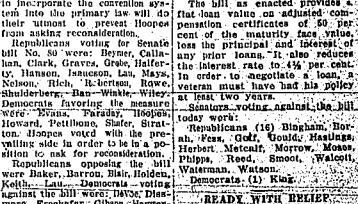

# JONES ACCEPTS LAST AMATEUR GOLFING MEDAL

James E. Sullivan Memorial Presented to Atlantian in Chicago—Ceremony Witnessed by Gathering of 1500

CHICAGO, Feb. 27. (AP) Bob Jones, greatest golfer of his generation, has received his last amateur medal.

Before a gathering of 1500 persons, the Atlantian received the first medal of the James E. Sullivan Memorial Golf at the Madison Athletic club last night and left for Hollywood a week to begin a series of talking pictures which will forever remove him from amateur medals.

The medal, cast in gold and five inches in diameter, was inscribed with the following:

To Robert J. Jones, Jr., of Atlanta, Georgia, champion of amateur golf in the United States of America, the A. A. U. awards this medal, 1931.

In a brief acceptance speech Jones said:

"I read somewhere once the purpose of having medals is to express thought and to express thought with respect, and I believe that's the only reason I'm here for."

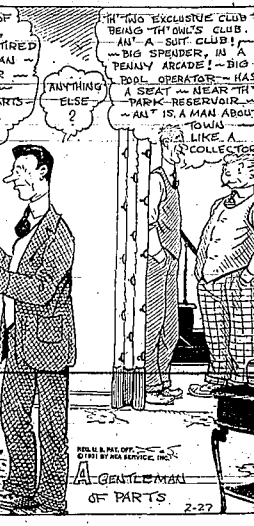

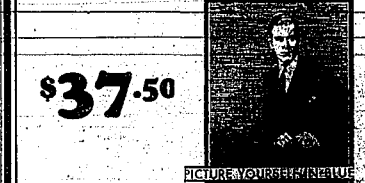

# IDAHO FARMERS RAISE BUMPER CROPS IN 1930

### Now Publication of Chamber of Commerce Will Present Yield Records; State Places First in Clover Seed

HOISE—While the whole nation is hearing of drought, loss of crops, suffering and hunger, it is encouraging to read of the results Idaho farmers made with their 1930 crops as recorded in a new publication of the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce. The publication will soon be off the press. Ten thousand copies are being prepared for distribution to farmers about Idaho.

One reads in this pamphlet that last year's yield per acre of all wheat in Idaho ranks first in the nation in average bushels.

Idaho is also first in clover seed and alfalfa seed. The production being 6.10 bushels and 5.19 bushels per acre respectively. The national average for clover seed is 4.43 bushels and 2.91 for alfalfa.

With winter wheat, spring wheat, barley and beans, Idaho's yield per acre is second in the nation and the average yields are more than 100 per cent above the national average.

In potato yields Idaho averages third place with an average yield of 214 bushels per acre. The national average, however, is but 166.40 bushels.

Idaho's corn yield for 1930 was 29 bushels per acre and was higher than any other state in the nation, with the exception of six relatively unimportant corn states, in the New England group.

Other information in the book, let deals with the manufacture and importance of the wool and fur industry, each of which is worth up to 40 million of dollars annually to the state.

The growth of the dairy industry is sketched in the figures. In that year, 1930, all dairy products manufactured in the state had a wholesale value of \$1,149,000; that the state ranks fourth in cheese production in the nation.

The wool clip for 1930 is shown to be 18,763,000 pounds with the state ranking seventh in the world.

Bean prices have declined to the point where further price declines will not increase consumption one bit—In fact an increase of 1-2 or even one cent in the price paid the grower would not increase the retail price and would therefore not slow down consumption. Buyers in Eastern markets have refrained from purchasing any quantity except to fill immediate needs and are going to continue this sort of buying policy unless some stability is put into the bean market. Just now there is danger of further declines in the near future unless the growers take some concerted action to prevent it. A change of 50 cents per hundred in the Great Northern beans unsold in the Twin Falls tract is of vital interest to every resident because it involves the sum of about \$350,000. If proper steps are taken this much can be added to the wealth of the tract, while if nothing is done to meet and correct present conditions it is quite probable that half this amount will be taken from the present value of the beans now unsold.

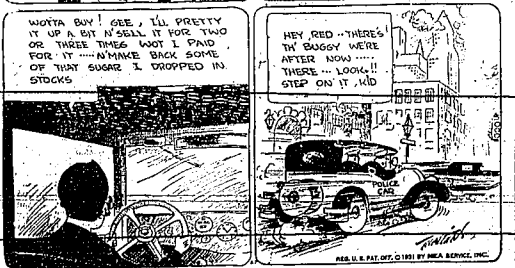
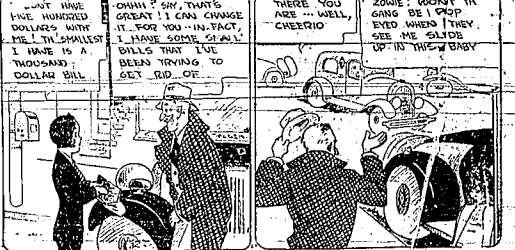
