

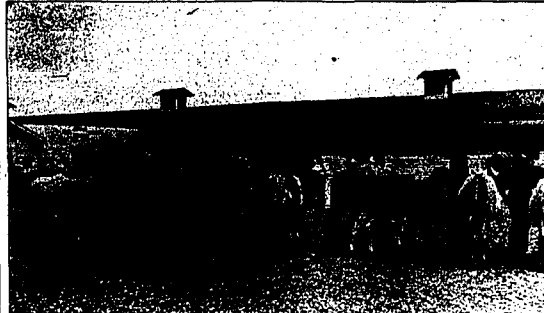

BOMBER AND SIX MEN DISAPPEAR

Keep the White Flag of Safety Flying

Twin-Motored Plane Vanishes in Heavily Populated Washington Area

TACOMA, Wash., Sept. 9 (AP)—An army twin-motored bomber with six men aboard disappeared into the Pacific Northwest area today during an early morning training flight... The plane was last seen over the heavily populated area...

The bomber was last heard from at 4:30 a.m. PST and had fuel enough to last until 8 a.m. It was en route from Seattle to the army's McClellan field air base, a distance of 100 miles... An aerial search was started, but abandoned at noon because of rain and a zero ceiling. Foot parties took to the search, aided by the state police.

Aboard the plane were: Second Lt. Edward H. Volz, 26, Chicago, chief pilot; Major, a well-known wrestler; 19-year-old national amateur title year ago and had a record of 17 wins in the Pacific northwest heavyweight title. He was graduated from the University of Chicago.

FBI AGENTS SEND NAZI MESSAGES

Counter-Espionage Work of Government Revealed by Spy Trial Witness

NEW YORK, Sept. 9 (AP)—A lanky-impudent man of Germany's Wehrmacht army, who professed to be his native country, disclosed today that the Federal Bureau of Investigation is in a counter-espionage move, had virtually supervised for the last 18 months the counter-espionage work of defense information by alleged spies.

The witness, William G. Sobodd, 42, a retired chief clerk of a government witness, advised a sobriety board of Brooklyn courtroom, where 16 men are being tried on charges of participating in a gigantic espionage conspiracy—that ever since April, 1940, an FBI-controlled radio broadcast station on Long Island had been clearing messages to the German spy center in Hamburg.

GERMANY LEARNS OF WAR

After two years, the war, in its harrowing aspects, is catching up with Germany, which has been touched by the conflict to an infinitely smaller degree than any other nation involved. For the Nazis the war had been a succession of easy triumphs. One nation after another fell before the military might of Hitler's reich.

SHORT OF GAS

Any speculation about Japan must necessarily take account of oil. Such an accounting is one that the Japanese are not likely to make unless Hitler's conquests should become so broad that Japan would have dependable sources of petroleum.

THE PHILIPPINES

Whether the Philippines are eventually to be granted their independence is a matter of more moment to the United States than it can possibly be to the islands themselves. It is a matter that the Japanese are trying to resolve against any major power with no more gas than she has in the tank would be short and bitter.

CAR CUSTOMS

While curtailment of motor car production is now slated to be by gradual stages and not by sudden reduction, the net result by 1942 will be a total reduction of 500,000 vehicles. During the decade of the 30s the average number of automobiles junked annually was 2,339,000. It appears, therefore, that production next year will be short 170,000 of the number scrapped.

That figure may be deceiving unless all the factors are considered. For the last two years motor cars have been junked at an unusually

rapid rate in preparation for the coming of curtailment. As motor car production slows down, most people are in possession of fairly recent model cars which can be operated for several years.

No one attempts to predict how long restricted production will last. If it lasts several years, a time will come when motor cars will be available in the market.

Whether this will bring about a permanent check in automobile buying practices, when several million Americans who have been trading in the old bus for a new one about the time the original tires wear out probably will depend on the cost, to the United States, of the war and taxes thereafter.

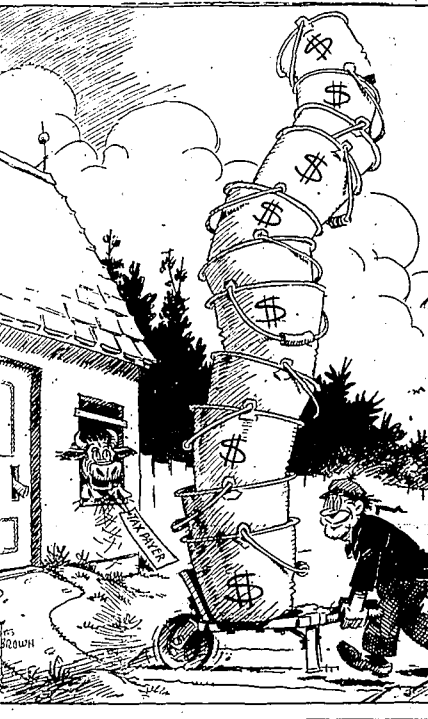



COUNTY SCHOOL LEVIES LOWERED

BOISE, Sept. 9.—The Idaho school equalization program to be fulfilled, estimated average tax for school purposes in the 44 Idaho counties of 1941 would be 4.24 mills, as compared to the 1940 average of 5.23 mills. State Superintendent of Public Instruction, E. Roberts said tonight.

Reductions made in the various counties, Roberts pointed out, largely because the 1941 legislature enacted \$1,250,000 of state funds annually for school purposes, as compared to the \$1,000,000 allotted by the 1939 legislature because of a slight increase in assessed valuation in the counties, and because of a larger carryover in state school funds from last year, \$154,280.

Highest estimated county levy this year is 6.743 mills for Gem county, closely followed by 6.619 mills for Cassia. The lowest for the state counties were 8.207 and 8.130 mills, respectively.

Minimum requirement for schools this year was required by the board of education as \$4,600,000, as compared to last year's estimate of \$4,621,000. County levies are based on school enrollment, number of teachers and school units.
