Bernie Bierman's Gophers Conquer Washington 14-6

SEATTLE, Sept. 27 (AP)—The boys they've been talking up as an all-American candidate, 193-pound halfback Bruce Smith, lived up to all the advance notices today as he led the mighty Minnesota Gophers to a 14-6 victory over the University of Washington before 43,000 impressed spectators.



The intersection gridiron opener, witnessed by Seattle's record crowd, saw Smith virtually alone carry on his team's offensive to score touchdowns in the second and fourth quarters. It was the toe of Bill Garman, playing his first season, that made victory doubly sure, because the Gophers were leading only 7-6 up to the last two minutes of play.

Washington last made a ball game of it in the third quarter, aided by a break deep in Minnesota territory. Strong forward running by halfback Earl Stetle ran back to his point lead.

It was a rough, tough battle up front where the behemoths did their bruising. The Minnesota forward appeared tired when Washington was getting its score, and later didn't have the punch to stall Washington held the Gophers for downs on the one-yard line, after four cracks from the eight.

But Coach Bernie Bierman of Minnesota, astutely juggling his manpower, managed to rest some of his key linemen like Urban Olson and Dick Widung, tackle, and they had enough snap left to push over the line, just before the finish, with the driving Smith lugging the ball.

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



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HIGHWAY BILLING REPORT ISSUED

Survey Shows Costs Nearly Same for 1940-41 in Local District

Costs of billing Twin Falls highway district roads during 1941 compared closely with expenditures for this purpose in 1940, according to a report just completed by J. D. Binema, highway district director.

Average cost per mile during 1941 was \$14,697, as compared to \$14,403 for 1940. In 1941 the highway district had a contract for 4 miles of road mix and completed another seven miles with its own facilities.

Comparative figures show that dilling per square yard during 1941 was more expensive than for the preceding year, but this is offset by a decrease in cost of seal coat rock caused by a decrease in quantity used.

Average cost per mile for drainage, spraying and flume driveways was \$725, which makes a total of \$484.70 for 23.0 miles. Penetration road oil, plus application rocks, cost \$14,682.94, and seal coat for the same area cost \$23,822.

The report also shows that total mileage for which the district is responsible is 754, which includes 73 miles of state highway and 672 in district roads. Break-down of these figures indicates that under the highway, bituminous concrete leads with 11.8 miles, followed by bituminous mixed 61.40 and bituminous penetration 17.5.

Twin Falls highway district mileage consists of bituminous concrete one-half mile; bituminous penetration, 37 miles; bituminous mixed, 34 miles; gravel or crushed rock, 212 earth roads, graded, 82; earth roads, unimproved, 42; and earth roads, primitive, 200 miles.
