President Quotes Woman's Charge That Dictators Seek World Domination; Terms Peace Uncertain

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (AP)—An informal, homespun gathering of old friends and neighbors heard President Roosevelt emphasize today that peace for Europe is not in our hands...

Increasingly, the president said, "we all return to the fact that this is the twelfth anniversary of the club, so much as it is the third meeting of the club since this world has been convulsed with all kinds of dangers...

Mr. Roosevelt told of receiving a letter from a woman just returned from the country, who had written him that she carried the charge that dictators planned world domination...

"Having seen with my own eyes the dictators through Europe in the first year of the war," her letter said, "I have no doubt that the dictators of that time were the same as those who have now."

Eden Says Outputs of Munitions Fall Short British Foreign Secretary Calls for New Sacrifice for Victory

LONDON, Aug. 30—Anthony Eden, foreign secretary, pointed out advantages for Europe of a Roosevelt-Churchill peace over one devised by Hitler and Mussolini today, but declared that the United States is far short of needs if victory is to be won.

In a speech, before munitions workers at Coventry, Eden said that "the struggle will finally be decided" in the sphere of munitions, and he called for "further efforts and further sacrifices" for "the immense effort that lies ahead in the field of production."

In his warning, Eden disclosed that "our first armament division never got to France until after the evacuation of Dunkerque." He said that the British government had no more munitions to spare.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (AP)—The bureau of agricultural economics reported today that a recent advance carried prices of farm products to their general level of 1937 peak of 97 percent.

Only three Reds reached first base as the 31-year-old right-handed veteran of major league campaigns, blanked the world champions 2-0. The Cards' victory concentrates them into first place with a 640 percentage to CBS, which lost to New York, 4-3, and 6-1.

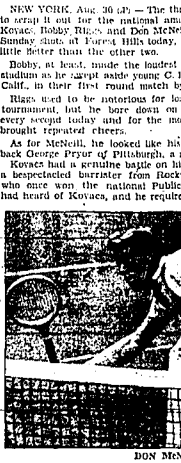

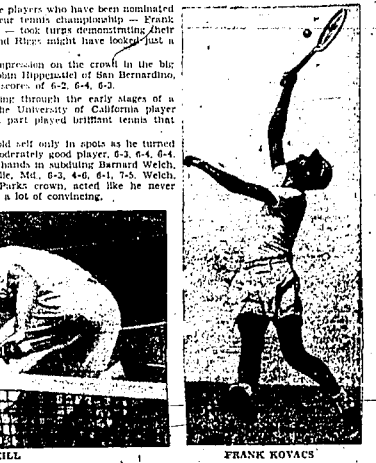
