assignment only to communication units, photographic units, depot units, repair units, pigeon units, corps of engineers, maintenance, permitted to any unit except combat units, general service units, separate battalions and position battalions.

Procedure Same
The bulletin points out that within these restrictions, assignment will be based on the same principles used for assignment of other personnel. Conscientious objectors in classified and assigned will not be transferred from noncombatant to combatant service, but such classification will not prevent their reassignment to some other form of noncombatant service. Voluntary requests in writing for assignment to combatant service may be granted.

BOISE, Aug. 21 (AP)—The Idaho public utilities commission will conduct a hearing on the bean storage rates requested by 25 warehousemen and storage firms for a new rate schedule, classified according to amount of dried beans stored.

At present both growers and non-growers are charged one cent per 100-pound bag for each month, or major fraction thereof, of storage. The petition filed in behalf of the warehousemen by Attorneys Chapman and Chapman and James Murphy, all of Twin Falls, asks that new rate schedule be approved for the bean storage business. A petition was placed at two cents per 100 pounds per month.

PRUNE GROWERS REJECT CONTROL

Idaho Producers Turn Down Proposed Marketing Agreement

BOISE, Aug. 21 (AP)—Idaho prune growers rejected a proposed marketing agreement, extension marketing specialist, C. O. Youngstrom, said today.

The agreement, requested by the prune industry committee composed of representative south Idaho growers, would have regulated the handling of fresh prunes in interstate commerce. Under the amount of prunes to be shipped in any one day would have been regulated.

Results of the referendum show approximately one-third of the prune growers, or 131, said "no," Youngstrom explained. Of the total, 69 growers representing nearly 38 per cent of the total production voted for the agreement. The agreement was signed by handlers representing about 19 per cent of the total quantity of fresh prunes handled in 1940.

Gooding Schools Set for Opening

GOODING, Aug. 21—Gooding schools will open Tuesday, Sept. 2, with a heavy enrollment anticipated. The school students will register on Thursday and Friday, Aug. 23 and 24, according to Superintendent M. W. The. School will remain in session all day Tuesday. Enrollment of freshmen and sophomores is scheduled for Thursday, Aug. 28, and for juniors and seniors, Friday, Aug. 29. Only those students who enroll on those days can be certain of getting the classes and sections of their choice. Tuition and book fees will be approximately the same as they were last year. By order of the school board, however, all fees this year must be paid in full at the time of enrollment. No exceptions will be made except to those who successfully apply for free books and waiver of fees.

In the past, one section of the fourth grade will be held in the Lincoln school and one in the high school building. The division of pupils for these sections will be made on the basis of closeness to the buildings. 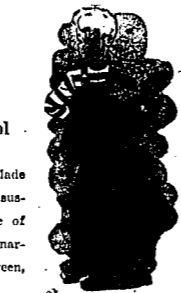

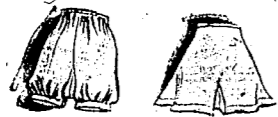

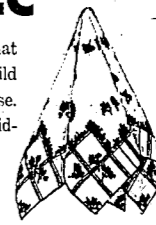
