

MINERS DAILY AT BOOST OF UNION DUES

Rank-and-File Revolt Halts Hard Coal Production at 14 of Pennsylvania's Major Anthracite Collieries

(By The Associated Press)
HAZELTON, Pa., Sept. 12.—A rank-and-file revolt against a union dues increase approved by the CIO United Mine Workers of America kept hard coal production at a standstill today at 14 of Pennsylvania's major anthracite collieries.

Regional leaders of the principal union, whose chief is John L. Lewis, declared the work stoppage, involving nearly 10,000 men, was unauthorized and demanded that all return to their jobs. Lewis himself declined to comment.

The increases are only a milder step toward the 10-cent-a-week dues which are being proposed by the CIO. The union membership approved the increase in a national referendum, but miners in the area voted against it. The check-off is used for collection.

A temporary halt at least until Monday in the strike protesting union members had stretched across the Philadelphia and Reading areas. The strike also hit near Shenandoah in adjoining Schuylkill county.
