Government Takes Over Operation of Strikebound Ships

Seizure Follows Seafarers Union Refusal to Submit War-Bonus Dispute to Arbitration

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—The seafarers international union (AFL), whose refusal to submit to arbitration its war-bonus dispute with the Alcoa Steamship company, resulted today in seizure of three Alcoa ships by the federal government, announced tonight it was willing to allow arbitration "on certain conditions."

The conditions, union spokesman Leonard Tir said, were that the arbitrators take into account the union's proposal to the Alcoa lines that the company apply a \$60-a-month top war bonus to steam employees of vessels plying the West Indies.

Tir said his offer would not hold good if the arbitrators fail to award the Alcoa line a \$60-a-month top war bonus to steam employees of vessels plying the West Indies.

The union spokesman said the recommendation to allow arbitration had been submitted to a vote in the union's executive council and that the first return—from Mobil—was overwhelming for acceptance.

The seizure today of the Pacific (AFL), which yesterday voted to join the east coast seafarers in a walkout, was the first in a series of seizures of ships by the government to force arbitration, mediation or anything else.

Two of the ships were loaded with supplies for an American offshore oil rig and were to be sent to the Gulf of Mexico.

Government officials said the union refused to apply the men. The commission could draw officers and crew from the government's training schools and to arm and transport supplies, maritime law.

FARMERS FACING STRICT CONTROL

Idaho Grange Master Avers Government Will Raise Price of Hitler Defeat

IDAHO FALLS, Sept. 18 (AP)—E. T. Taylor of Coeur d'Alene, master of the Idaho Grange, said today that the government's attempt to control farm production will result from the food-for-freedom program, but he added, "we must beat Hitler."

The Grange master spoke at the Idaho Grange hall near his home in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, where he addressed a group of farmers and farm laborers tonight.

"We must beat Hitler, and it appears that the farmer will have to do it," Taylor said. "We've got a wildcat by the tail, and we've got to hold on now."

The state master called attention to the fact that Idaho is asked to export huge wheat production reductions.

"This will work a hardship on many farmers, and the result may be that we will have to give up our land to the government," Taylor said.

Stukas Silence Guns of Island Fortress Guarding Approach to Leningrad

MOSCOW, Sept. 19 (AP)—German forces have reached the gates of Kiev, a Soviet information bureau communique reported early today.

Kiev, ancient capital of the Ukraine, is the third-largest city in Soviet Russia, with nearly 850,000 inhabitants. It lies some 500 miles inland southwest of Moscow and 300 miles north of besieged Odessa.

Fighting has swirled to the north and south of it as German forces seeking to advance directly on Kiev found resistance so fierce that they detoured in an effort to squeeze the city in a nutcracker.

The reports came amid assertions that the Red troops were suffering severe reverses on the whole front.

The Russians appeared to have suffered a major defeat in the isolation of the Crimean peninsula by the Nazi Luftwaffe. The Red army actually to be in a perilous position everywhere through the cumulative effects of enormous losses, particularly in the materials of war.

SENATOR SKEPTIC ON PRICE FIXING

Idahoan Questions Proposal for Prevention of Inflation

BOISE, Sept. 18 (AP)—In the opinion of Senator John Thomas (Idaho), "every step possible must be taken to prevent inflation," but he is skeptical of the benefits of a price-fixing statute.

Thomas in Boise today after visiting a brother, Frank, who is ill at home, plans to return to Washington early next week for hearings on a price-fixing bill in the senate banking and currency committee.

TORONTO, Sept. 18 (AP)—The Toronto Star today quoted "an infamously-placed Englishman who recently arrived here" as saying that British authorities had discovered 20 secret Nazi landing fields in the British Isles last September.

"Fifth columns had rolled out the fields and then disguised them with fences and brush," the Star quoted its informant as saying.

Counter-espionage agents discovered the secret fields were to be identified from the air by a brilliantly-painted red barn at the edge of each field.

20-30 Clubs Lose Members in Draft

IDAHO FALLS, Sept. 18 (AP)—Twenty-thirty clubs in the central Idaho area are confronted with membership problems inasmuch as selective service has taken as high as 50 per cent of club memberships, the district governor for Utah and Idaho, Karl Hale of Idaho Falls, said.

"The national average on membership drafts is 30 per cent, but the average runs about 30 per cent in Idaho," he said. The Twin Falls and Nampa clubs have had 50 per cent of their members called into military service, he added.

COLLEGE OF IDAHO HEAD WANTS WAR

Dr. W. W. Hall Would Make Fleet Available Now for Action

CALDWELL, Sept. 18 (AP)—Formal declaration of war against Germany and immediate availability of the fleet for action were urged today by President William W. Hall, Jr., of the College of Idaho.

In an address at chapel services, President Hall declared the navy should take over convoy and other duties of the British fleet in the Atlantic so the latter force might be used in the Mediterranean against the threat of the French fleet.

"We should make a formal declaration of war, not because this would alter our present relationship to Germany in any essential way, but because its effect would be devastating upon German public opinion and

electrifying to the conquered peoples of Europe and to those who are bearing the brunt of the air-raid against Hitler," he said.

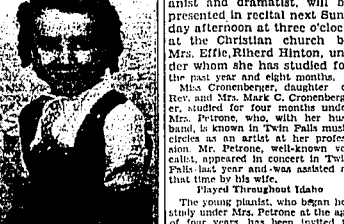
