## PRINCE OF WALES WILL SEE CHANGE IN LATIN AMERICA

Familiar Cities Vastly Different Than Few Years Ago; Many Celebrations Planned Honoring Visiting Royalty

LIMA, Peru (UPI)—The Prince of Wales, voyaging southward by British "salesman" to Latin America, will find many changes in the countries he will visit since his last visit there.

Although the Prince is traveling incognito in his journey to Buenos Aires, open journeys to cities and towns along his route have planned celebrations and entertainments of various regions through which the British heir and his brother, Prince Charles, will travel.

The prince has indicated such enthusiasm that vast crowds are expected to greet the royal party in all parts of South America.

**Empire's Interests**

The British Empire—Interests in Peru total about \$125,000,000, largely by 1938, according to the latest information, and extend to almost every important line of business. About 80 per cent of British exports to South America are

in the Peruvian corporation which controls all but 20 per cent of the country.

Leaving the Panama Canal, the S.S. Resolute will carry the Prince to the Peruvian oil port of Callao, where he will visit many strange and remote places he will visit on trips to the heart of the Andes and the Amazon, the Amazon and the continent. He will make a brief inspection of the British Rubber company and the Industrial Development Company, the Canadian subsidiary of the Standard Oil fields at Talara, and then return to Callao, where he will sail down the coast to Paita.

Later by ship to Lima and then go to various resort cities where he will stay for a week or two, ranging from 17,500 to 20,000 feet in elevation, and the seat of ancient Inca and Spanish civilization.

**Study Incas**

The Prince will have an opportunity to study Inca civilization at Cuzco, which once was a city of 200,000, particularly after the following lines: The Inca region over a distance of 100 miles

from Jujuy to Cuzco is intensely agricultural, with the Andes on one side and "Sarchachos"—bordered the railroad track on each side of the mountains, the great Inca road, the royal party will sing at an Inca hotel, and see the ancient royal residence of Cuzco, well known as the ancient Temple of the Sun.

Peru is the most unusual part of the trip, will be a journey by steamer, probably the fastest in the world, east into Lake Titicaca, in the lake of the Andes, will cross the lake to the Bolivian border, and then return to Lima.

Returning westward, via the Pacific, the capital of Bolivia, La Paz, and the Andean region of the Altiplano, on the border of the nitrate desert. The 20 years of work to develop the open bay into a port will be finished at a cost of more than \$7,500,000.

**May Fly**

The Prince probably will fly to Santiago and then visit Chile, returning to Argentina, where he will enter a summer resort place the Prince visited there in 1925.

Argentina is the great grain capital, and the modern town of Puerto Madero, on the shores of Lake Mar Chiquita, will be visited.

At Chile, another stop will be made at the foot of the Andes, where the climate is so different from the Andean plateau, and surrounded

by volcanic mountains which are reflected in its placid glacial waters.

Going his trip through Chile, the Prince will visit the ancient Indian region, where the natives were subdued in 1881 at Temuco, the hub of their aboriginal and a large number of Indians will greet the Prince in native dress. Later he will cross Todes dress, and the Andes, and descend to the Pacific Coast, and surrounded

by volcanic mountains which are reflected in its placid glacial waters.

A large airplane will probably be used to bring him to the port of Punta Arenas, the southernmost point of South America, where he will be met by the automobile and make pack train to Rauli Pass.
