

Western Granges Submit Program For Agriculture

Wickard Announces Nation-Wide Farm-To-Farm Census to Determine 1942 Production Goals

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 16.—Urging that agriculture be given the "same consideration as in the past in the nation's defense effort, members of the Grange from seven western states today submitted a five-point agricultural program to Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard.

Pledging that state granges represented at a western farm conference here "will give their best to a program of necessary production goals for agriculture" as proposed by Secretary Wickard, the masters asked the secretary to follow these suggestions:

1. Defense production, agricultural income should be placed on a parity with incomes of labor and industry.

2. Crop reduction should be placed on a volume basis rather than an acreage basis to prevent unfair practices.

3. Draft Exemptions As far as possible and consistent with the defense program, farm boys necessary for agricultural production should be given deferred classification by selective service law.

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5. Priorities should be given for farm machinery and necessary materials for such machinery, as well as materials for packaging and processing farm products.

Grange masters adopting the program represented Washington, Oregon, California, Nevada, Wyoming and Colorado. The program was submitted by E. T. Taylor, director of the national office of the United States grange at Idaho.

Taylor also announced a meeting for Thursday night at Idaho Falls, and one Friday night for potato growers at Burley, reports on findings of the Salt Lake farm conference.

Requested to the conference today, Secretary Wickard announced a nation-wide farm-to-farm census to determine 1942 production goals for agriculture.

Representatives of the boards of 14 western states pledged support today to a program designed to determine accurately the nation's 1942 production of the nation's farm products.

Hoover Predicts Hitler's Collapse in Overreaching

CHICAGO, Sept. 16.—Hoover predicted tonight that the United States should build an impregnable defense, give material aid to democracies, but "wait for the enemy and reserve its strength to help in the reconstruction and stabilizing peace" when Hitler collapses of his own overreaching.

He stressed these points in outlining a "constructive policy" for America and contended that neither isolation nor intervention was wise or possible.

Hoover stated also that President Roosevelt was right in protesting against the listing on U. S. ships and the sinking of merchant ships.

But the greatest policy danger, he said, was the possibility of sending American merchant ships with cargoes to the most critical of all questions, he added in a prepared address on the CBS radio here.

These steps to war are unappreciated and unneeded by Europe. That is not in accord with the spirit of representative government and it should be remembered that three in-

terests are the consequence of war: the victor, the vanquished and the neutrals. Hoover said new objectives had been planned for an American people and that the navy had been ordered to start shooting.

No one will deny that if we keep up this step-by-step policy it will lead inevitably to sending our boys into this war by millions, riding without the specific declaration by the congress.

The former president asked "What is the constructive policy for America?" Then suggested that American policies should be predicated on these bases:

1. It is probable we cannot be invaded nor our economic life disrupted.

2. English can prevent invasion of her shores if she give her troops, land even with, without sending our boys to death, either on land or at sea.

3. Hitler, on the way to be crushed by the victors forces within his own regime.

"We have freedom by bitter experience. It is our duty to try to impose freedom and justice upon the world by war."

Hoover said he believed that the ideas and spirit of the west can grow and spread abroad by our own demonstration in this country. They die in the world if they shall become weaker for the American.

It may be said that the American compromise or alliance with either Nazism or Communism, Hitler's Russia, was a mere tactical aggression but also a moral surrender to the forces of darkness.

Nazi Armies Deep Eastward in Drive To Isolate Crimea

Russians Announce Smashing Of 30 German Vessels in Leningrad Defense

The German southern armies claimed last night to be sweeping eastward from the lower Dnieper river valley and hard-won bridgeheads toward the Neapolis steppe and by these accounts it appeared that a grand offensive to isolate the Crimean peninsula from the Russian mainland was well under way.

Little yesterday. They reported, however, a strongly successful continued defense of Leningrad in the northwest, and of the Red Baltic and Arctic fleets in the unimpeded control of the northern waters.

Specifically claimed by Moscow were: a punishing defeat of German mechanized columns before Leningrad in a battle that cost the Nazis 48 tanks and armored cars and 12,000 troops; the defeat of the German army and the capture of the mouth of the Gulf of Finland had been smashed; and the invading troops annihilated and the remainder driven into the sea.

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SLAYERS RENEW CLEMENCY BIDS

Mike Donnelly, Lyda Southard Among 79 Convict Petitioners

BOISE, Sept. 16 (AP)—Since Mike Donnelly entered prison 18 years ago on a Bonner county murder conviction 3,200 convicts have been in Idaho and most of them released. Now the 60-year-old mutant, who has spent much of his prison life in solitary confinement, has renewed his plea for clemency.

His name is among the 79 petitioners to come before the state pardon board at its fall meeting opening Oct. 1. The number, smaller in years, also includes Lyda Southard, Twin Falls county lynch slayer, who was sentenced to life in prison for good behavior (about six years) and served three times her minimum sentence. Donnelly, who had served time in Washington prison at Walla Walla, was a murder convict, as received in Idaho's penitentiary Sept. 17, 1923. Incurable when first committed, he spent more than two years of his solitary confinement in a lunatic room.

In recent years, Warden C. Van Clark said, Donnelly has been a good prisoner. He was denied a pardon July 5. His partner in the slaying was hanged in 1924.

Plea for Woman
Mrs. Southard has served 19 years on a 10-year term for second-degree murder. She was sentenced to life in prison by the April board, her present plea sets forth her belief she was punished unjustly and she can establish a business to care for herself in a "clean, respectable life" released now.

Original among the applications is that of William D. Hale, 21, sentenced to life imprisonment as an accomplice in the hold-up murder of Patrolman Craig T. Bracken in Twin Falls May 7, 1935.

Donald Williams, youthful gunman convicted of slaying Bracken, appeared to the board for a hearing on the night of "indubitable evidence" that Hale played an unimportant part in the shooting, which climaxed a service station hold-up of which Williams said Hale was unaware.

Torture Slayers
George and Joseph Santer, brothers who pleaded guilty to voluntary manslaughter in the Lincoln county "hog-lic" slaying of their father, Clinton Santer, are seeking clemency. They were admitted Feb. 6, George, 17, and Joseph, 21, explained their mother needs assistance.

A sister, Mrs. Flossie Phillips, who also pleaded guilty, was reprieved last July by Governor Clark and is living with the family in Blaine. David G. Hyde of the Shoshone Latter-Day Saints church. She also is asking a pardon.

Her husband, Chester Phillips, fourth principal in the slaying, was committed to Blackfoot state hospital.

"Old-time clemency" include Raymond Curtis, who has served five years of a 24-35 year sentence for a Woodland county murder conviction with three others was involved in an armed prison break in May, 1929, but was captured by possemen near Crouch, in mountains north of Boise. L. A. Verbeck, convicted Custer county wife slayer, has again appealed. He has served seven years of his life sentence.

More than 15 cases continued from the July board also will be considered, including that of former Probate Judge Robert S. Callis of Pocatello, serving a 1-14 year sentence for embezzlement.

Bailey sentenced him to pay \$10 fine, then suspended the fine on payment of the costs and showing that Truedell had obtained a driver's license.

GERMANS STRIKE AT OIL SUPPLIES

Russo-British Move in Iran Seen as Effort to Balk Drive on Bakou

Interpreting "The War News" Hitler's handiwork in Russia intimates that the most crucial German attack of the Nazi-Soviet war has been launched eastward of the lower Dnieper river line in the southeastern Ukraine.

From bridgeheads on both the north and south flanks of the great bend of the Dnieper, advances have been made on a wide front according to German reports. Presumably Hitler's main objective is Kiev, at the mouth of the Don river, 250 miles eastward of the nearest German bridgehead across the Dnieper at Zaporozhe.

Key in Oil Fields
Kiev, located on the eastern bank of the Don at the head of the sea of Azov, the northeastern arm of the Black sea, is the key to land approaches to Russia's fabulously rich Caspian oil fields. Through it runs the great pipe line tapping the oil fields north of the Caucasus range. Its loss would cripple Russian defenses even if German forces failed to turn the Dnieper corridor promptly and sweep on southeastward to seize the northern portion of the Baku oil fields and its refineries.

It is evident that the Anglo-Russian allies are gravely concerned at the threat to Russian oil sources. Synchronizing with the indicated launching of the German drive came word of forestal pressure by the allies which drove Reza Shah Pahlavi ruler of Iran, to abdicate in favor of his son. British and Russian forces were reported on the march to occupy the capital of Iran, Tehran, and to balk German threats to the Baku fields.

Curtain Lifts on Battle
Against the prizes sought by Hitler in the opening drive across the lower Dnieper, the German claims that three Russian armies have been placed in the north in a secondary offensive. The German bulletin blamed the scene of action below Lake Timan and some 150 miles south of beleaguered Leningrad.

That would indicate that a significant battle, until now not mentioned by either side, has been raging for days in the region of the Staraya Russa rail junction, just south of the lake.

Lacking Russian versions of the battle, however, it is not clear whether it involved a new German thrust via the Pskov-Pustok-Saraya-Batva single track railroad in an effort to drive a great wedge between Leningrad and Moscow, or whether it represented a heavy Red counter attack for relief of Leningrad.

attacks a hundred miles or so farther south down the Lovat and Upper Dvina rivers.

A Nazi drive toward Moscow from the indicated scene of action does not seem probable. The Volodykya range, the most mountainous terrain on the whole vast battle front from Leningrad to the lower Dnieper, throws a sheltering arm about Moscow from that direction.

War Given Credit For Business Gain
BOISE, Sept. 16 (AP)—Business is improving in the east, but Eugene Untermyer of New York City is wary the gain should be based on a war.

Untermyer, member of the law concern of Guggenheimer and Untermyer and nephew of the late Samuel Untermyer, internationally known lawyer, was in Idaho with A. C. Derfelzner, vice president of a New York pencil company. They planned to visit Hells Canyon of the Snake river on the Idaho-Oregon line.

"We must not be behind and to fight with all we've worth . . . give her all the help we can," said Untermyer, who declared by so doing the nation "may yet have to go into a shooting war."

COUNTIES RETAIN CASH RESERVES

Ada and Canyon Regard Surplus as Means to Prevent Borrowing

BOISE, Sept. 16 (AP)—Two of Idaho's most wealthy counties, Ada and Canyon, are proceeding today in conflict with an opinion by Attorney General Bert H. Miller that available surplus funds should be considered in future county levies.

Ada county commissioners set their levy at \$1.00 per \$100 valuation, 11 cent, under 1940, but they followed Miller's ruling the tax could have been nearly 50 cents per \$100 less because of surplus in the current expense and charitable funds.

Canyon county Commissioner R. S. Brown said his county had \$75,000 on hand in the current expense fund but declared \$40,000 has been borrowed this year in other funds.

Heads of both counties asserted the fund balances were not surplus but were cash on hand to meet obligations without borrowing until the next tax collections are made.

Yesterday was the day for setting county levies throughout the state. Money to be raised from them is payable the fourth Monday of December and is earmarked for operations during the 12 months preceding collection.

Brown declared Canyon county could follow Miller's opinion if it "wishes" to go back to conditions in 1924 and 1925 when, he asserted, it was over-run "to practically bankruptcy" to take warrants.

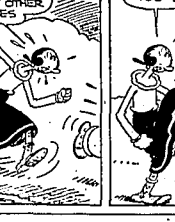

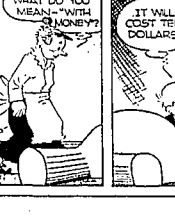
