TWO SIDES TO BONUS MATTER

THIS measure vetoing the veterans' loan bill, President Hoover made the following arguments against the measure:

When the original adjusted compensation act was passed in 1924, "it was upon the explicit understanding of the congress that the matter was closed and the government would not be called upon to make subsequent enlargements."

"There is 'not a penny in the treasury to meet' the new demands, and the government must either borrow or resort to increased taxation."

Veterans in need comprise "a minor percentage" of all those in distress, and they are being cared for adequately, often receiving preference from employers.

In a majority of cases the loan value of the certificates would be less than \$500; in 800,000 cases less than \$200, and in 200,000 cases only about \$75, so that such loans would not give adequate relief.

The bill is a "breach of fundamental principle" in that it requires the government to prefer loans to "a vast majority" who are able to care for themselves. The veterans themselves would oppose such a policy.

Business cannot be stimulated "by borrowing from some of our people, pledging the credit of all the people, to loan to some of our people who are not in need of the money."

The veterans who borrow to the limit jeopardize their own and their dependents' future security by reducing the ultimate value of their certificates.

Patriotism is "not a material thing. We cannot pay for it with government aid."

On the other hand, the head of the American Legion says there are 800 million dollars set aside in reserve fund to care for the payment of adjusted compensation certificates, more than the treasury department estimates will be required for the bill.

Apparently there are two sides to this question, as there are to every question, Congress, oblivious to the Hoover advice, is going right ahead on the matter, the House Thursday having passed the bill over the presidential veto, and indications are that the Senate will do the same thing.

THEY STILL FALL IN LOVE

A WRITER in the March issue of Harper's Magazine complains that romantic love has lost its power over the imagination of the race. Young lovers don't go in for poetry much nowadays. Magazines find in love a topic for cynical humor. The wise-crack has replaced the time-honored sonnet. To get the answer, probably, one should not go to writers of sundries at all. One should forget about books and magazines and plays and collegiate jokes, and go to the original sources—to the people, in other words, who really are in love.

That would not be hard to do. Any wanderer in any town can find them on every side. Whence come these silent couples that stand in doorways, prolonging a good-night kiss, oblivious of the passersby in the street? Whence come these couples in parked cars, who forget about the glare of the lights that throws their joined heads into relief, and find in each other's nearness something that can blot out the whole world? Whence come those strange, mystic glances that one is continually glimpsing on faces that drift by in a crowd, as if boys and girls by the myriad were going to meet a glamorous and ecstatic destiny?

All of these people could tell you. But they are not given to the traditional modes of expression. The modern girl may be as distracted by some boy's smile as her sentimental grandmother ever thought of being, but she doesn't moon about the house and drape herself listlessly over a sofa for hours of dreaming. She goes about her regular routine, and usually no one but the boy himself knows just how she feels about it. 


