

Three Tots Killed When Army Plane Crashes in Street

Sheet of flaming Gasoline Envelops Victims Without Warning in New York Town

(By The Associated Press) HEMPSTEAD, N. Y., Sept. 2—Three children playing along a busy street were burned fatally today when a P-39 army pursuit plane crashed in flames and exploded.

The pilot, Second Lieut. Roy W. Scott, 8th pursuit group, Mitchell field, parachuted to the plane.

Charles Cuen, 5, and George Kramer, 4, died in Meadowbrook hospital a several hours after the accident, and Charles Phillips, 3, died at 11 p. m. (EAST) tonight.

The children were playing about 25 feet from the spot where the plane crashed into the ground, entering a burning fall trap.

Dr. and Mrs. Arthur I. Kramer, parents of George and Charles, suffered burns on the hands and arms as they tore clothing from the children after the blast.

Witnesses said the plane apparently burst into flames as it approached from Mitchell field and Scott attempted to make the airport. He fell at about 700 feet and landed in a tree 300 feet from the spot where the plane plowed into the ground.

SUBSIDENCE OF MANUFACTURING New Supply Priorities Board to Speed Defense Work by Halting Manufacture of Less Essential Items

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Sept. 2—The new supply priorities and allocations board made clear today that a shortage of raw materials needed for defense would necessitate the closing of some less essential industries.

The board, appointed as the master-agency of the defense production effort, took up its duties as president, Roosevelt, announced a new drive to increase production by sending plans to Congress and pulling extra shifts to work.

The president's statement was made at a press conference at which he said the increased expenditures would come through a rise in general expenditures, rather than through augmentation of the general fund. However, a new lease program, estimated to cost \$5,000,000,000, is expected to be ready by next spring.

Board Chairman, the work, under the chairmanship of President Wallace, was holding his first meeting and drawing up a schedule of general production activities. Essentially, it called for:

1. Curtailment of every available man and machine "on direct defense requirements or on work essential to the civilian economy."

2. Curtailment of production of less essential articles so that there may be "an abundance of the essential" and striping the civilian economy of the surplus of raw materials.

3. Routing of raw materials to use of raw materials which are being loaned by certain industries and traders in order that surplus materials cannot be tolerated, the board will become a "strong force."

All actions taken by the board will be publicly announced and the board will have full powers.

The Germans asserted last night that their advanced forces had taken Tallinn, the capital of Estonia, and that their Rumanian allies were about to strangle Odessa in the far south by cutting off the water supply of that beleaguered Black sea port.

Moscow in its communique early this morning officially announced the fall of Tallinn, the capital of Estonia, west of Leningrad on the gulf of Finland which the Nazis had claimed last Friday, and said of the front only that heavy fighting was in progress everywhere.

Naval Counter-Attacks Russian counter-attacks were continuing on a large scale, however, and most important of all the Soviet command claimed that the invading German forces were being repulsed in some cases leaving wounded casualties to hold the west.

Naval Partisians in France, in Belgium, in Holland, had been stopped even the progress which was being originally to replace the regular British fleet, the British invading forces of the east—this was the official Russian announcement as attributed to a Soviet military officer, one of whom was circumstantially identified by name.

S. A. Losovsky, the official Soviet spokesman, asserted, moreover, that an appeal by Hitler to Moscow to fill the gaps in the Nazi line was a signal for the Soviet command to order the front line to be reinforced.

LONDON, Sept. 2 (AP)—An east-bound trans-Atlantic transport plane previously reported missing has been found wrecked in an isolated mountainous district of the west coast of an American naval officer and Count Guy de Baillet-Latour of Belgium.

The American officer was Capt. Sherwood Pickens, en route to London to become ambassador to the United States naval attaché.

Announcement of the discovery of the plane's wreckage was made by the air ministry tonight.

The second American lost was Capt. Kenneth Gordon of Great Britain, a flight engineer of the plane. The air ministry announced tonight that the plane hit North America yesterday. Presumably it had taken off from Canada or Newfoundland.

Dr. Mark Benjamin of Wenlock, England, central scientific officer of the British air ministry, said he received a proper share of the work.

GIO CONVENTION RAPS HITLERISM

Electrical Workers Declare for Quick Help to Foes of Nazi Chief

CAMDEN, N. J., Sept. 2 (AP)—Without mention of recent political victories by John L. Lewis, a major unit of the Congress of Industrial Organizations today formally resolved that the United States must give quick help to all nations resisting Hitlerism.

By a vote of 302 to 5, the convention of the United Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers of America passed a resolution declaring that this union approves the policy of the government in declaring that all possible aid be given to Great Britain, the Soviet Union, China and other nations resisting Hitlerism.

The convention here is the first of a major CIO branch since Lewis, former CIO chief, joined in an international statement with 14 prominent European labor leaders.

Most of the opposition to the resolution came from New York representatives of the nearly 500 delegates attending the convention. The union claims to represent 316,000 skilled defense workers in 233 plants of the United States and Canada.
